

"Insurance is a device for repairing some serious injury, at a moderate charge by bringing together a multude of people, who agree that if a certain loss falls on one of them all shall unite in repairing that

To collect on fire insurance yo must have a fire loss. For theft insurance on your car, someone must steal it for you to collect. But in life insurance, it is different, for there is always a mat-brity date, which comes about through death, endowment, dis-ability, refusal of neglect to pay premiums, choice of paid up or extended insurance, or through case surrender value.

Insurance is based on the law

Insurance is based on the law of averages pertailing to life. Chas. Cabbage 125 years ago wrote: "Nothing is more proverbially uncertain than the duration of human life, when the maxim is applied to an individual, but there are few things less subject to fluctuation than the average duration of life in a multude of individuals" As I mentioned before, if you take 100,000 boys age 10, there will be 749 to die the firse year, but there is nothing so uncertain as who will be

You may be interested in how important life insurance is regarded in this nation. For instance in 1937, claims paid out were \$2,854,000.00; the five year total \$15,159,000,000. The 1937 claims were divided as follows: Death, \$1,093,000,000; matured indowments, and annuties, \$330,731,000;disability claims and accidental death benefits, \$144,968,000; payments for premium savings (dividends to policy holders) and for cash surreder values, \$1,285,000,000. Note that the living policy holders today are receiving icy holders today are receiving more insurance money than the deceased policy holders' benefi-

ciraries.

Total insurance in force in the United States Dec. 31, 1937, was 3117,000,000,000, an increase of \$14,000,000,000 since Dec. 31, 1933. Admitted assets were \$28, 417,000,000. Insurance was divisited as follows: Ordinary \$83, can spend wisely for improvement

If I am informed right, Texas 000,000,000; group \$13,000,000. Total premium income was around \$4,000,000,000. Thus, the American people are paying a good cent of the national income to insurance firms. In 10 years the insurance firms. In 10 years the insurance people distributed \$28. 519,000,000 to policy holders and beneficiaries. The average policy in the United States for 65,000, 000 policy holders is about \$1,725.00, a sum far too low to provide much security for 130,000,000 people.

Life insurance payments in Tex as for 1937 were \$68,800,000 for the tenth place in the nation. Texas is 5th in population and payments per capta were only \$11.24. Payments in Texas inculed: Houston, \$4,616,000: Dallas \$4,545,000: San Antonio, \$3,316,000: Amerillo \$723,000. Wich

009; Amarillo, \$733,000; Wichita Falls, \$720,000.

The 1938-1939 Spectator magazine of Prominent Patrons of Life Insurance Number lists 17 Life Insurance Number lists 17, 000 persons who did not object to publications of their names and who own more than \$50,000 of life isurance. There were 217 persons carrying more than \$1,000 000 in insurance, the highest being Pierre S. Dupont, Wilmington Del., with \$7,000,000 of life insurance. There were seven news. Del., with \$7,000,000 of life in-surance. There were seven news-paper publishers. Texas had four with these amounts: J. M. West, Houston, \$1,480,000; Clarence E. Linz, Dallas, \$1,236,060: W. L. Clayton, Houston, \$2,000,000; Jesse H. Jones, Houston, \$1,025, 000.

The per capita insurance written in Texas was \$128.17 in 1937. The per capita income in Texas was \$380.00 and the percentage of per capita paid for life insurance to per capita income in 1937 was 2.4 per cent. Per capita insurance in force was only \$502.50 rank as to per capita in force, 34. Per capita expense for new cars Per capita expense for new cars in 1937, \$21.86; amusements \$4.00. Texas per capita premiums paid for life insurance in 1937 fas only \$13.02.

I don't intend to get rid of ment. I don't intend to get rid of ment. I don't intend to get rid or the auto and buy a horse, quit smoking or visit the soda foun-tains, but I urge you to realize the potential buying power of your expenditures and try to get

your money's worth.

They tell the story about a horse pulling a street car up a steep hill in Denver. At the top of the hill, they loaded the horse on a platform and coasted down hill. The lesson is: A man should pay attention to his savings, so that the savings can carry him. If a man makes the savings in cash, his business, good investments, real estate or insurance, it may be possible to coast down the downhill of life, and take life easier just as the Denver horse easier just as the Denver horse easier just as the Denver horse did.

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
