## Bank Leader Speaks To Hansford Farmers

A. C. Williams, president of the Federal Land Bank of Houston spoke to an audience of Hansford county farmers that crowded the district court room to capacity, Friday evening Sept. 8th.

Mr. Williams made a most interesting and instructive talk along the line of Farm credit and marketing farm products. The speaker recently returned from a tour of England, France, Denmark, Holland, Sweden, Norway and Germany. His record of living conditions and farm marketing in these continental countries proved a revelation to Hansford people, and when they learned that thousands of families in foreign countries make a comfortable living on less than 5 acres of farm land, they left a bit more satisfied with their own opportunities.

As a feature of the program Mr. Williams showed moving pictures of natural scenery in Texas, rodeo events and industrial scenes.

Prior to the talk from the visitor, Secretary-Treasurer of the Hansford Farm Loan Association P. A. Lyon gave the annual financial report of conditions of the organization. The report received the compliments of the visiting president of the parent association. New directors elected at the meeting were Coy Holt and Ted Rosenbaum.

Many farm homes and yards in Hansford County are showing decided improvement over this time last year, so Virdie P. Wheeler tells us. Some afternoon when you are out driving notice these home and see if you don't agree. A number of families have first cleared their yards of trash, and rubbish and even filled in the blown out places with dirt, after which they have planted such flowers as zinnias, marigolds, pinks, larkspur, snapdragons, also trees and shrubs.

In yard improvements Mrs E T Read would probably rank first she has a beautiful old fashion flower garden, with a variety of flowers too numerous to mention.

Another prase in which many farm families will rank high this year is in canning. Virdie P. Wheeler states that nearly every family under her supervision endeavored to have a garden. Many obstacles were met such as drought, insects and hail but these families worked on with that "try again" spirit undaunted by such impediments since they have experienced worse barriers to progress—dust storms for example. As a result of their attempts to have fresh vegetables for home use and to can, ten families checked the past months had 825 qts. of vegetables and 1,510 qts. of fruit. Several other families were just starting to can from their garden, and had canned several hundred qts. of fruit.

First place canning goes to Mrs Ralph R. Fullbright who has canned nearly 700 qts. of food, about 350 qts. of vegetables though we admit all that did not come from her garden but the thing we are boasting about is that she got that much food in cans and is still planning to can more.

The Farm Security Administration has made it possible for several farm families to have water in their homes giving them an opportunity to also have a garden. Also the Farm Security has made it possible for farm families to have better cheaper medical care through a medical society that is now being organized.

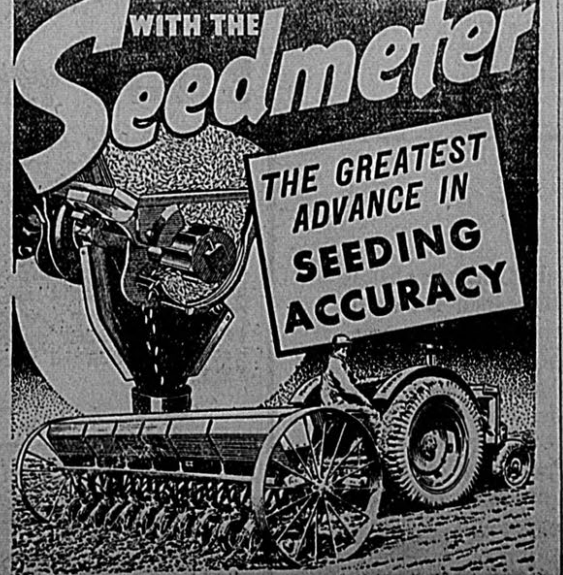


