INFORMATION FOR VETERANS WHO HAVE NOT RECEIVED BONUS

According to information from Postmaster Marvin Chambers approximately 40 per cent of the Baby Bonus Bonds have been received at the Spearman Post Office. Mr. Chambers expects to deliver bonds to 65 veterans at the Spearman Office. For the benefit of those who have not yet received the Bonds we publish the following information. Mr. Chambers has arranged to keep open house in the Post Office, and for those who work he will arrange to deliver or certify bonds at night. The veterans will receive a notification of the registered mail containing the bond. He will present this notice at the Post Office and receive his mail which will contain the bonds coming to him and the check for the odd amount under fifty dollars. Should the veteran decide he wants to cash the entire shipment of bonds he will contact Mr. Chambers or Mr. Whitson presenting his bonds and asking for certification. If the veteran is unknown he must furnish proper identification. Postmaster Chambers stated that he was sure he or his assistant, W. J. Whitson could identify any veteran that wanted to be certified for cashing bonds. At this rate it will not be any large job to take care of the 65 veterans of Spearman. However, the first problem encountered today has been so many veterans wanting their certification at the same time. After proper certification has been made the bonds are retained by the Postmaster and a receipt given the veteran. Checks will be issued by the Postmaster at Dallas, Texas and returned via mail to the veterans. Mr. Chambers estimates it will take a week between certification in Spearman and receipt of checks from Dallas.

OUR OWN BILLIE MURRY BACK ON JOB OF REDEEMING CARS, SOULS

Billie Murry, who has been away from Spearman for more than a year attending the University of Tennessee, is back at home on the job of redeeming wrecked cars and wrecked souls. Bill works on the car at McClelland Chevrolet Co. All thru the week and spends most of his time on other duties of his life. He will serve as pastor for the Church of Christ for at least the three months that he remains in Spearman. Billie brought his two children here with him. Both Virginia and Wallace are glad to get back to Spearman they declare.

An estimated total of slightly more than \$100,000 is scheduled to be released in the Spearman trade territory. This amount is to be released in this county according to figures of Marvin Chambers Postmaster and C. A. Britton American Legion leader, will provide far more than that in business Mr. Britton stated that he showed the first bonus changed hands ten times in multiplying business. He pointed out world-wide turnover in this business. According to Mr. Britton 20 per cent will hold their bonds and about 10 per cent will hold them till they mature. Concerning the use of the money Mr. Britton stated that the bigger amounts will go to different investments, into homes and for many other things. Bills will be paid and many veterans will use some of the money for such things as cars, appliances, furniture, clothing and a large number of the veterans of this county will spend a part of their money on their crops. The actual cash for the bonds is to be sent following certification of the bonds by postmasters acting postmasters or postal inspectors. The bonds are sent to Dallas and then the money is sent in the form of a check directly to the veterans.

OLD AGE QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS BY O. S. CARPENTER

This is the fourth of a series of questions asked by citizens of this State and answered by Orville S. Carpenter executive director of the Texas Old Age Assistance Commission. Q—Did the United States Government have any part in drafting the Texas law? A—The Tex. Legislature drafted the Texas Old Age Assistance Law in such form as to enable Federal cooperation. In preparing the bill the Legislature had the assistance and advice of a representative of the National Social Security Board. Q—How many applications do you believe will be approved by July 1? A—Approximately 40,000. Q—What about the payments to those people whose applications have not been approved July 1? A—The commission will continue investigating applications for assistance and as each application is approved, the applicant will receive a check for all payments beginning July 1. Aged applications who are found to be eligible after July 1 will receive back payments. This, of course concerns those who applied before July 1. Q—Payments will be based upon need as required by law? A—Yes. Payments will not only be based upon need but upon the amount of need. Old people who need more money will receive larger grants than those who need less. Q—Is it true that after the first job of investigating the 190,000 applications the commission will be paid by the Federal Gov. A—Yes. We believe that a large part, if not all, of the actual costs of operation after the 190,000 applicants have been investigated, will be paid by the U. S. Government. The 5 per cent expense allotment allowed Texas by the Social Security Board will be sufficient we know to cover ordinary running expenses of the Commission. ion of the State or in any other section so long as the major pipe line companies and the stripping corporations are permitted to keep our representatives in the Senate on their pay roll. The public at large, the land owners and the royalty owners have no representation in this matter whatsoever. It has been a fight between the major pipe lines and the strippers which has resulted in absolute detriment and loss to the public and the land owners. I am in favor of paying the pension now provided for by law. The people overwhelmingly voted for it and the Legislature of Texas had two full terms by which they could have passed proper measures assuring the payment of the pension. Why, then, should we take seriously now the campaign of the Legislature during the past two sessions when his past acts and conduct have displayed to us a total indifference toward the fulfillment of the peoples desires. What difference will it make, though so far as taxation pensions natural resources and all other problems that confront us so long as a Senator or a Representative in the Texas Legislature is permitted to say on the pay roll of the corporate interests who are seeking special privilege? International Sunday School Lesson

General Topic—Jesus Exalted Scripture Lesson—Luke 24:36-55

36. And as they thus spake, Jesus himself stood in the midst of them and saith unto them, peace be unto you.

37. But they were terrified and affrighted and supposed that they had seen a spirit.

38. And he said unto them, Why are ye troubled? and why do thoughts arise in your hearts? 39. Behold my hands and my feet that it is I myself handle me and see for a spirit hath not flesh and bones as ye see me have.

40. And when he had thus spoken he shewed them his hands and his feet. 41. And while they yet believed not for joy and wondered he said unto them Have ye here any meat?

42. And they gave him a piece of broiled fish and of an honeycomb.

43. And he took it and did eat before them.

44. And he said unto them, the words which I spake unto you, while I was yet with you, that all things must be fulfilled which were written in the law of Moses and in the prophets and in the psalms concerning me.

45. Then opened he their understanding that they might understand the scriptures. 46. And said unto them Thus saith the Lord, these things which I have said unto you should have been fulfilled in you, and ye have not believed. 47. And ye are witnesses of these things.

48. And ye are witnesses of these things. 49. And behold I send the promise of my Father upon you, but tarry ye in the city of Jerusalem until ye be endued with the power from on high.

50. And ye are witnesses of these things. 51. And it came to pass, while he blessed them, he was parted from them and carried up into heaven.

52. And they worshipped him and returned to Jerusalem with great joy. 53. And were continually in the temple praising God. Amen. Golden Text: Wherefore God also hath highly exalted him, and given him a name which is above every name.

The resurrection and the ascension of Jesus mark the greatest exaltation possible in the moral universe. There is the ascent from the nadir of humiliation to the zenith of honor and glory.

The exaltation from the tomb was more than the emergence of a physical body from Joseph's sepulcher. It was a triumph over Satan and the powers of darkness. It was a victory over death which is the last enemy to be destroyed. It was a complete conquest over everything that men suffer and dread. It was the finishing touch to the structure of human salvation.

The exaltation to the throne was more than the disappearance of a spiritual body skyward from the Mount of Olives. It was an ascension to the seat of infinite power in the government of God.

It is even now at the right hand of the Majesty on high and he will remain and reign till his enemies are conquered and the redeemed are saved fully and forevermore.

Jesus Resurrection Body I see my hands and my feet, I it is I myself handle me, see for a spirit hath not flesh and bones, as ye behold me having. It was a real body. It was the body in which he lived while ministering among men during his sojourn on the earth, but it was a changed body both physical and spiritual. It was no longer limited by the laws of

nature, which bind us to the earth, making us dependent upon food and drink for our sustenance, hether the body of Jesus underwent further changes as he ascended into heaven, we do not know. And they gave him a piece of broiled fish. And he took it and ate before them. The fact that Jesus actually ate and drank with them after he was raised from the dead is one of the proofs appealed to by the disciples.

The Foundation Of Our Christian Faith

As Luke relates the appearance of Jesus to the eleven disciples in the upper room, after night had fallen he lays stress upon the fact that Jesus appeared in bodily form. Jesus by every possible appeal to the senses made it evident that he possessed not an immaterial or spiritual or Celestial body, but the identical body of flesh and blood scarred by the cruel nails a body capable of eating food, a material body which could be touched and felt by his disciples. More over he solemnly declared that he was not a disembodied spirit; he showed them the wounds in his hands and feet; he declared that a spirit does not have flesh and bones which they saw he had and finally to remove every lingering doubt he took a piece of broiled fish and ate before them. The appearances and disappearances of Jesus after his resurrection may have been mysterious or miraculous as was his walking upon the sea in the days of his previous ministry; but he gave his disciples to understand by every conceivable sensible sign that he had risen from the dead in his actual physical human body. Upon the foundation of the established fact of a literal bodily resurrection this superstructure of our Christian faith firmly stands.

Prophecies Fulfilled By Jesus

All that things must needs be fulfilled which are written in the law of Moses and in the prophets and in the psalm concerning me. This three fold division is the most comprehensive designation for the Old Testament which we have; the law of Moses includes the first five books of the Old Testament, commonly called the Pentateuch; the prophets include what was known as the former prophets, all the books from Joshua through 2 Kings, excluding Ruth, and the later prophets Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel and the twelve minor prophets; the psalms, commonly called the writings covered all the other books including Ruth, Chronicles, Ezra, Nehemiah and Daniel. Notice how emphatically the Lord Jesus makes all the scriptures to be a witness to himself. No other person has ever lived on this earth who could ever truthfully say that he was the fulfillment of the predictions of a great body of writing circulated hundreds of years before he was born! Then opened he their mind, that they might understand the scriptures. Without an understanding of the Word, the apostles could never fulfill the mission to which Jesus Christ had called them. With a true insight into the meaning of the Scriptures, they would be equipped to convince the Jews that Jesus was the Messiah and would have within them a power adequate for each emergency.

The Ascension Of Jesus

And it came to pass, while he blessed them, he was parted from them and was carried up into heaven. The verb would indicate that Christ deliberately walked away from the disciples. The ascension of the Lord Jesus is referred to with amazing frequency by the later writers of the New Testament. His ascension was the inevitable consequence and climax of his ministry on earth. He could not remain upon the earth. He often said he would return to his Fathers home. By ascending to Glory, Christ indicated that his work on earth was accomplished and He ascended into heaven that he

might be invested with the glory which he forfeited when he came down to earth. In heaven he ever lives to make intercession for us. His ascension is the assurance that some day we also shall be taken up into glory. We could never expect our dust and ashes should ascend the heavens; but since our nature hath gone before in him we can now hope to follow after him. He is our head and where that is the members may expect admission. For in so great and intimate a union there is no fear of separation or exclusion.

I sure do not know a thing about how it could be arranged, but I do know that if I was commissioner of precinct No. 1 I would rather the voters decide this question than to have to make a decision myself.

One thing about this bridge that sure concerns me is the fact that it is developing into a sectional fight. I hear comments in the streets to the effect that it's the old county seat fight over again. I sure do not know WHY this old issue should be revived and I am going to say to the Spearman folk, that I believe you should keep your mouth shut about this issue. ence what one's attitude may be in respect to taxation what his promises may be in regard to pensions, or what his program might set up with reference to conservation of our natural resources if that man, whether he be Senator or Representative is permitted to stay on the pay roll of the State then the plans the promises and the program in general will fail because it is as true today as it was when written that "A man cannot serve two masters at one and the same time."

I charge that the present Senator represents at least twenty of the oil, gas and insurance corporations of this State; that Senator Small has represented gas stripping corporations in an effort to attack the validity and constitutionality of his own conservation measures; that Senator Small has voted constantly in the State Senate for corporations and had favored legislation that was favorable to the large utility companies and the other large corporate enterprises rather than the masses of the people."

Streets Of Paris To Be At Texas Centennial

DALLAS, June 11, 1936—The Streets of Paris with its sensational picturization of Ga Paree bids fair to be the most popular spot on the entire Texas Centennial grounds. Fashioned after the Latin Quarters of Paris, with a replica of the SS Normandie as the central piece in the place, it is attracting more attention than any other attraction on the grounds.

Located aboard the SS Normandie is the Centennial Club where royalty will be entertained if royalty attends the Centennial Exposition. Three decks of the Normandie are devoted to Centennial Club Rooms, two of these being air conditioned.

Famous pep shows, its gisettes its sidewalk cafes, its casinos and dance pavilions, the Streets of Paris opens the Centennial with a bang. Featured as the stage show in the attraction is Andre Lasky's French Revue, with 45 Continental Artists, and 24 Parisienne models. Another feature will be Francis Dittrich's Art Institute, where living models will be sketched by visiting artists. Room will be reserved for spectators who seek to see how an art institute is run. Thirteen prominent artist models from Chicago have been brought here for this feature of the Streets of Paris.

Many sensational acts have been signed for the Streets of Paris to augment the French Revue. Among these are four high diving acts. Maudin, the world's most famous high diver. Another act is the Venus in the Shell, and many other famous acts.

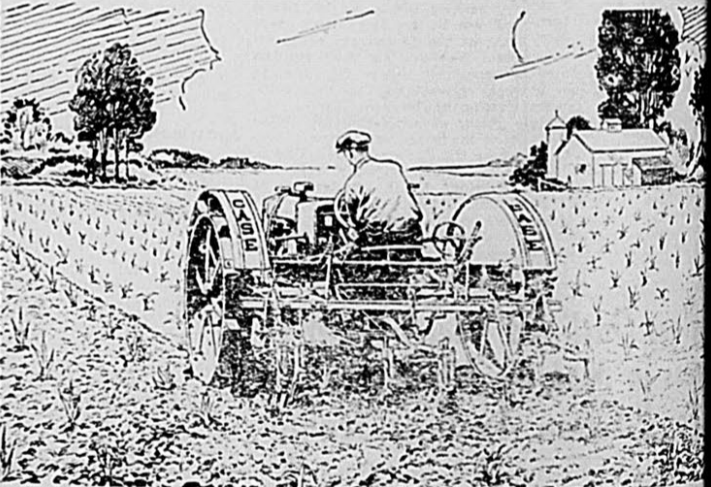

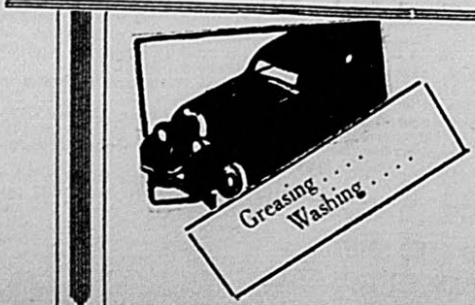

Good Management Helps In Controlling Soil Erosion

By T. V. Weaver

The successful farmer makes plans for the future while carrying out the necessary tasks of the present. Good farm management means looking ahead and making adequate provisions for the feed needs of livestock from year to year as well as to increase the usefulness of land rather than to permit our most precious natural resources, the soil, from being wasted and destroyed. Good farm management does not permit overgrazing of winter wheat fields stalk fields and pastures. It provides for the feed needs of livestock by planting and storing surplus feeds to supplement the pastures during emergencies. It means keeping up the vegetable content of soils, and getting a vegetative cover on the land. It means keeping the moisture and use of emergency cover crops after the regular crops fail.

If livestock are to be grown in connection with wheat farming the farmer must plan to raise feed and store it in trenches or stacks for emergency needs. The practice of over-grazing means the loss of the farm and when the farm is ruined the livestock must be sold or moved to a farm capable of producing vegetation sufficient to meet their needs. As long as there were favorable seasons for crop production without moisture conservation practices and there were no shortage of feed for livestock, the stubble and other residues gave the soil protection from blowing. Crop failures meant a loss of vegetation cover and the resulting feed shortage induced the over-grazed stalk fields, winter wheat was also overgrazed. This crop started

a practice which proved to be a very destructive program of overgrazing. Partial crop failures have prevented a recovery of adequate vegetative cover and permitted the soil to drift with the wind in a very destructive manner.

Erosion is controlled in proportion to the continuance sequence of good crops. If a good crop is produced considerable residue (stalks leaves and roots) is added to the soil. This rotted vegetative matter increases the water-holding ability of the soil thus increasing the moisture accumulated and held in the soil because of the presence of an adequate supply of organic matter.

Since moisture is the limiting factor in crop production farmers should employ every means to save moisture and hold it in the soil. It has been shown experimentally that July rainfall, fall moisture to a depth of three feet, amounts of available nitrogen in the soil and the amounts of unrotted vegetable matter in the soil, affected the prospects for a wheat crop.

It is doubtful whether burning of stubble fields should ever be practiced since it constitutes a permanent reduction in organic supplies.

If from a drought or any other cause the regular crop fails, plans should be made to plant a cover crop.

Crop failures in dry years can be prevented only by moisture conservation. The prevention of run-off water by contour tillage adds moisture to the soil and helps make for more favorable crop conditions, especially in dry years.

THE MENACE OF SOIL EROSION

(By Grant Woodward, Assistant Engineer)

Too much emphasis cannot be placed upon the damage done by erosion and the final consequences if erosion is allowed to go on unchecked. Man by removing the covering of grass and shrubs with which nature protected the land from erosion has allowed the uncontrolled forces of wind and water to carry away our rich surface soil. Unless we wish to reach the condition of soil depletion as is now present in Japan, Italy and China, we must organize our forces to combat our greatest enemy erosion.

The severness of our situation is clearly explained in the following extract from a pamphlet published by the U. S. D. I.: "Unprofitable clay-baked ridges, gullies barren range lands, wind-swept farms and abandoned

farmsteads are mute evidence of the rapid devastation of our land by water and wind. Too long we have taken it for granted that erosion is just a natural unavoidable occurrence. Too long have we failed to realize that man cannot continue to prosper if his work is out of harmony with nature.

Already 35,000,000 acres of land in the United States once valuable and fertile, now lies ruined by erosion and abandoned by man. Another 125,000,000 acres has been stripped of its productive surface soil. In this impoverished land subsoil farmers are struggling to eke out a bare existence on barren, clay-baked ridges and gullied slopes. Another 100,000,000 acres now lies at the border of destruction. These acres are a part of our national total of less than 400,000,000 acres of agricultural land.

While this devastation of agricultural and range land continues 3,000,000,000 tons of soil, washed from field and hillside annually silt our streams, reservoirs and river mouths. From the broad fields of the Mississippi Valley a-

lone, soil which has an economic value equal to 1,250 farms of 160 acres each is washed into the Gulf of Mexico each year. The total yearly damage of erosion is estimated at \$400,000,000. The farm owner of a Palouse wheat farm could not replace his annual soil losses for ten dollars per acre per year.

History has seen entire civilization in once prosperous nations of the Old World and China vanish as erosion lands takes its toll. The valuable lands are being stripped of their fertile topsoil, floods carry away, unchecked, the rainfall which nature provides to replenish our ground water supply and to feed our springs, wells, and streams.

Nor is this all. Poverty and suffering for thousands of farm families must be the outcome unless the ravages of erosion are halted. Vast areas of now fertile farm land will lie desolate in abandonment, entire farm communities will disintegrate; the relief rolls will be swelled by those no longer able to wrest a

living from erosion-blighted soil. More tremendous even than this destruction of erosion work. Untold millions of dollars in damage to our costly reservoirs and irrigating systems, the clogging of our navigable rivers, the depletion of our ground water supply, the burying of rich bottom lands under tons of unproductive sand and clay and gravel
