Wichita Trade Trippers Bringing Big Brass Band

When the booster train of the Wichita Chamber of Commerce visits Spearman April 22, it will be accompanied by a musical organization that is known from coast to coast and has the distinction of being the best organization of its kind in the entire United States.

The Wichita American Legion band holds that distinction by virtue of having been awarded first prize last October in the national Legion band contest held in conjunction with the national convention at San Antonio, Texas. With the award, came the appointment as the official band of the national Legion for the present year.

The Wichita band was organized in 1922 and the following year made its first trip with the Wichita boosters. So popular did the organization prove to be that it has been considered a necessary feature of the trips every year since.

The band also has always attracted more than usual attention at the national conventions of the Legion, and several times, prior to last fall, placed high in the competition, twice being awarded second place. In winning the first prize at San Antonio, the band nosed out the Sioux City organization which has held the honor for five years and which far outnumbered the Wichita Boys.

The band is directed by Duff Middleton, one of Wichita's most successful musicians and well known throughout the Southwest.

This will be the twenty-fifth good will trip of the Chamber of Commerce of Wichita and has been designated as the Silver Anniversary Trade Trip. At every stop along the route, silver bells will be given away by the boosters as souvenirs indicative of the occasion.

DRIED MILK WILL HELP CURE CHICKS

For chicks affected with coccidiosis a diet rich in milk is one of the measures advocated for the cure and control of the disease, by the poultry husbandry department of the Ohio State university. Not that simply feeding lots of milk is a sure or complete control measure. It must be employed as one of the features of a general treatment of which sanitation and prevention are the outstanding particles.

In combating coccidiosis in a flock the poultry husbandry department recommends four steps, giving epsom salts at the rate of one pound to four gallons of water; confining the chicks to the brooder house or moving the house to clean sod so that there is no reinfestation from the soil; cleaning the brooder house thoroughly and disinfecting it every three days; and placing the chicks on a diet which is rich in milk.

Quick relief from a diet of liquid milk is not likely because the birds will not consume enough of it. In using dry milk, best results are obtained when the mash is composed of 40 parts of dry milk. No other source of animal protein should be used in the mash.

The following mixture has been found to give satisfactory results when fed as soon as the disease appears and kept before the chicks as long as it is in evidence; Dry skim milk, 40 pounds; wheat bran, 10 pounds; yellow corn meal, 30 pounds ground rolled oats or barley, 20 pounds.

DO YOUR SHOPPING NOW

There are many things which December and April do not have in common, weather being the first point on which they differ, but there is one bit of good advice which can be accepted without question either in December or April. This message of pure wisdom is: "Do your shopping early."

The buying public has learned from sad experience that Spearman stores do not emulate the tradition "general store" in buying stocks in the lump for the next five years. Parodying the bromide, "The early bird catches the worm," it can be said with truthfulness that "The early shopper catches the pride of the shops." If you don't buy early you take what the other shoppers have refused.

Spring and summer buying is limited chiefly to wearing apparel, household needs and the implements of out-of-doors life. At this time of the year the mind of every man, woman and child turns to the thought of light and colorful raiment, to furnishings which will lend a cool summery atmosphere to the city home and to the multitude of accessories to summer play. Our merchants recognize this seasonal demand and provide amply for it, but it is manifest that the wide choice of the new stocks can not be maintained to the end of the season.

Many people defer their spring buying until the passing of winter. Others advance their seasonal buying a few weeks and give themselves the privilege of leisurely shopping and wide choice. The late shopper saves no money and loses that antivable satisfaction given only to the early shopper.

Spring stocks are fresh on the counters. The very first choices are already being made. He and she who hesitate will lose. Shop early for spring as well as for Christmas.

CLEAN-UP

There is no "sure sign" of Spring but spring should be a "sure sign" of the arrival of that time for the community to clean up. There is no superstition or prophesying about this clean-up sign.

When warm weather has come to stay (until cold weather returns in the autumn) every owner of property and tenant should instinctively feel it his duty to remove the evidences of winter's ravage and to aid and augment nature in her work of rebeautification.

Every spring clean-up program should include disposal of winter's accumulation of litter and decayed vegetation, repairing and repainting of buildings, and landscape gardening. Landscape gardening is no longer associated with large estates alone.

Cleanliness about the person or the home costs nothing. A community clean-up need involve no expense, except of a moderate amount of labor on the part of the householders. If there ever were excuses for uncleanness they were removed long ago.

What is the compensation of a community-wide clean-up campaign? It improves the general health of the community by removing deposits that are breeding places of disease germs and disease carrying insects. A clean town is a better place in which to live than one that is unsanitary and unsightly. And the best community advertising is the appearance of being "cleaned-up, painted-up and planted-up."

HATCH CHICKS EARLY

In making the decision he should take into consideration not only the future usefulness of the birds. It is a fact that early hatched chicks are more profitable winter layers, the same as fall freshening dairy cows are the most profitable milkers.

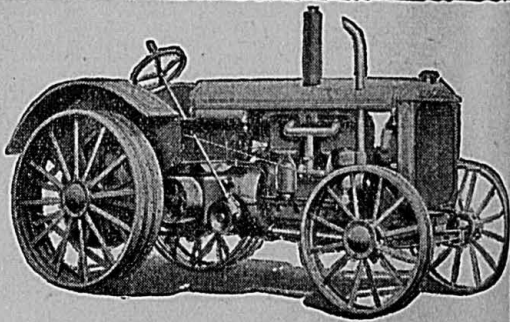

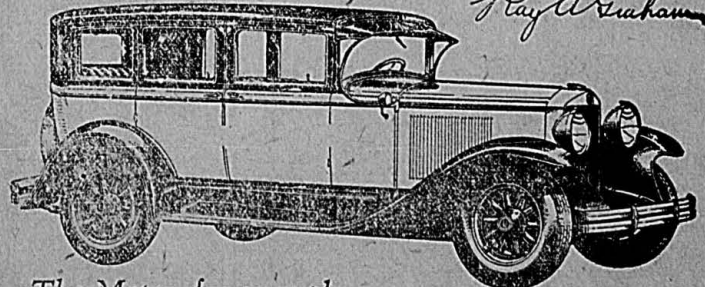

FIVE-YEAR FARM SURVEY

Two leading engineering groups will shortly begin a five-year study of the entire farm problem, according to a recent announcement, the survey to include farm management, financing, economical production, elimination of waste, the use of power and mechanical equipment, and the betterment of relations between agriculture and commerce and industry.

This survey will be undertaken by the American Society of Agricultural Engineers and the American Engineering Council, of which President Hoover was formerly the head. The methods to be employed will be similar to those of the Hoover committee on waste in industry, which was instrumental in effecting economies extending to many lines of manufacturing.

For several years increasing attention has been given to research and fact finding as means toward better methods in commerce and industry. While similar work has been done in behalf of agriculture, no such comprehensive study as that now planned has ever been undertaken. The new survey will doubtless be a most important step toward putting agriculture on a more sound and business-like basis.

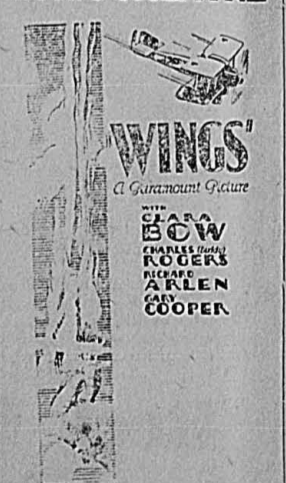
