### Mrs. Fannie Richardson Rites Held On Thursday

A large crowd of friends and relatives filled the Union church of Spearman to overflow Thursday afternoon to pay tribute at the funeral services for Mrs. E. F. Richardson, pioneer citizen of Hansford county who passed away at Qanah, Texas, late Tuesday May 5, after a lingering illness.

The profession of flowers that were banked about the casket and chancel of the church bore testimony of the esteem of friends.

Services were conducted by Rev. Eulis H. Hill of the Christian church and Rev. W. A. Hitchcock of the Methodist church. The funeral prayer was given by Rev. Hitchcock.

Three favorite Hymns, "The Old Rugged Cross," "Beautiful Isle and Does Jesus Care," were sung by the choir under the leadership of Fred Hoskins.

With the passing of Mrs. Richardson, Hansford County has lost one of its most highly respected and useful citizens.

She was first of all a Christian. Her life was built upon her faith in God. She was a charter member of the local Christian church and has served in various offices of the church for many years.

Her home was her sanctuary. It was as a mother of a fine Hansford county family she excelled most and is most deserving of praise.

She has left this community the memory of a good name fragrant with honor and goodness.

### Obituary

Emily Frances, daughter of James William and Anna Eliza Ralls, was born near Center, Ralls County, Mo., on August 24, 1868, and passed away at Qanah, Texas, May 5, 1936, age 67 years 8 months and 11 days.

At the age of 14 she accepted Christ as her personal Savior and united with the Christian Church, of which she remained a devoted member all of her life, being a charter member of this local congregation.

On August 14, 1890 she was united in marriage to Robert McAlpine Richardson at Perry, Mo., and the young couple established their home at El Paso, Texas, moving to Stephens County, Texas, in about 1895, and later to Hansford County, Texas, in May 1902, where she lived there past 34 years.

To this union five children, 3 boys and 2 girls were born all of whom survive, and are present today: Alvin Richardson, Mrs. J. S. Caldwell, Mrs. P. A. Lyon, Ralls Richardson and Eugene Richardson, all of Spearman.

She is also survived by one sister, Mrs. C. L. Higbee of Houston, Texas, who is present, and two brothers, E. H. Ralls of Shelby, Mo., and Clifford Ralls of Peoria, Ill. Her husband, Robert McAlpine Richardson, preceded her in death, June 1, 1918.

She also leaves a host of friends and acquaintances who found in her a real neighbor and friend.

### Four Delegates Elected To Attend State Demo. Convention May 26.

Judge J. H. Broadhurst of Spearman, Hubert Durham of Morse, Lee McClellan of Spearman and Frank Mack of Gruver, were elected as delegates to the state democratic convention to be held at San Antonio, May 26.

The county convention was held at the Court house Tuesday afternoon and aside from electing the above delegates and going on record instructing the support of President Roosevelt and John N. Garner in all action at the state convention, the convention had little business.

Hubert Durham agreed to make the trip to San Antonio, and will perhaps be able to secure proxy voters to cast the full four votes Hansford county is entitled too at the state meeting.

### LION CLUB PLANS ANNUAL SOFTBALL SEASON AT MEET

Discussion of plans and organization of the Spearman softball league was the principal topic of discussion at the regular meeting of the Spearman Lion club Tuesday noon.

Committeemen for the club agreed that it was a bit too early to start softball play at this time and set 2 weeks from date as the opening of the season. In the meantime, every person man or woman who desires to take a part in the various games are asked to register with Bill Miller at the Spearman Reporter. Schedules will be made and the season officially opened within 2 weeks.

Qualifications, Age 17 to 28 single, unemployed, and whose families have been and or receiving aid from the government. They must be able to stand a physical examination and if the applicant has had previous CCC work he must have served at least four months.

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### LAST OF 1935 AAA ALLOWANCES IS BEING PAID NOW!

Wheat producers of Hansford county were made happy this week when checks covering approximately 400 contracts totaling one hundred thousand three hundred and eighty five dollars arrived in Spearman, Tuesday morning. County Agent Lester Boykin assisted by two clerks began issuing the checks immediately after their arrival.

Of a great deal of interest and encouragement to Hansford producers was the fact that every check received was much larger than anticipated by growers. Settlement was made at the rate of 12 1/2c per bushel, whereas the settlement anticipated was at the rate of 8 1/2c per bushel, the rate that was used last year in making the final payment of 1934 contracts.

The shipment of checks represented the payment of the final installment of the 1935 contracts. The present payment represents approximately two thirds of the amount that will be received by Hansford county wheat growers.

Contracts are finally being paid. It is estimated that approximately \$50,000.00 more will be paid in the county within the next few weeks.

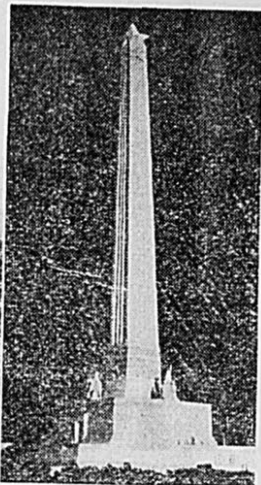

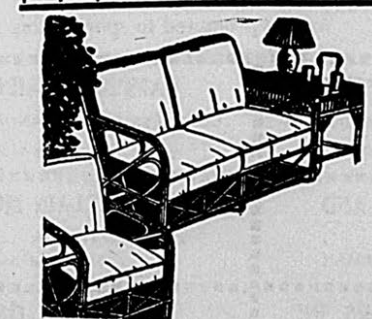

the high road to amendment." "Archbishop Usher often confessed that he hoped to die with the language of the publican in his mouth. His wish was fulfilled for his last word were God be merciful to me a sinner."

#### The Parable Of The Unjust Judge.

In Men ought always to pray and not to faint. We find Christ anticipating the parable and giving an explanation of it before he states it. It is a proface to the book.

#### The Two Characters Studied

Here are two types, the judge and the widow, clearly defined, as clearly as a verbal photograph could make them. Note them and you have a perfect picture of the times and conditions. The judge He feared not God. Here is a cold careless, unscrupulous character who boasted fearlessly of his corruption, to the point of declaring that he did not take God into account at all. He is a type that lived in that day, and is still among us, who bought his way to prominence, and asked odds of no one, save the ruling prince, even as such men today defer only to the political gangsters who put them on the ticket for a price. He regarded not man. Though unscrupulous, he was not two faced about it. He acknowledged that he didn't care a snap of his finger for public opinion, but was in office for the spoils, and cared not one whit for justice.

Note the widow. We must be aware that in that day and country a widow had hardly any rights especially if she was poor and obscure. Imagine then this woman with few if any friends, and without influence, appealing to an unscrupulous judge saying, Avenge me of my adversary, or Do me justice of my adversary or protect me from my enemy

#### Results Of Persevering Faith

She came 'oft' until, though he would not for awhile, but after wards said within himself, Though I fear not God, nor regard man; yet because this widow troubleth me, I will avnge her, least she wear me out by her coming.

The widow's perseverance got results, not because the judge believed in or desired to render justice in her case, but because she was interfering with his physical comfort, had become an annoyance to him.

### The Pharisee and The Publican

It is quite apparent that this parable is a perfect picture of what Christ intends to teach, namely, to frown down on self-righteousness. Could a more appropriate place be found for its setting than the Temple. Two men were going up to the Temple to pray. Those who have been to Jerusalem have seen just such a scene. There are still the two types to be found there. In the Holy City the Pharisee still is admired by the people. There ostentations still is admired and private and public processions are still in vogue. Imagine this self-righteous individual, well dressed, dignified, outwardly reverent, going to the Temple to perform his religious duties. See the publican, weighed down with sin, and seeking succor from the weight of it.

#### Two Kings Of Prayer

We discover that the Pharisee stood and prayed thus within himself He carried on a conversation with himself. He gave himself a self satisfied statement about his own virtues. He was not talking to God. He did not have God in mind at all. This man was outwardly very religious. The things he told himself: O God, I thank thee, I am not like . . . rogues . . . or like this tax gatherer.

But the publican standing afar off, would not lift so much as his eyes unto heaven, but smote his breast, saying God be merciful to me a sinner. Just the opposite in attitude and spirit is this Tax Gatherer. He holds himself aloof because he thinks himself unworthy to worship with others. There is the absence of self-assertion. He is painfully conscious of his sins. The publican thinks of himself alone as the sinner.

#### The Answer

I say unto you, this man went down to his house justified rather than the other for everyone that exalteth himself shall be humbled; but he that humbleth himself shall be exalted. This despised tax gatherer, this betrayer of sacred duties, this poor sinner, found grace. It is an example of God's attitude always. Thou desirest not sacrifices of God are a contrite spirit; a broken and a contrite heart, O God thou wilt not despise. The prayer of the publican went to the source of help. (God) went to the source of a yearning. A sense of guilt and a yearning for pardon and a cry to God for mercy, that is the very beginning of a new life; and however far one progress in holiness there is ever need of similar humility.

#### Payments To Veterans

World War veterans will receive a settlement of their adjusted service compensation very soon after June 15, according to the Treasury Department. Under the law passed at the present session of Congress, the bonds by which payment will be made cannot be delivered before June 15, which is the date they become effective. The bonds have been printed and have been sent to the Federal Reserve Banks for distribution.

Because of the mailing problem which would be created by the release of 2,000,000 letters all at once, the payments will be mailed in large batches. Within a short time after June 15, every veteran who has had his application approved is expected to receive a registered letter containing settlement.

Applications are being received daily and it is estimated that there will still be 700,000 applications on hand when payments are started. These are ones which have recently been received or about which correspondence has been necessary. They will be taken care of as quickly as possible.

The letter which the veterans receive will contain the bonds in denominations of \$50, and if the sum is less than \$50, due, this will be in form of a treasury check. No other person except the veteran can sign a receipt for the letter for the bonds.

Bonds may be converted into cash by application at any of a large number of post offices of this section. The list of these has not yet been announced but there will be 250 or 200 of them.

#### Payment Through Local Post Office

The Treasury Department explains that it is not necessary for the veteran to call at one of these post offices in order to have his bonds converted. If he does not live near one of them, he can take his application to his local postmaster, who will certify to his identification. The bonds desired by the local postmaster will be forwarded by the local postmaster to the nearest post office making disbursements. A check will be sent back immediately to the veteran.

It will probably be more satisfactory for the veteran to cash his bonds through his local postmaster so as to avoid any problem of identification. All bonds will be dated June 15, 1936, and will run to June 15, 1945. They may be exchanged for cash at any time during the first year at their face value, and if held one year from the date of issuance they may be exchanged with an additional 3 per cent.

The law provides that the bonds shall not be transferable, and cannot be assigned toward purchases. They are payable to the veteran only, and can be cashed by him only.

"This plan has become the topic of national discussion on radio, pulpit, platform and street, and in the press, club, social circle and in millions of American homes. It is more than an old-age pension proposal. It is a national permanent recovery program whereby we may all get back to a normal and decent standard of employment and living. 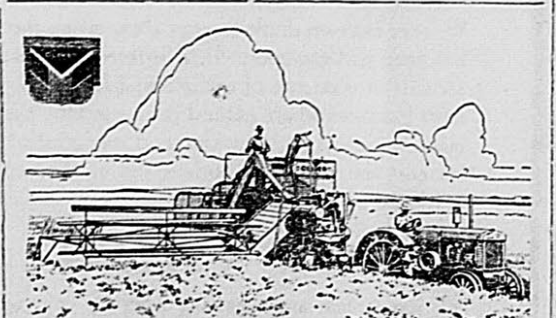

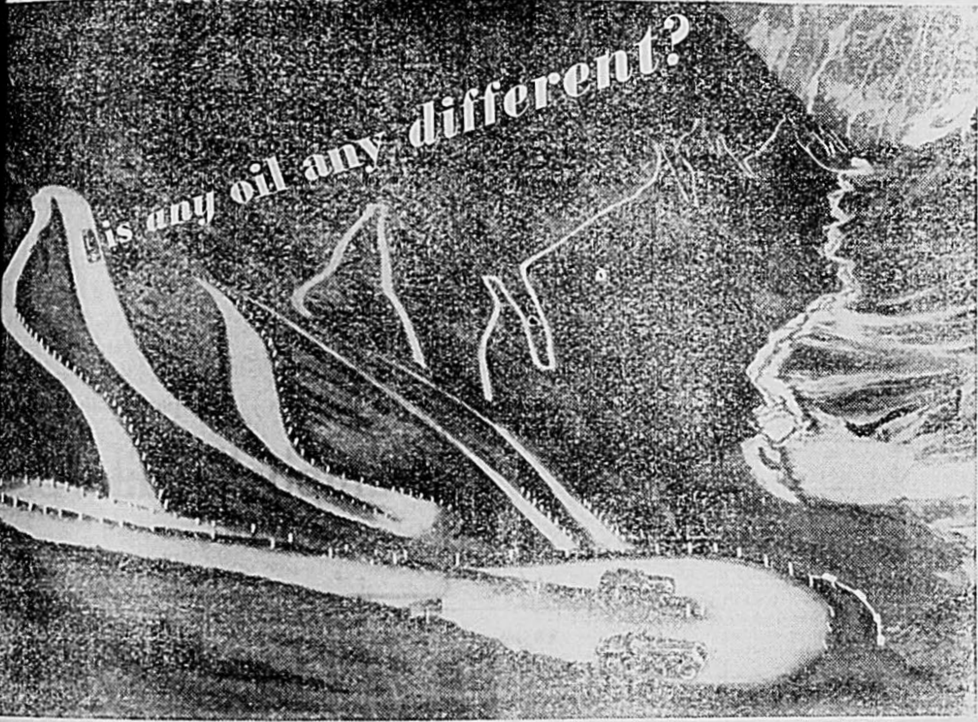
