

Thousands of poorly paid workers are thus putting part of their meager earnings into games of chance and liquor, and it is impossible for them to get ahead.

Havana with its disadvantages vet we leave a pleasant recollection. You will never forget the Prado, with the raised street running several blocks to the Gulfa. You will think of America of 25 years ago. But you will not find the Cuban women in somber black like you do in Mexico.



Young persons who became 21 years of age prior to February 1, 1936, should have obtained an exemption certificate prior to that date in order to vote. If they have become 21 years of age since February 1st, or will become 21 years of age prior to elections during the year in which they offer to vote, they will be titled to vote, even though they did not obtain an exemption certificate prior if February 1st, nor paid a poll tax, since none was assessed against them last year. Persons Who were past 60 years of age before February 1st of last year are not required to pay a poll tax or secure exemption.

Other exemptions include Indians, persons insane, blind, deaf and dumb, and the who have lost a hand or a foot, or who are permanently disabled.

If you have lost your poll tax receipt or leave it at home on election day you make affidavit before the election judge, by signing your name to such affidavit his presence.

In voting draw a line through every name for each office except that of the care FOR whom you want to vote.

Any citizen moving to Hansford County after Jan. 1, 1935 from other states have exemption certificates to vote in the Democratic Primary election.
