

PAPER FOR ALASKA

For several years the enormously ncreased demand for paper of all kinds has given concern to many, who feared that with the depletion of the forests of Canada and the United States a paper famine might

This fear has led to the substitution with more or less success of other fibres instead of wood, as well as efforts to make available new ources of wood pulp supply.

In the scarch for new timber the paper manufacturers have recently turned to Alaska, where immense forests of suitable woods have been discovered. Within the past few months 2 of the largest timber sales ever made by the United States For-est Service were negotiated for Alaskan forests.

The last one, which accepted the bid of the San Francisco Chronicle and associates, involves the purchase of 835,000,000 cubic feet of pulp timber in the vicinty of Juneau, Alaska, the contract requiring the erection of a paper mill of 200 tons daily capacity, to be increased within 15 years to 400 tons.

The same interests are seeking water power sites in that region where tremendous potential water power exists.

Recent surveys of Alaska by gov ernment aviators have revealed al-most limitless natural resources, and it is likely that adventurous spirits of the future will there find a virgin field for their activities.

Be-cause of this many are duped into paying more than regular mar-ket prices for things they buy. This class of people is especially susceptible to the appeal of anything resembling an auction. Fake auc-tions with the cards stacked against the buyer are very common. They rank high among the fraudulent schemes of the country. The "here today and gone tomorrow" auction faker rents a fine looking house in some high-class section of the city in which he plans to operate. He furnishes this house with the cheapest imitations of high-class fur-nishings, with here and there a fine pieces are aliged antiques with a thread of glorious his-tory behind them. Of others it is claimed that they have been handed down for generations, or with some famous Southern family. Of other pieces it is maintained that they are made of rare and precious woods imported from far across the sea. The oversuified furniture, it is claimed, is all high grade of standard manufacture.
