### Information On New Farm Program

All farmers who have received a notice under the 20c per acre program should bear in mind that they must receive pay under this program by May 15th. Any farmer who has received this money and not used it as agreed is subject to Federal regulations for recovery of money under false pretenses. Information is put out by the county committee in charge of the program in the county for the benefit of farmers concerned.

Limited amount of milk, kafalini seed is available for distribution subject to regulations regarding its use. Any farmer or club boy interested, get in touch with Vernon Martin, assistant who has charge of the program.

Farmers interested in the new program should bear in mind the following: 1. That there is no money to be made out of this program. 2. That no farm can qualify in the program if a work sheet is not filed. 3. That if a farmer wants to be in the program he makes application for a grant later in the year. 4. Each farmer must divert a certain amount of land to a soil conserving crop or practice to qualify for the first flight. 5. The number diverted to soil conserving crop or practice should be the ceiling for the program. 6. If a farmer has more than 100 acres any farm may be divided into sections as prescribed for the program. 7. That the farmer must earn money before collecting in the program. 8. That the county committee will certify a farmer for the program if in their judgment he is a good farmer and has become a wind erosion fighter in the community in which he lives. 9. You will find a list of soil conserving crops and practices to which some soil building practices will be accepted in this program under the new program.

### LIIONS WILL HOLD PICNIC HONORING SCHOOL TEACHERS

### OLD AGE PENSION INFORMATION FOR HANSFORD PEOPLE

This is the first of a series of questions that the people of Texas are asking. Orville S. Carpenter, state pension director, answers them frankly and to the point.

Q.—Why cannot assistance be paid to every person in Texas who is 65 years of age or older?

A.—First, because the Texas law says that assistance may be paid only to those in need; second, because the Federal Government will not allow us to pay Federal money to people who are not in need.

Q.—Will not Federal money mean a lot to Texas?

A.—Yes, it will mean that several millions of dollars each year will be given to the aged people of Texas that they would not otherwise get; it will mean that with it a person will be able to receive as much as \$30. per month, and without it no one could get more than \$15. dollars per month.

Q.—What does the Federal law say about 'need'?

A.—It says that the Federal appropriation is made for the purpose of enabling states to assist aged needy individuals.

Q.—Was this aged needy individuals checked?

A.—The social security Board stated that this was the correct interpretation of the law.

Q.—How does the Texas definition of needy compare with that of other states?

A.—Texas has the most liberal definition of aged needy people in the U. S. The Texas law is much more liberal on this point than that of any other state in the Union.

### OPEN BASEBALL SEASON WITH GAME SUNDAY

Spearman will open the 1936 baseball season here Sunday May 17 with Perryton as their opponent. This game bids fair to open one of the most successful seasons enjoyed by Spearman in many years, if the enthusiasm shown in the first meeting last Sunday is any indication.

Baseball enthusiasm reached a new high in Spearman last Sunday as the first meeting was called and organization for 1936 was completed. Every one seemed to be pepped up over the prospects of this year, and after a lively discussion of the short comings of private teams in Spearman, Manager Carl Meek and Fied Captain Buster Cator began laying plans for the coming game.

Everyone seemed to believe that the people of Hansford County and Spearman in particular, would appreciate and support a baseball team that could hold its own with the best amateur teams of the panhandle, so it was decided to combine the teams of Hansford County so that a team of this caliber could be gotten together.

Repairs on the local Base Ball field is under way, and it is hoped that everything will be in shape to open the season Sunday in great shape, and before a good crowd.

### FINANCIAL AID FOR FARMERS IS BIG TEXAS ITEM

More than 7,000 farmers and stockmen in Texas borrowed over \$5,000,000 during the first four months of the year, in order to finance their crop and livestock operations on a cash basis. According to Tully C. Garner, president of the Production Credit Corporation of Houston, this amount represents an increase of more than \$1,600,000 over commitments made during the same period in 1935, when farmers and stockmen received commitments amounting to \$3,397,517. In the period of March 1, 1934 to April 30, 1936, commitments amounting to \$22,794,442 were made.

Organized early in 1934, these farmers short term lending associations have advanced a total of over \$31,000,000 to Texas farmers and stockmen to grow crops, finance ranching activities, purchase fertilizers, farm supplies, machinery and work stock. Operated by farmers on a cooperative basis and supervised by the Farm Credit Administration, the production credit associations are partially owned by the borrower member and serve in every county in Texas.

### Tax Burden Will Not Increase With Gov. Land Program

AMARILLO, May 11—What are political subdivisions to do for tax revenue if the government acquires land in its conservation program? is a question that is occasionally raised on the south plains. A reassuring answer came to that question today from the regional office of the Resettlement Administration here. It gives figures showing that fifty percent of the land acquired have been tax delinquent for two years or more.

The 9,000,000 acres which are being purchased for conversion to forestry grazing, wildlife protection, and recreation by the Resettlement Administration throughout the nation, have a total assessed valuation of only \$26,000,000. Actual tax levies against the properties amounted in 1935 to \$1,030,000, and only half that amount was collected.

Local governments will be relieved of many expenses now being incurred for roads and schools which can be closed following the purchase of the unproductive land areas. Federal subsidies for relief will also be decreased. This is particularly true in Region 12 according to officials in the Amarillo office.

### Rates Are Set On Soil Building For West Texas Counties

Soil building practices have been officially stamped by the Soil Conservation Administrator in Washington D. C., A. L. Smith state agent assigned to conservation work in Texas announced last week.

Soil building practices have been divided into three parts, seedings crops plowed under for green manure, and establishment of pastures and forests and terraces. Payments for soil building practices which will be made to the producer who incurs the expense of the soil building practice consist first of seeding alfalfa, sericea and kudzu-rate of payment from the government will be \$200 per acre when seeded on crop land between January 1, 1936 and Oct. 31, 1936; seeding red clover, annual lespedeza-rate \$1.50 per acre seeding alsike, white, burr, and crimson clover, Austrian winter petch and other locally adapted legumes, rate \$1.00 per acre.

Under the second part of building practices come crops plowed under for green manure, velvet beans, cowpeas, crop, beggar weed and other locally adapted summer legumes, rate \$1 per acre if grown on crop land in 1936 and vetch and stalks left on land and seed not harvested, oil milling or crushing, or \$2.00 per acre if plowed under, green crimson clover, bur clover, Austrian winter petch and other locally adapted winter legumes, rate \$1.50 per acre when turned under, rye, oats, barley, Italian grass, wheat, or mixture of the rate \$1. per acre when turned under as green manure.

Any sorghums Sudan grass millet seeded, solid or broad, by Texas farmers will bring a rate of \$1. per acre when planted between Jan. 1 and July 31, 1936 and the crop left on the land and plowed under.

One other group of soil building practices pertains to the establishment of pastures or perennial grasses or grass and legume mixtures and will pay a rate of \$2. per acre.

The planting of forest trees will pay a rate of \$5. per acre if planted on crop land or pasture land between Sept. 1, 1935 and Oct. 31, 1936.

In the case of terracing the government will pay the farmer 40c per hundred feet of completed terrace not to exceed \$2. per acre, the terraces must be constructed according to methods recommended by the State Conservation Board and the Texas Extension Service. Proof must be shown to the county soil conservation and allotment board that the terraces have been kept up as specified in the application for a grant.

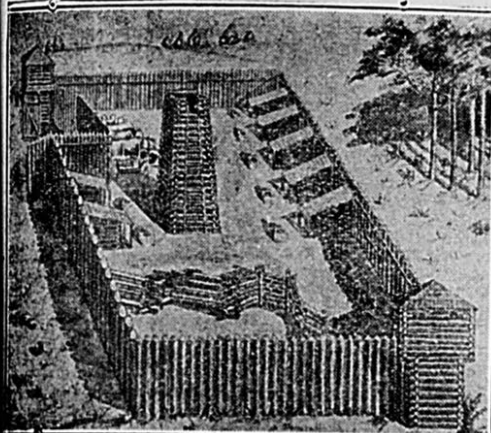

## International Sunday School Lesson

General Topic:—Jesus Inspires Honesty.  
Scripture Lesson:—Luke 19:1-10; 45-48.

1. And Jesus entered and passed through Jericho.  
2. And behold, there was a man sitting by the roadside, and he was called Zacchaeus, which was the name among the publicans, and he was rich.  
3. And he sought to see Jesus who he was; and could not for the press, because he was a little of stature.  
4. And he ran before, and climbed up into a sycamore tree to see him for he was to pass that way.

5. And when Jesus came to the place he looked up and saw him and said unto him Zacchaeus, haste and come down for to abide at thy house.  
6. And he made haste and came down, and received him joyfully.  
7. And when they saw it, they murmured, saying That he was to be the guest with a man who is a sinner.

8. And Zacchaeus stood and said unto the Lord: Behold the half of my goods I give to the poor; and if I have taken anything from any man by false accusation I restore him fourfold.

9. And Jesus said unto him: Today salvation is come to this house, because much as he also is a righteous man.  
10. For the son of man has come to seek and to save that which was lost.

11. And he went into the temple, and began to cast out them that sold therein, and them that bought.  
12. Saying unto them: It is written, My house is the house of prayer; but ye have made it a den of thieves.

13. And he taught daily in the temple. But the chief priests and scribes and the chief of the people sought to destroy him.  
14. And could not find what they might do: for all the people were very attentive to hear him.  
15. Text: Thou shalt not steal. Exodus 20:15.

INTRODUCTION  
The general lesson heading for this lesson is "Jesus Inspires Honesty." The topic for young people is "Taking Religion in Business." The Golden Text is "Thou shalt not steal." The lesson is built around the story of Zacchaeus, a publican who was a sinner. The lesson is divided into two parts. The first part is the story of Zacchaeus, and the second part is the lesson on honesty. The lesson is designed to help young people understand the importance of honesty in business and in life.

The City Of Jericho  
And he entered and was passing through Jericho. The City of Jericho has been referred to in the preceding lesson. The following words may be added; Jericho was called the city of palm trees. It is about six miles from the Jordan River and about fifteen miles distant from Jerusalem. It was a city notoriously wicked, and Dr. William Thomson that great student of the Holy land has some where very aptly said that not only was Jericho because of its location far below the level of the sea, the nearest city, geographically speaking to hell, but also in the morals of its people, nearer hell than any city of late Bible times.

Zacchaeus The Publican  
Verse 2 tells us that Zacchaeus was the chief among the publicans. Moffatt translates the statement, the head of the tax gatherers. So Zacchaeus was the head collector of taxes for this place and a man of some prominence in the community. Verse 2 states also that he was a rich man. He had evidently made considerable money out of his position and had saved it. This financial standing would also add to his prominence. In all likelihood some of his gain was made by unfair means, as his desire for restitution after conversation would indicate.

Jesus Sees And Calls Zacchaeus  
In verses 3-6 we are told that Zacchaeus was anxious to see what Jesus was like, and being short of stature and unable to see because of the crowd he climbed a tree so as to get a look at the man who was so kind to taxcollectors. Evidently he had heard much about him. When Jesus came along and looked up he saw Zacchaeus and immediately told him to come down at once for he was to dine with him that day. A self appointed guest he was, but what an honor and privilege to have him! And this was all the more significant when we realize that there were almost as many priests there as in Jerusalem; yet Jesus chose to lodge with a publican. How democratic and interested in humanity he was! Zacchaeus immediately came down and gladly welcomed him.  
In verses 8-10 we are told of the changed life of Zacchaeus due to his meeting with Christ. All that transpired during the visit is not recorded. The final result of it though, was that Zacchaeus was a completely changed man. That is the important thing. The formal steps in the regulation ex-



perience of conversion are not made clear, but the evidence of it are there. Zacchaeus proceeded to tell Jesus that he would give half of his goods to the poor and also if he found that he had exacted more taxes from anyone than he should he would repay fourfold. With such salvation of a conversion experience, Jesus immediately said: This day is salvation come to this house. What Zacchaeus did well illustrates the topic for Young People and Adults, Taking Religion into My Business, for that is exactly what is involved. Religion does effect one's personal domestic business and political life. And if it can be made so to do it will correct the evils of amusements, of the home of the economic order and of political life. John Wanamaker and others are fine examples of business men who have carried Christ into their business.  
The Parable Of The Pounds  
The parable recounts how the nobleman on leaving called his ten slaves together and gave them a pound each and told them to trade with it while he was away. When he returned he called the servants together to ear a report of their success. The first stated that he had gained ten pounds, and as compensation was given the rule over ten cities. The second reported that he had gained five pounds and was given the rule of five cities. The third came returning his pound saying that he had hid his pound in a napkin. The nobleman addressed him as a good for nothing slave and commanded the pound be taken from him and given to the one with ten pounds. Unto every one which hath shall be given, and from his that hath not, even that he hath shall be taken away from him.  
Personal Accountability  
There will be an accounting some day for the use we have made of what God has entrusted to our hands.

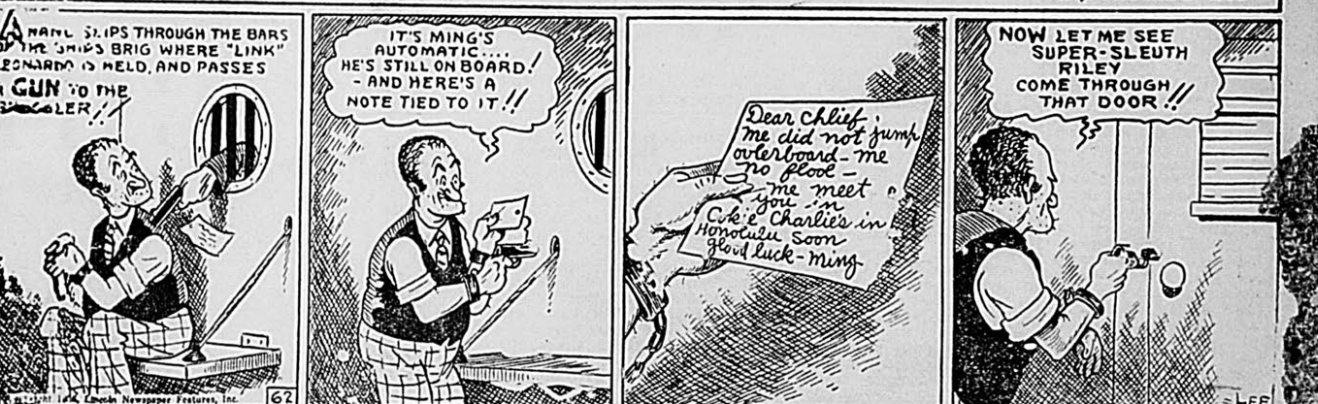
## Night Automobile Accidents Serious

Last year during daylight there were 14,000 fatal automobile accidents as against more than 19,000 during dusk and darkness. But total accidents in daylight exceeded the number during dusk and darkness by more than 130,000.  
The fatal accident record during dusk and darkness, in proportion to all accidents in such periods, was 92 per cent greater than the daytime experience. The tremendous loss of life during hours of darkness constitutes one of the strongest arguments against the present-day practice of driving too fast. There is a way to explain the high rate of death per accident at night except by the fact that many operate cars at speeds during darkness which do not permit them to stop within the range of the illumination provided by headlights. Under such conditions lives are crushed out whenever the unexpected happens. Either highways must be illuminated and the lighting of streets improved, or drivers must remember and act on the warning: WHEN THE SUN GOES DOWN, SLOW DOWN.
