## Railroad Meeting at Spearman Saturday Afternoon, Sept. 15

Amarillo Business Men Will Be Here to Discuss the Matter of Building a Railroad North Out of Amarillo—Everybody Should Attend the Meeting at 1:30 p. m.

This "railroad north out of Amarillo" talk just will keep bobbing up, and it gets louder every day. The next important step, in this connection is the meeting to be held in Spearman on Saturday afternoon at the Lyric Theatre building. A delegation of Amarillo business men will attend this meeting. The Delegation will be headed by A. S. Stinnett, the first president of the Panhandle Plains Chamber of Commerce, and one of the greatest boosters for the North Plains in the southwest. They will have some interesting things to tell the people of the Spearman country and this meeting should be largely attended. Come out and hear the talks and learn the real facts in the case of what is being done and what is proposed, in the matter of building a railroad north out of Amarillo. This is the next great development of the North Plains country. It is coming, as sure as sundown.

A direct route to the Gulf ports would mean about ten cents on every bushel of wheat shipped from this country. It would not take many years for this community alone to pay for a road to Amarillo. Every farmer, stockman and business man in the Spearman country should attend the meeting at the Lyric Theatre in Spearman on Saturday afternoon at 1:30. It is important.

### CARS WILL RUN DAILY TO AMARILLO

J. W. Anderson & Son of Canyon, are Running a Service Car Line Daily from Spearman to Canyon.

J. M. Anderson of Canyon was here Wednesday night and completed the arrangements for the establishment of a daily service car line from Spearman to Canyon. The route runs via Dumas and Amarillo. The car will leave Spearman every morning at 7:00 o'clock; arrives at Dumas at 10, at Amarillo at 12:30 and Canyon at 2:30. This venture will prove to be a great convenience to the people of this section. Mr. Anderson's charges are very reasonable, and for a short business visit to Amarillo or any of the towns down the line it will be cheaper to patronize the North Plains Stage Line, as it will be known, than to drive your own car. Spearman headquarters of the line are at the Hillhouse Drug Company. Mr. Anderson is a pleasant gentleman to meet and we sincerely hope he makes a success of this venture. One of the great conveniences it will afford is to furnish Spearman with a daily paper every Sunday. The publishers of the Amarillo Daily News have made arrangements with Mr. Anderson to bring the News to Spearman every Sunday. This will give us a Sunday morning paper just a few hours later than the city folks and is really an up-town arrangement of which we will be proud. And this is leading up to an arrangement which has been talked of for a year or more. That is, the establishment of a mail line from Amarillo to Spearman. With this daily service car line in operation, there is no reason why a daily mail should not be established over the route. The Farmers and Citizens Commercial Club of this place should take this matter in hand at once, and by a persistent effort, the mail line could be added to the passenger line within a short time. And again, when Amarillo gets her railroad to the north, it will run over the same route as this passenger line running. Big trucks are hauling freight over this route every day from Amarillo to Dumas and Spearman. Some day trains will be running over this route, and the line will extend north to Liberal, Kansas. Which is a fact.

### SAYS COTTON IS THE CROP

Will Develop the Country Faster Than any Other Crop, and Pays Much Better Than Wheat.

H. R. Lyon, of Denton, who is visiting relatives here, in discussing the future of the Spearman country, says that it is his belief that cotton will some day be a profitable crop in this country, and that the settling up and development of the country will come through the cotton-raising route. Mr. Lyon has watched the development of the west for many years and his opinion is worth while. He lives in a wheat-producing section, Denton county, and he says that cotton which will make only a bale to four or five acres will pay the farmers better dividends than wheat, even at an average yield. He states that cotton is now selling at around 24 cents per pound, which would make a 500-pound bale bring \$120; the seed is bringing \$42 per ton and one-half a ton is obtained from each bale. This would make every bale of cotton worth about \$140. And the beauty of cotton-raising, says Mr. Lyon, is that a farmer does not have to invest a fortune in equipment before he is ready to start. Of course more acres of wheat can be produced than cotton, but the investment is likewise greater. Another advantage in cotton raising is that cotton can be followed with wheat and the land is already in just the proper condition. Mr. Lyon would not cut the wheat entirely. This is too great a wheat country for that, but he would advise the planting of less wheat and more cotton on every farm in the country. It will bring people to the country, more land will be put under cultivation and the rainfall will increase.

#### TOO MUCH HARD TIMES TALK

There is entirely too much talk of hard times in Spearman and vicinity. It is true that money is not as plentiful as it has been, but it is likewise true that money is about as plentiful now as it will be any time soon, and to keep continually talking about it will not make better times. It will only make bad matters worse. The truth of the matter is, Spearman and the Spearman country have much to be thankful for at the present time. We have produced a good wheat crop and the row crop is fine. Many farmers sold their wheat while it was down to the lowest price, and did not realize much profit from it, but it is now selling at around a dollar per bushel, and those who have not sold are coming out considerably ahead of the hounds. Those who planted cotton are much enthused over the prospects, and broom corn raisers are highly elated. As a rule the fellow who raises the loudest howl is the one who has made the least effort. The man who keeps everlastingly at it usually comes out in pretty good shape.

Spearman has several hundred spare dogs. They rove about town in great droves and make the nights hedious with their howls. A city ordinance compelling the payment of a stiff dog-tax would be a mighty nifty piece of legislation.

#### NOTICE TO PARENTS

Compulsory School Attendance Law. Sec. 294. Attendance Requirements and Provisions.—Every child in this State who is eight years and not more than fourteen years old shall be required to attend the public schools in the district of its residence, or in some district to which it may be transferred, as provided by law, for a period of not less than 60 days for the scholastic year, beginning Sept. 1, 1916, and for a period of not less than 80 days for the Scholastic year beginning Sept. 1, 1917, and for the scholastic years 1918-19 and each scholastic year thereafter a minimum attendance of 100 days shall be required. The period of compulsory school attendance at each school shall begin at the opening of the school term, unless otherwise authorized by the trustees prior to the beginning of such school term; provided, that no child shall be required to attend school for a longer period than the maximum term of the public school in the district where such child resides. (Acts of the 34th Legislature, Chapter 49, Sec. 1.)

Sec. 295. Exemptions.—The following classes of children are exempt from the requirements of this Act:

(a) Any child in attendance upon a private or parochial school, or who is being properly instructed by a private tutor.

(b) Any child whose bodily or mental condition is such as to render attendance inadvisable, and who hold definite certificate of a reputable physician specifying this condition and covering the period of absence.

(c) Any child who is feeble minded, for the instruction of whom no adequate provision has been made by the school district.

(d) Any child living more than two and one-half miles from the nearest traveled road from the nearest public school supported for children of the same race and color of such child, and with no free transportation provided.

(e) Any child more than 12 years of age who has satisfactorily complete the work of the fourth grade of a standard elementary school of seven grades, and whose services are needed in support of a parent or other person standing in parental relation to the child, may, on presentation of proper evidence to the County Superintendent of public instruction, be exempt from further attendance at school. (Acts of 34th Legislature, Chapter 49, Sec. 2, as amended by the Acts of the 37th Legislature, Chapter 125, Sec. 1.)

Art. 1513g. Any parent or other person standing in parental relation, upon conviction for failure to comply with the provisions of this act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be fined for the first offense \$5.00, and for the second offense \$10.00, and for each subsequent offense \$25. Each day's absence from school may constitute a separate offense, etc."

### THE REASON WHY YOU SHOULD RAISE MORE HOGS

The past few years have served to prove beyond a shadow of a doubt that the production of livestock is the most important and profitable phase of farming. Not only is this true, but it is now a universally accepted fact that admits of no argument and let it be said to the credit of the intelligence of the American Farmer that once convinced of the advantages of livestock as a means to increase the revenue derived from his farm and to increase the fertility of the soil, he undertook the increased production of livestock and the results have been such that farming without livestock is a situation that will never again be known to the world of agriculture. Livestock is permanent on every farm and it can be truthfully said that farming can not be profitably conducted without the production of live stock in connection with farming operations. In nearly every farming community the farmers who have accumulated wealth and who are the forces behind the real accomplishments of the community are livestock farmers.

In an analysis of what constitutes livestock on American farms we are told by figures officially compiled that nearly fifty per cent of the total value of the meat products slaughtered in the packing houses of the United States is derived from the hog. We can present no more telling argument to the American Farmer, in our efforts to encourage the raising of more and better hogs than these simple figures and this fact that fifty per cent of the meat products of the United States is produced by the hog, should be sufficient reason to decide all farmers, not heretofore raising hogs, to begin the production of pork.

The Hog is primarily the most profitable animal on any farm. No other farm animal matures as rapidly, reproduces as quickly and in as great numbers, or requires as small an initial investment. The capital, labor and equipment necessary to engage in raising hogs is so small that it is within the means of every farmer to be a producer of Pork. The income derived from the production of pork is quick, continuous and sure, which insures the farmer the use of ready money at all times of the year. Growing hogs thus earns quick interest on the principal and enables the hog grower to realize on the principal which can be re-invested. In other words money invested in hogs is subject to "quick turnover" and is not indefinitely "tied up". The Banker readily appreciates the financial advisability of growing hogs and investigation will show that the pork producer is generally regarded by bankers as a safe risk and is always given bank accommodation. Why is this true? Because the production of pork is profitable and is a forerunner of success and financial independence. Hogs on any farm mean diversified crops, increased soil fertility and increased production which is a natural consequence of the first two.

The hog is an economical feeder. There is no farm animal that will make greater gains in a given period of time on the same amount of feed than the hog. In other words the hog makes the most meat in the shortest time with a minimum feed expense. There is no farm product that the hog does not eat and his position as the champion consumer of farm by-products has never been assailed. The hog likewise makes the very best possible use of pasture turning into high priced pork alfalfa, rape, wheat, oats, clover and most any native grasses in connection with other feeds. Hogs can not be profitably raised on pasture alone, no more than they can be profitably raised on corn or other grain alone but good pasture is often all that is needed to make a balanced ration and in all cases greatly cheapens the cost of producing pork. It should be said that even the best of pasture plus good corn is not a properly balanced ration for young stock that is being grown out and developed for breeding animals. Such stock should have other feeds that will grow bone, muscle and internal organs and that will stimulate growth and development. Without protein feeds no

animal can make growth much less produce pork at a profit. Hogs that have access to good pasture will invariably do better than hogs confined in close pens. By grazing hogs secure roots, herbs, and sometime mineral matter that their systems demand, that they would not otherwise get.—The National Duroc-Jersey Record Ass'n.

### SELECT THE RIGHT TYPE OF BOAR

One of the quickest and most effective means of increasing profits in producing market hogs is by selecting a better type boar than is usually selected. Too much stress can not be laid upon this matter. Some interesting records have been kept at the Kansas Agricultural College on this matter. Many boars are sold each year and the practice is followed of allowing purchasers to select a boar from the entire lot and with very few exceptions the type of boars that will sire the most profitable market hogs are left until the last. The kind of a boar to select is the boar that will produce market pigs that will make the greatest gain in the quickest time on the least amount of feed and have enough quality and condition to meet the requirements of the packer buyer.

The type of boar that will sire this kind of market hogs is the big long deep bodied, strong backed, heavy boned, rugged individual, Big Type. Why? Because the farm sows that must produce our market hogs are, on the average, undersized and fine boned, and it is necessary that such sows be crossed with big, growthy, rugged boars if one hopes to produce the rapid growing, economical kind of market hogs.

It is essential that one select this type of boar for the same reason that the range man insists upon having the big, heavy boned, rugged bulls to mate with his range cows. The hogs marketed at Omaha in 1921 averaged almost 50 pounds per head more than the hogs marketed at Kansas City, for the simple reason that big, stretchy, rugged Big Type boars are used more generally in the Omaha territory than in the Kansas City territory.

### HOW TO CAPONIZE THE YOUNG COCKRELS

I wish to explain through the columns of the Herald the case of caponizing. Most people think this a secret known only by a few, but this is a mistake. It is not at all tedious or difficult task.

The cockrels to be caponized should be about like a quail in size and appearance, and weighing between one and two pounds; more than six and not over ten weeks old. The beginner may practice on a bird that has been killed for table use if he prefers. The birds to undergo operation should be confined in a cool, dark place, absolutely away from feed and water for 36 hours before the work is attempted.

In order to successfully perform the operation, one should be equipped with the following: Knife for making incision and spreaders for holding apart the ribs, probe for tearing over intestines, and a special form of tweezers for removing the testicles.

When the birds to be caponized are ready, place on a box or barrel, secure a cord around the feet, place another cord around the wings and make the cords taut with a small weight. Pluck a few feathers just in front of the hip joint (these will come out easily as they are ready to moult), stand in front of chicken so the breast will be toward you; locate the last two ribs with the forefinger of the left hand, and place the blade of the knife between them, and with a firm, steady pressure, draw toward you making a cut about one inch in length. Insert the spreader so you can see to work. Take the probe and tear the membrane over the intestines. Now you can see a small, yellowish object laying close to the backbone with a blue artery just back of it. Insert the tweezers and grasp the testicle firmly, being very careful not to tear the artery; turn the tweezers a little each way to loosen the testicle; then twist around and around, drawing the parts toward you as you twist. If the bird is small the cord will twist in two, but if large, they will have to be cut when pulled outside.

Now take out the spread, turn the bird over and proceed as before. When operation is complete, water the birds first and then give feed; do not let the bird crowd at night after the operation. In a few days wind puffs may develop on a few capons; this can be remedied by taking a long stitch with a common darning needle and tying the ends of thread in a hard knot.

I keep capons up a few days after the operation so that I can look after them easily. Never attempt to caponize the small strain of chickens. Capons make good "mothers," and anyone wishing futher advice I will be glad to give it. Now is the time to caponize.

I hope to hear of a lot of it being done as it is very profitable. There is very little danger of killing the birds; in fact you don't even have to watch and get the moon right.—V.B. Reeves in Brownfield Herald.

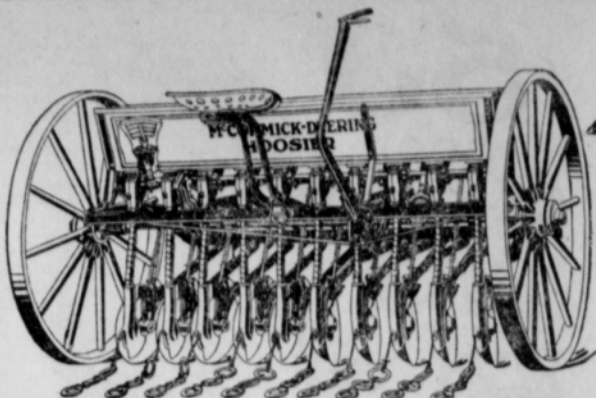

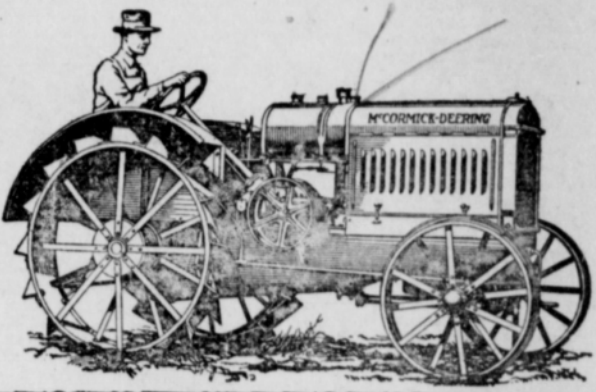

**A PIG CLUB BOY'S TRIUMPH**

A pig club boy attained one of the highest honors possible when the purebred Duroc-Jersey barrow Oklahoma King won the grand championship over all breeds at the 1922 International Live Stock Exposition in Chicago. While this barrow was bred and exhibited by the Oklahoma Agriculture College, he was fitted for the show by Felix Roy, herdsman at the college for the past three years, who was the champion pig club member of Oklahoma for three successive years. Oklahoma King weighed 550 pounds, and was bought at public auction for \$36 per cwt., by the two Duroc-Jersey recording associations. The barrow has since been exhibited at shows for educational purposes, to acquaint farmers and feeders with the correct type and conformation of the profitable market hog.

Oklahoma King, which was bred by the college, is a direct descendant of Pathfinder, which was one of the prominent sires of the breed. From birth the barrow was cared for and developed by Felix Roy, who spent four years as a member of the pig clubs, operated by the state club leader in Oklahoma. Mr. Roy was born on an Indiana farm 23 years ago. When 5 years old he moved with his father to Oklahoma. His first knowledge of feeding and caring for hogs was gained in assisting in the management of the herd, owned by his father, who was, until recently, a well known breeder of Duroc-Jerseys. When 16 years old Felix joined the state pig club, and in the fall of 1916 won first on his Duroc-Jersey gilt in the contest at the state fair. In the following year he exhibited in the state contest, again, and won the state championship over all breeds with a Duroc-Jersey pig. In 1918 he won the litter championship over all breeds at the state fair for club members, and in recognition of his ability he won a place on the state pig club live stock judging team. This entitled him to a free trip to the International show in Chicago that year. He was employed by the college in 1920 as herdsman, in charge of all breeds of hogs. In 1920 and 1921 barrows fitted by him were awarded breed championships in the Duroc-Jersey division at the International.

Felix resigned his position at the college, and on Jan. 1 engaged in the breeding of Duroc-Jerseys, in partnership with his older brother, on a 90 acre farm near Union, Okla. Questioned as to the lessons that he learned from his clubwork, he said: "The right kind of feed at the right time is what it takes to win." His modesty prevented his saying that his success is due more to devotion to duty, industrious application and making the most of his opportunities. The story of the success of this club boy is a striking example of the value and effectiveness of pig clubwork. —(Assistant Secretary) Joe Haaga, National Duroc-Jersey Record Association—The Breeders Gazette.

**GETTING ALONG WITHOUT GOD**

Is religion losing its hold on the people? Not if the statistics of church membership are taken as the test. Does religion today mean what it did fifty years ago? This is a different question and one that cannot be disposed of so easily. Is God as the object of worship and the source of good as real to us as He was to our fathers? That we cannot help doubting.

It is apparent that among the multitude of current systems for improving our bodily health, for relaxing the fret and strain of daily life and for gaining inward peace there are scarcely any that include prayer. It is the human will that the new prophets exalt, or else it is the hypnotic power of self-suggestion that they appeal to. God is not so much denied as ignored. It is not common to hear the sort of militant atheism that Colonel Ingersoll used to pour out. The very earnestness of his unbelief would be considered as extravagant by modern agnostics. They are polite toward those who still believe in God. They avoid offense by shifting their ground. They do not dispute concerning religion; they simply substitute for it groups of psychological formulas, and they manage to carry along with them thousands who bear the name of Christians and who would be shocked if they were accused of irreligion.

Anyone who was brought up among the genuinely religious influences that were common in American homes a generation ago cannot help realizing that a change has come over a great part of our people. Outwardly circumspect and attentive to religious obligations, they show no consciousness of God as an active and controlling power in their lives. For their health and happiness they depend on the cultivation of their own will power rather than on a careful compliance with God's will. When they manifest an interest in humanity it seldom goes beyond the desire to make men and women more comfortable economically. At the thought of prayer or of other definite communion with the Divine Power they are uneasy, as if that were an outgrown attitude of the spirit from which modern psychology had delivered us.

We believe that this is a temporary illusion, inevitable perhaps in an age that is distinguished chiefly for its curiosity in the field of physical science and its ingenuity in the field of mechanical invention. But there is no hope for the health or happiness of the human soul without a definite reliance upon the Divine Power that is at once without ourselves and within ourselves. Whatever the human intellect and the human will can do for the relief of bodily ills, they cannot, unaided, do much for the spiritual sickness that afflicts so large a part of the world.

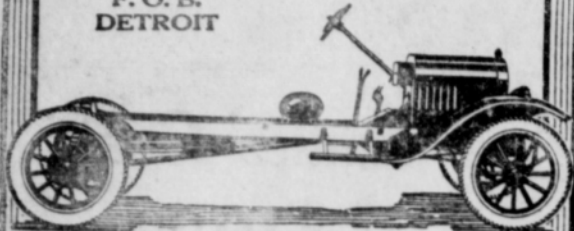
