OPENED UP ON DALHART'S GANG OF ROUGHNECKS

Ku Klux Klan has Given Bootlegging and Gambling Contingent Due Notice to Quit or Move

Whether one approves of the Ku Klux Klan or not it has started something in Dalhart which is to its credit and which cannot but help any community. The following notice was taken from last week's Texan, effects of which will be watched with considerable interest, we imagine, in that city. The notice is as follows:

A Statement From the Klan
We desire the public to understand that we do not take the law in our own hands, nor countenance intimidation of lawful authority. On the other hand our members are pledged to a strict observance of the law; and especially is each one pledged to do all within his power to assist the constituted authority in the enforcement of the law. Our numbers are such and we are so organizing them that we are able to detect all important infringement of the law.

As a beginning in this field of our endeavor the Ku Klux Klan has decreed that the bootlegger must go from Dalhart. So Mr. Bootlegger, our net is out for you, and you may as well destroy your stills and stock in trade or move to a more congenial climate.

To the gentry that have made our community notorious for its gambling, we would respectfully suggest that you immediately find some legitimate occupation. We have your name and number. "A hint to the wise is sufficient." We are fully determined that the boys of this community shall not be contaminated by the evil influences of bootleggers and gamblers. It is the sincere desire of the Klan to foster a clean and higher standard of citizenship among the boys soon to be men, and this we know we cannot do so long as you are allowed to pursue your evil practices. 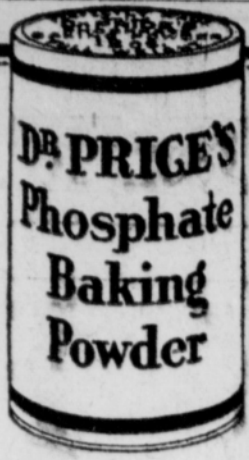

ATTRACTING ATTENTION

Canadian, Texas, September 7, 1922
The D-C-D Highway continues to receive attention from high sources. At the recent meeting of the Associated Highways of America held in Minneapolis, D. J. Young of Canadian, Texas, President of the D-C-D Highway Association, was re-elected a member of the Executive Committee, consisting of four elective members and the President and Ex-Presidents of the Association. The re-election of Mr. Young to this position is regarded as a distinct recognition of the importance of the D-C-D Highway, since the Associated Highways of America consists of the principal highways of the United States.

At the Minneapolis meeting the Executive Committee was authorized to select a system of National Trunk Line highways and submit their report to the next meeting of the Associated Highways of America. Mr. Young is quite hopeful that he will be able to have the D-C-D highway, extending from Galveston to Boulder, Colorado, and from Childress to Canadian, included in this system. When this system is agreed on by the convention, it will then be submitted to Congress for adoption as a system of highways to be built entirely by the National Government. The situation is encouraging and ought to inspire the people along the D-C-D Highway to work harder than they ever have for our Highway.
