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**HAY SHIPPERS FREQUENTLY MEET  
WITH LOSS IN EARLY SHIPMENTS**



Tight Baling and Close Packing of Hay Cause Heating.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Every year when new hay begins to be marketed, reports from several central western hay markets show that much of the new hay arriving is hot and out of condition, and must be sold at a heavy discount under the price quoted for No. 1 hay. There are a number of causes, but the bureau of markets and crop estimates of the United States Department of Agriculture believes the principal one is that the hay is baled and shipped before it has cured sufficiently and while it contains too much moisture.

**Baling Newly Cut Hay is Risky.**

It is the custom in some sections to bale the hay from the windrow or cock in order to avoid the expense of stacking or putting in the mow. It is almost always true that the first new hay shipped to the various markets is baled in this way. In most of the timothy-producing sections weather conditions are such that it is not safe to allow the hay to remain long in either the windrow or cock, if the best quality of hay is to be obtained. Local showers or heavy dews, followed by a hot sun, will soon cause it to bleach and deteriorate. It is, therefore, the practice to bale just as soon as, in the judgment of the producer or shipper, the hay can be safely shipped. This is frequently entirely too soon for the conditions under which it is marketed.

The movement of hay from a dry to a humid section, or from a cool to a warmer one, increases the probability of heating. Tight baling and close packing in the cars are contributing causes, and apply to alfalfa and prairie hay as well as to timothy.

**Higher Prices Invite Early Shipment.**

The easiest way to avoid the losses caused by hay getting out of condition is not to ship new hay until it has gone through the "sweat" and becomes properly cured in the mow or stack. The premiums usually offered for early shipments of new hay are very inviting, however. The first new hay, if in good condition, often sells near the price of old hay which, as the season draws to a close, is frequently

high. The new hay is heavier, too, and the shipper profits from the sale of the water in it, even though it sells below the price of old hay. The chance of getting these premiums causes many shippers to take the risk of the losses that continually occur. It is very doubtful, however, if the premiums equal the losses during the first week or two of the movement.

While the shipment of new hay is not advised until it is cured so as to contain not more than 14 or 15 per cent moisture, a few suggestions are offered by the Department of Agriculture, which, if followed, will tend to elim-

nate some of the losses frequently incurred. The principal ones are:

Press the hay in the bale as loosely as possible to get the minimum weight in the car.

Load hay in cars with air space about the bales; standing the bales on end is considered a good practice.

Ship first hay to near-by markets only.

Hay shipped into low or humid territories should be drier than when shipped into dry or high sections.

Provide ventilation for cars when possible.

Bill cars so that no delay will occur in handling or unloading at destination.

**SOWING TURNIPS TO  
FOLLOW VEGETABLES**

Excellent Crop to Utilize Waste Spaces in Garden.

Reasonably Rich Soil is Essential, Finely Raked and Leveled Off to Avoid Water Collecting in Little Pools.

As a crop to utilize garden space after early vegetables have been harvested, nothing is better than the turnip. Turnips should be planted in most parts of the country about July 25, but in the extreme South as late as the last of August and can be left in the ground until after several light frosts or all winter in the South. They are useful as a table vegetable and to a limited extent will supply the place of potatoes. It is the general opinion of specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture that the American public could consume many more turnips than it does.

For field sowing, turnips are usually broadcast. The particular requirement is a reasonably rich soil finely raked and leveled off to avoid water collecting in pools. The seed should be sowed sparingly. One homely rule is to take the quantity which seems sufficient and divide it in half. After the seeds have been scattered on the surface of the ground, they should be well raked in. This may be done by dragging a piece of brush over the ground. The surface should be well smoothed. It is a good plan to sow turnips just after a rain, giving them opportunity to sprout before a crust forms. After sowing they will need little attention until harvest.

**Common Garden Error.**

One of the common faults in gardening is making rows of plants too close together and leaving the plants too close in the row. This causes plants to suffer for moisture and the lack of plant food. Give more distance.

**Not Good as Fertilizer.**

Sawdust is not a good fertilizer and should not be spaded into the garden until it has rotted so that it almost disintegrates. It is a favorite breeding place for certain kinds of insects. Burn it and use the ashes.

**SERUM DOES NOT ELIMINATE**

Clean-Up of Hog Cholera Cannot Be Expected Through Use of This Modern Treatment.

Some persons think that the use of hog cholera serum has become so general that we are far on the way toward the elimination of the disease, but, according to the United States Department of Agriculture, a clean-up of cholera can not be expected through the use of this method. Besides, only a small percentage of the hogs in the country are treated each year and there is also almost a complete turnover of the swine population each year. Every 12 months we start with a new lot of pigs and the fight against disease must start at the beginning again.

About 500,000,000 cubic centimeters of serum are used every year, which means that, counting 50 cubic centimeters for each hog, only about 10,000,000 hogs are treated. In recent years there have been around 70,000,000 hogs in the country on January 1, according to federal crop estimates, which means many more hogs in the spring and summer. If all these hogs were treated cholera would not be eliminated. It would simply be made impotent to kill many hogs for one season and would begin to kill again the next season if serum were not used. Serum treatment, like insurance, can not be allowed to lapse.

**PUREBRED SURELY PAID WELL**

Lambs From Registered Sire Brought More Money Than Those From Scrub in Missouri.

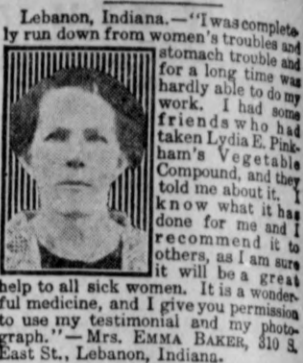
In the sheep flock the purebred sire is a money maker. In one experiment at the Missouri College of Agriculture the lambs from a purebred ram brought 63 per cent more money than lambs of the same age fed in the same way but sired by a scrub. The lambs from the purebred ram weighed more at three months of age than the lambs sired by the inferior ram at four months of age.

**Dressing Asparagus Bed.**

Give the asparagus bed a good dressing of manure. It will hasten the appearance of the "grass" and make it more tender. The custom of salting the bed may be omitted. It does not produce any noticeable results one way or the other.

**IN HER HUSBAND'S MEMORY**

Mrs. Maude Donohue, Minnesota Newspaper Woman, to Erect Building as Memorial.

The day Mrs. Maude A. Donohue's husband enlisted she went to work on the editorial staff of the San Francisco Examiner. She is now editor and publisher of a progressive little weekly paper at Cokato, Minn., trying, by keeping herself always occupied, to forget the day when she received the news that her husband had been killed in action in France.

Mrs. Donohue intends this year to erect a new newspaper building in Cokato as a memorial to "My Bill," and then she intends as a "distant dream" to write a book of his life. Last year she visited her husband's grave at Romange, where 22,000 were buried in the heart of the Argonne wood.

Probably no paper in the country gives more sympathetic treatment to the problem of the returned soldier than does the weekly at Cokato. "The tragedy of war has broadened my viewpoint," says Mrs. Donohue. "There is much to be done, and I'm frank to say that I expect great things of the American Legion as an organization representing men who know what the word 'service' means."

**FRENCH AWARD IS DECLINED**

Legion's National Commander Accepts Honor Only in Name of Those Who Served.

Hanford MacNider is one of the negligible number of persons who declined the award of "commander of the Legion of Honor," proffered by the French government. Mr. MacNider, as national commander of the American Legion, adroitly shifted the honor to the heads of a million soldiers. He said that he could receive the decoration only as a tribute to all Legionnaires—and when the medal arrives it will be deposited in the archives of the Legion.

When he received the notification of the award, he cabled Marshal Foch: "In the name of 5,000,000 service men and women represented by the American Legion, we extend through you to the President of the French republic our gratitude over the tribute proffered. Realizing that this is not awarded to me personally we accept it for every man and woman of our organization and in extending our deep thanks pledge to France our continued love and devotion."

Mr. MacNider was made a chevalier of the Legion of Honor on the battlefield in 1918.

**AERIAL POLO IS NEW SPORT**

Airplane-Toy Balloon Game One of Features at Recent Legion Entertainment in Florida.

Aerial polo is the latest sport. One of the chief features of an entertainment given by the American Legion at Miami, Fla., was a game of polo staged high in the air, sans mallets, sans ponies, sans ball, sans everything except a dozen nimble aviators and several dozen toy balloons.

Every sort of twist from the Immelman turn to the maple-leaf drop is called into play during the contest. Here is what happens: A motorboat loaded with the many-colored balloons of the proverbial country fair plows out into the harbor and drops anchor. From nearby hangars come galloping a dozen Pegasuses. They take the air, and when they are equidistant from the launch, at a safe altitude, the little balloons are released and go soaring upward in great confusion on the wind.

The air rider who captures the greatest number is declared the winner. The Legion pilots who tried it said that it used to be easier catching Taubes.

**Would Postpone This Expense.**

The dome of the proposed Victory Memorial building in Washington would be virtually a huge service flag. It would be studded with five million stars—gold for those who died, blue for those who served. The plan is to have each star engraved with the initials of the soldier it stands for, so that future visitors will be able to distinguish them, with the aid of a telescope, from the floor below. The American Legion has taken the stand that the erection of the expensive memorial should be withheld until there are fewer suffering veterans on the streets.

**INTEREST IN LAMONA BREED**

White-Egg-Laying General Purpose Fowl Developed by Department of Agriculture.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The Lamona, the new white-egg-laying general-purpose fowl originated and being developed by the United States Department of Agriculture, made its first public appearance at the Madison Square Garden poultry show, held in New York from January 25 to 30, where 15 of the birds were shown in the open classes. In addition to the Lamonas, and other government-bred fowls of standard breeds, the department put on an extensive exhibit consisting of models of poultry houses, a display of feathers of the standard breeds, appliances such as feed hoppers, brood coops, and a feeding battery.

A series of panels, made up of photographs, charts, and placards, showed the more important standard breeds, the feeding of hens for egg production, the preparation of birds for exhibition, the advantages of early hatching, the improvement resulting from the use of a high quality sire, capping and culling, cutting the farm flock, and the pedigree breeding of poultry.

A number of department representatives took part in the program of the show and gave information to the visitors concerning the educational exhibit. They reported an extraordinary interest on the part of the public and various poultry breeders in the Lamona breed, many persons desiring to obtain breeding birds. The department believes it necessary to perfect them still more as regards certain characteristics, and it is not likely that any will be for sale during the coming year.

**GRADING EGGS IS ESSENTIAL**

Ungraded, Unstandardized Product Is More or Less of an Uncertain Quantity.

When pullets begin laying, their eggs are not up to standard weight. Therefore, grading eggs is essential, not only from the producers' standpoint but from the buyers', for an ungraded, unstandardized egg is more or less of an uncertain quantity. The marketing of such a product is never advised since it puts an unnecessary handicap on the buyer who never knows what quality he will receive. The buyer in order to protect himself against loss must pay a correspondingly low price. Fresh eggs should be graded by size to meet the requirements of the market. The first grade of eggs ordinarily consists of clean, fresh, reasonably full, strong, sweet eggs with an average weight of 46 pounds net per standard 30 dozen case or over 24 ounces to the dozen. The second grade must weigh 44 pounds or more net, per 30 dozen case. The third grade must weigh 41 pounds or more net per 30 dozen case. They also make a grade of pullets' eggs which weigh 34 pounds or more net for 30 dozen or 16 ounces per dozen.

**DOULTRY NOTES**

Apoplexy and egg-bound are almost always the result of excessive fattness among the hens.

The young chick drinks a great deal of water and plenty of it is necessary for its health and development.

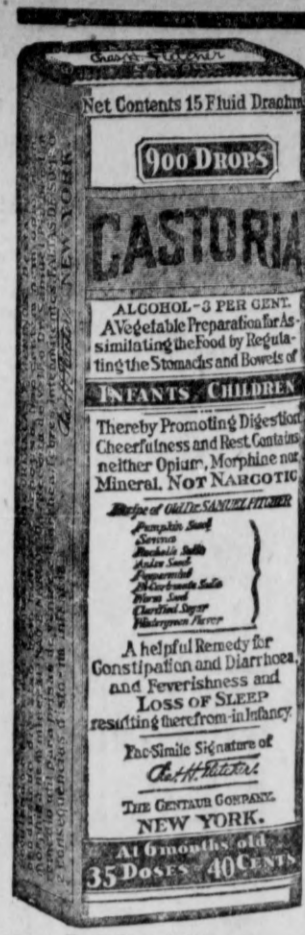
The first food the chick should receive after being removed from the nest or incubator is clean, fresh water with the chill removed.

Don't feed any more mash at one time than the fowls will eat up perfectly clean. To allow more is not only wasteful but promotes unsanitary conditions.

Variety in rations is one of the most important things connected with good feeding. Sometimes even a faulty ration will give fair results because of the variety that enters into it.

Don't expect the fowls to find grit for themselves. No matter how much range they may have it is best to keep grit, charcoal, oyster shells, etc., constantly before them.

Accumulated moisture in the poultry house and an overcrowded condition are directly responsible for the colds and roup which weaken the vitality of the birds, causing them to easily succumb to other diseases.

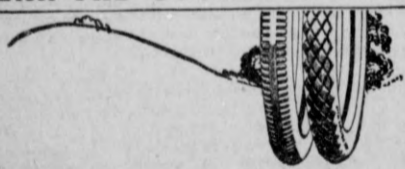

"Postal Improvement Week" has been set for May 1, by the Postmaster General. This is the first general campaign of its kind in the Postal Service for several decades. Business men and their organizations, large users of the mail, newspapers, motion pictures, advertisers, and the entire organization of 326,000 postal workers are to be enlisted in this country-wide campaign of interest in postal improvements. Your help is vital. Address your letters plainly with pen or typewriter. Give street address. Spell out name of State, don't abbreviate. Put your return address in the upper left hand corner of envelope (not on the back) and always look at your letter before dropping in the mail to see if it is properly addressed. This care in the use of the mails is for your benefit and speeds up the dispatch and delivery of mail matter.

If you have any complaints of poor service make them to your postmaster. He has instructions to investigate them and report to the department.

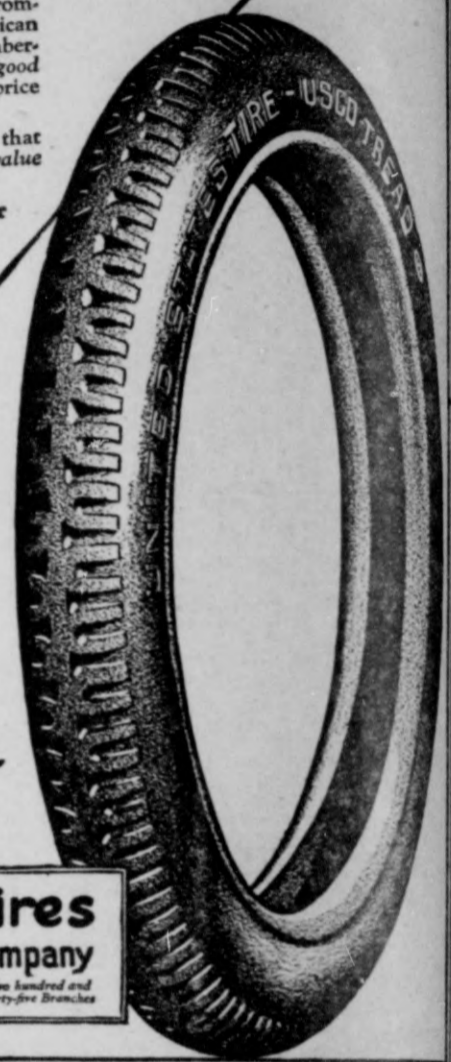

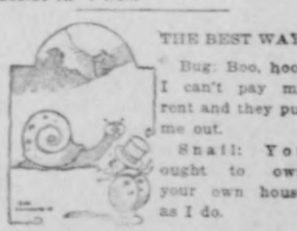
