### Hutchinson County Oil News

Gulf No. 1, Dial ranch, in Hutchinson county now has the material on the ground ready for the construction of the derrick and it is believed that no great amount of time will be lost in erecting the derrick and getting "ready for business". This location is about four and one half miles west of Plemons, the county site, and according to the leading geologist is on the very best of structure. This location by the Gulf and the manner in which they are going about their work is causing quite a bit of interest in this section of the country and leases are selling at a good price. Mr. Pyron, who has been managing Gulf No. 1, Carson county, was in Plemons this week on his way to this location, and it is stated that he will also be in charge of this well. At any rate, we hope this to be the case, as he is recommended as first class man in every respect.

Gas from Gulf No. 2, Carson county, will be used as fuel to drill this well and pipe is being hauled from Panhandle and scattered for that purpose at this time. This pipe line will be 14 miles in length and will have to cross the Canadian River in order to get to this location. It has been reported from reliable

sources that the Coble-Heywood well has finished under-reaming and has the casing set ready to continue drilling until they strike oil. This well is down to a depth of approximately 3500 feet.

Plemons and Panhandle are cooperating in building a telephone line between the two places and the Gulf has offered their services in this connection, a highway has also been established between Plemons and Panhandle and this route will be ready for the traveling public within a few days. When this route is accessible and the phone line established from Plemons to Panhandle, it will serve to a great advantage the people of Amarillo, Panhandle and other points who wish to get in touch with Plemons and get the oil news direct.

### Bought the Dial Ranch

The Dial Brothers ranch, 11,044 acres, in Hutchinson county, was sold Monday by W. O'Brien of the National Bank of Commerce to J. J. Perkins and J. N. Martin of Wichita Falls. The consideration was not made public.

The acreage acquired by the Wichita Falls oil men lies across the Canadian river, about twelve miles north of the Gulf Well No. 1.

J. N. Martin is a brother of George E. Martin of Amarillo, and has other holdings in the Panhandle. Mr. Perkins is one of the men who drilled in the first well in the Breckenridge field, which after yielding almost a million dollars in oil was sold for \$1,000,000.

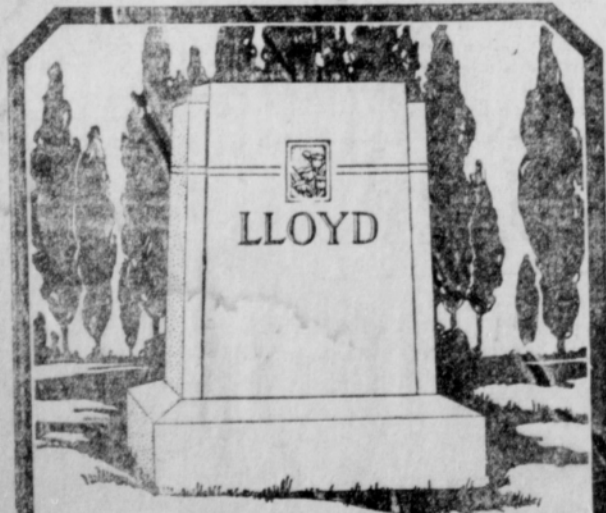

### Chestnuts Stewed in Gravy.

### THE WIFE'S POLL TAX

Answering a question about which the attorney general's department has received many letters lately, Assistant Attorney General W. W. Caves, in an opinion today, held that a husband in paying the tax assessed against community property of himself and his wife must pay the poll tax assessed against the wife.

Mr. Caves held that when the poll tax of the husband and wife is assessed against them along with the community property the husband has not the right to pay the property tax and leave unpaid the poll tax assessed against the wife, if the wife is in fact subject to payment of such poll tax.

He also held that when the husband applied to tax collector to pay his community property tax and the collector finds there has been no poll tax assessed against the wife it then becomes the duty of the collector to assess the wife with a poll tax, if the wife is subject to such tax, and to refuse to permit payment of property tax without payment of the tax assessed against the wife.

The opinion was given in answer to questions submitted by A. J. Lewis, county attorney of Cameron, Texas.

This opinion answers the numerous questions which the department has been almost swamped with in the past few months.—Amarillo News.

If you do not agree with the friend's recommendation you are, of course, at liberty never to have her again! Of course the dressmaker is only an example and the same rules hold good of anything that is recommended to you—from a book to a new kind of breakfast food. You don't have to take the recommendation. But if you do it is the well-bred thing not to criticize the result.

Some people give up recommending books because those they recommend them to do not like them. But one of the things that makes books interesting is the discussion they evoke. You are not casting aspersions on a friend's taste when you fail to like a book that she finds interesting. So discussion of a book at somebody else's suggestion is permissible.

The only thing that you ought not to recommend unless you are willing to take the consequences is something in which you have a personal or financial interest. But perhaps this admonition comes rather in the field of ethics than in the field of etiquette.

### ORDINANCE

An Ordinance Regulating the Use of Water from the City Well and Providing for the Collection of Water Rent for Same.

Article 1. Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the town of Spearman, Texas, in council assembled:—

That there be levied and collected a water tax for the upkeep and operating expenses of the city well from each and every person, firm or corporation using water from the city well, as hereinafter set out.

1. From each family using water from said well, for domestic purposes, whether the same be taken from the tank at its location in Spearman, Texas, or piped from said tank to their respective residences, or procured from said well in any other manner, a sum of one dollar (\$1.00) per month.

2. From each business house, hotel, restaurant, garage or wagon yard using water from said well, whether the same is piped, hauled or procured in any other manner, the sum of two dollars (\$2.00) per month.

3. The taxes herein levied shall be payable the first day of each month, in advance, at the Guaranty State Bank, Spearman, Texas, and if not paid by the 5th day of the month, shall be considered and treated as delinquent, and a ten per cent (10 per cent) penalty shall be added to the amount due, and in addition thereto, it shall be the duty of the City Marshal to stop said person, firm or corporation from procuring water from the said well until the said tax and penalty has been paid.

4. No person or persons shall be allowed to irrigate a garden or gardens from the said city well, provided that this section shall not apply to the watering of a few shade trees and provided further that in case of a shortage of water from any cause, the last mentioned privilege shall be revoked until such time that the shortage is overcome.

5. It shall be the duty of the mayor or of the town of Spearman, Texas, when he deems it necessary to suspend the use of water from the City well, for any other purpose other than for domestic uses, and in case of his refusal or inability to act, the Board of Aldermen shall have the power to appoint someone in his stead to so act.
