In 1836, the Texas Declaration of Independence cited the failure of the Mexican government "to establish any public system of education, although
possessed of almost boundless resources," as one of the key reasons for severing political ties with Mexico.

state constitution state constitution provided for
the establishment of an educathe establishment of an educa-
tional fund for children tional fund for children of
indigent parents. In 1854, the Legislature set aside $\$ 2$ million to set up the first Texas school districts. The Texas Constitution, written in 1876, provided perpetual public school fund.
'During the 1980's, Legislature has reaffirmed this Legislature has reaffirmed this
belief and refined the public school system. House Bill 246, approved in 1981, required a uniform curriculum in 12 subject
areas be taught in all Texas areas be taught in all Texas public schools. This legislation
ensured that students across the state were given the opportunity to study the same essential elements of every subject at every grade level. "These requirements for
teaching the "essential teaching the "essential elements were phased in over a
period of several years and were fully implemented during the coincided with the implementation of provisions of House Bill
"In passing House Bill 72, Texas Legislatois left the curri-
culum provisions of HB 246 intact, and also mandated some new programs requiring state guidelines. This piece of legislation revised the state funding system, looked at requirements and incentives for teachers and
administrators, set a statewide passing standard of 70 (on a scale of 100) and prohibited social promotion for students, initiated the no-pass/no-play rule, and required high school students to pass an exam in English
language arts and mathematics language arts and mathemati

stretch and reach difficult goals. There is no activity which challenges young students more or requires more effort than participating in the now national Mock Trial competition.
In order to make the team, the
