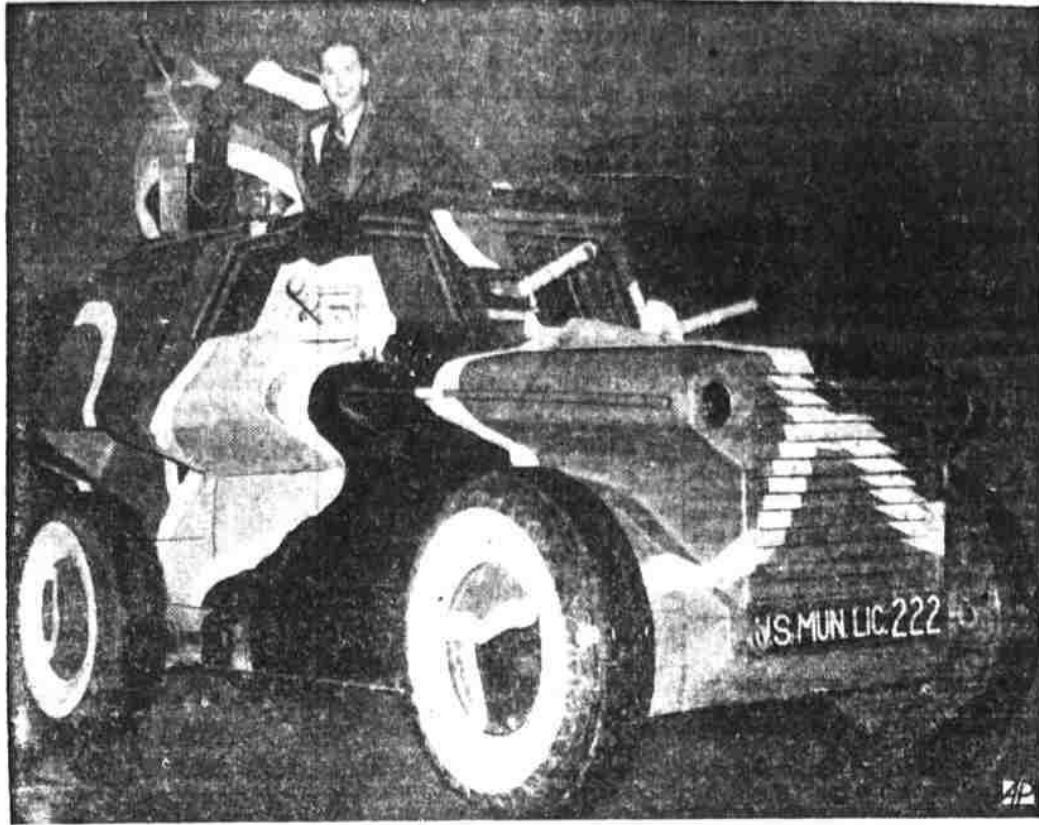

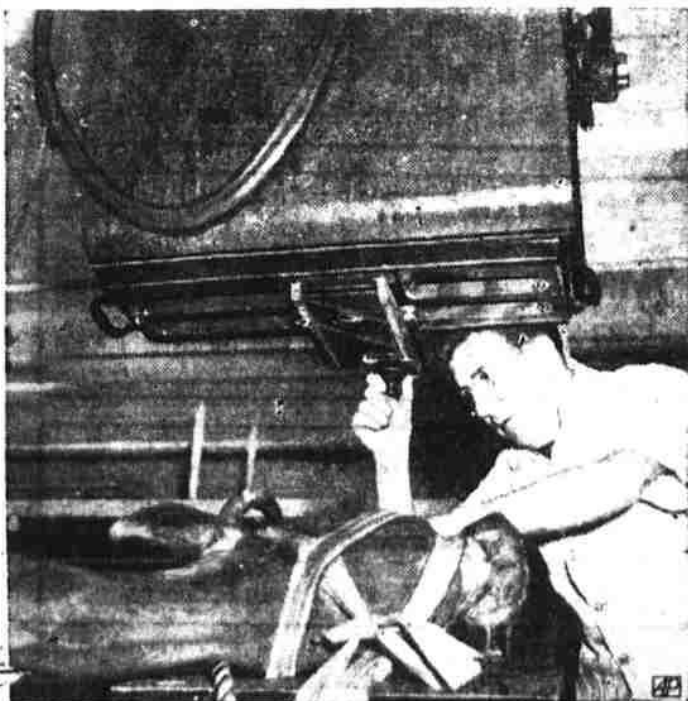

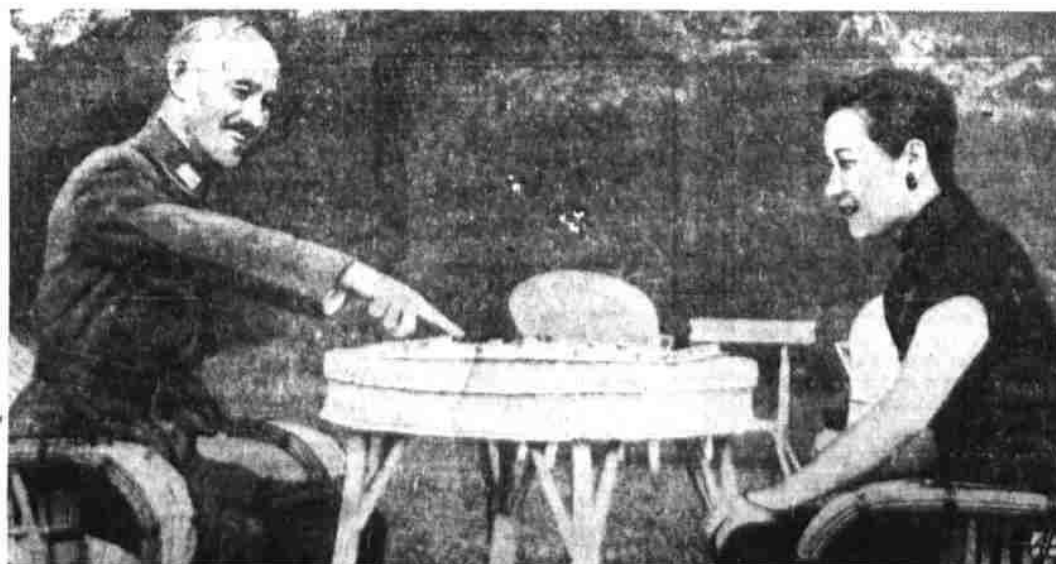

mobiles, giving out gasoline fumes had made it impossible for the dogs to keep on the trail.

"However," Rudden added, "it would be like Chipman to have commiserated an automobile, but I still believe he will be found dead."

Records compiled by the Arkansas state police and federal bureau of identification show that Chipman was first arrested in Miami, Fla., in April, 1931, on charges of carrying concealed weapons and hijacking.

He was later released on bond and the charges eventually were nullified.

In August, 1931, he was arrested in Ventnor City, N. J., on a charge of highway robbery, but acquitted when brought to trial at Mays Landing.

The former contractor then returned to the Southwest where the records show numerous arrests and convictions. His last escape was from a prison in Texas in July 8, 1937. He was serving combined sentences of 30 years for bank robbery and kidnaping at the time.

**Chapman Confession Is Controversial Topic**

AUSTIN, Nov. 1 (AP)—A "confession" by Charley Chapman, desperado who barely eluded capture near Philadelphia, Miss., last night, is the issue in a long-warm controversy over whether Texas is holding two innocent men in prison.

Chapman told federal officers in 1936 that he and a companion robbed the First National bank at Atlanta, Texas, June 6, 1934, and Ovid Mathis and L. L. "Doc" Sutherland, assessed long sentences for the crime, were innocent.

**CHINESE ADMIT LOSS OF TEIAN**

SHANGHAI, Nov. 1 (AP)—Chinese admitted today they had lost Teian, 125 miles southeast of Hankow, after more than three months of bitter fighting in which both sides lost heavily.

Japanese last week announced capture of the town, but today was the first definite admission by the China forces.

The new line of defense, Chinese said, was established south of Teian to protect Nanchung, the Chinese air base.

The Japanese drive continued from the captured tri-city area of Hankow, Hanwang, with one column reported to have occupied Hanchwan, 80 miles by river to the west of Hanyang.

DENVER, Nov. 1 (AP)—Eddie Goode, a dancing star in Fort Worth's Casa Manana shows for three years, was married yesterday to Gene C. Eymann of La Prairie, Ill., a member of Cecil Golly's orchestra.

The couple exchanged marriage vows in the Grant Avenue Presbyterian church before the Rev. Guy E. Kunkel.

The bride was ringleader in 1936 in a statewide contest for the title of Miss Texas. The contest, was sponsored by Billy Rose, entrepreneur of the Casa Manana shows.

**Optimistic In Rail Outlook**

**Head Says Strike Improbable; Hint Aid Acceptance**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 (AP)—Hints that the railroads might accept federal aid as an alternative to wage cuts in their search for economic relief, came today from management officials.

"A railroad strike is so far, far away in my opinion," H. A. Fuchs, chairman of the management's wage committee said with a smile, "that there's no use to get worried about it."

J. J. Polley, president of the Association of American Railroads, also grinned when he told reporters that any strike was "at least 30 days away."

Polley asked heads of leading roads to meet in Chicago Friday to accept or reject cancellation of a 15 per cent pay reduction. President Roosevelt's fact-finding board recommended Saturday that the roads drop that proposal.

Some 900,000 union railroad workers have voted to strike rather than accept the cut, but under the Railway Labor act they can not walk out until Nov. 28.

**Love For Apples Costs Intruder**

CHICAGO, Nov. 1 (AP)—Richard Stanhope's insatiable appetite for fancy apples sent him to a hospital. But not with a tummy ache.

He was hungry when he passed Edward Doyle's confectionery, and police said he forced the front door. Stanhope was on his 15th apple when the Doyle's returned. There was a scuffle and Mrs. Doyle struck Stanhope on the head with a rifle butt. He regained consciousness in a hospital.

**Nations Ready For Parley**

**Germany Predicts End Of Conference After Day Of Negotiations**

VIENNA, Nov. 1 (AP)—The gathering yellow castle in which Dr. Kurt Schuschnigg held his independence Austria's last councilor will be the scene tomorrow of a German-Austrian conference on the further dismemberment of Czechoslovakia.

The German foreign office mouthpiece said the 1920 treaty's "indivisible" to Hungary would play "an essential role" in the talks and the new paper of East Minister Hermann Wilhelm Guehring declared the conference would correct mistakes of the Paris suburb-an treaties (Versailles and Trianon).

A new territorial alignment or plan for southeastern Europe, based on racial nationalism and aimed at appeasing the Danubian area, may be the result.

Goering's organ, the national Zeitung of Essen, said the parley on the Czech-Hungarian territorial dispute primarily would go down in European history as "a demonstration of the policy of the Rome-Berlin axis."

**PRESIDENT DISCUSSES NEW HOUSING PLAN**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 (AP)—President Roosevelt arranged a forenoon conference with treasury and housing officials today to discuss a reported new housing plan.

Called to the White House for the meeting were Secretary Morgenthau and Undersecretary Hanes of the treasury and Stewart McDonald, Federal Housing administrator; Gerard B. Lambert, special adviser to the FHA; Abner H. Ferguson, FHA general counsel; and J. M. Daiger, FHA financial adviser.

**NAZIS WEED OLD ARMY OFFICERS FROM RANKS**

BERLIN, Nov. 1 (AP)—Military observers today saw in the appointment of a new chief of the army general staff another step in the gradual removal of officers clinging to the ideas of imperial days or unwilling fully to go along with the whole program under the Nazis regime.

Chancellor Hitler yesterday named Lieutenant general of artillery Franz Halder, 54 to the post which General Ludwig Beck resigned because he could not see eye to eye with Hitler.

**IRVIN TRIAL IS AGAIN DELAYED**

NEW YORK, Nov. 1 (AP)—The trial of Robert Irwin, 30-year-old sculptor charged with the murder of Veronica Gedeon, photographer's model, her mother and Frank Byrnes, a lodger, was postponed again today until Nov. 7. It had been set for this Thursday.

Irwin will be tried on the indictment charging he killed Byrnes. The lodger and the others were slain Easter Sunday, 1937.

**FLORER SOUP RECIPE GIVEN**

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 1 (AP)—When you get tired of looking at your chrysanthemums, you can eat them.

K. Hirayama, Japanese chrysanthemum society president, explained how to make soup of the flowers. The recipe:

Put a pint of milk and a tablespoon of butter in a pan and heat. Add two tablespoons of cornstarch and stir until thick. Add chopped chrysanthemum petals which have been boiled in water for two minutes. Serve hot.

"It's very good," said Hirayama.

**SCHOOL HEAD DIES**
