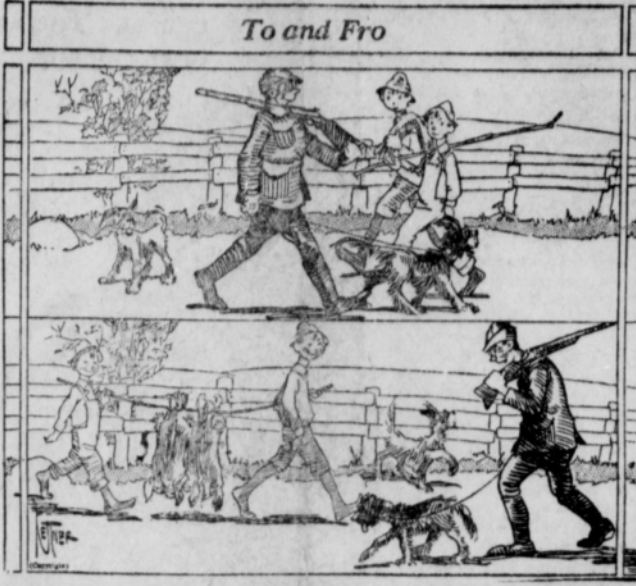
We have been fortunate enough, in the Spearman country, to raise a good wheat crop—one worth many thousands of dollars.

Mr. Keim is manager of the Equity elevator at Farnsworth and Mr. George owns a fine farm six miles north of that town.

Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Coate, Mrs. Viola Handlin and Miss Beulah Coate motored up to Protection, Kansas, last week, on a visit to Mr. and Mrs. G. L. Coate, who are happy over the recent arrival at their home of a fine boy. Mr. Coate says he took the time while in Protection to inquire into the wheat market, and found that while they were paying 85 cents per bushel for wheat there, the Spearman buyers were paying \$1.00 per bushel. How does that sound for Spearman as a wheat market.

Commissioners court met in called session on Monday of this week, to look after some road and bridge business for the county. W. E. Moore, representing the Austin Bridge Company of Dallas, was here to meet with the commissioners. The bridge on the Kimball road across the Palo Duro is finished, and those on Farwell draw on both the Kimball and Guymon roads are nearing completion. An other span will be added to the bridge on the Spearman road. There is now about 90 miles of graded road in the county and the grading crew is putting some finishing touches on the north end of the D. C. D. Highway.

"The Manless Wedding," on Friday night of last week and the "Betty Wales Girls," on Thursday night of this week, the plays put on by students of the Spearman High school, were well received by the people of Spearman and vicinity. The students take their parts like old-timers and before the ending of the present term will doubtless give us several good entertainments. Airplane Landing Field

Several days ago S. B. Hale, president of the Hansford County Chamber of Commerce, received from the War Department, Post Field, Fort Sill, a request for information concerning an airplane landing field at Spearman. The request came in the form of a questionnaire, calling for much detailed information. The matter was taken in hand by Mr. Hale and Ralph T. Bucy, who proceeded to give the facts in the case to a nicety. So well did they do their work that Mr. Hale on yesterday received a letter from the department at Fort Sill, thanking him very kindly for the information, and also stating that out of the 700 questionnaires sent out from that Post, the Spearman report, or answer, was best of all, and that Plainview was second. Spearman now stands a mighty good chance of some day having an army landing field, and all on account of a little activity on the part of the Chamber of Commerce.

Hansford County Wins Again

The fact that Hansford is the banner county in the state, so far as literacy is concerned, is revealed in information concerning the 1920 census taken in Texas, by the Census Bureau. Only one-tenth of one per cent of the population of Hansford county is illiterate.

PANHANDLE EQUITIES ARE FLOURISHING

The Equity organizations located along the Spearman branch of the Santa Fe railroad are in splendid condition. Mr. E. C. Bill, auditor, Garden City, Kansas, has recently completed a series of audits along that branch line. On October 5th we published the Spearman, Texas, report which shows a net profit for the period of \$14,804.80. The Perryton, Texas, audit shows a net profit of \$32,486.42. The Booker, Texas, report shows a net gain of \$4,402.26, and Mr. Bill says that he is looking for a good report from the Darrouzett local. Darrouzett has been in operation as an independent concern for some time, but during the past year has come under the Equity organization. Now when the Follett boys affiliate with the national, the Spearman branch will be one hundred per cent Equity Union.

In a recent letter to this office Mr. Bill says, "The Equity members at all stations on the Spearman road are loyal to their own concern. My observation as an auditor is that the more loyal the membership to the local organization the larger the profits

and proration. Where there is a little friction and disloyalty we can see the results in smaller business and profits."

The splendid results shown by the Equities along the Spearman branch is due particularly to the splendid loyalty of the members and to good management upon the part of the directors and managers. Special mention should be made of the fact that the fine showing made has not been the result of the lack of competition as there is plenty of competition at every one of those market points.—Equity Union Exchange.

Better Telegraph Service

The Reporter is in receipt of the following information from Hamlin Palmer, Traffic Manager of the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce: "Immediately after the Amarillo Trade Trip in August, Mr. J. W. Gilliam, the Western Union Manager at Amarillo, took up with his company the matter of telegraph service for the Spearman branch. He secured immediately additional operators at Shattuck to help out with the work at that point, and he is now in receipt of information from J. F. Wilson, district Commercial Superintendent of the Western Union, that arrangements have been made with the Santa Fe Company for the construction of an additional wire out of Shattuck to take care of Western Union Service on the Spearman branch. It is expected that this service will soon be available."

PUDDINGS AND PUDDING SAUCES

A tender, delicate, well-flavored steamed pudding is a dessert one enjoys any season of the year.



Plum Pudding.

—Take one cupful of finely chopped suet, add one cupful of New Orleans molasses, sift three cupfuls of flour with one and one-half teaspoonfuls of soda, one teaspoonful of cinnamon, one-half teaspoonful of cloves, one-fourth teaspoonful of nutmeg, and one-half teaspoonful of salt. Add to the first mixture alternately with one cupful of sweet milk, one cupful of seeded and cut raisins, and one cupful of hickory nut meats. Enough of the flour should be reserved to dredge the raisins and nuts. Mix well and steam in a buttered mold three hours. Serve with any desired sauce—one of beaten egg flavoring and hot milk is especially good, sweetening to taste.

Chocolate Rice Pudding.—Scald two cupfuls of milk; add one-fourth of a cupful of uncooked rice, one-half teaspoonful of salt. Cook until the rice is tender. Add one tablespoonful of butter, one-third of a cupful of sugar, one square of chocolate melted, one-half teaspoonful of vanilla, one-half cupful of minced raisins and one-half cupful of shredded almonds. Cut and fold in the stiffly-beaten whites of two eggs, and one-half cupful of cream whipped. Pour the mixture into a buttered baking dish and bake 20 minutes. Spread with a meringue using a little vanilla flavoring. Brown in the oven.

Ginger Pudding.—Cream one-third of a cupful of butter with one-half cupful of sugar; add one egg well beaten. Mix and sift two and one-fourth cupfuls of flour with three and one-half teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one-fourth of a teaspoonful of salt, three teaspoonfuls of ginger; add alternately with one cupful of milk to the first mixture. Turn into a buttered mold, cover and steam two hours. Serve with a vanilla sauce.

Apricot Sauce.—Drain a can of apricots from their syrup and rub through a sieve. There should be three-fourths of a cupful of pulp. Add three cupfuls of whipped cream, sweeten to taste and serve on any plain cottage pudding.

CITY ORDINANCES

Passed by the Aldermen of the town of Spearman, Texas, in Regular Session Assembled:

In the interest of better government and the general welfare of the community. It is necessary that the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Spearman, Texas, establish a set of rules or ordinances suitable for the proper administration of the community affairs.

Therefore, be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen, of the Town of Spearman, Texas, that the following set of rules or ordinances be enacted, published and spread on the minute book of the said Town of Spearman, Texas:

AN ORDINANCE TO LEVY AN ANNUAL OCCUPATION AND LICENSE TAX ON OCCUPATIONS IN THE CITY OF SPEARMAN, TEXAS, AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE COLLECTION THEREOF.

Art. 1. Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the town of Spearman, Texas, in council assembled:

That there shall be levied on and collected from every person, firm, company or association of persons pursuing any of the occupations named in the following subdivisions of this ordinance in the city of Spearman, Texas, an annual occupation tax, which shall be paid annually in advance, except when otherwise provided, on every such occupation or separate establishment as follows:

1. From every merchant who may remove from place to place and offer for sale bankrupt stock of goods, or advertise fire sale or water damaged sales for a limited period of time, the sum of Fifty Dollars per month, for the first month or less than a month, and for each additional month the sum of Ten Dollars per month, provided that where they remain in town for a period of six months they shall be required to pay only Five Dollars per month in addition to the first Fifty Dollars.

2. From every person selling patent or other medicines, the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars per annum, provided that this article does not apply to wholesale salesmen soliciting trade from merchants doing a legal drug business in this town.

3. From every auctioneer an annual tax of Five Dollars.

4. From every person, firm or association of persons selling on commission, the sum of Five Dollars.

5. From every itinerant physician, surgeon, oculist or medical or other specialist of any kind, traveling from place to place in the practice of his or her profession, except dentists practicing from place to place in the county of their residence, the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars.

6. From every person or firm operating a shooting gallery at which a fee is paid or demanded, the sum of Fifteen Dollars.

7. From every foot peddler, every peddler using wagon and team, and from every peddler using automobile or truck, the sum of Five Dollars per annum, provided nothing herein shall be so construed as to include traveling vendors of literature, and provided further that nothing herein shall be so construed as to include traveling vendors of poultry, vegetables, fruits or other country produce exclusively, when such country produce is actually raised or produced on the farm of the person or persons selling same.

8. From every circus or wild west show, where rough riding or acrobatic feats are performed or exhibited for pay, the sum of Seventy-Five Dollars.

9. From every menagerie, side show or carnival, the sum of Five Dollars for each performance, or in case of a carnival, the sum of Five Dollars for each stall, knife rack, doll rack, or any other attraction connected with such carnival where an admission fee is charged or collected or where any article is sold.

10. From every exhibition where acrobatic feats are performed and an admission fee is charged or collected, the sum of Five Dollars for each such performance.

11. From every sleight-of-hand performance or exhibition of ledger diemain, not connected with theatre or

circus, the sum of Twelve Dollars and Fifty Cents.

12. From each owner or keeper of a motion picture show, used for profit, the sum of Twelve Dollars Fifty Cents.

13. From each person or firm engaged in the general merchandise business, the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars.

14. From each person or firm engaged in the dry goods business, the sum of Twenty Dollars.

15. From each person or firm engaged in the ladies' and (or) gents' furnishing business, the sum of Twenty Dollars.

16. From each person or firm engaged in the retail grocery business, the sum of Twenty Dollars.

17. From each person or firm engaged in the retail drug and (or) notion store, the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars.

18. From each person or firm engaged in the retail hardware and (or) furniture business, the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars.

19. From each person or firm engaged in a general retail lumber business, the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars.

20. From each person or firm engaged in the hotel business, the sum of Fifteen Dollars.

21. From each person or firm engaged in the business of running a barber shop, the sum of Ten Dollars.

22. From each person or firm engaged in the business of running a public garage and (or) dealing in automobiles, the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars.

23. From each person, firm or association of persons engaged in the business of buying, selling grain and operating elevators, the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars.

24. From each person or firm engaged in the business of buying, selling or brokering real estate, the sum of Twenty Dollars.

25. From each person, firm or corporation engaged in the business of selling oils and gas at wholesale, the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars.

26. From each person or firm engaged in the practice of medicine, or of law, or any other profession for which a fee is charged, the sum of Ten Dollars.

27. From each person or firm engaged in the business of draying or transferring or running a livery business, the sum of Fifteen Dollars.

28. From each person or firm engaged in the running of a restaurant or eating house, where meals or short orders are served to the public, the sum of Ten Dollars.

29. From each person, firm or corporation engaged in the general banking business, the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars.

30. From each person or firm engaged in the business of running a newspaper print shop or job print shop, the sum of Twenty Dollars.

31. From each person or firm engaged in the business of running a blacksmith shop, the sum of Fifteen Dollars.

32. From each person or firm engaged in the telephone business operating a switch board, the sum of Twenty Dollars.

33. From each person or firm engaged in the abstract business, the sum of Fifteen Dollars.

34. From each person or firm engaged in the shoe repair business, the sum of Five Dollars.

35. From each person or firm buying, selling and shipping country produce, the sum of Fifteen Dollars.

36. From each person or firm engaged in selling meat at retail over the counter in a meat market or upon the streets from house to house, the sum of Ten Dollars, provided that nothing herein shall be construed as to include persons who actually raises the meat so sold from house to house.

37. From each person or firm engaged in the business of running a wagon yard, the sum of Ten Dollars.

38. From each person running a feed store and (or) feed mill, the sum of Ten Dollars.

39. From each person or firm running a filling station, for automobiles,

trucks or other motor vehicles, the sum of Five Dollars.

40. From each person or firm engaged in the business of peddling, selling or offering for sale any article of merchandise, including meats, fruits, vegetables, etc., the sum of Ten Dollars, provided nothing herein shall be so construed as to include vendors of such articles herein mentioned when such is raised or produced on the place of the person or persons selling same.

41. From every person or firm engaged in the contracting business, including building contractors, stone or brick masonry, or any other avocation where work is done under contract, the sum of Fifteen Dollars, and sub-contractors shall pay the same license.

Art. 2. The receipt of the City Marshal, as collector of taxes for said town of Spearman, Texas, shall constitute the license of the persons pursuing the occupation herein taxed, and all taxes are payable in the currency or coin of the United States.

Art. 3. It is hereby made the duty of the collector to report monthly, at the regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen, the amount of occupation tax collected. If the collector knowingly fails to collect or try to collect any occupation tax, or shall receive any occupation tax without giving the proper receipt, as herein provided for, he shall, upon conviction, be deemed guilty of malfeasance in office and summarily dismissed therefrom.

Art. 4. The mayor shall have occupation tax receipts, in blank, printed with their signatures and stubs in blank, which shall show when a receipt was issued, to whom, for what occupation and for how long it was issued. The mayor shall take the collector's receipt for the number of blanks issued, and at the end of each month shall collect the same up and see that he has accounted for all receipts issued up to date.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 2

An Ordinance pertaining to and establishing a street tax.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the town of Spearman, Texas, that there shall be assessed against each and every male resident of the town of Spearman, Texas, between the ages of twenty-one and forty-five, both inclusive, except ministers of the gospel actually engaged in the discharge of their duties, an annual street tax in the sum of Five Dollars, which street tax may be paid in money or in labor upon the streets of the town; provided that the one so working on the streets shall receive not more than the sum of One Dollar per day for such work on the streets.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 3

An Ordinance regulating the use and driving of automobiles and other vehicles on the streets of the town of Spearman, Texas:

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the town of Spearman, Texas, that all persons operating automobiles, truck or other vehicles on the streets of the town of Spearman, Texas, shall drive on the right hand side of the street, and shall drive to the center of the intersection of cross streets and turn around the markers in the center of street crossings on all streets of the town, where markers are erected. It shall be unlawful for drive any motor vehicle on the streets of

Spearman, Texas, exceeding a speed of ten miles per hour, and be unlawful to drive at night on such streets without proper lights. All cars shall be parked in the center of the streets on all business streets, and when starting the driver must back his car to the side of the street from which he turned in and continue on the right hand side of the street.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 6

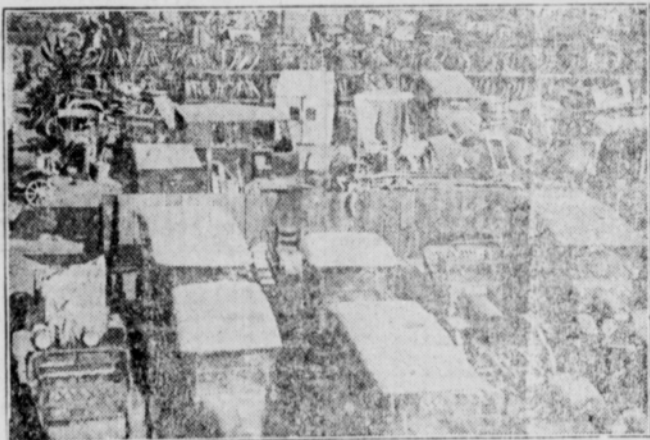

AUTO BONEYARD OF THE PACIFIC



A View of "Steve's Boneyard."

Everyone in Los Angeles and for miles around knows "Steve the Auto Parts Man," for "Steve" is as much a part of the city and an institution as Broadway itself. Steve owns the "Auto Boneyard of the Pacific," situated in the heart of the city on Eleventh street, Broadway. The "Boneyard" occupies about 250,000 square feet of land, and here the autoist may buy any part desired for any make of car on the market within the past 15 years. Steve's business is to buy old and wrecked cars and dismantle them, storing away all the good parts for sale to some future patron. Much of his supply comes from transcontinental motorists, who sell their worn cars for little or nothing on reaching Los Angeles from the East. It is said that Steve can supply auto parts that the automobile manufacturers themselves cannot. Some of the manufacturers, finding certain parts out of stock, refer their prospective customers to Steve. The second-hand cars and parts stand out in the open, exposed to the weather, and of course are weather beaten and rusted. A little oil and emery, however, soon puts them in shape for new use.

IMPORTANT DETAILS FOR NOVICE DRIVER

First Should Learn to Turn Corners and Signal.

Two Essentials Many Motorists Have Difficulty in Learning Should Be Studied and Practiced on All Occasions.

One of the things that many motorists have great difficulty in learning to do properly is turning corners, says a writer in a New York exchange.

It is difficult to coast around a corner at low speed, and if high speed is used the car goes too fast. The novice driver should practice going into second speed just before he reaches the corner he is to turn, and then drive around at slow speed.

Another detail every driver should learn and practice is the matter of signaling. The law states that the driver shall signal in some unmistakable manner which way he is going to turn. The left-hand drive makes this easy. If the operator is going to the left he should hold his arm out in a horizontal position. This indicates to those back of him that he should not come up behind him on that side. When making a right turn the car should be run close to the curb and the signal given by waving the hand in a small circle, with a forward swing, as if he says: "Come on up on this side, I'm going to turn the corner." The "come on" motion is not prescribed by law, but has become a custom of the road.

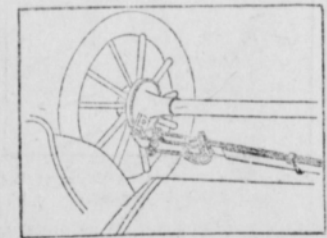
If a sudden stop is necessary the hand should be held upward. This signal formerly was used by coachmen on the box and is well known to all users of the highway.

RULES FOR GENTLEMEN DRIVERS ON THE ROAD

Keep to the right of the road. Slow down at crossings.

Signal for a stop or turn to the cars behind by holding out the left hand.

Apply brakes slowly. Change speed rates slowly. Drive carefully.

Be prepared to help any motorist in trouble on roads distant from garages.

Be prepared to give pedestrians "lifts" on country roads.

Stop car and engine when meeting drovers with sheep, swine or cattle on country roads.

Park only at side of roads, leaving fairway.

When buying produce in the country park alongside road, not on the road.

When parking at night leave warning lights.

Have headlight dimmers and use them when meeting and passing other motorists at night.

When picnicking do not trespass to gather wild flowers, tree branches, blossoms, fruit or shrubs.

When picnicking clean up thoroughly, removing from sight all cans, papers and rubbish.

Give all vehicles, especially loaded trucks, a good half of the road.

Take hills on the right side of the road. Go over the crest carefully. Avoid coasting or speeding around curves at foot of hills.

Be courteous to pedestrians. Do not drive your car at them full tilt and laugh when they jump. Do not splash water on them as they stand at crossings or near curbs waiting for you to pass.

Avoid streets cars carefully at stops.

Learn and follow the local traffic rules, speed limits and driving ordinances. These are made for the common good of all drivers, including yourself, and of all pedestrians.

DAILY CLEANSING FOR TIRES

Drivers Should Be Compelled to Wash Off Mud With Sponge—Cuts Easily Detected.

Drivers or the men in charge of this class of work should be compelled to give the tires a daily cleansing. Mud should be washed with a little water, a sponge not too wet being used. Not only is this good for tires, but it enables easy detection of small cuts and abrasions, which should be repaired at once before they have a chance to become larger.

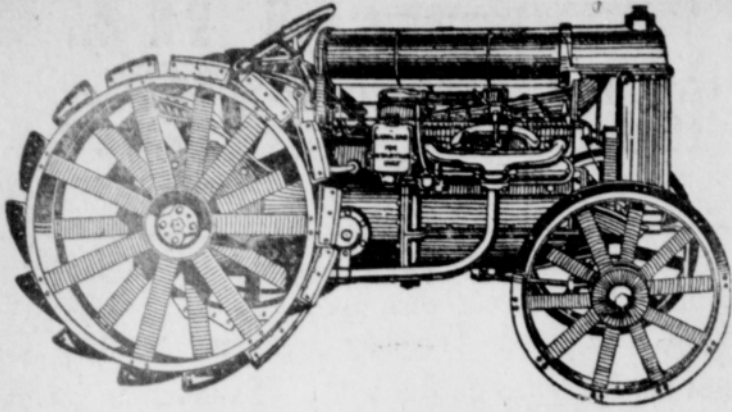

EVERY DAY GOOD THINGS.

After the cool fall days have come, we turn to the succulent oyster which has not been so often on the menu.

Oyster Stew.—Put a pint of oysters in a colander and pour over them one-fourth of a cupful of water. Pick them over in the fingers carefully to remove any bits of shell and place the oysters in a stewpan. Heat three cupfuls of milk over hot water; strain into it the liquor from the oyster, add the oysters and cook until the edges curl and they are plump; season with one-half teaspoonful of salt, and a few dashes of pepper, add three tablespoonfuls of butter to the hot milk and bring to the boiling point; serve at once. Overcooking of oysters toughens them and ruins the flavor.

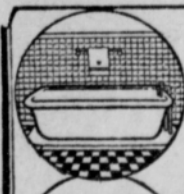
Meat Pie.—Use any cold-cooked meat except salted meat. Cut in small pieces, put into a baking dish and cover with a slightly thickened and seasoned gravy. Place over the heat while the crust is being prepared. To a pint of sifted flour add four level teaspoonfuls of baking powder and one-half teaspoonful of salt. Mix thoroughly and work in three tablespoonfuls of butter. Add three-fourths of a cupful of milk or enough to make a soft dough. Spread this over the meat and bake in a hot oven until the crust is well done and browned on top.

Creole Croquettes.—Mix one cupful of beef from the top of the round or the end of a porterhouse steak, finely chopped with one-third of a cupful of uncooked rice. Season with two-thirds of a teaspoonful of salt, a little cayenne and white pepper. Mix well and add a heaping tablespoonful of this mixture in cabbage leaves that have been parboiled two minutes. Simmer one hour in tomato sauce.
