## SPEARMAN H. S. OPENS MONDAY

The Schools of the Spearman Independent District will open next Monday, September 12th. All students as well as patrons and others interested in the school are invited to meet in general assembly at the Methodist Church on Monday morning at nine o'clock.

Those students whose residence is not in the Spearman Independent District and who have not been transferred into it in the regular manner will be required to pay a tuition fee of \$3.00 per month if they are classified as a High School Student; \$2.00 per month if classified in the Grammar school (grades 5, 6, 7) and \$1.00 per month if classified in the Primary Department. A tuition fee of \$1.00 will be charged for all students under 7 years of age on September 1st. None will be admitted under 6 years of age on September 1, 1921.

No unders will be admitted after October 1st till January 23rd, when they may be admitted during that week only. New beginners classes will be organized only during the time from opening day till October 1st, during the week of January 23rd.

A music teacher and an art teacher will offer instruction in their respective branches at reasonable rates of tuition.

## VALUABLE PACKAGE LOST AT P. O.

On Tuesday the City National bank, Guymon sent a package of \$1,000 by registered mail to the Guaranty State bank of Spearman. The package was received at the Spearman postoffice, receipted for, but before delivery could be made, mysteriously disappeared and up to the hour of going to press has not been located. Postmaster Lyman J. Hillhouse has wired the government officials to come at once and look into the matter and they are expected any moment. The package was insured in the Springfield Fire and Marine Insurance Company, which guarantees payment within fifteen days. Absolutely no trace of the valuable package can be found, but nothing about the post office was disturbed. It is a mysterious case to Spearman people, all of whom regret the affair very much and hope that the package will be found and that our town will not have a postoffice robbery checked up to its discredit.

### Pronounced Insane

Joseph L. Oliphant, who created quite a disturbance the first days in August in the vicinity of old Hansford by attaching a horse and entering smoke houses and who has been in the Canadian jail since that time, was brought to Spearman last Sunday and on Monday morning was given a hearing in Judge Storrs' court on an insanity charge. The jury selected were Messrs: O. C. Roney, John L. Hays, W. R. Massey, D. W. Hazelwood, Joe Davis and C. W. King, who, after hearing all the evidence and making a thorough investigation, pronounced the young man mentally unbalanced. He will be sent to the asylum at San Antonio tomorrow. Apparently this young fellow is perfectly rational, and his conversation and general demeanor are not that of a crazy man. Yet a thorough investigation will convince anyone that he is not in proper mental condition to be allowed to go and come where and when he pleases. He is an ex-service man.

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### HOW WE WON AT LAST

The Panhandle has gained during the past few months more honest-to-goodness recognition than had been accorded it before in the entire history of Texas. While the senatorial redistricting bill does not go into effect until 1924 [a very unfair discrimination] yet is better than the senatorial arrangement that has been in force for the past thirty years. By this bill Northwest Texas will have the senatorial representation its population is entitled to. The representative bill is a fair one and gives the Panhandle and the South Plains the number of representatives these sections are equitably entitled to. While the Panhandle is only a small portion of the legislature—and always will be, due to the preponderance of population in central Texas—yet we feel that we are more of a vital factor in our own affairs than we have ever been before.

There are elements that enter into the securing from the political-bound legislature the recognition we have (figuratively) prayed for. One is the development of the Panhandle as a productive section. The grain crops have astonished Texas by their abundance. The quality of the livestock that has come off of the Panhandle stock farms has made the market take notice. Again the press of Northwest Texas has been united as never before in demanding either a square deal or a separate state. The boys have quit saying: "Oh, yes, I'm a Texan. Kick me, spit on me, tax me to death, give the nigger more franchise than I have, but like the yellow dog I will crawl back and crave just an opportunity to be in the presence of my master, the Texas politician." Instead of this craven plea, they are saying: "I am an American citizen. I love Texas, but I also love my standing as a citizen, and if you won't recognize me I will cut loose from Austin and organize me a Texas of my own that will recognize the equality of men, whether those men be from the stock farm or the ward heeler's precinct in the city or the twenty acre cotton farm."

This threat of separate statehood has had its effect. The ear of central Texas has heard the ominous sound of discontent and deep unrest, the voice of an outraged citizenship, and has redistricted.

There is yet another factor that must be considered as largely instrumental in securing this long delayed redistricting act, and that factor is the class of men Northwest Texas has been sending to the legislature. We know, and all Panhandle folks know, that many representatives in the years that have passed were men elected solely because of the fact that no able man could afford to leave his profession or his business and go to the legislature for the meagre pittance paid him. There have gone to the legislature men whose names were bandied about as hugh jokes, men without ability or even standing in the commercial world. There would of course, occasionally a good man volunteer to make a patriot of himself by going to Austin as a legislator, but, oh, the jokes that have come out of the great West at legislators.

As senator we now have W. H. Bledsoe, a lawyer of Lubbock. A man of recognized ability, clean forceful, fearless, he has taken a place in the senate never before acquired by a Northwest Texan. He is a true Plainsman; he

doesn't live down in Central Texas, and at the same time try to represent the great Plains commonwealth.

Lee Satterwhite, representative from the Amarillo district, has come to the front in the house in a way that has made Texas sit up and take notice. His place as chairman of the committee on appropriations is second only to that of speaker of the house, and he is slated for the next speaker.

H. B. Hill, a lawyer of Shamrock, has been right to the front, especially as a leader of redistricting. He is another representative the Panhandle

can speak of with pride as to his standing and his ability. R. A. Baldwin, lawyer, representative from Lubbock county, has been heard of frequently and is another man of standing who has let the legislature know he is there to see that Northwest Texas is taken care of. With characters like these it is no mystery how the legislature has at last awoke to the fact that Northwest Texas is no mere tax paying end of the state is no longer a land without tradition and ideals, but is a real homeland, a vital, vibrant, energetic empire within itself.—The Canadian Record.



## TIMES DEMAND MODERN BARN

Poorly Constructed Live-Stock Shelters Out of Date.

### DAIRY ANIMALS REQUIRE CARE

Money That is Expended for Better Structures is Well Invested—Trust Economy When Building is to Build Well.

Time was in the history of American farms when a barn was merely a poorly constructed shelter for the farm live stock and some of the feed needed to maintain the animals throughout the winter months. No particular attention was paid to the needs of the animals other than a roof over their heads and walls to break the winter winds. Cows housed in these structures were cold and a great percentage of the feed they consumed was used up to maintain the required body heat, and little went to produce milk. Horses were not needed for farm work in winter, so they were put on light feed, and when spring came were in poor condition for the heavy work of that season.

Study of the live-stock industry showed that this type of poorly constructed farm building was expensive. It proved that when dairy animals are kept in a weather-proof building the milk flow greatly increases during the cold weather. Better buildings demonstrated that there were means of not only keeping the animals more healthy and productive, but of doing the work necessary in caring for the live stock more easily and in less time. Step by step the design of barns was improved, until barn architecture became so important that it attracted the attention of the architectural profession, and an intensive study of the needs of the live stock and the farm owner has brought about standard architectural practices in barn designing.

The modern barn, like the modern home, is built with two ideas uppermost; comfort and conveniences—comfort for the animals that are to live in it, and convenience for the men who care for the animals. Modern barns are constructed of good materials and are put up in first-class workmanlike manner; they are provided with systems of ventilation that keep the air in the stables pure, but eliminate drafts; they are equipped with labor-saving fixtures, such as steel stanchions that do not accumulate dirt and filth; water cups that supply fresh water at the stall heads continuously; litter carriers that eliminate the unpleasant job of removing manure; feed trucks that carry the feed to the mangers.

A good example of the modern dairy and horse barn is shown in the accompanying illustration. This barn is of about the right size to accommodate the live stock—horses and dairy cows—that are found on the average farm in the Middle West. It is 124 feet long and 38 feet wide, and is divided into two stables, one to accommodate nine horses and the other to house 28 cows, their calves and a bull.

A comparison of this barn with those in use twenty or thirty years ago, and the structures found on too many American farms today, will give a good idea of the progress in barn construction and equipment. Dirty, dark, cold and drafty structures are expensive because they cut down production and increase labor cost, while the modern barns increase production and cut labor costs.

It is economy when building to build well. That is especially true of barns that are to house live stock and their feed. Every farmer who needs a new building of this type should bear these facts in mind.

Every person who builds a home strives for two things—exterior beauty and interior comfort, for there is a satisfaction in the former that cannot be measured in dollars, while the latter makes the investment worth while.


Building designs that contain these two features are not difficult to find nowadays, as architects are constantly designing homes that are good to look at and utilize the space the walls inclose to the best advantage. Careful planning, so that there is no waste space in the interior, is what cuts building costs, as every foot saved either in the width or depth of the house reduces materially the total investment.

Whereas several years ago there were few homes built that contained less than seven rooms, with a great majority having more than that number, now the trend is to have fewer rooms, but arranged so that they provide comfortable living quarters for a good-sized family. The old-fashioned parlor and sitting room have been consolidated into one living room; entrance halls have been reduced in size, or eliminated entirely, while small "cubby-hole" rooms are a thing of the past. In other words the walls have been cut out and the space in the home devoted to rooms that are used constantly. This means economy in building costs.

Herewith is shown an exterior view of a house that any prospective home builder may be proud to own. Inside it is compact and comfortable, and provides the rooms necessary for a family of four or five persons.

While the exterior of this house is covered with stucco, the walls may be either frame, brick or hollow tile. As will be seen by the floor plans, the walls of this house are straight, making for lower construction cost, but the porch set into one corner the slight bay in the living room, and the long slope of the roof, all tend to give it a handsome appearance.


Inside, there are four rooms on the first floor and two bedrooms and a

bathroom on the second. How these rooms are arranged and the size of each one is shown on the plans. The building itself is 38 feet wide and 32 feet deep. The entrance door from the porch leads into a small reception hall, out of which run the stairs to the second floor. To the right, connected with the reception hall by a double-cased opening, is a living room, 14 feet wide and 16 feet deep. At the front on the corner is a bedroom, 9 by 12 feet.

Back of the living room and connected with it by a second cased opening is the dining room, which is larger than usually is found in a home of this size. This room, on the corner, and well lighted and airy, is 16 by 13 feet 6 inches. Adjoining it is the kitchen, 11 by 10 feet, while off the kitchen are convenient nooks, such as pantry, lavatory and closets, that









THE KITCHEN CABINET

#### HOT WEATHER GOOD THINGS.

A good supply of bottled sirups, juices and ginger ale will be a source of comfort and refreshment to the housewife and guest during the hot weather.



**Cherry Punch.**—Boil together for five minutes two cupsful of sugar and four cupsful of water; add one cupful of lemon juice, three cupsful each of orange juice and cherry juice. Chill and serve with ice.

**Grape Nectar.**—Boil together one cupful of sugar and one quart of water; after cooking ten minutes add when cool the juice of three lemons, two oranges, one can of pineapple and a pint of grape juice. Let stand three hours then add one thinly-sliced orange. Serve with ice.

**Ginger Ale.**—Remove the skins from

six large lemons and slice them into an earthen bowl. Add to them six ounces of bruised, fresh ginger root, six cupsful of sugar and four gallons of boiling water. When lukewarm add one-fourth of a yeast cake dissolved in a little water. Cover the bowl with a thin cloth and let stand a day. Bottle and keep in a cool place.

**Pear Fritters.**—Cut ripe pears, peeled and cored into thick slices; dip into a fritter batter and fry in deep fat. Serve rolled in sugar and with a sauce made from stewing the peelings and cores with a pear or two in sufficient water to cover. Strain, sweeten, thicken with flour; add butter; cook until smooth and thick. The fritter batter is prepared with one cupful of flour, the yolks of two eggs, one-half cupful of cold water, two tablespoonfuls of sugar and a tablespoonful of olive oil or any good salad oil. Beat to a smooth paste; add the stiff-beaten whites and a pinch of salt.

A pair of baking sheets made to fit the oven with the edges turned up and reinforced by a piece of heavy wire are the handiest of baking pans. A whole roll of cookies may be rolled out and baked with one heating of the oven.
