It was due entirely to a sharp 3 percent drop in mining output. In Texas, that means oil and gas production. Once a main source of industrial strength, estroleum production in

Crude production dropped

Crude production dropped 4.9 percent in October to a level 6.5 percent less than a year before. Production of natural gas was unchanged, as it had been for several months. But gas production was down 4 percent from a year earlier and production of natural gas liquids was down 1.7 percent. The only signs of strength in Texas mining for several

Ine only signs of strength in Texas mining for several months has been in drilling. Drilling was on the increase all fall. And by October, 15 percent more drilling was being done in Texas than just last summer. In terms of petroleum pro-

In terms of petroleum pro

level in years

Early this year, business six was picking up so well there was concern about a return to shortages with new pressure on prices.

shortages with new pressure on prices. But this summer, the pace of recovery slowed. And by fall, concern had shifted to emerging signs of weakness. Now, all signs point to a further slowing in the growth in real GNP this quarter. That will make the third consecutive quarter of slow-ing.


ing. Adjusted for prices, the nation's total output in-creased at a seasonally ad-justed annual rate of 4.5 percent in the second quar-ter, compared with a boom-ing 9.2 percent in the first. By the third quarter, expan-sion had slowed to 4 percent. This quarter, it may be only a little over 3 percent.

This quarter, it may be only a little over 3 percent. On the industrial front, output has actually declined, failing an estimated 0.5 per-cent in October to 130.4 percent on the 1967 base. And that was after a 0.2 percent decline in Septem-ber.





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

This can be accom-plished quickly by boiling them in water for two min-utes, removing from the heat and soaking for one hour. They are then ready to cook. If you prefer to soak the peas overnight, it is still a good idea to start with the two minute boil, because you will minute boil, because you will have fewer hard skins and the brief boil will keep them

from souring," she ex-plained. Season with one teaspoon salt for each cup of dry peas. Salt pork and bacon are old standbys for seasoning, but chopped ham or smoked turkey left over from the Christmas celebration are great also. Pepper, garlic and oregano can be added in small amounts, one-fourth teaspoon per pound of dry peas. to enhance the flavor. In the slow cooker, soak the peas overnight, then cook them in water on high for two to two and one-half hours. Gruver Man Has High Yield Keith Lamb, of Gruver, has reported a high yield among local entrants in a nationwide sorghum growing program with a yield of

seeds per acre in twin 40-inch rows. He fertilized with 107 pounds nitrogen. (His crop was irrigated preplant and 3 times.) He used atrazine/2,4-D for weed con-tred nationwide sorgnum growing program with a yield of 8131.3 pounds per acre. The program, Project: 10,000, is sponsored by The Producers of Funk's G-Hy-brids and is one of the most meaningful sorghum-grow-ing programs in the nation. Lamb planted 6 acres of Funk's G-701GBR sorghum on May 17 and harvested on October 20 at 14.2 percent moisture. His official yield was adjusted to 14 percent moisture.




