The unemployment compensation provision of al Social Security Act will begin to take effect in weeks. Unemployment benefits-at least from the Fedand-are not to begin until 1938. Then persons out of work from no fault of their own will be to collet half-pay, or thereabouts, for a period of ten to twenty weeks, varying from state to state. A maximum of \$15 a week for unemployment rensation is provided in most of the states so far: has an \$18 maximum. And in all of them, the pensation will not begin until the beneficiary has out of work for a period which ranges from hree weeks. This unemployment insurance will, beyond

bt, become a permanent and general system as as the rest of the state legislatures can get around macting laws of the same general nature. It does apply to farm labor, domestic workers, men em-red on ships, employees of charitable or non-profit eprises, nor those who work for national or state aments or their political subdivisions. 
Following an address made by Supt. W. B. Irvin of the Perryton schools, the Spearman Lions club adopted the following BE IT RESOLVED

It is an undisputed fact that any warm dry gas absorbs mois-ture readily. This being true is it not logical that this absolutely dry gas which is turned loose into the atmosphere at the rate of 1.600-000,000 Cu. Ft. per 24 hours, or approximately enough gas to sup-ply the demands of every piece of gas burning equipment in the United States for that same ver-iod of time, will absorb enough moisture to turn an atmosphere which is about ready to rain, in-to one which if far from raining. It is also a recognized fact that a dry gas will heat more rapidly than one containing moisture.

ter. On several occasions recently we have seen a light mist be en-tirely absorbed at the gas-fields. When the wind was from the north the mist was north of the fields and when it was from the south there were perfectly clear skies north of the fields. There was NO mist or even fog where the gas was. Some people say they believe gas would help us get rain, so do we, natural gas. When the fields were first opened we did seem to get more rain. However at that time the natural gas had no gasoline (moisture) extracted from it and it had more moisture in it than the atmosphere. Now its different. They even give it the charcoal test to find if it has any moisture left in it before they turn it loose, and if it has.
