## VANGUARD TO STORM PERRYTON FOR GRID BATTLE

### Business Plans To Close Up Almost 100 Percent To Attend Game and Support Their Team

PERRYTON STAGING ARMISTICE DAY CELEBRATION WITH FOOTBALL GAME AS FEATURE ATTRACTION OF DAYS PROGRAM—GAME CALLED AT 3 P. M.

All roads lead to Perryton on the afternoon of November 11th when the entire citizenship of the city headed by the Lynx players and the Spearman student body, journey over to our neighbors to attempt to collect the second consecutive scalp from our enemy.

With the exception of 1933, the local team has been more or less successful in winning from the Perryton Rangers. Should the Spearman club have won in 1933 instead of coming out on the little end of a 19 to 0 score, the record at the present time would be five consecutive wins—but the defeat in 1933 started the record all over again. According to back files of the Spearman Reporter the games played and won from Perryton are as follows:

This record shows that Spearman lost four games in a row when the team first started playing with Perryton. Then the Lynx won three games in a row, tied one in 1933, but lost the conference contest and came back last year with two wins.

Perryton with quite a bit of edge in the matter of records for this season will be the favorite in the Monday contest. The records show that Perryton has continued to improve as a team all thru the year, and where comparative scores are available, the posters give the Rangers the advantage.

Neither team has the incentive of a sectional championship to fight for in the Monday contest, since Canadian has eliminated both Perryton and Spearman. However, this fact will not dampen the spirits of either of the two teams. Both at Perryton and Spearman the players and fans regard a season's success if the Lucy team is winner from the opponent.

Coach Gunn is working his boys unmercifully this week on a set of new plays, calculated to deceive the defense of Perryton. He is drilling them equally as hard on an air-tight defense calculated to stop the Rangers when they start galloping down the field Monday.

School officials and school fans are urging the casual football fan to attend the Monday game and help win the contest. The Perryton contingent will have a strong backing at the game and will play hard for a win, and just a little encouragement to our boys may mean the difference between victory and defeat.

Citizens headed by members of the Lions club plan to banquet the boys Friday night and let them know they are behind the team in the coming contest.

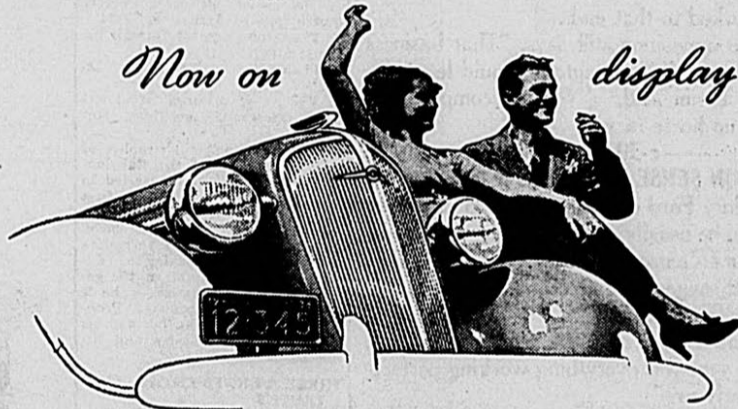
