

SPEARMAN LYNX PLAY FAST PANHANDLE CLUB FRIDAY OCTOBER 4

What is expected of the very best football test of the present season is to be staged on the gridiron this Friday Oct. 4 when the Lynx players meet their ancient rivals, the Panhandle Panthers at 3 p. m.

Next to Perryton, the Spearman players and fans take more than ordinary delight in beating the Panhandle club.

This year, however, the local players enter the fray a most emphatic under dog. While Panhandle has not won a game so far this season, it has been because the team encountered two of the best Class B teams in the entire state—the McLean, past district champions, and Canyon excellent team. In both these contests the Panhandle team held the opponents to a one point victory the scores being 7 to 0.

Panhandle will come to Spearman overconfident. The fans and team of Panhandle have rated their players as four touchdowns better than Spearman.

In the home camp Coach Elma Gunn says little, but he believes that Spearman has a chance to defeat the visitors with a few of the breaks of the game.

Spearman has won all the contests so far this year. However, this does not mean too much. The local team has not been up against too stiff competition so far.

All Spearman is excited and interested in the Friday game. The Spearman Lion club voted to aid in the game and a committee of the club stepped out and sold \$40.00 worth of advance tickets Tuesday afternoon of this week. Colonel Erasmus, O. Tack, of the Amarillo Globe, earned the stolen title of "Honesty" when he publicly admitted at Spearman Friday evening of last week that "I ain't no weather prophet."

The occasion for the admission was a public address to the people of Hansford county, when the Spearman City Library was officially opened to the public with a social get-together, the board of the library serving coffee and doughnuts to those who attended.

Tack, when called on to make a speech, started his talk with the admission that he was not a weather prophet, and never intended being one, and that he wanted the good intelligent people of this section of the Panhandle to understand that his weather propheting was only for the saps that lived around Amarillo, and not for the salt of the earth that lived up here in Hansford county. His next confession was the fact that he had stolen the title of "Honesty" from a certain newspaper man who had earned it by example and precept over a period of years.

He said in substance that his stolen title had been more or less of a handicap in his work, and that he was considering abandoning the stolen title, since it did not fit in with his life at the capital city of the Panhandle.

Tack complimented the Hansford folk on their enterprise and ambition in establishing the Spearman city library, and to substantiate his remarks along this line he made a contribution of \$5 to forward the work of the library.

Following his short talk the versatile newspaperman stepped behind the serving counter and dished out coffee and doughnuts to the Hansford folk.

The Friday evening social affair proved very beneficial to the library project. More than a hundred books were donated to the library, and a substantial sum in cash started the library work proper for this county.

STATE SUPT. FOUR CANDIDATES ARE NEW PROGRAM ENTERED IN REPORTER COLLEGE SCHOOLS SUBSCRIPTION CONTEST

Briefly the new legislation is making available more funds for transportation, and better allowances for the standardized school. It is the plan of the state board of education to bring up the efficiency of the school system of the state so that Texas will not in the future rank 33 in the stand- ing of the nation.

To bring to the attention of the patrons the situation as it now stands, Deputy Supt. Wilson gave a few examples. He cited the fact that in Livingston county Texas a total of 102 schoolastics were recorded, and in Harris county 80,000 schoolastics were recorded.

The state board of education is sponsoring and recommending a program of consolidation. The general plan calls for students of rural schools to transfer to the larger schools of counties or near-by independent districts. Where a standardized elementary school can be maintained in a rural district, the board is recommending that the high school students be transferred or consolidated with and accredited high school and the elementary school receive all efforts of improvement.

Supt. Wilson stated that West Texas paid in a great deal more in taxes than we get back, and that we must adjust our schools to fit the state laws if we are ever to receive a equalized distribution of the tax money.

In the program of consolidation, records show that 27,718 high school student attended the accredited high schools last year as result of the transportation aid from the state. This is growing every year.

Wilson complimented the three high schools of Hansford county, and encouraged the patrons of the rural districts to consolidate with these schools.

In the absence of County Supt. Broadhurst, A. F. Barkley presided at the meeting.

Arnold Ferguson Attends Meeting State AAA Men

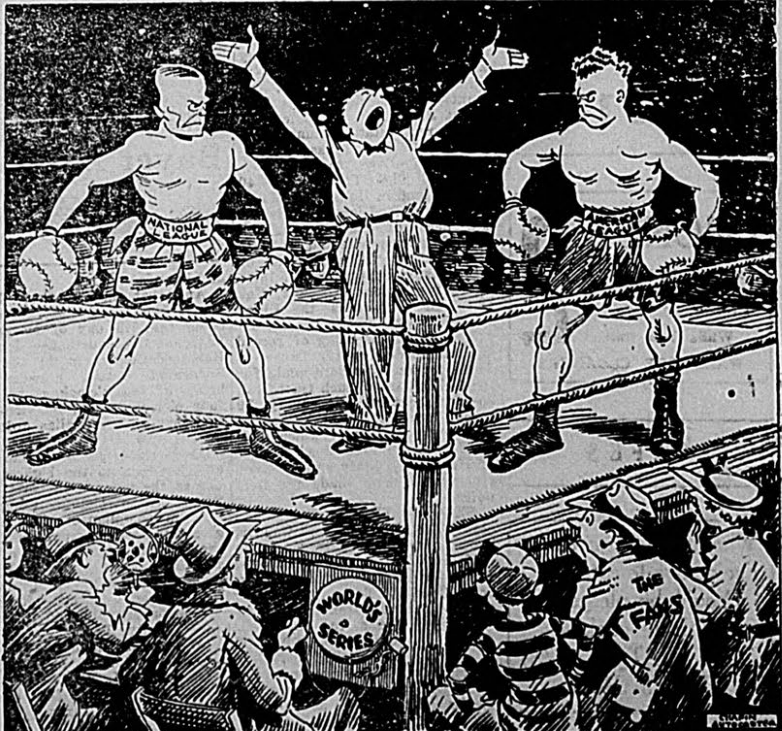

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EDITORIAL

THE REPUBLICAN CAMPAIGN

What the writer believes is an insult to the intelligence of the Southwestern Agricultural Producer, is the Republican party campaign to secure votes from the Southwest on the grounds that the party has a better program to offer than the new deal administration.

... that the party leaders realize they have not to dig up something more than empty promises to secure any appreciable votes is indicated by recent planning and discussion within the bounds of party leaders.

Information comes to the public that the party is planning to raise more than two million dollars for campaign funds, and—but let the TEXAS Weekly give the information.

"We must dramatize our appeal more than has been done in the past," declared Jim Watson a great one for dramatizing a situation. We recall that breathless climax with which he brought the debate on the Hawley-Smoot tariff bill to a close in June, 1930. "I here and now predict," he declared, "and I ask my fellow Senators to recall this prediction in the days to come, that if this bill is passed this nation will be on the up-grade financially, economically, and commercially within thirty days, and that within a year from this time we shall have regained the peak of prosperity." It was all very dramatic, not to say thrilling. But the bill was passed, and a year later almost to a day President Hoover declared a moratorium on intergovernmental debts. And far from making the up-grade, the country went on the toboggan and didn't stop until complete prostration was reached early in 1933. But there was plenty of drama in Jim Watson's handling of the situation, when he stood on the floor of the Senate and called upon his fellow Senators to "recall this prediction in the days to come." However, he didn't like to have it recalled during the campaign of 1932, and it is not altogether probable that this was one of the reasons he didn't go back to the Senate. Nevertheless, he considers the Republican outlook excellent in the Middle West and expects Indiana to swing back to the G. O. P. in 1936. It occurs to us that one of the reasons that conservative Democrats, who are dissatisfied with much of the New Deal, are nevertheless going to stay with their party in 1936, is that the alternative is a return to power of the Jim Watsons of the Republican party. The Republicans had first chance at the repression, and their cure for it was the Hawley-Smoot tariff law. If they have any better program than that today, no Republican leader has divulged the secret. The spectacle of the Republican Party in the role of the guardian of States' rights is not convincing. It is not good drama, but approaches more nearly to opera bouffe, not to say burlesque. There are Republicans, to be sure, who realize that something more than an attitude of destructive criticism of the administration is called for, but they are outnumbered by narrow economic nationalists and unregenerate high tariff protectionists, who have no practical program for the present situation.

A significant incident in connection with that Washington meeting of the Republican National Executive Committee was the failure of Chairman Henry P. Fletcher to present to it a telegram from Frank E. Gannett, publisher of an influential chain of newspapers in the State of New York. Mr. Gannett's telegram urged the committee urged the committee and all Republican leaders to concentrate on two questions. The first of these questions follows: "How can the American economic system be made to function within the Constitution, so private business can put 10,000,000 idle back to work?" And the second question is like unto it: "How can the income of agriculture be raised, by constitutional means, so that the

wage of 10,500,000 American gainfully employed in farming shall be more than \$1.39 a day including AAA benefits as in 1934?" Chairman Fletcher said that he had written Mr. Gannett: "We are not discussing policies at this time." This, it seems to us, is a significant answer. As to what answers will be given these two questions when the Republicans do finally get to the point of "discussing policies," it would be difficult to imagine. For our own part, we are convinced that the 10,000,000 idle will not be put back to work in private industry until the trade of the world has been restored, and that the trade of the world will not be restored and expanded so long as the richest nation in the world restricts trade to a minimum by means of a sky-high tariff wall. And by the same token, we do not expect to see the farmers of the country producing normal crops and marketing them on a profitable basis so long as that tariff wall remains up. This, we think, is the fundamental condition which must be met in any attempt to provide a practicable program in answer to Mr. Gannett's questions. More than this is required, to be sure. A full program of international cooperation and stabilization is required. But the basic condition upon which to construct such a program is the lowering of the American tariff wall. The Republican, we can be sure, will not agree upon such an answer as that, no matter how much they "discuss" it. The Grass Roots convention did some discussing, and the best it could do in the way of arriving at an answer was to parrot Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace by declaring that so long as the tariff wall remained high the farmer must be paid subsidies by the Government. The real question, it seems to us, is: "How long is the tariff wall going to be kept sky-high?" And the answer to that question is certainly not that it will remain sky-high until we elect a Republican President and a Republican Congress to scale it down. The Republicans will not even promise to scale it down, as the Democrats did in 1932, and the
