THE REPUBLICAN CAMPAIGN

What the writer believes is an insult to the itelligence of the Southwestern Agricultural Produc-, is the Republican party campaign to secure votes om the Southwest on the grounds that the party has better program to offer than the new deal adminis-

.. that the party leaders realize they have t to dig up something more than empty promises to sure any appreciable votes is indicated by recent anning and discussion within the bounds of party aders.

Information comes to the public that the party planning to raise more than two million dollars for mpaign funds, and-but let the TEXAS Weekly give the information.

"We must dramatize our appeal more than as been done in the past," de declared. Jim Watson a great one for dramatizing a situation. We recall at breathless climax with which he brought the bate on the Hawley-Smoot tariff bill to a close in me, 1930. "I here and now predict," he declared, and I ask my fellow Senators to recall this prediction the days to come, that if this bill is passed this na in will be on the up-grade financially, economically, nd commercially within thirty days, and that within year from this time we shall have regained the peak prosperity." It was all very dramatic, not to say inlling. But the bill was passed, and a year later most to a day President Hoover declared a mora-mum on intergovernmental debts. And far from king the up-grade, the country went on the tobogan and didn't stop until complete prostration was rached early in 1933. But there was plenty of drama Jim Watson's handling of the situation, when he tood on the floor of the Senate and called upon his low Senators to "recall this prediction in the days come." However, he didn't like to have it recalled uring the campaign of 1932, and it is not altogether probable that this was one of the reasons he didn't back to the Senate. Nevertheless, he considers the epublica noutlook excellent in the Middle West and expects Indiana to swing back to the G. O. P. in 936. It occurs to us that one of the reasons that onservative Democrats, who are dissatisfied with which of the New Deal, are nevertheless going to stay with their party in 1936, is that the alternative is a turn to power of the Jim Watsons of the Republican arty. The Republicans had first chance at the represon, and their cure for it was the Hawley Smoot tariff w. If they have any better program than that today, Republican leader has divulged the secret. The pectacle of the Republican Party in the role of the pardian of States' rights is not convincing. It is not and drama, but approaches more nearly to opera mulfe, not to say burlesque. There are Republicans, be sure, who realize that something more than an thitude of destructive criticism of the administration called for, but they are outnumbered by narrow tonomic nationalists and unregenerate high tariff rotectionists, who have no practical program for the sent situation.

A significant incident in connection with that ashiggton meeting of the Republican National Exealive Committee was the failure of Chairman Henry Fletcher to present to it a telegram from Frank E. unnett, publisher of an influential chain of news-Papers in the State of New York. Mr. Gannett's teleam urged the committee urged the committee and Republican leaders to concentrate on two ques-lons. The first of these questions follows: "How can American economic system be made to function, whin the Constitution, so private business can put 0,000,000 idle back to work?" And the second restion is like unto it: "How can the income of agri-ulture be raised, by constitutional means, so that the

farming shall be more than \$1.39 a day including AAA benefits as in 1934?" Chairman Fletcher said that he had written Mr. Gannett: "We are not discussing policies at this time." This, it seems to us, is a significant answer. As to what answers will be given these two quetions when the Republicans do finally get to the point of "discussing policies," it would be difficult to imagine. For our own part, we are convinced that the 10,000,000 idle will not be put back to work in private industry until the trade of the world has been

restored, and that the trade of the world will not be restored and expanded so long as the richest nation in the world restricts trade to a minimum by means of a sky high tariff wall. And by the same token, we do not expect to see the farmers of the country producing normal crops and marketing them on a profit-able basis so long as that tariff wall remains up. This, we think, is the fundamental condition which must be met in any attempt to provide a practicable program in answer to Mr. Gannett's questions. More than this is required, to be sure. A full program of international cooperation and stabilization is required. But the basic condition upon which to construct such a program is the lowering of the American tariff wall. The Republican, we can be sure, will not agree upon such an answer as that, no matter how much they "discuss" it. The Grass Roots convention did some discussing, and the best it could do in the way of arriving at an answer wa sto parrott Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace by declaing that so long as the tariff wall remained high the farmer must be paid subsidies by the Government. The real question, it seems to us, is: How long is the tariff wall going to be kept skyhigh?" And the asnwer to that question is certainly not that it will remain sky-high until we elect a Republican President and a Republican Congress to scale it down. The Republicans will not even promise to scale it down, as the Democrats did in 1932, and the




