Hansford County Rainfall Measures More Than Inch For Past Week End Rains

Sufficient rainfall to insure wheat coming up has fallen in every section of Hansford county the past week. The official record for Spearman was .45 of an inch Sunday night. This is probably the smallest amount of moisture to fall in the county, according to U. S. Weather recorder, Fred Brandt. Mr. Brandt says that the county as a whole has the best prospects for a planting season that we have had since 1933. The average over the county for Sunday precipitation amounted from a half inch to one and a half inch, Mr. Brandt said.

WHEAT OFFICIALS HOPE FOR INCREASE IN 1936 ALLOTMENT

Protests of Hansford county wheat growers, registered under the leadership of the Hansford wheat allotment board and our county agent, will be reviewed by a board of review of the state estimates of crops, which is to be in session at Amarillo in the near future. This information was made available by John R. Edwards, who represents the Federal officials in the matter.

County Agent Boykin has a file of letters from Tom Connally, Marvin Jones, Morris Shepherd and other government officials indicating that the government will try to correct any injustice in allotting the wheat money to Hansford producers. The file also shows by record, the basis of the wheat allotment under the present contract covering the counties surrounding Hansford county. According to the data being presented the government, all the surrounding counties, with the possible exception of Moore and Hutchinson counties, are receiving more favorable basis of allotment than Hansford county. Should the local authorities be able to gain a more favorable adjustment, as a result of their protest, it will mean several thousand dollars to Hansford producers in the future.

DEMONSTRATION Gruver School Will Open For Year Sept. 9



Supt. F. P. Wilson returned from Lubbock Aug 29 with his family and is busy shaping things up for the opening of School Monday, Sept. 9th. He has been at the Texas Tec. College working on his M. A. degree. His subject for his Masters Thesis is "Activities for commercial and Economic Geography and General Science with Special reference to Moisture Conservation and Soil Erosion in the Panhandle". He expects to spend his spare time this winter working with the soil erosion project and the weather bureau and the farmers trying to find out the best possible policies to follow in moisture conservation and soil erosion, and to collect this data and complete it so that it may be used in the classrooms as projects for geography and general Science.

Mr. Wilson states that all the affiliations for which the school asked for last year has been granted which gives the Gruver school affiliations in twenty units. The faculty will have our new teachers on its roll. They have been selected with the greatest of care and have been placed in the places to teach their major or minor subject. San Antonio, Sept. 5— With five statewide projects asking grants of \$37230409 and a request for funds to prosecute a \$30,092,398 Brazos River flood control and conservation project already in the hands of Washington officials, prospects that this state would be able to secure sufficient WPA funds to care for its employables by Sept 12 are encouraging.

Deadline for presentation of projects for state WPA grants has been set at Sept 12 by the President.

For this reason these statewide projects were forwarded early in the hope that we may secure allocations to Texas of enough money to insure a year of work for all our employable on relief rolls as of May 31.

At the same time sponsors are urged to continue proposing local projects.

It must be understood clearly that statewide projects are submitted only in anticipation of local sponsors submitting proposals for similar types of projects.

For instance, if the statewide lateral road request is granted individual counties will be received as usual and charged against the statewide project.

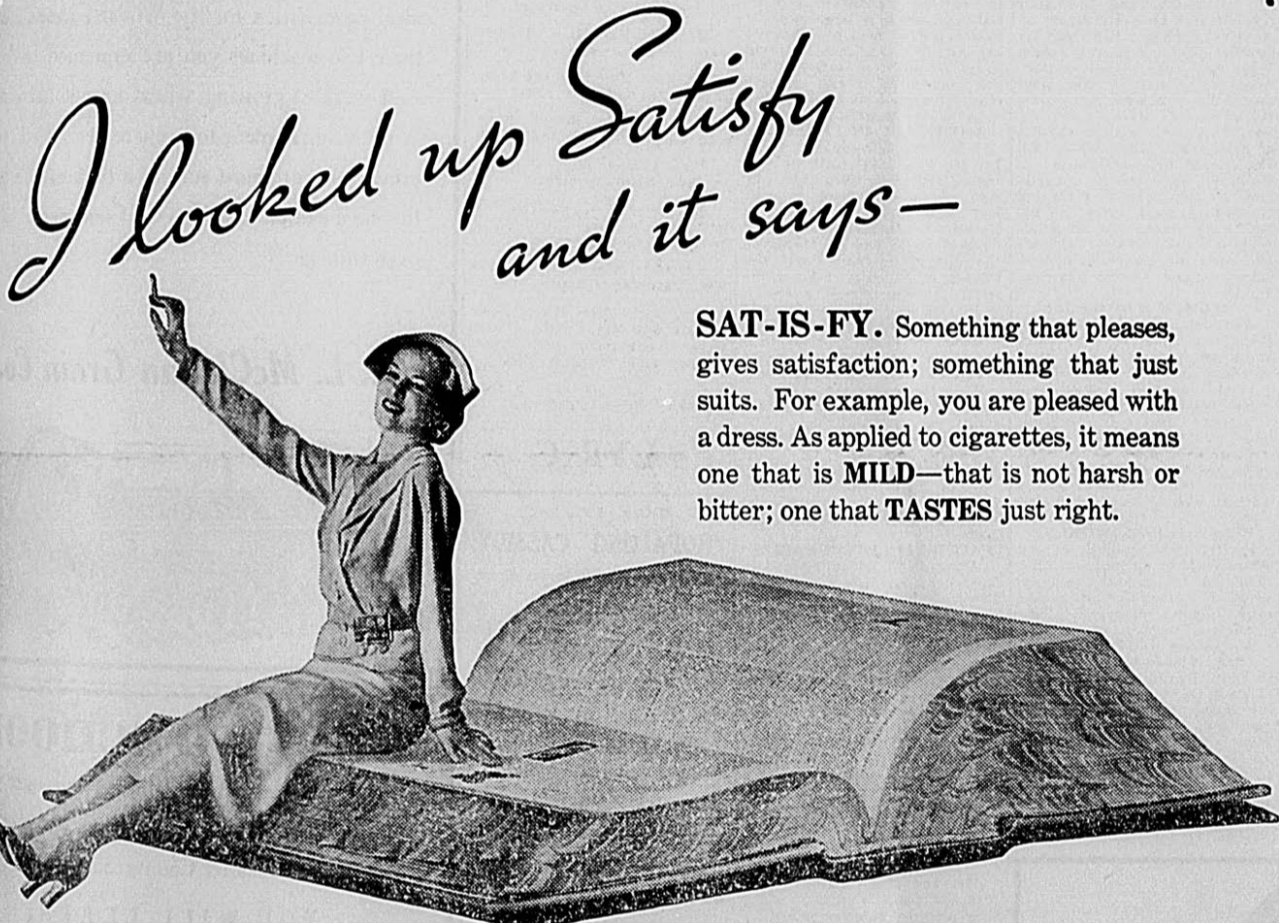

General Topic: Lydia and Priscilla
Scripture lesson: Acts 16-11-15
Acts 16-11. Setting sail there-fore from Troas we made straight course to Samothrace and the day following to Neapolis.

12. And from thence to Philippi, which city is of Macedonia, the first of the districts a Roman colony; and we were in this city tarrying certain days.

13. And on the sabbath day we went forth without the gate by a river side, where we supposed there was a place of prayer and we sat down, and spake unto the women that were come together.

14. And a certain woman named Lydia, a seller of purple, of the city of Thyatira, one that worshipped God, heard us, whose heart the Lord opened to give heed unto the things which were spoken by Paul.

15. And when she was baptized and her household, she besought us saying, If ye have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come into my house, and abide there. And she constrained us.

Acts, 18-1 After these things he departed from Athens, and came to Corinth.

2. And he found a certain Jew named Aquila a man of Pontus by race lately come from Italy, with his wife Priscilla, because Claudius had commanded all Jews to depart from Rome; and he came unto them.

3. And because he was of the same trade, he abode with them and they wrought, for their trade they were tent makers.

24. Now a certain Jew named Apollos, an Alexandrian by race, an eloquent man, came to Ephesus and he was mighty in the scriptures.

25. This man had been instructed in the way of the Lord; and being fervent in spirit, he spake and taught accurately the things concerning Jesus knowing only the baptism of John.

26. And he began to speak boldly in the synagogue. But when Priscilla and Aquila heard him they took him unto them, and expounded unto him the way of God more accurately.

27. And when he was minded to pass over into Achaia the brethren encouraged him and

wrote to the disciples to receive him; and when he was come he helped them very much that had believed through grace.

28. For he powerfully confuted the Jews, and that publicly, showing by the scripture that Jesus was Christ.

Golden Text. Give her of the fruit of her hands And let her works praise her in the gates.

INTRODUCTION

In modern American life we find a great host of women who are in business The industrial group makes up a large part of our church family. How may we provide a definite place for them What part can these women have in the work of the kingdom? We may learn much from the characters of our lesson today. They rank high in the list of helpers and associates of Paul Each made her contribution to the work. Each will be remembered as long as God's Word continues to be read. Lydia and Priscilla are among the immortals because they answered Christ's challenge and consecrated themselves without reserve to his service.

WOMEN AND WAGES

For many years women have demanded equal pay for equal work yet in most cases their earnings are still less than 70 per cent of men's. Women seem more individualistic than men, and many expect to work for only a few years. Yet single women often have to support aged parents, or younger brothers or sisters. Of all women workers 28.9 per cent are married.

PROFESSIONAL WOMEN

In 1883 Oberlin College opened its doors to women, and since then many others have become available. Pioneer educated women overcame many of these obstacles. The first woman physician in the world was Dr. E. Backwell who secured her degree in 1858. During her three years of study the women at her boarding house refused to speak to her, and meeting her on the street, drew aside their skirts in contempt.

Today there are 1,400,000 professional women, of whom one-fifth are school teachers, 1 fifth trained nurses. Frances Perkins Sec. of Labor, is the

first woman member of the Cabinet. Hattie Caraway, of Arkansas was elected in 1932 as the first woman member of the U. S. Senate.

LYDIA A BUSINESS WOMAN

Luke had given us a picture of Lydia in Acts 16. There is no further mention of her any where. In that chapter we are introduced to a woman who had come to Philippi from Thyatira a city of Lydia. Though a stranger from Philippi she gradually built up a good business, employing a number of workers. Her city was famous throughout the Roman world for the fine cloth manufactured there.

THE FAITHFUL PRISCILLA

In Paul's travels among the churches he found many workers who proved faithful to him. Among all of these Aquila and Priscilla take their place among the foremost of the faithful. It is probable that Priscilla was converted while in Rome and that she and Aquila were driven out from the great city under the order of the Emperor Claudius. These two faithful Christians fled to Corinth about the year 50 A. D. and had been about six months there before Paul came to Corinth from Athens. They were pleased when they heard Paul preach in their adopted city and immediately invited him to live with them and to become a partner in their business.

PAUL IN CORINTH

For eighteen months this happy partnership continued. Paul preached and worked at the trade and enjoyed the fellowship of these fine people and friends. His successful ministry in Corinth was due in a large measure to the blessed help of Priscilla and Aquila It was great training for them and they offered Paul the companionship and strength that he needed so much during those trying months in Corinth.

WITH PAUL IN EPHEBUS

When the Jews made it too hot for Paul in Corinth he journeyed back to Jerusalem by way of Ephesus, with Priscilla and Aquila. They left him at Ephesus to establish a home and business there, and he journeyed the rest of the way alone. The Church at Ephesus met in the home of these friends where it was probably established, and continued to meet there until it became too large to meet in a home.

Priscilla an efficient teacher

As a teacher of Apollos this good woman demonstrated her ability as an instructor. The young preacher was eloquent and talented. He needed to know some things more accurately before he could become effective finished her work with him he was a powerful preacher of the Gospel.

FAITHFUL MISSIONARIES

After Paul left Ephesus we later hear of this couple in Rome again. They went about a great deal but they always took Christ with them. Whether in Rome, Corinth or Ephesus, they always used their time to witness for their Saviors. They were successful in business and were able to preach Christ in the midst of their activities.

Think of the millions of people who are reading the Bible of this quiet couple today because they thought it worth while to give their best in witnessing for Christ.

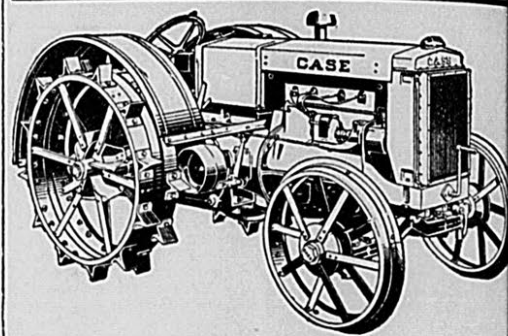

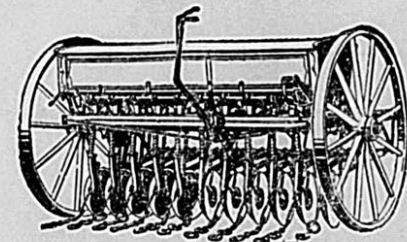
