## FREE SEED AVAILABLE TO PLANT COVER CROP IN HANSFORD COUNTY

Seed of Milo and Hegira are expected to be available through the county agent for late coverage crop planting. The Soil Conservation Service of the U. S. D. A. are supplying this seed to farmers who will use it to plant on land where the crop has failed or was not planted.

It is not intended for production purposes but to help fill the gap in erosion resisting vegetation caused by failure of crops and neglect of land.

For example, land now being summer fallowed for wheat with no returns of straw and stubble this year will enter the winter solely dependent on the sown wheat for protection. Both soil and wheat can be made safer if a wide row or strip planting of sorghum is made soon.

The agreement necessary to get this seed is a simple and honest promise to leave an effective cover on the land through the winter. The land which goes into the winter without stubble or stalks will continue to blow away and damage nearby crops as long as it remains in an exposed condition.

The more bare fields can be got under cover before fall the safer the condition will be generally for the next blow season. Therefore everyone who does not now have a crop on the ground capable of leaving an effective residue behind is urged to obtain seed and plant at the first seasonable opportunity.

### JUDGE BROADHURST VISITS DUMAS FOR COUNTY JUDGES MEETING

Judge J. H. Broadhurst is in Dumas today (Thursday) attending a meeting of Judges and Commissioners of the nine West Texas counties that are to receive refunds of state taxes. Plans will be made at the meeting as to the method that will be employed in disbursing funds that are to be available in the soil erosion program of the state the NRA program.

One of the most impressive facts encountered in my visit home was the apparent lack of interest of folks in providing for the future. My father has a small fruit orchard at Collinsville, and normally the demand for plums and peaches is far beyond his ability to supply. People living in the prairie section of the county engage their supplies long before the fruit is ripe. This year very little of the fruit was sold, and rather than see the fruit go to waste, the immediate family have canned a large supply. I was able to can up two bushels of plums, and approximately 8 gallons of berries during the stay of my family down state. It seems almost criminal negligence to allow good food to rot in the fields. But the production is so great that many families are allowing this to happen. A person who desires to can vegetables can get a large quantity from families who have already canned all they need for the coming year. A relief cannery will take the vegetables or fruit and can them in quart tin containers for 6c per quart. This really makes it cheaper to produce canned goods than the individual can produce at their own home.

To those of the readers who are banking for a real fish yarn we feel sure that you will not be disappointed next week when Clay Gibner, Country Agent Boykin, Ike (Cluch), Gene Richardson and Bruce Sheets return from a fish trip to Colorado. Mr. Boykin placed a value of \$25.00 on his catch alone. He is stating that if the rest do as well as he does the Editor of the local paper will eat trout when the fishermen come home to this city. Here's hoping.

## EXPECT QUICK PAYMENT FOR 1935 SIGNERS

Wheat contract signers of Hansford County have been signing up their compliance records this week with the communities of the entire county having completed their first check and signatures. County Agent Boykin stated that the response to the request for signatures was very gratifying, but that the preliminary canvass left a few unsigned contracts in each community. Those producers who have not signed are urged to come to the court house for signing their compliance contracts at the earliest convenience, as failure to sign will delay receiving the 1935 wheat checks.

Every precaution is being taken to avoid any delay in the payment of the second 1934 and the first 1935 payments this year. After approval in the local county office all papers are to be taken to Amarillo where the State chairman will make a pre-audit before sending them on to Washington for payment.

By following this plan it is hoped that checks will be mailed out of Washington within thirty days after the compliance papers reach there.

### Emergency Rates To Be Extended Thru August

Geo. W. Barnes, assistant State drouth director, has advised the county agents office that emergency freight rates will be extended to August 31, 1935. This ruling became effective on June 5th. No changes have been in effect for the past several months.

Rates now in effect cover both interstate and intrastate shipments of hay and roughages. Texas railroads have extended the ruling to include feed shipments if made within the states.

Those consumers wishing to make carlot shipments will continue to secure drouth certificates from the county agent's office, as in the past.

### NEED MORE RAIN

Reports coming in from every section of the county is to the effect that more rain is needed in Hansford at this time. Weeds are sapping all the moisture in many sections, where the land was not worked before the rains. Several farmers declare that the land is sealed over with the dust that has been blowing this spring, and the heavy rainfall of last month and early June ran off the land into drainage channels and lakes. Those that are completing planting feed stuff this week are of the opinion that there is not sufficient moisture to bring up the seed.

## ANNUAL RODEO TO BE HELD AT CANADIAN BEGINNING JULY 3.

Canadian, Texas.—Considerable progress is being made each day—for the 13th annual presentation of the Anvil Rodeo to be held here July 3, 4, and 5. The livestock is being assembled and placed in pastures near the park and being fed, that they may be in condition for the arduous ordeal that they will be required to go thru for the three days.

The association has gone into the interior of Old Mexico to secure steers for the bulldozing contest. Cattle of this type are practically extinct in the States.

The cattle that create the most excitement in the rodeo are the Brahma riding steers. The association owns its own string of riding steers, large ponderous fellows, from 4 to 5 years old, many of a whit cream color, and with a little hump on the back. Originally these cattle were imported from India and placed in the South Texas coastal country because they are impervious to the tick. Today, these cattle are a common sight in south Texas Brahma cattle are the meanest, wickedest and wildest bovine on four feet.

Marion McLain of Sun City, Kansas has been secured to direct the arena. He has acted in this capacity heretofore at Canadian, and has operated a rodeo at Sun City for a good many years. McLain brings to Canadian a good many rodeo experts.

The program would not be complete without a clown. Jasbo Fulkerson of Ft. Worth and his mule Eko have been contracted, and will give the kiddies as well as the grown-ups some interesting entertainment. Jasbo will play Tag with the Brahma steers during the steer riding event, a very interesting addition to bronk riding, steer riding, steer wrestling and wild cow milking, there will be specialty acts Trick and fancy riding and roping mean as much to a well balanced program as the contest events. The very best of talent has been contracted.

Vivid in their minds were the glorious days of David and Solomon and the dreary days of submission to a foreign yoke through which they were passing. The disciples question reflected their hope. They had seen in Jesus such mighty power. They had had their power and hour of depression when the grave had hidden him from their sight. They had found a new courage with his resurrection. Now the hope revived. The day they had longed for was surely at hand. The question they asked touched the matter closest to their hearts. The Master's answer did not say that they were altogether mistaken in expecting the kingdom, as some have us believe today. But simply that the time of it was not a matter for their concern. It was in the hands of God.

Jesus turns their attention from an impersonal consideration of a vast kingdom to their personal, individual need power. They were thinking of his power over Ben-tile nations; he was concerned for their power over the world, the flesh and the devil, in a personal ministry. When the Holy Spirit is come upon you. For every service to which God calls His people, there is power in the Holy Spirit to meet the particular requirements of that service. O that His word might be burned into our souls until we count all things but loss for the excellency of the knowledge, of its fulfillment. Not by might nor by power but by my spirit saith the Lord.

BARNABAS AND SAUL

Barnabas had been chosen to go to Antioch to see the condition of the work there. He and Saul had been evidently the leaders in the furtherance of the work and now the Holy Spirit, seeking men, whom he could entrust with a wider work, turned not to the Apostles but to these men who here in Antioch were doing a big work. The mission task is the main business of the church, and woe to that church that is so busy with its own affairs that it cannot see or respond to the call of the world vision. Our best is none too good. Our best men, going in the power of the Holy Spirit is what the missionary cause merits.

THE FIRST FOREIGN MISSIO-NARY

This is the story of the call of the first distinctive missionary and the inception of the great missionary task. It will be remembered that the Christian, at Jerusalem had apparently forgotten the Great Commission, and the scene at which we have just been looking, when for the second world task upon them.

They had tarried at Jerusalem, and had carried on the great work there with most encouraging results, but they were not attempting to go to the uttermost part of the earth. It took a bitter persecution to scatter them; a persecution that God overruled for his own glory when he used it to bring Saul of Tarsus into the picture. The emphasis changed from Jerusalem to Antioch in Syria. A revival broke out there and the brethren at Jerusalem sent Barnabas down there to investigate the report. So pleased was he with what he found that he brought Saul from Tarsus to help him. Under their combined care this young missionary church flourished, and in the providence of God it was from this young missionary task was to begin.

BARNABAS AND SAUL IN CYPRUS

Barnabas and Saul were soon on their way. The island of Cyprus was the first place visited and here many were converted, among them the leading man of the island. At Paphos a sorcerer was smitten with blindness and the gospel had established itself in the region beyond. Paul had demonstrated his fitness to deal with difficult situations, his name had been changed to Paul and he had become a leader of the little party in the place of Barnabas. Thus was inaugurated the great missionary enterprise. It was not the first time the gospel had been preached outside of Judea, but it was the first time any church had definitely set aside from its membership those who were to carry the good news to other people. This is the heart of the missionary task and we, too, must see and follow the vision if we are to have the blessing of God upon us.
