ORDINANCE NO. 50

THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF HANSFORD
CITY OF SPEARMAN

Be it resolved, by the City Commission of the City of Spearman, Hansford County, Texas, that on and after the passage of this Ordinance that from every person, firm or corporation engaged in the occupation of selling cannon-crackers, or toy pistols used for shooting or exploding cartridges, within this city, an annual tax of the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars, and such persons, firm or corporation shall be required to pay an additional tax in the above amount and take out an additional license for each establishment or place where such cannon-crackers or said toy pistols are sold. By the term "cannon-cracker" is meant any fire cracker or other combustible package more than two inches in length and more than one inch in circumference commonly sold for purposes of amusement. Notin herein shall be so construed as to prohibit the sale of, or to place a tax on the sale of cartridges, combustible packages commonly used for firearms or artillery, mining, excavating earth or stone, scientific purposes or for public or private works.

WE, the undersigned, composing the City Commission of the City of Spearman, Hansford County, Texas, do hereby certify that the above and foregoing Ordinance was passed at regular meeting of the said City Commission held in the City of Spearman, Hansford County, Texas, on July 2nd, 1935 and ordered published for four consecutive weeks in a newspaper published within the limits of Spearman, Hansford County, Texas.

SIDE LIGHTS



By Congressman Marvin Jones

Just now a tremendous fight is being made by producers and industrial groups against the Agricultural Adjustment Act.

Hundreds of suits are being filed to contest the validity of the act and to prevent the collection of the processing fees from which funds are obtained for carrying on the farm program.

The recent decision of the United States Supreme Court has given encouragement to the hope of these groups that they may be able to stop the collection of the fees and thus destroy the farm program.

We are all hoping that they may not succeed.

It has been my privilege to handle in passage through the House practically all the farm legislation of the Administration.

As a result of this legislation not only have farm prices been materially increased but hundreds of millions of dollars have been paid to farmers in rent and benefit payments as a means of restoring price parity. More than one hundred million dollars have been restored to the farmers of Texas.

In my judgment, this has been of great advantage to the entire country in tending to restore balanced conditions.

Soon after the court decision referred to, we introduced in the House a measure ratifying the entire previous agricultural program and changing the original act in such a way as to remove in so far as possible, any question of the legality of the act in the future. This measure has

ready passed the House and is now undergoing a fight in the Senate. Before this is printed, we hope it may have passed the Senate and will be in conference between the two houses.

I believe it is all-important that the farm program be continued in the interest of the entire country. The united manner in which the farmers have stood by this legislation has been encouraging to all those who have had a part in its enactment.

We have come a long way from the fear, uncertainty and distressed farm conditions that prevailed at the beginning of the program. We cannot afford to surrender what has already been accomplished.

FREE SEED

It has taken nature many centuries to produce a protective covering to prevent blowing soil. When this land was first put into cultivation there was very little evidence of wind erosion. Since the native vegetation has been destroyed much of the farm land in the north and west part of the High Plains area will not have a substitute planted on it, there is nothing to prevent the sand storms from starting again in early winter.

Many farms were damaged by the wind in past seasons for the first time. If something is not done now to insure a cover crop on the land, many new farms will likely blow out this season.

To prevent this occurring again preparation should be made sev-

eral months in advance of the blowing season. In fact, if a drought were expected each year and proper preparations were made in advance much damage could be avoided. If the drought did not come no harm is done, but if it should be a dry season the land is protected from the blowing hazard. It has been demonstrated at the Soil Conservation Wind Erosion Project No. 27 at Dalhart, Texas, that the sorghums, either sweet or grain, will furnish an effective cover crop. This crop should be planted when moisture permits, even up to the middle of August. It is best to leave all of the stalk, the heads may be harvested. Wide rows planted on the wheat fall will prevent the soil from shifting, should a cover of wheat fail. The AAA restrictions have been lifted. We will all have to fold up our tents and move out if we all do not take measures to stop this wind erosion damage. Some farms have lost from 6 to 28 inches of their soil in the last two years. Our land will go likewise if we do not take steps to prevent it. We have now 58,000 pounds of free seed for distribution to be planted for a protective covering. Any farmer may have same by calling at the Co. Agents Office.

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
