## TWENTY PERCENT PENALTY IF CARS ARE OPERATED WITH OLD TAGS AFTER APRIL 1ST.

Owners of automobiles and trucks in Hansford county are slow in obtaining 1935 license plates, so states Sheriff Wilbanks. To date, only 200 passenger car tags have been issued. In 1934, 850 passenger cars were registered.

Sheriff Wilbanks asks that car owners obtain their plates at once in order to avoid the last minute rush. April 1, 1935 is the dead line and the 20 per cent penalty is added on all cars and trucks operated on the highways after the above date.

Many people doubtless are delaying purchase of new tags in the expectation that extension of delinquent date will be made. It is certain that such will not be the case this year. Get your 1935 plates before April 1, 1935, if you expect to operate your car and truck.

All revenue for the registration goes into the county road fund. All car tags receipts up to \$50,000 go to the county in which they are collected. Where receipts run over \$50,000 and not more than \$175,000, all over the minimum amount is divided equally between the county and state highway department. All over \$175,000 goes to the state.

## ATTENTION WHEAT PRODUCERS

Wheat Producers of Hansford County who have signed a contract with the government covering their acreage for 1935, will be allowed to use the allotment acreage for production of other crops than wheat where the thirty five harvest has been abandoned, according to information from the Wheat Allotment Board. This permission is subject to the restriction that the allotment acreage not be planted to any basic commodity such as cotton, corn-hog, peanut, etc., whereby using this land for planting of other crops might involve acreage restrictions of the other commodity contracts.

It is subject to the further restriction that all rules and regulations of the wheat contract in force must be complied with, and therefore any individual producer must first consult the wheat allotment board to gain clearance before any land is seeded to any crop other than wheat. THIS IS IMPERATIVE. If an individual producer plans planting his allotment land to any other crop, THEY MUST first consult the Wheat allotment board, or the County Agent BE SURE to take the matter up with the County Agent's office before making any plan for seeding any crop.

## SPECIAL AAA AGENT TO INSTRUCT LOCAL MEN APRIL THIRD

Sam McMillian, farm record expert, will be in Hansford county April third for a special meeting of the wheat producers of the county. The meeting will be held at the court house at 2 p. m. and every wheat producer is invited to attend.

Mr. McMillian will take up the AAA farm record book and its use. He will explain how the book may be used on the farm and its relation to AAA contracts. You will receive valuable aid in keeping your records in the future.

## Continued Sandstorms Play Upon Spearman

With abundant rainfall received on all sides of Spearman and immediate vicinity over the past week-end, we still suffer from the scourge of nature. There has been but one or two days in the last two weeks that the sand and wind have not blown.

For about the sixth time in the past few weeks, we just had the "worst one ever." Tuesday about midnight a storm hit that was completely blinding, making it impossible to drive or nearly to breathe. That is the worst part about these sandstorms, it is not our dust. The Panhandle folk have become entirely acclimated to any ordinary sandstorm, they can get along just fine with sand and a few rocks flying around, but this stuff is a fine powdery dust that is stifling and stays in the air even when the wind goes down.

## SHERIFF WARNING CAR OWNERS THAT TAX MUST BE PAID

A warning has been extended car owners of Hansford that car license tags must appear on their cars and trucks on or before April 1. Cars operated on the highways after this date will subject their owners to arrest and fines, with additional penalty for payment of car license fees.

Up to noon Thursday only 294 passenger cars had been licensed at the Sheriff's office. Eight hundred and seventy five car licenses were sold last year. In the farm truck division only 58 trucks had been licensed to noon Wednesday as compared with 290 licensed last year. The commercial truck division showed a total of 15 cars licensed against 55 for 1934.

12. March 12. Peter Describes the Christian Life.—1 Peter 3:8-18.
Golden Text:—Sanctify the Lord God in you hearts.—1 Peter 3:15.

13. March 31. Review: Lessons from the Life and Letters of Peter.—1 Peter 5:6-11; 2 Peter 3:14-18.
Golden Text:—Grow in grace and knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.—2 Peter 3:18.

Peter a Missionary and Martyr
We note five things about Peter: 1. Peter was a Christian. A Galilee fisherman, he became the disciple of John the Baptist and was won to Christ by his brother Andrew on the banks of the lower Jordan where John was baptizing and where Jesus had just returned from his Temptation in the Wilderness.

2. Peter was a preacher. By the lakeside in Capernaum he was called to permanent association with Jesus. His name appears first on all four recorded lists of the Twelve. He belonged to that inner trio that accompanied Jesus to the death couch of the ruler's daughter and up the Mount of Transfiguration and into the Garden of Gethsemane. Probably the most fruitful sermon any man ever preached was that which he delivered on the day of Pentecost resulting in the conversion and accession to the church of three thousand souls.

3. Peter was a missionary. He engaged in both home and foreign missions. He was an evangelist in the village of Samaria, shepherd of the saints at Ludda and Joppa, and missionary to Caesarea where the Gentiles had their Pentecost. He was target of the hate of Herod out of whose hands he was miraculously delivered.

4. Peter was an author. He is thought practically to have dictated the Gospel of Mark as well as the two epistles bearing his name.
5. Peter was a martyr. It is not certain that he ever went to Rome as tradition asserts, but undoubtedly he earned the martyr's crown about 68 A. D.

PETERS' VALERICTORIES.
The two letters which Peter left us, close with climaxes of missionary obligation and duty:
1. Benediction of First Peter Duty: Serve
2. Benediction of Second Peter Duty: Grow

3. The benediction of First Peter centers upon the duty of service: Serve the God of grace to whom be the dominion forever. "And the God of all graces, who called you unto his eternal glory in Christ, after that ye have suffered a little while, shall himself perfect, establish, strengthen you To him be the dominion for ever and ever. Amen."—1 Peter, 5:10.

4. The benediction of Second Peter centers upon the duty of service: Serve the God of grace to whom be the dominion forever. "And the God of all graces, who called you unto his eternal glory in Christ, after that ye have suffered a little while, shall himself perfect, establish, strengthen you To him be the dominion for ever and ever. ## SEE INCREASE IN DRUNKEN DRIVING DURING PAST YEAR

After one year of repeal highway safety authorities frankly admit concern over the menace of the drinking driver, whose devastating trail of injury and death has been widening steadily during the past twelve months. The intoxicated driver, of course, was with us prior to repeal, but the easy access to alcoholic beverages following that event has greatly increased the number of accidents in which liquor is a contributing factor. There is no doubt that alcohol is much more of a traffic problem since repeal than it was under prohibition.

This conclusion is based not only on actual statistics, but on special reports from many cities and towns throughout the country.

National Safety Council statistics show from 5 to 10 per cent of the drivers and pedestrians in fatal accidents have been classified as "under the influence of liquor" or "had been drinking" by city and state authorities.

However, the Council says, it is so difficult to get true reports on this item that these percentages understate, by an undetermined amount, the importance of alcohol as a contributing factor in accidents. One thorough study of a few cases, the only one of its kind so far made, showed alcohol the street safety is not detectable accidents studied.

## Money Border-Line Cases

The Council's reports also show that "had been drinking" drivers in fatal accidents have increased 29 per cent and pedestrians 53 per cent. In non-fatal accidents, drivers reported under the influence of liquor have increased 50 per cent while pedestrians increase, under the same circumstances, show 64 per cent.

The statistics are correct as far as they go, says the Council, but they are admittedly incomplete, because of difficulties in collecting such figures. In a great many "border line" cases, where liquor has undoubtedly been a causative factor in the accident, a lesser charge of reckless driving has been filed, due to reasonable doubt in the mind of the arresting officer. It is now known that a quantity of alcohol sufficient to lower appreciably the ability of the driver or pedestrian to use the street safely is no detectable by the simple observations now depended upon by those reporting traffic accidents, but only by careful tests of blood, urine, breath, saliva or spinal fluid.

Dr. H. A. Heise, of Columbia Hospital, Milwaukee, a well-known authority, states that he finds "a measurable loss of efficiency when as little as one ounce of whiskey is consumed." Other authorities agree. Obviously, therefore, it cannot be said whether a particular accident was partially caused by the use of alcohol unless it can be said accurately whether one or more participants had drunk an ounce of whiskey, or its equivalent in some other alcoholic drink. If they have done so, or, more accurately, if they are found to have as much as 0.02 per cent of alcohol in the blood or urine, then they must be placed in the "had been drinking" category.

## STATE RACING PAYS \$721.00

Hansford county will receive \$721.00 from the revenue received from legalized state horse racing in Texas. The first installment of \$200 was received last week by Mrs. S. E. Harbison, Hansford county treasurer.

The money made by the state on horse racing has been divided as follows:

Free school fund, \$132,642.59. State Department of Agriculture, \$111,640. Jack and stallion fund, \$100,000.

After deducting these and deducting for the maintenance of the racing commission, the excess is divided among the 254 counties of the state.

A letter from Charles Lockhart which accompanied the check for \$200 stated:

"In compliance with the provision of House Bill No. 12... creating the horse racing commission for the state of Texas, I am herewith enclosing special Fund Warrant... in the sum of \$200, payable to you as county treasurer and representing the first installment of an amount to be allotted to your county from funds deposited in the state treasury by the Texas Racing Commission.

"Disbursement of this fund has been held up somewhat, waiting for an audit of the racing commission's account, which has not yet been completed and for a legal opinion of the construction to be placed on the various provisions of the act. Which would enable the disbursing official to fully carry out the purpose and intent of the law.

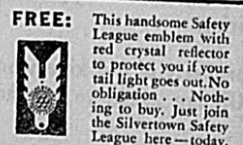
