HOLT MAN CLEARED OF MURDER CHARGE

Farrall Lee of Holt as acquitted of murder in the 84th district court in connection with the death of John Adams on the Lee farm last October.

Judge E. J. Pickens instructed the jury to return a verdict of not guilty because he said, "Evidence is such in this case that there can be no other verdict returned, and in so instructing you I am carrying out one of the prerogatives of my office, where the state has not produced evidence warranting deliberation of facts."

According to witnesses Adams was killed by five shots fired into his chest abdomen and arm while he was assaulting Lee, who a short time previously had undergone an operation.

Mrs. Johnnie Close, a neighbor of the Lees, and who was at the Lee home at the time of the killing, testified that Adams came to the Lee home in an intoxicated condition, that he cursed and threatened the women and children, and that on one occasion he struck Mrs. Lee.

Lee, testifying on his own behalf said that he did not get his pistol, a .22 calibre, until after Adams had struck his wife. Lee said that when Adams struck his wife he went to the bedroom, got the pistol and concealed it under his coat.

He returned to the room where Adams was still swearing and threatening the women and children and induced him to leave the house to go to the field. They approached the well, a short distance from the house, and Adams refused to go farther, saying that he was going back to the house.

Lee said he grabbed Adams by the arm in an effort to restrain him from leaving and Adams began striking him in the abdomen near the operation incision. Lee then pulled the gun and fired five shots into Adams' body, he said.

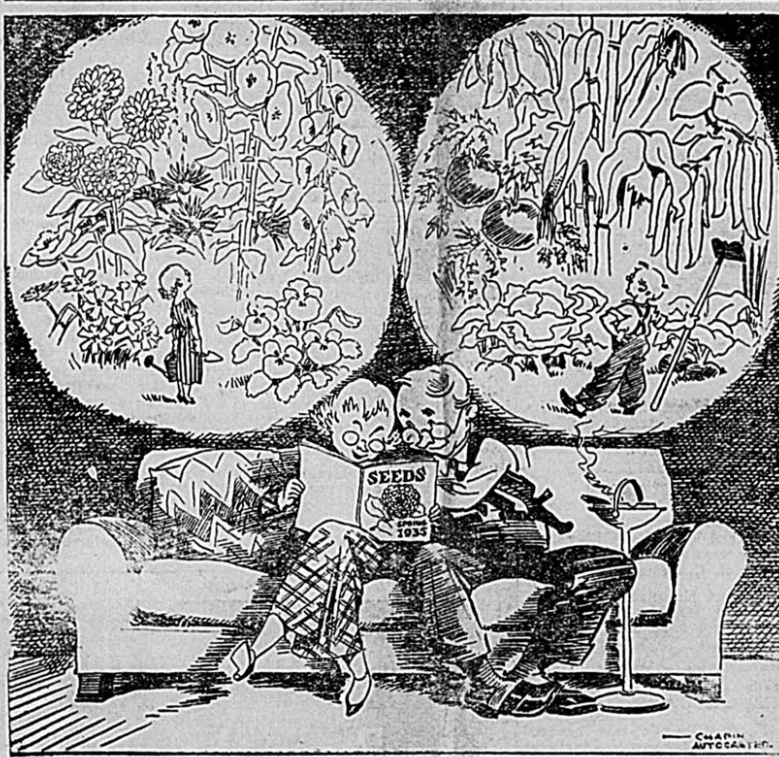
Paul Higgs at Gruver: "What are you going to write up about the dust storm? You had better tell em that it wasn't as bad as it could have been." It wasn't.

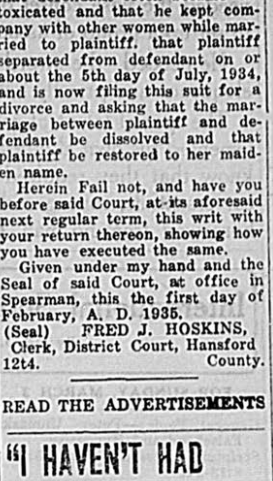

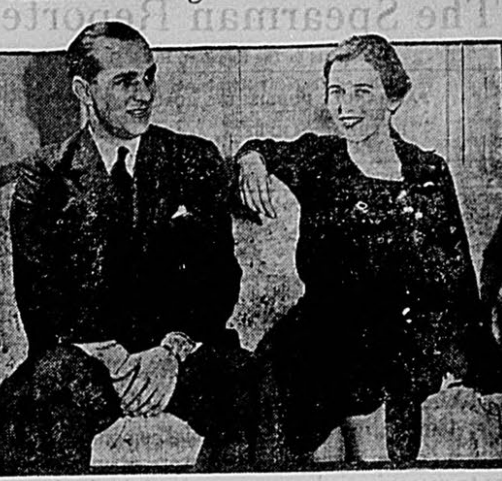

A BRAVE WOMAN REWARDED

We take off our hat to Mrs. Irene Davis of Greenville, Alabama. We pass our especial compliments to the citizens of her community who were so understanding as to recognize in her an example of the fundamental American qualities.

They gave her a silver cup, a couple of weeks ago on which was engraved the sentiment that Irene Davis is one of Alabama's greatest women. She didn't lead any campaign to abolish anything, nor run for Public office, nor win a prize in a beauty contest, nor any of the other things that so many women do to bring themselves notoriety, if not approval.

Nobody ever heard of Irene Davis, outside of her neighbors, a year ago. Only the relief workers knew that she was a widow with three children and a lot of debts. She didn't ask for any relief except a chance to dig her own subsistence and that of her children out of the ground. So she was fixed up with an eight-acre piece of land, with a tumble-down house on it, and went to it. Relief Administration provided seed, feed, fertilizer, groceries and clothing on the chance that she could pay for them out of what she got off the little farm. She borrowed a mule from a neighbor to do her plowing. Rather, she rented the mule by the day for every day the mule worked she or her 14 year old boy worked for the mule's owner.

In the story-books, that sort of determination always wins. There are a lot of folks these days who have the idea that patience, industry, thrift and the old-fashioned virtues don't pay any more. They do pay, and they paid in Mrs. Davis' case. Beside a living for herself and family, she got enough out of the soil the first season to pay off the advances made by the relief administration and leave something over. And when the story of her achievement got around, the citizens of Greenville and other parts of State got together and gave her that silver cup.

To us there is the strongest kind of an inspiration in Mrs. Davis' feat. So long as that spirit of independence of willingness to face hardship and toil rather than to be a burden upon the community continues to exist, even in a small degree, among American women, we have no fear for the nation which their sons and daughters will inherit.

MOSES

Reared as the grandson of an emperor doted on by a royal foster mother, Moses, who might have had every luxury, preferred, like Abraham, like each of the prophets, like John the Baptist and Saint Paul, to be "not disobedient to the Heavenly vision." He was modest as most men of genius are.

And Moses said unto God, Who am I, that I should go unto Pharaoh, and bring forth the Children of Israel out of Egypt? Behold, they will not believe me, nor hearken unto my voice: for they will say, The Lord hath not appeared unto thee.

And the Lord said unto him, What is in thine hand? And he said, A rod.

And He said, Cast it on the ground. And he cast it on the ground and it became a serpent; and Moses fled from before it.

And the Lord said unto Moses Put forth thine hand and take it by the tail. And he put forth his hand, and caught it, and it became a rod in his hand.

That rod was to play a mighty part in the history of the next forty years. By it the plagues were brought upon the Egyptians in tragic succession until even the stubborn will of Pharaoh was broken; the Red Sea divided at the touch to let the children of Israel pass through; and in the wilderness, when water failed, the rock which it smote gave forth a crystal stream. Moses had need of its help and of all the encouragement and support that Aaron, his colleague, and the strong men of the twelve tribes could give. There have been many leaders of powerful personality who failed because they could not associate strong men with them. Moses was not one of these. He

Time and Place:—The events in the fifth chapter of Acts took place in the year 31 A. D. in Jerusalem; those in the eighth chapter of Acts took place a year later in Samaria.

Introduction

In the afterglow of Pentecost the church at Jerusalem "had all things common." As the church sought to attain its ideal in a community of goods, one noble spirit (Barnabas, later Paul's associate) sold a piece of his land and put the money into the Apostles' hands for distribution among the needy. Two other members of the church, husband and wife, coveted the same honor without being willing to make the same sacrifice. Here were two members in good standing in the church. Perhaps no others stood higher in the esteem of their fellow members in the church. They had good property and must have been among the most thrifty residents of the city. They heard the call of need about them. They joined the church in its philanthropy, seeking to relieve the needy. So they sold a piece of property, which was all right. And they kept back a certain part of the price against which nothing could be said provided the fact were known. The falsity lay in the claim that they were giving all the money received from the sale. We can read in this act at least four offences: Vanity, hypocrisy, lying, and deliberate defiance of God.

Death of Ananias and Sapphira Acts 5:1-11

"Ananias and his wife agreed in the claim that they had sold the land for so much and that they were giving the entire amount to philanthropy. Thus the compact hypocrisy was definitely made. Though both had agreed together as to what they should do, the money was brought to the Apostles by Ananias alone. "He only brought part of it to lay before the feet of the apostles. "Ananias," said Peter, "why has Satan filled your heart and made you cheat the Holy Spirit by appropriating some of the money paid for the land? When it remained unsold, did it not remain your own? And even after the sale, was the money not yours to do as you pleased about it? How could you think of doing a thing like this? You have not defrauded men but God."

When the apostle told the hypocrite that he was inspired by Satan to lie not to men but directly to God Ananias "fell down and expired." "The younger men rose, wrapped the body up, and carried it out to bury it." About three

a great person, and all sorts of conditions of people attached themselves to him, declaring he was that Power of God which is known as "The Great Power." They attached themselves to him because he had dazzled them with his skill in magic for a considerable time."

Peter and John in Samaria

Finding himself surpassed by Philip both in ability to work wonders and in hold upon the people, he made a profession of faith and was baptized. That he joined the disciples with sinister motive is clear as we see it. At length Peter and John came down to the city of Samaria and in connection with their ministry laid their hands on believers whereupon they received the Holy Spirit.

The two Simons face each other on this occasion—Simon Peter and Simon Magus. And now the real character of the sorcerer appears. He offered to buy from the Apostles the power to bestow the Holy Spirit. "He brought them money, saying, Let me share this power too, so that any one on whom I lay my hands may receive the Holy Spirit." From this act of Simon comes our word "simony, the crime of buying, selling or bargaining for spiritual functions. Thus the world still needs to learn that spiritual functions are not a "marketable commodity." And it is definitely wrong for anyone to attempt to make religion a means of worldly gain.

Peter Denounces Hypocrisy. vs. 20-24

The anathema upon hypocrisy was pronounced instantly, almost indignantly, by Peter who utterly repelled the idea. Let the sorcerer and his silver perish together! He made the blunder of his life in thinking that he could obtain the free gift of God with money. As a matter of fact, such a man with such a spirit had neither part nor lot in a particle of the Holy Spirit's power. And the reason was at hand. His heart had not been regenerated and so was not right before God. "Your money perish with you, because you have supposed that with money you can obtain God's free gift." Peter called upon the sorcerer to do two

very fundamental and necessary things. v. 22. He must repent and pray the Lord for forgiveness. On these conditions there was still hope for Simon.

Beware of Hypocrisy

What does God think of lying? The wise man answers, "Lying lips are an abomination to Jehovah." Lying is an abomination, a thing detestable in his sight. He hates it. He punishes it. Think of the fate of Ananias and Sapphira. Beware!

As Matthew Henry wrote: "Hypocrites do the devil's drudgery in

Christ's livery." As Colson says: "If Satan ever laughs, it is at hypocrites; they are the best dupes he has." As Shakespeare sang:

The devil can cite Scripture for his purpose,
 An evil soul, producing holy verse,
 Is like a villain with a cheek;
 A goodly apple rotten at the heart.
 O, what a goodly outside hood hath!

U. S. OFFERING SAVINGS BONDS TO THE PUBLIC

The United States Government, through the Post Office Department is now offering to the public its savings bonds. These bonds are sold in denominations of \$25, \$50, \$100, \$500, and \$1,000 which is their maturity values. They are not transferable, but may be redeemed before maturity at any time after 60 days from date of issue. The bonds are exempt from taxation except estate or inheritance tax, and surtaxes and excess-profits and war-profits taxes. These bonds may be obtained at all post offices of the first, second, third and certain designated fourth class offices.
 The issue prices of these bonds are as follows:

\$25 bonds	\$18.75
\$50 bonds	\$37.50
\$100 bonds	\$75.00
\$500 bonds	\$375.00
\$1,000 bonds	\$750.00

It is unlawful for any one person at any one time to hold savings bonds issued in any one calendar year in an aggregate amount of more than \$10,000 maturity value.

Postmasters from whom savings bonds may be purchased are authorized to deliver such bonds duly inscribed and dated upon receipt of the purchase price. These bonds may be held in safekeeping by the Secretary of the Treasury if the purchaser so desires.

Although the immunization now would not give immediate protection against diphtheria, the child would be safe for any future cases. It takes at least six weeks for a child to get an immunity after he has had the toxoid.

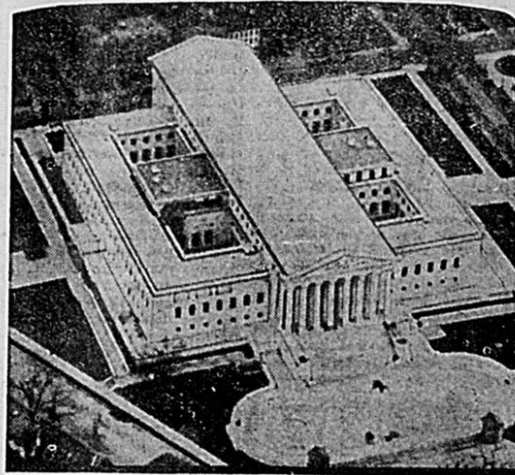
