

These data show that the evaporation of surface water from the small reservoirs made by level terraced will increase the humidity of the air and be more effective than the evaporation from the small farm ponds in increasing moisture context. She atmosphere in the country, since there is no loss from seepage.

The Experiment Station at Spur, Texas, has not only proved the importance of preventing the loss of runoff water out of the field, but has recently demonstrated the fact of utilizing water sheds of pasture land as a source of extra water for irrigation. The soil erosion service is recommending contour furrows in the pastures and thus preventing the loss of much water.

much water Figures indicate that 75 per

cent of the tillable lands of the Panhandle area can be terraced. Daniel believes that through these practices the rain water of the High Plains area can be utilized with very little runoff and consequently increase vegetative development on the pastures as well as crop yields in the field, and by vegetative covering also prevent wind erosion.

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
