## THE NEW DEAL IN HANSFORD COUNTY AND IN THE NATION

With the receipt of 400 wheat allotment checks in Hansford County, the checks representing the final payment of 1933 wheat allotment and the first payment of 1934 government allowance on wheat, citizens may well pause to take invoice on the results of the new deal.

While it is impossible to set up in cold clear type the entire benefit of the new deal in Hansford County, some of the material benefits may readily be seen. For example:

1. Wheat Producers of Hansford county have received approximately \$350,000 in payment of the government's contract for wheat acreage reduction.
2. Hog producers of Hansford county have received approximately \$5,879.40 in payment of the government's contract for reduction of hog production.
3. Federal cattle buying placed approximately \$22,000 in Hansford county.
4. Approximately 95 farm loans have been made in Hansford county by the Intermediate credit banks. This in many instances has saved the farms of land owners of this county. It will save literally thousands of dollars in lowered interest rates, making it possible for farmers to liquidate their indebtedness.
5. Approximately 34 home loans have been completed in Hansford county saving homes that were in such distressed condition that home owners of the county would have lost their equity in their homes, and perhaps in some instances the county would have lost valuable citizens.
6. Approximately eighty per cent of the farmers of Hansford county have been financed by government feed and seed loans during the depression times of the past two years. It is a known fact that conditions were such that agricultural production would have been virtually at a standstill without the aid of government in financing crop production during the trying times of the past two years.
7. From fifty to three hundred heads of families of Hansford county who were without means of lively-hood have received a living wage as workers on Hansford County relief projects?

Briefly the above are emergency projects of the New Deal which have made possible the continuation of existence during the depressing times of the past few years.

## DR. J. E. GOWER IS INJURED IN CAR ACCIDENT

Dr. J. E. Gower sustained painful injuries Saturday morning in a car accident, when his car ran into the side of the bridge over Farwell draw between Spearman and Hitchland.

The accident occurred at about 5 a. m. Saturday morning, and Dr. Gower remained at the scene of the accident until about 3 a. m. when Roamy Tomlinson picked him up and brought him to Spearman.

A deep gash was cut in his forehead above the eyes, his nose broken and minor bruises on his right leg.

Immediately after receiving first aid treatment in Spearman, Dr. Gower was carried to Shattuck Sanitarium, Shattuck, Oklahoma. Fifty two stitches were taken in sewing up the cut places about his face.

Dr. Gower remained at Shattuck this week and is reported as doing fine with prospects of returning home the first part of next week.

## ALL AMENDMENTS DEFEATED IN VOTE REGISTERED NOV. 6.

All amendments carried on the general election ballot were defeated in the vote held Tuesday November 6th.

The vote for Hansford county was as follows:

- Property classification amendment, for 127, against 168.
- County reorganization amendment, for 139, against 135.
- Maximum tax amendment, for 1, against 221.
- Fee abolition amendment, for 2, against 139.
- County consolidation, amendment, for 93, against 175.
- City charter amendment, for 1, against 161.
- City official terms amendment, for 107, against 150.
- University lands amendment, for 172, against 105.

In the election only six ballots were cast that were not in support of the Democratic nominees.

## District Court Adjourns Establishing New Record

Probably making a record of the sort, District court adjourned Tuesday of this week without having held a single jury trial or prosecuted a criminal case.

With a heavy docket of 40 civil cases, only a few were settled. Most cases were continued. The grand jury returned seven misdemeanor indictments, all of which were transferred to the county court for prosecution. Two felon indictments were returned, but arrest was not made in the case, and trial will necessarily be postponed to another term of court.

## Relief Officials Have 149 Goats To Issue Clients

Hansford County relief officials have 149 goats ready to issue relief clients. The officials state the goats are issued as surplus commodities, and are not charged against the clients budget. Only one requirement is made—that the individual bring back the goat hide for stamping after the animal has been butchered. The hide will be returned to the individual.

Latest instructions from relief headquarters relative to issuing clothes to relief clients is to the effect that issue of additional supplies will not be made where clothes on hand can be remodeled or repaired. Clothing is issued as a surplus commodity and is not charged against relief client budgets.

## AUTOMOBILES AND SAFETY

We understand that the makers of 1935 automobiles will put less stress on the speed of which their cars are capable and more on such safety features as unshatterable glass, low center of gravity, reliability of brakes and ease of control, as well as economy in gas and oil consumption. It seems to us that they have gone about as far as necessary in the matter of speed. There are few, if any cars now on the market that cannot be pushed to 60 or more miles an hour. And for most drivers on most roads that is faster than considerations of safety warrant.

There is a steadily growing number of fatal automobile accidents, as the speed of cars increases and the mileage of hard-surfaced roads multiplies. Most of these accidents are unnecessary. Leaving out of consideration the fools who try to drive after they have had a few drinks, there is an irresistible temptation, particularly to the young and reckless, to step on the gas when the road ahead seems clear, regardless of what may be approaching from the cross-roads.

Some bright fellow remarked that the weakest point of every car is "the nut that holds the steering wheel." Even the most careful driver has to reckon with the "nut" who may be driving another car on the same road.

As Winter sets in the risk of driving is increased. Careful analysis of some thousands of motoring accidents shows that more of them occur between daylight and dark, in the twilight hours, than either in broad daylight or after dark. Headlights do little but confuse in the half-light just after the sun has set, and the driver's instinct is not to rely on them.

We think that the greatest room for improvement in automobiles is in this matter of headlights. The genius who will discover a way to light one's own road without blinding approaching drivers has a fortune waiting for him to pick up.





# History of Hitchland, Texas

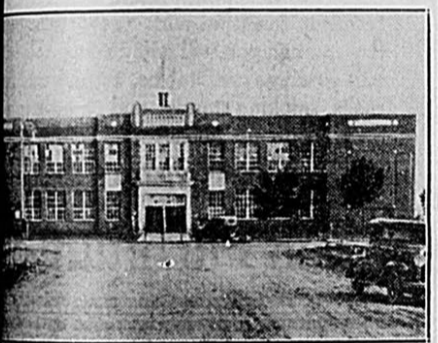
herewith attempts to give a brief history of this country, most of which was supplied by Charley Hitch, who, with his family, came here in 1855. He caught the stage coach to Fargo, Springs, Kansas, a little town which was located some 30 miles north of where Liberal is now located. The Westmorland Hitch & Co. Ranch, was about eight miles west of Fargo Springs, up the Cimarron River. When Mr. Hitch arrived at the ranch his brother, J. K. Hitch, and Doctor Smith, who now lives in Liberal, were here plowing sod and building sod houses southeast of where Henry Hitch now lives. They had built some seven or eight houses. Charley Hitch was then a mere kid, but in those days a fellow didn't have to grow whiskers to hold a claim if he had the nerve, so Mr. Hitch held a claim along with the older boys. Charley Hitch and his brother, James, and Charles Westmoreland left Fargo Springs about March 16, 1886, with wagons loaded with lumber, wire and groceries for this section. No Man's Land, as it was then called. Charley Hitch relates that upon entering this section, when they reached the Coldwater valley just north of Hitchland, it was the prettiest sight he ever saw. It appeared to him that the thousands of cattle were fairly walking on a huge green carpet of spring grass.

After the Hitch brothers operated on the Oklahoma side for some years they prospered and crossed over into Hansford county, where they bought about forty thousand acres of land. Later they sold about thirty sections of this land for one dollar per acre, the town of Hitchland being located on some of it. Later they bought back some of this same land at a much higher price.—Taken from the files of the Hansford County News.

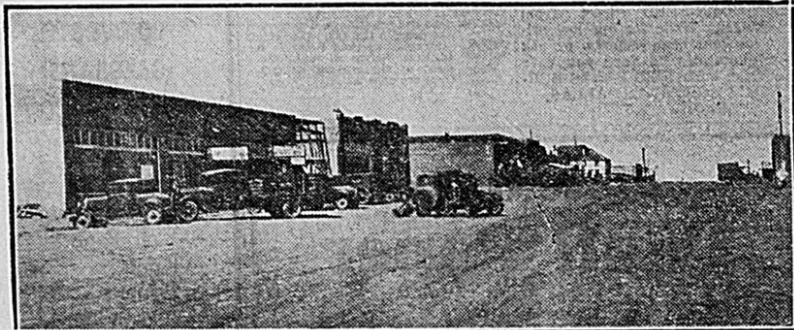
One of the really progressive cities of the North Plains is Gruver, Texas.

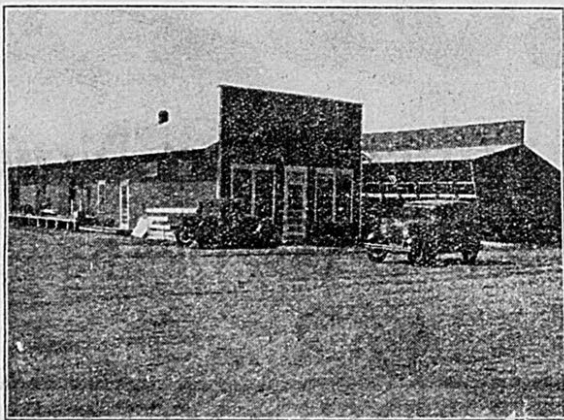

When the city of Gruver started the pioneers of our county laid the foundation for one of

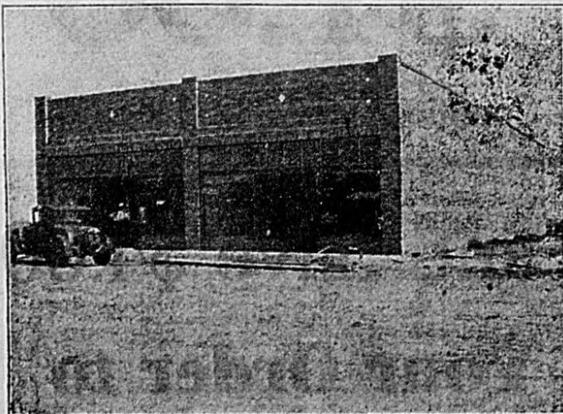


Panhandle Lumber Company—One of the Pioneer Firms of Gruver, Texas.

handle. Four large school busses are required to bring in the rural children. The school has a fine library that is growing each year, with prospects of rapid growth



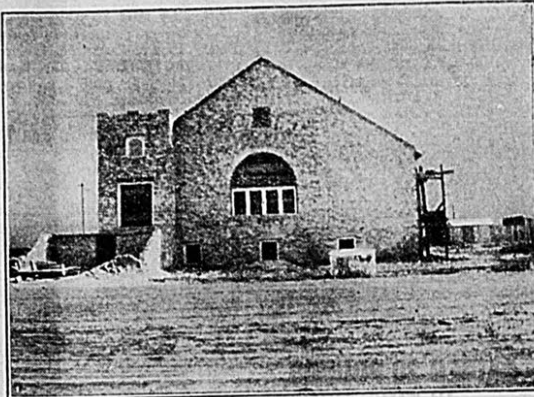
The William F. Etling Building Erected at Gruver About October 4, 1929.

## TOWN OF GRUVER IS NAMED AFTER FINE FAMILY WHO ARE PIONEERS OF COUNTY

While we have many farmers in this immediate community who have made an outstanding success at farming, J. H. Gruver and son, Lawrence H. Gruver, who live nine miles west of our city, have really made a phenomenal success of their farming operations in Hansford county. In the year 1928 they harvested about six thousand acres of wheat, which made more than one hundred thousand bushels of grain. They maintain a battery of nine combines, ten tractors and eleven large trucks, and conduct their own repair shop at the farm. Also, they feed several hundred head of cattle and hogs each year for market. A fine elevator was built by them in Gruver, where they handle their own grain and also buy wheat and all other kinds of grain grown here by their neighbors and friends. In all Mr. Gruver owns about eight thousand acres of land in Texas.

J. H. Gruver was born in Illinois, February 24, 1863, the son of David and Hannah Gruver. His father was an expert stone mason. They moved to Missouri from Illinois, when the young Mr. Gruver was eleven years old, and his mother died there when he was twelve. He was just a poor boy, had all the experiences of the ordinary youth, worked hard and at times failed to be able to make any financial headway from his labors. But like the courageous prize fighter, every time he made a venture and went down in defeat, he came up just a little stronger and more able to cope with a relentless commercial world better from his previous experiences.

He was married to Miss Addie M. Reed, who was born and reared in Missouri in 1885. The son, Lawrence, has been a great help to his parents in all their latter year experiences, taking much of the responsibility of his father's extensive operations the past fifteen years.

When 24 years of age Mr. Gruver moved to Colorado, where luck seemed to be against him, and he lost nearly all his savings. But undaunted by temporary reverses, he came back to Hansford county, where he has made good in a big way. Mr. and Mrs. Gruver and their son, Lawrence, are consistent and active members of the Methodist church, and are always found anxious to contribute their bit to the advancement of the religious life of our community.

The town of Gruver was named for Mr. Gruver, and the railroad was built into our town on his 60th birthday. To say that he loves the town and is doing all in his power to advance its interests, is a very conservative conclusion. He has a modern brick home in Gruver.

It is the earnest hope of the Reporter that Mr. Gruver will be spared by a kind Providence for many years yet to assist in the development of our county and to aid and counsel with his many friends throughout Hansford county as he has always done in the past.

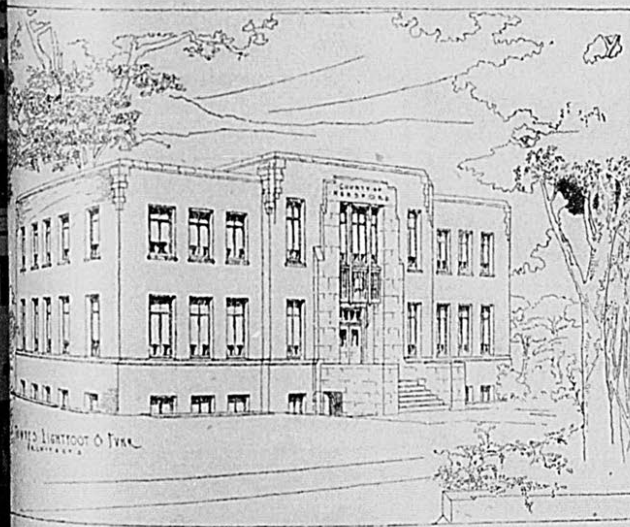

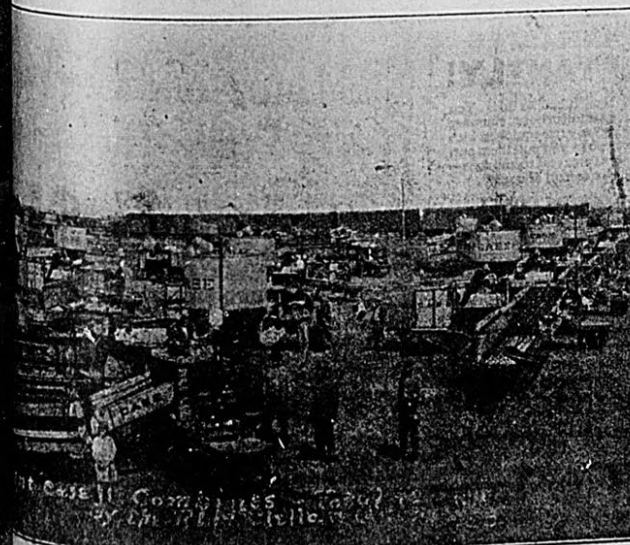

I am writing you again and ask that you publish this letter as a correction of the one I wrote to Rep. B. L. Rogers three weeks ago. In that letter I gave the address of the National New Age Retirement Pension movement as 1016 Wilshire Boulevard, Los Angeles, California. It should be 4016 Wilshire Boulevard, Los Angeles, California. It should be did, all-important feature of the National New Age Retirement Pension Movement is its simplicity and tax free feature. Passage of one law is all that will be required. It will not be necessary to enact complicated tax collection measures. It will not be necessary to enforce a sales tax. It is self liquidating. Bonds will be as good and as safe as a gold dollar. Both men and women are eligible at the age of 55 years (if any woman ever gets that old) to apply for and receive a retirement income from the government of \$100 per month payable in Self-Liquidating Money Certificates that will cost nobody anything except the plus business that will result from the distribution of these bonds and their circulation in consuming the products of industry.

Two immediate results are obvious. People who receive pensions will retire from active income from business and labor, making room from the employment of 11,000,000 or more young persons. The pensioner receiving a just reward for a lifetime of labor and service. It is not a dole nor charity, but payment for service rendered in active years to a prosperous nation.

Write to the address given above and get literature and a petition and sign it up and send it in. Write your senators and representatives at Washington and Austin immediately and let them know that you favor the enactment of a law giving the National New Age Pension Plan conceived by Norman Borroughs, a Los Angeles, California, advertising man. 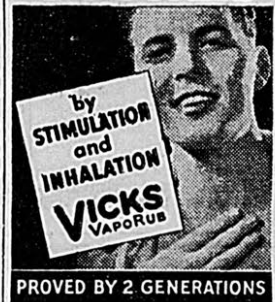

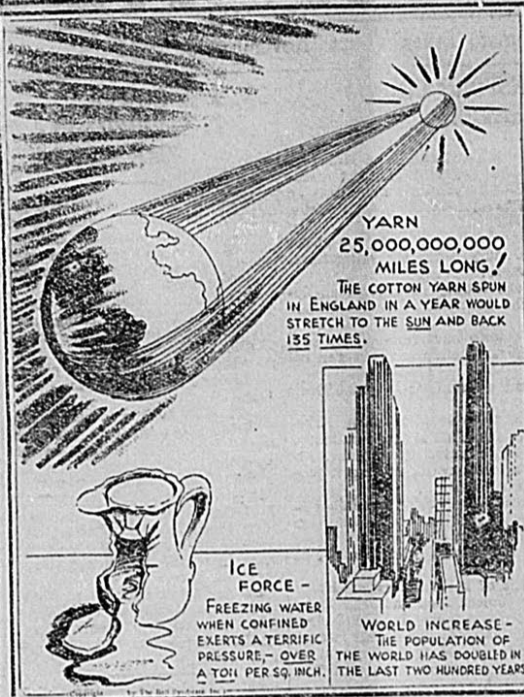

#### INFORMATION ON ESSAY WRITING CONTEST OF CO.

The name of the Essay Writing Contest of the Interscholastic League has been changed to "Ready Writers Contest," according to Miss Lorna Stock, who has been elected Director of the contest for this county.

The old name suggested a more formal composition than the rules of the contest contemplate, and hence it has been deemed wise to change the name to make it conform more closely to the composition that is required.

"The topics that are issued for use are all within the range of the average pupil's study, observation and experience, and hence no preparation of subject-matter is necessary. The preparation required is practice in writing and writing readily, that is, organizing and presenting a subject in the most effective way. Punctuation, spelling, paragraphing, and other items on the formal side are of course, taken into consideration in grading the papers. Some of the topics call for narrative, some for argument, others for exposition, and so on. The pupil is given five topics from which he may choose one as the subject of his composition.

"Winners in the county meet are qualified for participation in the district meet, and winners in the district go to the regional meet for further competition and for qualification to the State Meet.

"It is advisable for all students who are interested in entering

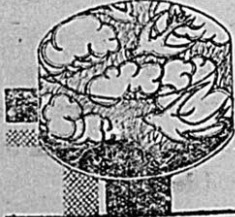

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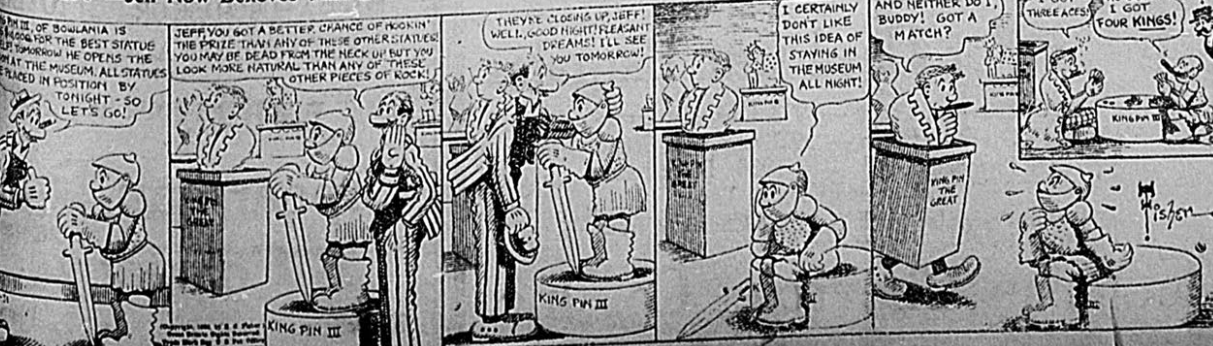
