With the arrival of the 98th Anniversary of Texas Independence

March 2, 1934, the pioneer spirit of Nancy Melissa Mullens, which had contributed so greatly to the Texas civilization, departed this earth to be gathered into the arms of the God above.

were held at the Union Church in order to accommodate the crowd, who mourned the departure of the spirit of Mrs. Archer. Services were conducted by W. V. Murry, Minister of the Church of Christ here. Pallbearers were Floyd Hays, L. G. Andrews, J. R. Douglas, Edgar Womble, Walter Wilmet and Hix Wilbanks.

Nancy Melissa Mullens was born at Shortmountain, Tenn.

September 25, 1855; she grew to young womanhood in Tennessee, coming to Texas with her family in 1879. She was married to John M. Archer May 12, 1880. Ten children blessed this union; Lily Francis Whittenburg, who died November 9, 1930, and Joseph Daniel Archer, Samuel B. Archer, Chas. O. Archer, Robert B. Archer, Roy C. Archer, Benjamin B. Archer, Mrs. Nancy L. Sheets, Mrs. Pearl Karr and Branch T. Archer, all of whom survive the deceased.

WHEAT ALLOTMENT RULES

(continued from page one)
on the farm, a report on his inspection of that farm. This report will be called the "Certificate of Performance." It will be signed by both the contracting producer and the inspector. The Certificate of Performance will be collected by the Secretaries of the Wheat Production Control Association. They will be completed and put on file as early in the year as possible.

These local farmer inspectors will be paid at a rate per farm to be fixed by the association in cooperation with the Wheat Section and their pay and expenses will be charged against the budget of the association.

Second Inspection
After the first inspection has been made there will be a second inspection. The second inspection will be of the nature of a sampling or check-up inspection. It will be made by a special force of inspectors appointed and paid by the Wheat Section.

The purpose of this second inspection will be to check up on the work of the first inspectors, as to accuracy and completeness. It is expected that in the case of most of the counties it will not be necessary to inspect more than 5 per cent of the farms. If the special inspectors should find that the work in the first inspection was carelessly or improperly done, they may reinspect 10 or 15 per cent of the farms, or all of them if that seems necessary to make a satisfactory check-up. If the special inspector considers it necessary, all the work of the first inspector may be set aside and the first inspection done again, either by the inspector who made the first inspection or by another local inspector.

It will be to the interest of the first inspectors to do their work as well and as carefully as possible, because their compensation cannot be approved and paid until the special inspectors have found that the first inspection was satisfactory and have reported to that effect.

The special inspectors will be equipped with measuring devices for measuring the acreages, and this measurement will be part of the checking-up inspection.

If the first inspection checks out with the second, then the Wheat Production Control Association will be authorized by the Wheat Section to pay the first inspectors for their work.

The reports of the second inspectors will be given to the association concerned, and be attached to the Certificates of Performance for the farms to which they apply. The check-up inspector will report to the Secretary of the association as he works, so the association will know what he is doing.

it in every step of progress made by the early pioneers. When the family first moved to their homestead less than a dozen families were scattered out over the North Plains country. Mrs. Archer was the only doctor within 75 miles, and served in most confinement cases within the boundary of two counties during the early days of the settlement of the North Plains. She was very successful in the treatment of typhoid fever and early in young married life she trained her family to take care of themselves, since she never knew when some of the settlers would drive over to the Archer home and she would leave to be gone for two weeks, ministering to the sick and afflicted. Mrs. Archer never made any charges for her services, contributing her knowledge and service to humanity.

Mr. Archer presented the first petition to organize Hutchinson county, which was successful, and the county was organized in April 1901. The Archer family established the first post office in this North Plains country, riding horseback 20 miles from their home to Adobe Walls, where the post office was under the supervision of Mrs. Billie Dixon. The post office at the Archer home was known as the old Jeffrey post office, and served the early settlers in this section, among whom were listed as the Kirks, Douglases, Holts, Lackey and others.

A daughter of Mrs. Archer, Mrs. G. A. Whittenburg, deceased, formerly of Hutchinson county, taught the first public free school in this section of the state. The school was taught in dug-outs near old Ft. Bugbee. Two school rooms were built about three miles apart and Mrs. Whittenburg taught a month or so at each school so as to favor the settlers. This was the first public school on the North Plains.

The Certificates of Performance will be classified into these three groups, by the Secretaries of associations:

1. Where there has been complete compliance with the contract.
2. Where the performance has been joint.
3. Where there has been failure to perform, either in not growing up to the domestic allotment 54 percent of the base acreage or in growing too much wheat or where the contract acreage contrary to the terms of the contract.

FOR MARCH 11

TOPIC: PARABLES OF A KINGDOM. Lesson: Matt. 13:31-33, 44-52.

Another parable set he before them, saying, The kingdom of heaven is like unto a grain of mustard seed, which a man took, sowed in his field:

Which indeed is less than seeds; but when it is grown it eater than the herbs, and becometh a tree, so that the birds of heaven come and lodge in the boughs thereof.

Another parable spake he unto them; The kingdom of heaven is like unto leaven which a woman took, and hid in three measures of meal, till it was all leavened.

The kingdom of heaven is like unto a treasure hidden in the field, which a man found, and hid; and in his joy he goeth and selleth all that he hath, and buyeth that field.

Again, the kingdom of heaven is like unto a man that is rich, seeking goodly pearls: And having found one of great price, he went and sold all that he had, and bought that pearl.

Again, the kingdom of heaven is like unto a net, that was cast into the sea, and gathered of every kind.

Which when it was filled, drew up on the beach, and sat down, and gathered thereinto the vessels, but the bad drew away.

So shall it be in the end of the world: the angels shall come and sever the wicked from the righteous.

And shall cast them into a furnace of fire, there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth.

Have ye understood all things? They say unto him, Yea.

And he said unto them, Therefore scribe who hath made a disciple to the kingdom of heaven is like unto a man that is a householder, who bringeth out of his treasure that which is new and old.

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Isrealites, which comforts them." Notice that Jesus' parables never fail to adorn the lessons they convey; even when they carry hard truth they still are beautiful from a literary point of view.

One may say that the parables of Jesus are poems of this divine Master poet.

The parable of the Mustard Seed is found also in Mark 4:30-32 and Luke 13:18, 19; the parable of the Leaven in Luke 13:20, 21. Matthew 13:36-52 has no parallels.

A Chapter of Parables. This glorious thirteenth chapter of Matthew is chiefly occupied with eight parables, of which we are to study especially the last six, because these for the most part are found only in Matthew.

The first, the parable of the sower, is found also in Mark and Luke, and is usually studied in our course with one of these Gospels. It is essentially a parable of four different kinds of soil, representing four different ways of receiving divine truth—in a heart trodden hard by worldliness, in a heart too shallow for the truth to find a lasting footing, in a heart pre-occupied by evil, or in a heart ready and eager to take it in and cheerish it, causing it to grow and increase.

The Parable of the Tares. vs. 24-30, 34-43. Tares are darnel, a kind of weed which grows among the wheat, which in its earlier stages of growth cannot be distinguished from it, but is easily distinguished later, and must be toilsomely pulled out by hand and burned in the oven, as its seeds are poisonous. Christ pictures an enemy of a farmer sowing darnel seed over his field by night, and the disastrous consequences, representing the evil work of the devil, who sows the seed of base thoughts and actions in the hearts of men, seed which later grows up, so that the plants must be painfully eradicated.

The Growth of the Kingdom vs. 31-33. The first of these two little parables has to do with the growth in its external aspect; the second in its inner working. Mustard seed is commonly used in the East as a symbol of minuteness. The plant sometimes grows to the height of ten feet, becoming, of not an actual tree, treelike. Linets and other small birds are very fond of its seed. They lodge in it for the purpose of eating the seed, not to build their nests.

"Three measures of meal" would be fully a bushel; a large amount, therefore, contrasted with the tiny bit of yeast employed. "It has been said that this parable should gain for our Lord the title 'The Divine Optimist.' The Gospel was hid at first in the mighty Roman empire; after a time the world awoke to the fact that that empire had silently become Christianized."

The Preciousness of the Kingdom. vs. 44-45. Here again we have two parables to illustrate the same truth. In the parable of the Pearl Merchant we are taken back into an age when wealth was largely in the form of jewels and such precious objects. Cleopatra had two pearls valued each at \$400,000. In both parables there is a reflection of the glad surprise that breaks upon many a man when he first gets a revelation of the redeeming mercy of God in our Saviour Jesus Christ.

Bunyan says that the Valley of Humiliation is a place where pearls are found. "The Christian pays a price for what he receives, but like the man in the parable he rejoices in the exchange."

Notice that in the first of these parables a man stumbled upon his joy; the man of the second discovered his by unremitting quest. We do not all find Christ in the same way. But the Kingdom of God is the ultimate blessing whose glory makes all other riches "of nothing worth."—G. A. Butterick.

The Parable of the Net, vs. 47-50. "Again the kingdom of heaven is like unto a net." Christ used the word meaning not a casting net, thrown by the hand, but a drag-net or seine, a long net with floats on the upper edge and sinkers on the lower edge, which was swept through the water by a boat and the two ends brought together, enclosing a multitude of fishes. The large operations of the kingdom of heaven are here pictured. "That was cast into the sea, and gathered of every kind." "The church is a mixed company; therefore the world thrust out its lip and points a derisive finger. Yet what else could be looked for, since the net 'gathers of every kind?' The word of invitation is addressed to all sorts of conditions of men. 'Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden.' God is no respecter of persons. Christ came not to call the righteous but sinners to repentance. It is not without significance that there was a traitor in the apostolic circle."—Rev. David James Burrell, D. D.

THE FINAL JUDGMENT "So shall it be in the end of the world." v. 49. Men are accountable to God. Their accountability may not be apparent while the good and bad are intermingled in this life, but the day of final account is bound to come. See the picture of the dragnet: "When it was filled, they drew up on the beach, and they sat down." And

from the tiny Galilean Lake our eyes are lifted to the consummation of the age: "In the end of the world angels shall come forth." We do not know when it will be to come. And when it comes it will be the day which will end the intermingling of the saved and the unsaved.

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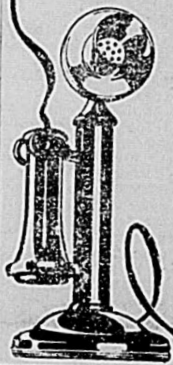
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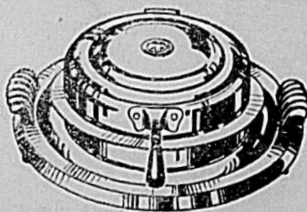
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
