Corn - Hog Raisers Will Reap Great Benefit For Signing

Every Texas corn and hog raiser would sign corn-hog contracts in the sign-up campaign now beginning throughout the state, total 1934 cash benefits would amount to about 8 million dollars, according to figures received by the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service from Washington.

For reducing corn acreage at least 20 per cent below the average of 1932 and 1933, farmers would be paid 30 cents per bushel for the corn not raised in 1934. If every farmer who raised corn in Texas should sign such a contract the total benefits that would be received would come to about \$5,948,000. For cutting hog production 25 per cent below the number of hogs raised in 1932 and 1933 and below the average number of hogs marketed from these litters in those years, farmers are to be paid \$5 for every hog not raised in 1934. If every Texas farmer would sign this contract a total of about \$2,013,750 would come to Texas in 1934 in the form of benefit payments.

Farmers who raise hogs and not corn may sign contracts, and those who raise corn and not hogs may sign, but the corn acreage on the one farm or the hog production on the other may not be increased above that of the last two years in such cases. Grain hogs do not class as corn but the contract provides that the total acres of crops at any kind on a farm may not be increased in 1934 over the total of 1933 or of 1932, whichever is the larger.

Miss Orene McClellan Given Federal Position

Miss Orene McClellan has been awarded quite an honor by being selected to a high Federal position with 13 workers under her supervision.

Miss McClellan is one of 300 in the United States, and one of 25 in the state of Texas selected by the Federal government to supervise a comprehensive home survey of farm homes in counties picked at random thru-out the nation.

Miss McClellan was assigned to Randall county where she will start the work immediately. The work is not an ordinary survey, it requires detailed information, and technical interpretation of the life in the various counties selected for the survey. One of the requirements of the survey calls for architectural drawings of the farm homes included in the survey.

DEPOSITS OF LOCAL BANKS ARE INSURED

The First National and the First State banks have received official information from Washington that they have complied with requirements of the Federal government and have been accorded membership in the temporary federal deposit insurance fund, through which deposits up to \$2,500 are insured by the government.

Both banks in swinging over to the new system expressed complete accord with the insurance system and described it as the biggest step yet toward stabilization of confidence of the country.

The insurance of deposits is expected to bring millions of dollars out of postal savings funds, which have been a big factor in the decline of bank deposits in recent years.

Regular Meeting of Oil Code Committee Held In Spearman

The regular meetings of the Oil Marketing Code Committee are held in Spearman on each first, third and fifth Wednesdays in Spearman at the Consumers Sales Company and at Perryton on the other Wednesdays of each month. Hansford and Ochiltree Counties composing Sub-Zone No. 1, of Zone No. 2, in District No. 12. The committee is composed of the following members: Wm. Deck of Spearman, Chairman, Frank Dodson, Glen McGibben and Carol Dodd all of Perryton. The meetings are held for the purpose of studying the marketing conditions and to receive complaints of its members, who know of any violation of the code by other dealers.

The committee attended a meeting held at the Herring Hotel in Amarillo Wednesday of this week, which was called by a Federal representative. At the meeting the committee was assured that the Federal government was behind the movement and would lend its assistance in prosecuting violators.

Due to conditions at this time, the school officials decided not to award any sectional championships in either boys or girls basketball.

The present sectional schedule of games must be played so that the champion teams of the section can play the champion teams of Section Two, which comprises Gray, Donley and Carson counties. This championship contest is scheduled to be played February 17, the place to be determined according to winners of the sectional honors.

HOG ALLOTMENT ORGANIZATION IS PERFECTED

At a meeting of the hog producers of Hansford county held at the Hansford County Court House Saturday afternoon, a temporary organization was formed with one committeeman from each section of the county, who will be responsible for starting an educational campaign on the hog allotment in his respective section.

In the matter of hog allotment the base period is for two years, 1932-1933, beginning on December 1, 1932 and ending December 1, 1933. Sufficient evidence is required to show that the individual farmer or hog producer produced not less than three litters for each of the base years. It is also required that the signers of the contract for Hog allotment will produce some hogs during 1934.

The hog producer will be paid on the basis of 75 per cent of the hogs farrowed for market during the base years at the rate of \$5.00 per head. The payments will be in three payments, first payment of \$2.00 per head soon after the government contract has been accepted by the department of agriculture, \$1.00 per head about September 1, 1934 and \$2.00 per head about February 1, 1935. All individuals signing the contract must agree to reduce pig production 25 per cent.

County Agent Frank Wendt is working out plans for organizations of all sections of the county, similar to those of the wheat allotment. A series of meetings have been scheduled as follows:

Morse, Thursday morning, January 11, 10:00 a. m.

Gruver, Friday morning, January 12, 10:00 a. m.
Spearman, Friday afternoon, January 12, 3:00 p. m.

A government bulletin explaining the purpose and work of the hog allotment has been mailed the recorded hog producers of the county by County Agent Frank Wendt, and he asks that each individual study the pamphlet carefully, and fill out the card accompanying the letter, so that general information can be gained on the hog production of the county.

Mr. Wendt stated that he was expecting supplies at any time for the allotment and hoped to be ready to start a sign-up campaign in the immediate future.

Meeting of Executive Committee Of Interscholastic League Held At Morse

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Interscholastic League of Hansford County was held at Morse, January 3, 1934, with the following members present: Voting members; J. B. Speer of Morse, Director General; W. R. Finley, Spearman, Declaration; F. P. Wilson, Gruver, Debate; Bowen Cox, Gruver, Extemporaneous Speech; J. E. Gunn, Spearman, Spelling; Lorna Stock, of Morse, Essay.

Non-Voting members: A. H. Word of Spearman, Wildflower; Mrs. A. H. Word, Spearman, Choral Singing; M. C. Riemschneider, Morse, Music Memory; J. T. Morris, Spearman, Arithmetic.

The following resolutions were passed:

1. That the county meet be held on the Thursday night and Friday two weeks before the district meet at Pampa, and that the schools of the county be notified of the set date by Mr. J. B. Speer.
2. That three judges, one of whom should be a critic judge, be secured from Amarillo Junior College by the Director General, with the final approval of the school superintendents.
3. That the heads of the three schools be a committee to estimate expense for judges and awards, and that they choose said awards.
4. That the following be appointed pronouncers in the spelling contest: Grades 4 and 5—Mrs. J. B. Speer, Morse; Grades 6 and 7, Miss Wilma Pearson, Spearman; Senior, Miss Pauline Roach, Gruver.
5. That sub-juniors may compete in declamation at the county meet and receive medals, but no points shall be gained.
6. That the following be appointed to hold conduct the essay contest: Miss Verna Lawrence, Spearman; Miss Josephine Cowsett, Gruver; Mrs. D. H. Boyles Morse.
7. That playground ball be played strictly according to the rules of the League, and that the athletic director be authorized to inform referee that the teams may "bunt" and may run on third strike.
8. Only grade school juniors are eligible to participate in playground baseball. No high school baseball teams, girls or boys.
9. That tennis teams compete on Spearman courts at a time set by the athletic director.
10. That a championship grade school and high school be declared with an official recognition of each by certificate of award.

most homes and that the people renew in two or three weeks after the paper is stopped.



D. 1933, in a suit numbered on the docket of said Court as No. 196, wherein Panhandle Construction Company, a Corporation is Plaintiff, and Nelson W. Willard and John L. Taylor and heirs and legal representatives of the said Nelson W. Willard and John L. Taylor whose names and addresses are unknown, are Defendants, and said petition alleging:

That the City of Spearman, Hansford County, Texas, is duly incorporated under the Commission form of government pertaining to cities of less than 5,000 population and more than 1,000, and was so at all times hereafter mentioned, with all powers incident thereto, and March 10, 1931, said City determined to pave, grade, and improve certain streets within its corporate limits including Davis Street, especially that portion abutting Lot One, Block Eighteen, in said City, according to plans and specifications therefore filed and adopted, and on April 7, 1931, entered into a contract with Plaintiff to make said improvement according to same at unit prices. In said contract it was agreed that City would set a date for hearing and give proper notice thereof to all parties of interest, owners or interested in the property, especially such lot, and that at said hearing it would be determined whether or not the proposed assessable costs would be not greater than the enhanced value, and if not greater, to assess the owner and persons interested therein personally for the same and place said costs as first lien upon the property; that the said costs would be payable in five equal annual payments providing for eight per cent annual interest, for accelerated maturity, and reasonable attorney's fees if incurred, all of which should be a lien and debt; the first installment due one year from acceptance, and the whole evidence by a certificate as provided by statute and that the certificate should be prima facie evidence of the legality of all proceedings.
