

Taylor from 4 to 7 p.m. The center is located in the basement of the building on the south side.

A vital link in the establishment of a region-wide emergency medical services system is voice communication linking all ambulances and hospitals. Additionally, a single access telephone number throughout the region affording local service complements the system.

The Panhandle Emergency Medical Services System has been in the process of implements the system. The Panhandle Emergency Medical Services System has been in the process of implementing a regional basic life support EMS system in our twenty-five countles over the past eight months.

Ambulances fully equipped have been placed in ten Panhandle communities. Additionally, all ambulances and hospitals in the Panhandle are now equipped with UHF medical voice communication.

The Panhandle Regional Communication for the single medical access number 1-800-692-1331. Upon receipt of a call, the dispatchers (on duty twenty-four hours a day) notify the appropriate local ambulance service of the emergency. Additionally, the Comm-Center affords the capability of patching an ambulance through to the local hospital to advise of an incoming emergency and/or the Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center to provide medical control as needed.

medical control as needed.
A caller may also be directly connected to the Poison Control Center, the AERC, or Suicide Prevention for immediate assistance in an emergency.
Future plans include a teletypewriter in the Comm-Center to allow two-way contact with the five hundred deaf mutes in the Pahhandle. Also, a CB receiver will be located in the Comm-Center to assist in coordinating emergency reports.



The city has called a bond election for june 15, 1976 in the high school auditorium.

If the proposed water and gas revenue bond issue passes it will provide the City of Spearman with the required amount of monies to meet the 40% matching funds required for our E.D.A. grant in the amount of \$214,600, along with \$322,000 provided by E.D.A. It will also provide the \$50,000 that will go to cathodic protection and painting of existing water storage units, along with \$10,400 to pay for the fiscal agents

fees.
This makes the total \$597,000 for both water and gas system reconditioning and upgrading. Breakdown of the proposals are divided, the water proposal calls for \$81,000 to march E.D.A. Funds, \$50,000 cathodic protection and painting. Funds, \$50,000 cathodic protection and painting, and \$4,400 for fiscal agents's fees for a total of \$136,000. The gas proposal calls for \$133,000 for required E.D.A. matching, funds and \$6,000 for the Fiscal Agent's Fees for a total of \$139,000. Combined total for the two issues is \$275,000.

If the issue passes, the citizens of Spearman would be paying for 46% of the project that would put our gas system in shape to meet the D.O.T. requirements and cut unaccountable gas losses to a minimum, and also provide for either an additional well and storage or an additional two water wells for the city.

The proposals in the bond issue call for bonds to be secuted by and payable from a lien on and pledge of the Net Revenues of the City's Water, Gas and Sewer systems.

The upgrading of our gas and water system is of utmost importance to the City and these repair are going to have to be made, in fact are long overdue, and if the voters approve these proposals in the election they will actually only be paying 46% of the cost with the E.D. Apicking up the tab for the rest of the expenditure. Absentee voting in the bond election begins Tuesday, June 1 and runs through June 11. Absentee ballots may be cast at city hall during office hours.





Vigil Continues For Hog Cholera

since hog cholera made its last appearance in Texas, but hog producers should keep up their vigil against the dreaded disease, urges Jim Kuykendall, County Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The fact that hog cholera

is still alive and well in the United States is evidenced by the recent cases in New Jersey, Massachusetts, and Rhode Island. Since infected herds must be destroyed to prevent the spread of this highly infectious swine disease, the disease is costly to producers as well as to the government which the basis of an appraisal.

ioned above. Hog cholera can remain undetected in a herd for a number of months so all producers should keep a close check on their stock and should report any suslocal veterinarian or animal health official, cautions Kuykendall.

Signs of hog cholera include high fever and loss of appetite. Other signs may include abnormal death losses among young pigs or possible abortions.
The disease can spread

rapidly and deal a severe blow to the swine industry close che to on their herds and report any sick animals, points out Kuykendall.



IRS News

Dallas, Texas--Thousands of low-income North Texar may be eligible for checks of up to \$400 each from the Internal Revenue Service. All they need to do is file a tax retum and ask. The Dallas office of the IRS said today that the extra cash, called Earmed Income Credit, has been applied for by only 125, 000 individuals in North Texas so far this year. Earned Income Credit, a tax break for parents who supported at least one child during 1975 and eam ed less than \$8000, was available for the first time on 1975 tax erstums. Many people who are eligible for Earned Income Credit have such low incomes that they are not legally required to file tax returns. IRS officials

Registration For Welding at FPC In Progress

Registration for welding technology will be in progress all day, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., at the Registrar's Office at Frank Phillis College in Borger and at the Welding Center, 618 N. Florida, Monday June 7, and between 6 and 7 p.m. at the Welding Center. Both full-time and part-time classes are also set to begin the same day.

The program in welding technology is organized into four 12-week quarters a year with students being allowed to complete all or part of the prescribed curriculum which can lead to an associate of Applied Science Degree. All courses are designed to lead to a student beomänga proficient and experienced welder. Cost for the course is nominal due to the demand for certified welders in the Borger area.

The first twelve week or quarter of study includes w 101, Basic Acetylene wel-firs; GR 101, Shop Math; and WR 101. Welding
