**THE BOOK OF RUTH**  
This little book follows Judges  
because it describes an event  
which took place in the days when  
the judges judged; but the peace-  
ful atmosphere of the narrative  
is quite the opposite of the stormy  
scene of Judges. We see that the  
history of the times was not all

of Ruth is an idyl, sweet and  
inspiring. It pictures  
manhood and honorable

purity. It is for good reasons one

was written, from early in the bi-  
ble century to very late. The writ-

An early rush for tickets to the big wrestling match here on August 7 has caused promoters to predict one of the largest crowds ever to attend a sports event in Amarillo. It will be on hand when Jack Dempsey, former fistie idol of millions steps into the ring at the City Auditorium to referee the match. Dempsey's appearance in Amarillo will be the first time he has shown here in a personal performance, and the flood of requests for tickets indicate he is as popular in the Panhandle as he is elsewhere.

Dutch Mantell, grizzled veteran of the wrestling game, and Sailor Moran, free swinging youngster of Arkansas, will vie for gladiatorial honors with Dempsey the third man.

Wilbur C. Hawk booked the performance and Cal Farley made the arrangements.

Out-of-town reservations may be phoned or mailed to Miss Lois Black at the Globe-News. Prices for the big exhibition are \$2.25 for ringside, \$1.10 and \$1.65 for downstairs and 85c and 55c for balcony seats. All prices include Federal tax.

PROHIBITION TRAIN VISITS SPEARMAN

The "Prohibition train" passed thru Spearman Saturday of last week making an hour stop. The train is composed of an automobile rigged with smoke stack, bell, whistle, tender, etc., and pulls a duplicate of a railroad pullman car equipped with berth, running water, lighting system, kitchen, equipment, observation car and all. The crew is made up of Judge B. D. Sartin, director of United forces for prohibition activities in West Texas; Dr. Bruce B. Corbin; Dr. H. P. Dunlop; J. H. Crouch and Wilson Dees. The main duties of the crew is speaking for the cause of prohibition from the observation platform during the travel with an arranged schedule for larger rallies at the night stops. The train arrived in Amarillo Saturday night where it stayed for the week end with the speakers in the large Amarillo church and the Sunday program in a city meeting in the afternoon at the city auditorium. One of the crew made a thirty-minute address to Spearman Citizens calling attention to the dangers to the county of repeal of Prohibition which he said furnished the only law to prevent the return of the Saloon as it used to be. He referred to the Democratic platform which promised that the saloon should not return and stated that the wet program provided for no substitute for the 18th Amendment and no provision to keep the entire liquor traffic from opening up wide across America. The speakers said senators Shepherd and Conally together with three fourths of the Texas congress were voting dry and did not interpret the Democratic platform like Jim Farley, the wet Postmaster General.

He stated that if the revenue that was proposed to be raised was gotten by the government, that the American public would have to drink five billions of intoxicants and that this money would have to come out of legitimate business channels. Taylor, and the heirs and legal representatives of the said John L. Taylor, whose names are unknown Defendants, said petition alleging:

1. That the City of Spearman in Hansford County, Texas, is a municipal corporation, duly incorporated under the commission form of government applicable to cities of less than five thousand population, and more than one thousand population and has been at all times mentioned hereafter, and its actual population has been more than one thousand population, having power to grade, drain and improve its streets and to assess a part of the cost of construction thereof against abutting property owners, under Article 1105-B, Acts of 1927 Revised Civil Statutes.

2. That on or about the 10th day of March, 1931, said City of Spearman, determined to pave, grade and drain certain of its streets within the corporate limits thereof, including Davis Street, and especially that portion thereof which abuts Lot One (1) in Block Eighteen (18) of the original plat of said City of Spearman, according to the plans and specifications theretofore on file and adopted, and on the 7th day of the crisis can never pass over any one without agonies and energies without earthquake and eclipse. 


