 wets, we must teach the youth of
 today the disastrous effects of
 alcoholic liquors as a beverage.
 Those who lived in the days of
 the open saloon have a story to
 tell of the physical and
 mental wrecks caused by John
 Barley Corn. And some of his
 victims of the old days are with us
 yet. Many of the alcoholic ad-
 dicted of today were patrons of the
 saloon and acquired the habit un-
 der the license system. That is
 one of the great evils of the
 liquor habit—its far reaching ef-
 fects. A story is told of a slave
 to alcohol drink. He made the
 following confession: "During 30
 years as a hard drinker he spent
 \$17,000 for liquor; influenced 20
 of his friends to drink—five of
 whom became slaves like himself;
 was discharged from 24 jobs in
 19 years; was once imprisoned for
 drunkenness, and estimated the total
 cost of his slavery to alcohol at
 \$60,000. And this is the traf-
 fic some would promise under the
 plea of personal liberty.

Alcohol does not promote phys-
 ical efficiency. Military leaders
 do not call for alcoholic stimulants
 for their soldiers, and athletes put
 themselves on a total abstinence
 pledge when they enlist for the
 games. Army officers know the
 results it has on the marching sol-
 dier. The drinkers always fall
 out first on the long hard march.
 Get liquor and beer back will
 help a great number of people.

 dens, employers and directors of
 sour kitchens, additional police-
 men, traffic directors, judges and

SUNDAY SCHOOL
 would make many demands in his
 servants; this is particularly true
 of an old person. No doubt, Sam-
 uel's sleep was interrupted fre-
 quently by calls from the adjoin-
 ing room. One morning shortly
 before dawn while the sacred lamp
 still burned, the Lord called Sam-
 uel. The lad answered promptly
 and thinking his companion had
 called ran to Eli at once. The aged
 priest told him that he had not
 called and bade him go back to
 bed. This experience was repeated
 with the same results. But when
 Samuel appeared the third time at
 Eli's bed, the latter knew that the
 Lord had called the boy. Accord-
 ingly he told Samuel to lie down
 and if the call came again to an-
 swer, "Speak, Lord; for thy ser-
 vant heareth."

The message which God gave
 to Samuel was a terrible one. In
 effect, it was that because of the
 villainess of Eli's sons, which Eli
 knew and from which he did not
 restrain them, the time had pass-
 ed when either sacrifice or offer-
 ing would avail; Eli's house must
 be destroyed. Only upon Eli's in-
 sistence did Samuel reveal the
 message of Jehovah, and the old
 man's heroic resignation stand
 out among his most commendable
 traits. Samuel grew in the power
 of the Lord and all Israel knew
 that the prophetic order had been
 restored in him.

A PHILISTINE VICTORY
 For some years the Philistine
 pleased with the Israelites. Shock-
 had done pretty much as they
 ed by one engagement in which
 Israel lost four thousand men,
 leaders decided to bring the ark
 of the covenant from Shloh where
 the sons of Eli guarded it and to
 use it in what they hoped would
 be a decisive victory against their
 enemies. The presence of the ark
 in camp inspired the Israelites but
 it also challenged the Philistines,
 and in the battle that followed
 thirty thousand Israelites were
 killed including Eli's sons, and the
 ark was captured. Eli, ninety-eight
 years old sat by the wayside await-

THE ARK
 The ark was brought by the
 Philistines to Ashdod, one of the
 five capitals, and placed before
 the image of their fish-god, Dagon,
 to signify that he had won
 the great victory over Jehovah.
 But the Lord proved the contrary,
 for the next morning Dagon's im-
 age was found prostrate on its face
 before the ark. They set it up
 again, and the next morning Dagon
 was on his face again, with
 his head and both hand severed.
 Moreover the men of Ashdod were
 afflicted with boils, a symptom of
 the Oriental plague.
 In deadly fear the ark was
 transferred to another capital,
 this time to the strongly fortified
 city of Gath, but there again it
 caused a plague of boils. Once
 more the ark was moved to a
 different capital, to Ekron. There
 the same plague appeared, but
 more severely than in any of the
 other cities, so that there was a
 demand all over Philistia for the
 return of the ark to the Israelites.
 The latter years of Samuel's
 life were clouded by many troubles.
 Like Eli, he was unhappy in his
 sins (1 Sam. 8:3). The people
 began to lose faith in what he
 him was the God-ordained government
