Releasing Penalty and Interest On Taxes Delinquent Fed. 1st.



A special notice has been sent out to tax collectors concerning provisions in a recently passed Senate Bill No. 262, governing the releasing of penalty and interest on delinquent taxes.

The bill provides that all penalties and interest that have accrued on all ad valorem and poll taxes, that were delinquent on or before February 1st, 1933, due to the state county, common school districts, road districts and also ad valorem and poll taxes due cities, towns and villages, special school districts and independent school districts, be released, provided the taxes are paid prior to September 30th, 1933, plus an added one per cent penalty.

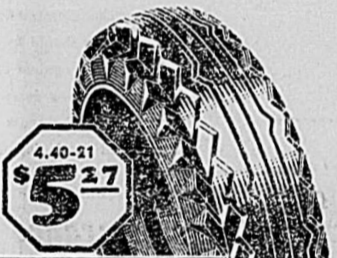

HOW ABOUT FAR LOANS?

This publication is favorably impressed with the effort of the National Government to elevate conditions among the farmers of the nation. Long before the pres-

ent program of farm relief was inaugurated, this paper carried an editorial suggesting that the gov- ernment refinance the farms of the country, issuing currency that would be backed by the land val- ue of our nation. The present plan of refinancing the farmer is largely along that line, with the exception of issuing currency to effect the liquidation and financ- ing. The plan may work out effec- tively, but we fail to see the great advantage of the govern- ment borrowing monney from the people to loan it back to the farm- er. The transaction requires two complete set of papers, in the form of bonds by the government, and security papers by the farm- ers.

Let's hope the farmer derives real benefit from the program.

General Topic:—
Jesus Rises From the Dead.
Scripture Lesson:—
Mark 16:1-11.

1. And when the Sabbath was past, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome, brought spices, that they might come and anoint him.
2. And very early on the first day of the week, they come to the tomb when the sun was risen.
3. And they were saying among themselves, who shall roll us away the stone from the door of the tomb?
4. And looking up, they see that the stone is rolled back, for it was exceedingly great.
5. And entering into the tomb, they saw a young man sitting on the right side, arrayed in a white robe, and they were amazed.
6. And he saith unto them, be not amazed; ye seek Jesus, the Nazarene, who hath been crucified; he is risen. he is not here, be-

hold, the place where they laid him!
7. But go, tell his disciples and Peter. He goeth before you into Galilee; there shall ye see him, as he said unto you.
8. And they went out, and fled from the tomb, for trembling and astonishment had come upon them; and they said nothing to anyone; for they were afraid.
9. Now when he was risen early on the first day of the week, he appeared first to Mary Magdalene, from whom he had cast out seven demons.
10. She went and told them that had been with him, as they mourned and wept.
11. And they, when they heard that he was alive, and had been seen of her, disbelieved. Golden Text:—He is risen.—Mark 16:16.

Time:—The Resurrection, Sunday, April 9, A. D. 30. The ascension, Thursday, May 18.
Place:—The resurrection, Jerusalem. The ascension, the Mount of Olives.
Parallel Passages.—Matt. 28; Luke 24; John 20, 21.
INTRODUCTION
The Saviors spent three days in the tomb, according to the Jewish mode of reckoning, which counted parts of days as whole days,—namely, Friday evening and night, all day Saturday, and Sunday evening and night.
Such came a supernatural event. Early Sunday morning. There was a great earthquake and a shining angel descended from heaven, rolled back the stone from the entrance to the tomb and sat upon it. The Roman guards swooned in terror, so frightful was the event, and on their awaking rushed off to tell the Jewish rulers what had occurred. These crafty schemers saw themselves exposed to a great peril, a Jesus indeed risen from the dead, heading a host of exultant followers; but they extricated themselves from their predicament as best they could. They bribed the soldiers to say that Christ's disciples stole his body while they were asleep and agreed to save them from punishment by the Roman authorities. And this falsehood is current to this very day.

Resurrection Mornng. vs. 1, 2.
And when the Sabbath was past, the Jewish Sabbath, our Saturday. "Mary Magdalene." The woman out of whom Christ had cast seven demons. "And Mary the mother of James." This was James the Less (Matt. 27:56), not the James who was the brother of John, the first martyr among the apostles. "And Salome." She was the mother of James and John, members of Peter of the Inner Circle of three apostles closest to Jesus. And probably other women whose names are not recorded. "Brought spices, that they might come and anoint him." The embalming done by Joseph of Arimathaea and Nicodemus on Friday was done hastily, as the Sabbath would begin at sunset; and these women come to complete it.
"And very early on the first day of the week." Our Sunday, which on account of the resurrection of our Lord on that day, came to supplant the Jewish Sabbath (Saturday) as the day of rest and worship, though for a time the Christians observed both days. They came to the tomb when the sun was risen. The confusion of the time is to be observed in the confusion of the accounts, for Matt. 28:1 sets the time as late on the Sabbath day (according to Roman reckoning) as it began to dawn toward the first day of the week; Luke 24:1 says "at early dawn"; and John 20:1 says "while it was yet dark." The accounts are evidently honest, and are precisely what would be reported at that dim time of day.
Needless Anxieties
"And they were saying among themselves," v. 3. They were full of anxiety, but they continued on their course. "Who shall roll us away the stone from the door of the tomb?" The tomb, as was not uncommon, was closed by a round upright stone, not unlike a mill-stone, rolling in a stone groove cut in solid rock. "And looking up." Joseph's rock hewn tomb was evidently on high ground, perhaps cut into a cliff. "They see that the stone is rolled back, for it was exceedingly great." Its removal was instantly visible as far away as the tomb could be seen it was so large. "Every obstacle was

carefully removed out of the way of the women. If we go forward following the dictates of our consciences, and trusting that God will smooth the path and roll away the obstructions, we shall find that he does so. He calls us to no duties which he does not enable us to perform.—Rev. Sabine Baringway to meet trouble before it comes. They expected an impenetrable wall, they found a clear opening, immeasurable expanse. They pictured a clod; they found a God—a God who had already gone before them, rolling exceedingly great material impediments out of their way.—Rev. Frederick F. Shannon, D. D.

The Angel at the Tomb. vs. 5-8
"And entering into the tomb, they saw a young man sitting on the right side." Luke 24:4 says that there were two men. Possibly but one of them spoke, and his memories than the other. Recall the two blind men at Jericho, both of whom called after Jesus and were healed by him, but only one of them, Bartimeus, was conspicuous enough to be mentioned by Mark (Mark 10:46; Matt. 20:30; Luke 18:35) Arrayed in a white robe." Luke 24:4 tells us that the angels were clad "in dazzling apparel," robed in light, in accordance with the uniform representation of the glorious beings.
The Marvel of the Resurrection
We know that Jesus Christ has risen, not only because the scripture says so, but also because nothing else has risen Christ can account for the facts of church history, for Christendom, for the transfiguration of human character, for the joys of a personal communion with the Living One. If ever there was a fact proved it is this: Jesus Christ has risen from the dead and is alive today.—Rev. George Dana Boardman, D. D., L. L. D.

CHEVROLET CARS LEAD IN TOTAL REGISTRATION

Registration of new Chevrolet passenger cars and trucks in the first quarter of this year accounted for 37.2 per cent of the total of the industry and exceeded the combined registration of the next three leading makes, according to a statement released today by the Chevrolet Motor Company.

In the three months Chevrolet totaled 96,621 new units as compared with 47,509 new cars and trucks for the second place make, 29,823 for the third, and 14,354 for the fourth place holder, another General Motors car in a higher price range than the first three, the statement read.

The New Deal

The trend of the Roosevelt policies, if not their ultimate outcome is beginning to become clear. Everybody has been asking what the "New Deal" is going to be like. Well the preliminary shuffle of the pack has been finished and enough cards have been dealt to give a pretty good idea of what the rest will be.

Summarizing the opinions of several of the men closest to the President it can be said quite definitely that the program on which the Administration has embarked is one of complete social reorganization. It is based upon what is, so far as practical applications are concerned, a new idea conception of relation of worker to employer, of debtor to creditor, of the government to the people.

The theory of the "New Deal" is that the day of individualism has passed, that under the old American system some people got too much and some to little out of life; that is the government's business, as Secretary Ickes of the Interior Department puts it, to set up a social control over the sources from which men get their living, to make it certain that all do get a living.

A Nation of Equals

The "New Deal" according to Professor Raymond Moley, Assistant Secretary of State and President Roosevelt's closest confidant, conceives the relationship of worker and employer, debtor and creditor, government and people as a common effort to unify the people of the nation into a genuine nation of equals. Mr. Moley refers to America's earlier economic development as having been actuated by what he calls a wrong concept of the right of one man to profit at the expense of another.

Mr. Moley is the leader of the

so called "brain trust" of the Administration. He spends nearly every forenoon with the President, and so may be regarded as voicing in a large way, the President's own ideas.
