proaching arrest, crucifixion, and resurrection, for he wanted his disciples to be prepared for those great events; but they could not comprehend the significance of his words, nor did they until his resurrection had placed upon them the stamp of glorious reality.

The Erroneous View of The Apostles

There was a very profound misconception concerning the Messiah in the minds of the twelve as they returned to Capernaum. They fully expected him to establish the Messianic Kingdom within a short time. But they now thought that his KINGDOM would be a worldly kingdom. It was from this viewpoint that they took it for granted that the twelve would occupy high positions in the kingdom.

On this account they had no little argument with each other as they journeyed, the Master now and then walking ahead of the little group but apparently overhearing what they said. They were not arguing about the foretold death of the Master, but about "the relative rank of each of them in the political kingdom which they were expecting him to establish" (Robinson.) The ignoble part of the argument was not the competition

THE QUESTION OF THE MASTER

When the company reached Capernaum, the base of the great Galilean ministry, the house of Peter seems to have been open and ready for them. This was the home of Jesus when in the city. He asked them, "What were ye reasoning on the way? If the altercation was not actually audible to Jesus who was walking a little ahead, he certainly was aware of it. To the earnest question of the Master not one of the Twelve summoned courage to reply. "They held their Peace."

Most. v. 35.

In the attitude of the teacher "he sat down and called to the Twelve," for they were disputing and seem to have constituted the entire company that took the journey with him. He laid down the law of greatness in his kingdom: "If any man would be first, he shall be last of all and servant of all." In other words, any man who would be first in honor must be first in service. "The Kingdom of Christ is not a kingdom of self-seeking but of self-sacrificing. And he is greatest in it who loves best and serves most" (Jones).

The Example of The Child

No finer model could the Master give to the disciples than to

the child has no pride, knows nothing of worldly rank or position, and is simple, teachable, and loving. When Jesus put the child before them, "it was an object lesson on the arrogant conceit of the twelve apostles contending for primacy."

This entire incident, so perfect in its tender beauty, should teach us the value of work for and with children, in the home, the school, and the church. Children not only serve the best example of the purity, trust and teachableness, which should mark all Christians, but they are the church of the future; as we guide and develop them now we are building the kingdom of God that is to come. The Sunday school, and all other instrumentalities for Christian nurture of the children, first and foremost being the Christian home—these stand at the very heart of the nation; these are the hope of the world. There is no sounder statesmanship than the loving leadership of a little child in the ways of the Saviour.
