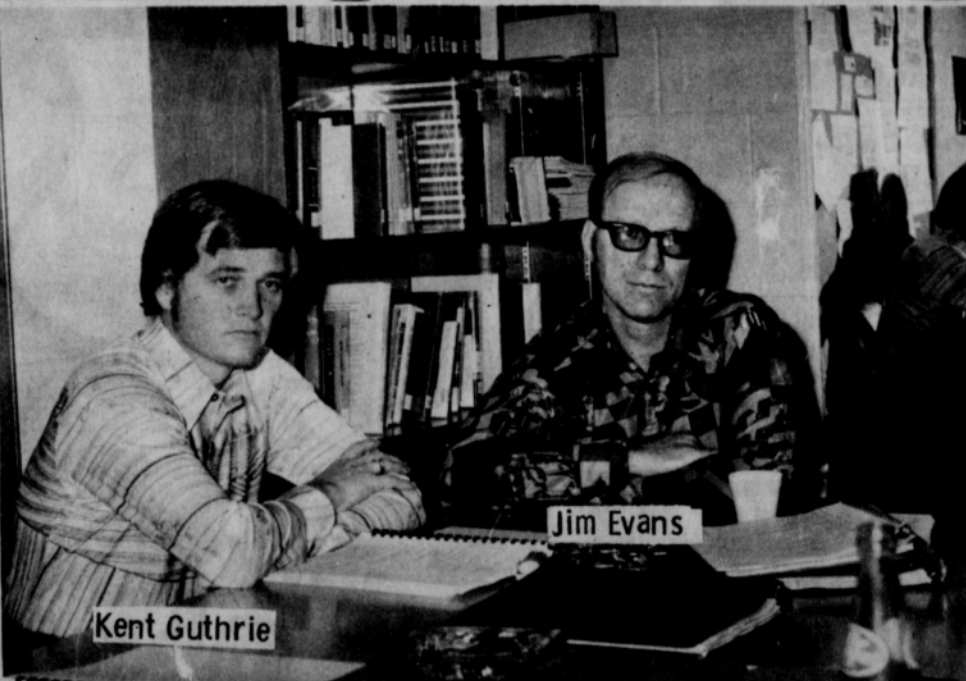

Record Number Child Abuse Cases Reported

A record 80,000 reports of child abuse, neglect, runaways, children in need of supervision, and other similar cases were handled by the State Department of Public Welfare in 1975 it was announced recently. Of these, almost 11,000 involved confirmed abuse and neglect, and many other cases were highly suspect but could not be confirmed.

"Child abuse and neglect can touch even the smallest community," according to Ann Carson, Regional Coordinator for the Child Abuse Campaign, Lubbock. "There is a need for every

person who suspects that a child is being abused, physically, emotionally, or sexually, to report the situation to the local Child Welfare Office. Or he can call the toll-free "hotline," 1-800-292-5400.

Ms. Carson went on to say that it is important to report neglect because the child may be exposed to dangerous persons or situations. "Accidents are the leading cause of death among children," she added, "and accidents occur often in cases where the child is chronically neglected."

"Under the law, the State

Department of Public Welfare is responsible for all children in Texas up to age eighteen. Abuse and neglect occurs among every racial group, and at all income levels. Perhaps this is because child abuse most commonly occurs in cycles, i.e., people tend to be the kind of parents their parents were.

"It should be kept in mind," Miss Carson said, "that it is not necessary to have proof that child abuse or neglect exists before making a report. The Child Welfare Unit will be responsible for proving or disproving the situation exists, so a suspicion is sufficient for a report."

"We also accept anonymous calls, but it is not really necessary to remain anonymous because the name of the person reporting is held in confidentiality anyway."

"Some people are hesitant to report because they hate to see the children removed from the parents. However, this will not necessarily happen. Whenever possible, children

remain in the home during the treatment period, or are returned following treatment."

Women getting married should remember to tell the Social Security Administration about their new name, according to Howard L. Weatherly,

social security branch manager in Pampa.

"In order to correct her social security card and keep her earnings record accurate and up-to-date, a bride should give us her new married name," Weatherly said. "Then earnings she had both before and after her marriage can be correctly credited to the same record."

A woman's work and earnings in jobs covered by social security build retirement, disability, survivors, and Medicare protection for herself and her family.

A new bride can call, write or visit any social security office to get her name changed on her record. "Or she can use a form available at any post office and many employer personnel offices," Weatherly said.

People can change their name because of divorce or for business or other reasons should also notify social security, Weatherly noted.

Speaker Named For Price Dinner

PAMPA--It was announced today that Congressman Jack Kemp of college and professional football fame will be the featured speaker for a Republican fund raising dinner honoring former Congressman Bob Price. The fund-raising event will be held Thursday, April 22, at the Amarillo Villa Hotel Convention Center on I-40.

The evening will start with a reception at 7:30, dinner at 8:15. Congressman Jack Kemp of New York is serving his third term in the United States House of Representatives.

He won his first term in November 1970, in his bid for public office, at the age of 35.

In the 1974 election, he received the largest number of votes cast for any of the 144 Republicans elected to the current, 94th Congress. Mr. Kemp also had the third highest number of votes cast for any U. S. Representative -- Democrat or Republican -- in the United States while capturing more than 72 percent of the vote in his 38th Congressional District.

From national prominence as a professional football quarterback, Congressman Kemp has also achieved recognition as a rising leader in U. S. politics.

TIME MAGAZINE recently described him as one of the top young leaders in America. As a freshman, the WALL STREET JOURNAL identified Mr. Kemp as "one of the clear comers in the Congress and one who will quickly emerge from the pack to become a leader in the House of Representatives."

Congressman Kemp is a member of the Appropriations Committee and the Subcommittees on Defense and the District of Columbia. His legislative responsibilities also include membership on the President's Conference on Physical Fitness. His experience includes four years as a member of the House Education and Labor Committee.

Congressman Kemp's consistent advocacy for free enterprise and fiscal responsibility has won support and respect from his colleagues in the Congress as well as the backing of business, large and small.

He is the recipient of two Watchdog of the Treasury Awards, presented by the non-partisan National Associated Businessmen, for his votes to cut wasteful, federal spending in the 92nd and 93rd Congresses.

During 13 years as a professional quarterback, Mr. Kemp played in both the American and National Football Leagues. He led the Buffalo Bills to AFL championships in 1964 and 1965, played in six AFL All-Star Games and won the AFL's Most Val-

uable Player Award in 1965. Born and educated in Los Angeles, he received his B. A. from Occidental College in that city in 1957. He married Joanne Main, an Occidental graduate, in 1958, and pursued graduate studies in political science and education at night classes while playing professional football for the San Diego Chargers. He was on active duty in the Army in 1968 and a member of the Army Reserve until 1962.

Congressman and Mrs. Kemp have four children. Their family home is in Hamburg, New York.

Congressman Kemp's many honors include the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame "Distinguished American Award as the former football player who has carried the lessons learned on the football field into the life of service to the community"; the U. S. Jaycees' Distinguished Service Award; The Buffalo Evening News' Outstanding Citizen Awards for 1965 and 1974; membership on the American Federation of Small Business "Honor Roll"; and Young Man of the Year Award from the Buffalo Jaycees.

Increased Tax Collections Boost State Revenue

AUSTIN-Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that increased collections of the sales tax, natural gas production tax and motor vehicle sales tax have helped boost state revenue at the mid-point of the fiscal year to \$3 billion, 18 percent higher than a year ago.

"The sales tax is up \$87.5 million over last year," Bullock said. "The gas production tax is up \$46.4 million and the motor vehicle sales tax up \$27 million. A together, tax collections are 12 percent higher than the same period last year."

However, the Comptroller noted in his March monthly financial statement, expen-

ditures through the first six months of the fiscal year totaled \$3.3 billion, 24 percent higher than during fiscal 1975.

The biggest chunk of the expenditures, Bullock noted, has been for education. "The state has paid out \$1.8 billion so far this fiscal year on education," he said. "That amounts to 54 percent of the of the state's total expenditures."

Bullock's report showed the state collected \$603.2 million during the month of February and paid out \$510.6 million in expenditures.

The February report also contained information on bond issuances by local governments in Texas, comparing 1976 issues with those during the same period in 1975. All bonds issued by local governments must be registered with the State Comptroller's Office.

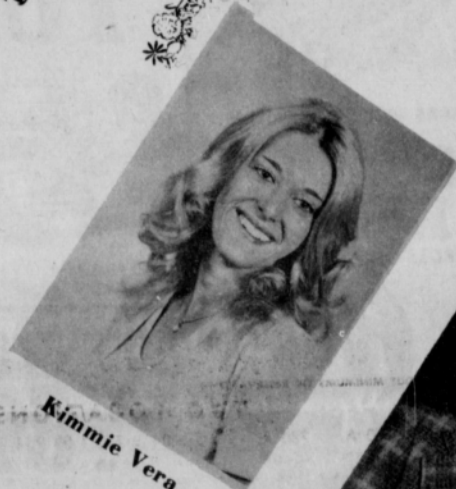

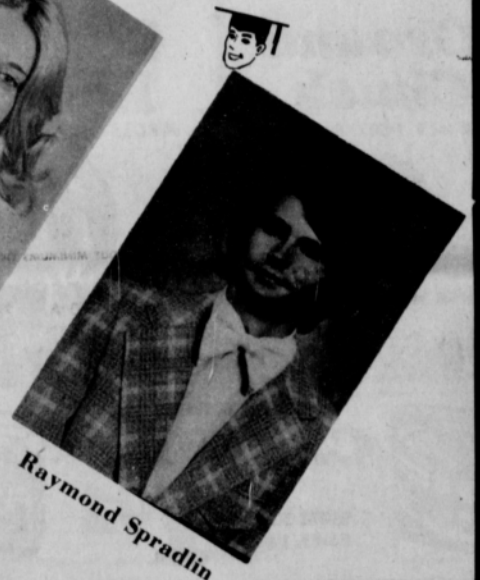

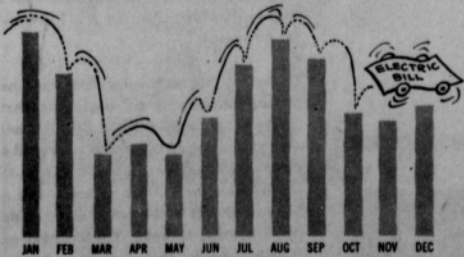

**Annual ACS Texas
Division Report
Available**

Judge Johnny Lee, president of the Hansford Unit of the American Cancer Society, reports that Texans gave the American Cancer Society over four and one-half million dollars this past fiscal year.

"This money is one way of showing the emphasis now being placed on cancer control. New action programs are continuously emerging to help save over the lives we are now losing from cancer," he said.

According to the 1975 Annual Report of the American Cancer Society, Texas Division, now available to the public, the Cancer Society has four main program areas: Professional Education, Public Education, Service/Rehabilitation, and Research.

Professional Education provides up-to-date information on cancer diagnosis and treatment to the medical and allied health professions. The past fiscal year, these programs reached over 81,965 physicians, dentists, and nurses. Also, 16 clinics and 13 conferences were supported by the American Cancer Society in Texas.

Public Education helps save lives by increasing public awareness and knowledge about cancer, prompting early diagnosis and treatment of the disease. This year over 44,000 programs were presented to an audience of 1,724,337 people. Programs included ACS educational films, physicians and lay speakers, also thousands of exhibits and millions of educational pamphlets. Over 300,000 Texans participated in one or more of the Society's new "Action" Education programs which offer the public an opportunity to take direct action against cancer through

cancer screening such as the pap test, proctoscopic, oral and breast exams. Mrs. Mozelle McClellan was recently commended for her contributions in education in this area for the Hansford Unit.

The Service-Rehabilitation program seeks to save lives, to ease the pain, and lighten the many burdens the disease places on its victims and their families. This year, the total number receiving ACS Service in Texas was 26,687 Texans. Service Chairmen for the Hansford Unit are Mrs. Comfort Winders, Gruver; and Mrs. N. F. Renner, Spearman.

Research is a crucial phase of the ACS activity which enhances the possibility of finding those answers that will be useful to humanity for control of cancer. During 1975, grants in Texas included 30 National and Texas Division fellowships and 31 research grants. The total of these grants exceeded \$1,774,244.

Judge Lee concluded, "I feel that fighting cancer is a local responsibility and a challenge every concerned individual should meet. Every man, woman, and child in our community has a stake in the outcome and each has a responsibility to participate in it. The American Cancer Society provides the opportunity."

The Annual Cancer Crusade will begin April 5th in Hansford Unit area with Mrs. James Stedje the Hansford Unit 1976 Crusade Chairman.

The month of April has been proclaimed as Cancer Control Month for Hansford County and each citizen's support of the American Cancer Society's Crusade is urged to fight cancer.

According to plans laid at last week's Hansford Unit ACS meet, the educational and fund-raising cancer crusade will be launched with a state goal of \$5,000,000 set. Members of the ACS Board were present at the meeting which was conducted by Hansford Unit president Judge Johnny Lee at the home of Mrs. Ted McClellan in Gruver.

Cancer is actually the common foe of every man, woman, and child, and will strike 32,500 Texans this year. Although accurate figures are not available for Hansford County, rough approximations for like a community with a community population figure of 10,000--a bit high perhaps for Hansford County but the closest approximate figures available--indicates that 74 people in Hansford County are alive, cured of cancer; that there are 43 cases under medical care in the year 1976; that 15 will die of cancer in 1976 and that there will probably be an

estimated 28 new cases of cancer this year.

Of this number nine people will be saved from cancer in 1976. An estimated 2,500 people will eventually develop cancer in our County and of this number 1,500 will ultimately die of cancer if the present rates continue.

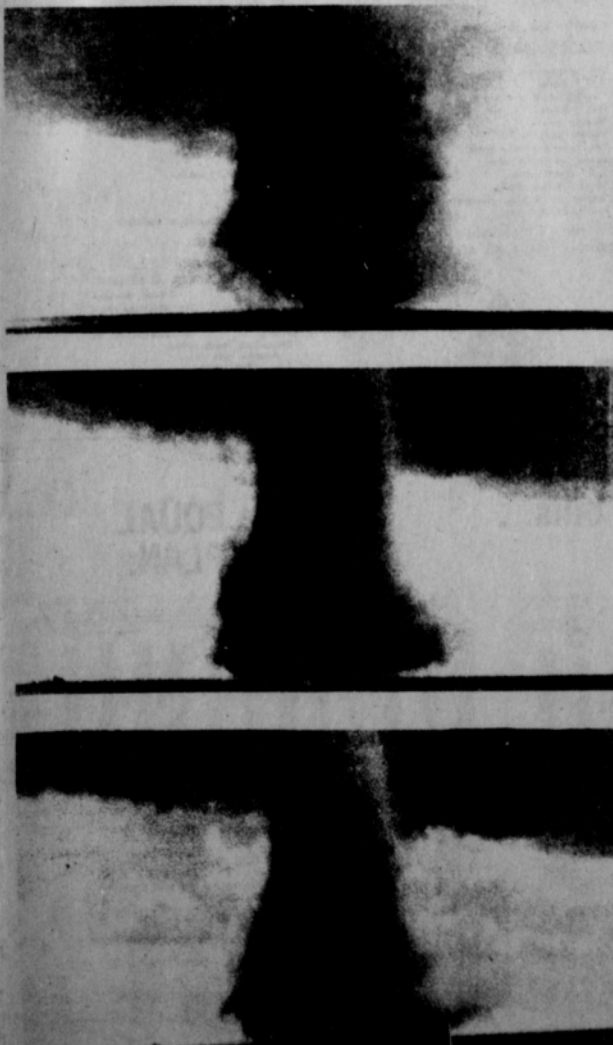

**"I SAW SIX
TORNADOES..."**



... writes R. A. Masingill, Chief Deputy of the Hansford County Sheriff's Office. It happened on the 26th day of June, 1975.

Masingill continues, "Sheriff R. L. McFarlin and myself were returning from a disturbance call in the city of Gruver when we observed a tornado approximately one mile southwest of Spearman city limits. The tornado looked like it was traveling southwest at (the) time. I took the Sheriff back to the office so... he could direct the tornado watch from (his) office. Sheriff McFarlin then advised me to stay with the tornado, take some pictures, and give the office the exact location of the tornado so that they could warn the towns and the people in the path of the tornado..."

How closely Chief Deputy Masingill followed instructions is evidenced by the remarkable photographs reproduced here from his color originals. During the course of this duty, Masingill states that on that day, "... in all, I saw six (6) tornadoes."

Regarding the particular tornado he photographed, Masingill emphasized that it appeared to take shape "... from the ground up, not from the clouds like all of the other tornadoes. This tornado is the one that struck a house and a barn northeast of Morse, Texas, doing heavy damage to (both). The tornado then traveled south, struck another house, totally destroyed a barn, turned over two cars, and destroyed an irrigation engine. This was right at the edge of Morse, Texas. No one was injured in this due to the fact that the Sheriff's Office put out the warning for the town ... and advised the people ... to evacuate..."

The chief deputy concludes: "As the tornado struck the last barn, it moved off to the northwest and went up into the clouds and disappeared, and that was the last time that I saw it."

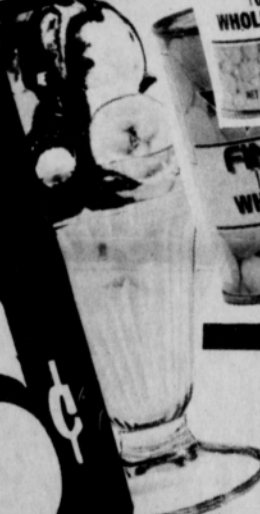
