## Judge Rules Against Temporary Injunction

District Judge Richard Counts refused to grant the temporary injunction against candidates L. M. Womble and Dan Desimone being sought by Ruth Gumfory. The plaintiff, Ruth Gumfory filed suit against Womble and Desimone maintaining that they were not legally qualified to enter their names as candidates for commissioner of precinct 3 because of residence

requirement. The hearing was held at 3 p.m. in Hansford County Courthouse.

In an earlier hearing on March 15, Counts ruled that Mrs. Gumfory "had the right to bring suit" and also ruled that the Commissioners Court, the Democratic Executive Committee and the Democratic Chairman and the County Clerk were "necessary parties" in the suit.

Steve Phillips, Division General Manager, congratulated and presented Cornelson with a Certificate of Achievement for successfully completing the program.



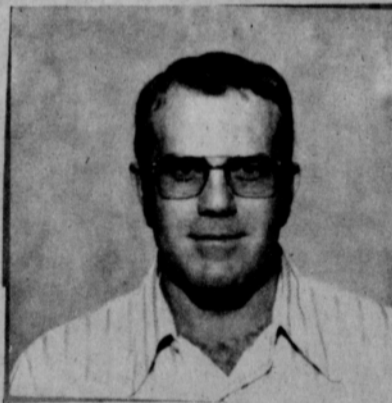

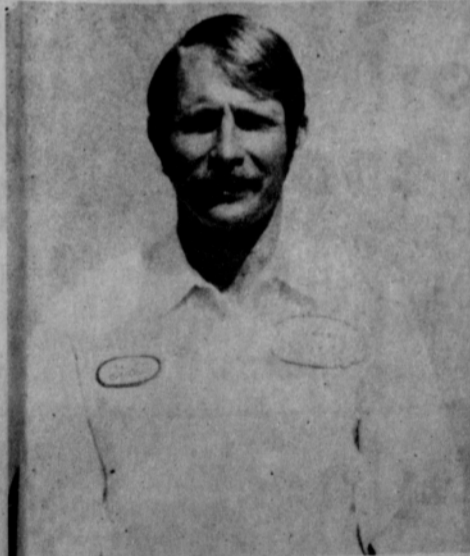

## Sunday Search

A young Perryton man in an unsuccessful theft of a motor vehicle became the object of a search by area law men Sunday night when he took to the fields in an attempt to escape capture late in the evening.

The calm of the Sabbath was rudely broken about 10:00 P. M. Sunday when 19 year old Joel Franco of Perryton became the object of a search by area lawmen following the theft of a car from Perryton. Young Franco proceeded in the stolen vehicle from Perryton, traveling east to Spearman on Highway 759 where he was pursued but eluded capture by Spearman City Police Chief Wayne Maynard who was joined in the chase by Chief Deputy Sheriff Masingill and Highway Patrolmen Sims and Marshall.

An alert to Gruver City Police Chief Jimmy Ratliff resulted in a roadblock being set up about 5 1/2 miles east of Gruver. The suspect ran through the roadblock and proceeded north on Highway 207 headed toward Guymon.

At approximately the location of the T. C. Harvey Feedlot, a tire

blew out on Franco's stolen vehicle and he took to the fields on foot, running in a westerly direction. A search was made of the entire area for about four hours until the officers decided to call the search til morning.

At about 8:30 A. M. Monday morning, Franco appeared at the Oscar Lee home, about one and one half miles west of Gruver, asking for a ride. Mr. Lee called Chief Ratliff who asked if the man was wearing a brown shirt and when answered in the affirmative asked to have the man held until he could get there.

Immediately upon arrival at the Lee home, Chief Ratliff apprehended the man, taking him to Spearman to be charged with theft of the motor vehicle and resisting the arrest. At a late hour Monday evening, Franco remained in the Hansford County Jail.

Officers in the area should be commended for their diligence in searching for the fugitive and for warning area residents of the possible danger from the suspect when he eluded apprehension and took to the fields.

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## Persecution Continues In Malawi

Persecution of peace-loving Christians is continuing in the East African country of Malawi, according to a report received by the Perryton congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses.

In the recent communique from the publishers of AWAKE! the Presiding Overseer of the local congregation, Tom Murray said an up-date on the continuing brutalities upon Malawian Jehovah's Witnesses was given.

Mr. Murray said, "The persecutions which broke-out against Jehovah's Witnesses in 1972 subsided as tens of thousands of these peace-loving Christians fled to neighboring countries where they found temporary refuge in camps where they were cared for by government administrators of these countries and provided food and clothing during the next few years. But they didn't escape to these camps unscathed," Mr. Murray continued, "because the Young Pioneers, a political youth group of the only political party in the country, was carrying out a decree of the Malawi Congress Party to force dismissal of Jehovah's Witnesses from employment, discourage their farming, chase them away from villages and ban the practice of their religion."

According to the report, "Dr. Hugo Idoyaga, United Nations High Commission Representative of Zambia, related after visiting that 'Many of the refugees bore cuts and gashes apparently inflicted by pangas, the huge knives common to East Africa,' which indicates the punishment they received."

"The relief they received at these camps was only temporary," Mr. Murray said, "as the governments of these nations have forced repatriation of these peaceable people to Malawi late in 1975, there to be submitted to worse inhuman treatment than they had experienced and fled from earlier."

"Many are the reports," this spokesman for the local congregation explained, "from Elders of Jehovah's Witnesses within Malawi, based on eyewitness accounts, of severe multiple beatings of these Christians - some having both arms and legs broken and being deprived food, water and clothing for long periods."

"Some of the most cruel inhuman treatment is given," Mr. Murray emphasized, "such as murders of male Witnesses by having their parts cut off, and the gang raping of the female Witnesses."

"Documentation of the plight of Malawian Witnesses has been widespread," Mr. Murray explained, "such as Times Staff Writer Dial Tongerson who reported after visiting refugees who once again have fled to Zambia. Some Witnesses said forced return to Malawi could be tantamount to death sentences," and quoting one elder of a Malawian congregation, "If we are sent back we will be imprisoned for three years. I was in a Malawi prison for one month and I know I could

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live in peace to which the Malawi constitution subscribes.  
"Also there is the house to house distribution of AWAKE!" Mr. Murray added, "to inform people of what is happening in the worse religious oppression by a national government since Hitler's Germany. In this way those who are lovers of what is just and right may feel impelled to speak up on behalf of these persecuted Christians. If they are so inclined they will have the opportunity to convey their concern to the proper authorities in Malawi."

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# Wayland's Flying Queen Continue Win Streak

PLAINVIEW, TX---Wayland's Hutcherson Flying Queens continue to prove they have what it takes to be champions. Led by senior Pearl Worrell of Decatur, Ga., the Queens claimed their

eight-straight National Women's Invitational Tournament (NWIT) championship last weekend (March 20) in Amarillo, before an estimated 3,100 spectators who crowded into the Civic Center

to see if the Queens could repeat last year's performance. They did! Faced by four All-American tournament selections, WBC defeated UCLA in the final game for the second-straight year, and

continued their dominance of the NWIT, with a 90-77 victory over the California Bruins. UCLA was wiped out last year, 79-41, and proved to be no match for the eager Queens again.

NWIT All-American honors brought tears from the eyes of Rosemary Brown, a senior from Talco, Texas; junior Leann Sheldahl of Spearman, Texas; sophomore Breana Caldwell of Cement, Okla., and, of course, Miss Worrell.

Championship honors were capped for the Queens when Miss Worrell, who finished the championship game with 27 points and 14 points for all three tournament games, was named the tournament's most valuable player.

The Queens, now 28-3 on the season, took a half-time lead of 43-32, with Miss Waddell scoring 17 points. She earned nine of 17 field-goal shots and hit 11 of 11 free throws to lead all scorers with 29 points in the final game.

While UCLA hit 47 percent (27 of 57) of their field goal shots and the Queens dropped to 44 percent, the Bruins could

not muster the strength to outplay their opponents. On two occasions, however, the Bruins moved within three points (61-58) and four points (65-61). It was not enough to stop the Queens who rallied to end the Bruins' threat.

Wayland's Queens entered the NWIT tournament 26-3 for the year, backed by a 14-game winning streak. And, even before the first NWIT game a week ago, had qualified for the national Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) basketball tournament which got underway yesterday in University Park, Pa. Although the NWIT is a national meet, the AIAW is considered by many schools as the highest echelon of women's college basketball.

The three-year-old AIAW tournament championship has eluded the Queens who will be doing everything possible to bring home this title before the week is over. Following the AIAW event will be the AAU bout to which the Queens no hold title.

Victory for the Queens is nothing new! It all started with a young coach who launched his Wayland career in 1948, who, when he resigned in 1973, had watched his cagers chalk up one impressive season after another.

Harley Redin, now associated with Plainview's City National Bank, coached the Queens to six national titles and four national college tournament crowns with a 428-60 record in 17 years.

The Queens present coach, Dean Weese, is a man who has achieved unprecedented success himself in girls' basketball. Prior to coming to Wayland, Weese won 13 straight district titles while at Spearman High School. His teams also won three state championships and made nine consecutive trips to the state tournament.

His first time out with the Queens in November, 1973, was a successful debut. The winning streak has continued.

The function of the Regional public health program is to provide public health services to those 23 counties in the Panhandle not served by a local, organized health department. These counties include: Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Collingsworth, Dallam, Dear Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, and Wheeler. Only Potter and Randall Counties in the Panhandle are served by an organized health department.

While some of the functions of the Regional program are of a regulatory and enforcement nature, based on State Public Health Laws, many of the public health services carried out in the Panhandle counties will be subject to request and/or approval at a local level. These services include Environmental and Consumer Health Protection Services, Public Health Nursing, Emergency Medical Services, Immunizations, Veterinary Public Health, Tuberculosis Control, Venereal Disease Control, Nursing Home Licensing and Certification and Health Education Services and Planning. ### Hightower Bill To Exempt Harvesters

(Washington, D. C.) --Congressman Jack Hightower, with Congressman George Mahon as co-sponsor, introduced a bill Monday that would exempt custom harvesters and sheep shearing crews from provisions of the Labor Registration Act. The bill, H. R. 12683, would restore an exemption such independent contractors had before the act was amended by the 93rd Congress in 1974. "Although I was not a member of the 93rd Congress," Hightower said, "I understand the principal intent of the 1974 amendments was to include unskilled migratory workers and their crew leaders under provisions of the act." Hightower said custom harvesters and sheep shearing crews were not migratory workers in the accepted sense "and I believe the exemption must be reinstated." The Congressman said a major part of the wheat and grain sorghum crops in the 13th District and other portions of the nation

are harvested by custom harvesters, and they are utilized to assist in harvesting corn and sugar beets.

The bill was referred to the House Committee on Education and Labor for consideration. Hightower said he would ask Congressman Carl Perkins, D-Ky, the committee chairman, for expeditious hearings on the bill.

will still be allowed to pay higher interest rates on their savings deposits. With this handicap, and their only competitive advantages removed, banks would have two strikes against them. The Financial Reform Act, if it is passed in its present form, would result in more funds flowing into savings and loan associations and away from banks. Obviously this will make more funds available for

home loans at a time when the cost of homes is so high the average family cannot afford to borrow the necessary funds to purchase one. Anticipating this lack of home loan demand, the Financial Reform Act would permit savings and loan associations to invest these funds in out-of-state corporate securities. The dollars so invested would not be available for the banks of Texas.

## Controversial Legislation

The farmer, the rancher, the small businessman, the average citizen who occasionally needs to make a bank loan, are all confronted with a dangerous threat to their sources of credit in a bill now pending before Congress.

Known as the Financial Reform Act of 1976, the legislation would make a number of sweeping changes in the country's financial structure, but the most important of these is that it would inevitably reduce drastically the funds now available to banks for lending. That is one reason why Texas bankers, and the nation's bankers, are so concerned about the effects of the bill, not only on their own industry, but on the economy as a whole.

As mentioned above, the Financial Reform Act covers a wide area, but its most damaging provision, from the standpoint of bank customers, borrowers, and stockholders, would allow savings and loan associations and credit unions to provide checking account service to their customers.

This does away with virtually the only competitive advantage banks still retain, since S & L's and credit unions already are permitted by law to pay 1/4 percent higher interest on savings deposits.

In short, the bill would increase overnight the number of "banks" in Texas from 1,344 to more than 3,700, and in the nation from 14,500 to over 42,500 - or a total of 28,000.

Why, you may ask, is this bad? Is not competition the lifeblood of trade?

There are several telling answers. For one thing, these 28,000 new "banks" will assume their broader powers without having to submit to any examination of their capital adequacy, or management capabilities, or any investigation of the public need for new banking service at their location, or locations.

For another, the new bank-type institutions

1. Area in which equipment will be operated includes the Texas Counties of Dallam, Hartford, Hemphill, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Roberts and Sherman.
2. The target area will be portions of the Oklahoma Counties of Beaver, Ellis, Harper, Kiowa, Texas, Woods and Woodward.
3. The areas adjacent to target area which may be subject to the effects of the operation are within the State of Oklahoma and in general within 15 to 20 miles of the target area. The maximum intentional effect is in the target, but some downwind effect may occur in Oklahoma mostly to the immediate northwest of the target. There would be no significant intentional effect in Texas from the operation of these proposed dispensers.
4. The materials and methods to be used in conducting the operation are silver iodide electric arc ground-based dispensers that have an output in the range of 1/4 to 2 grams per hour per dispenser.

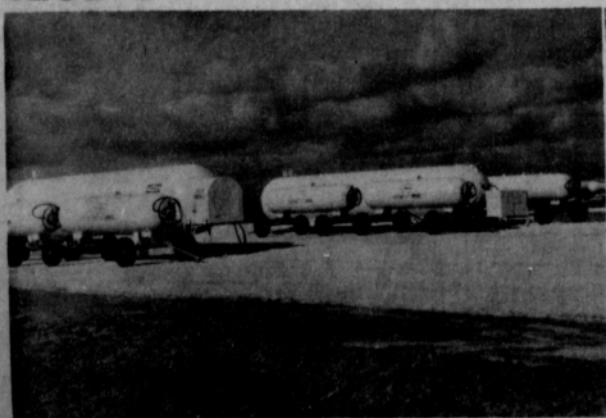

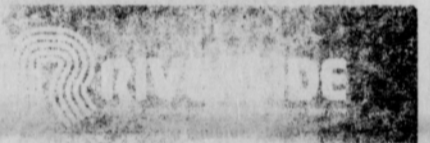

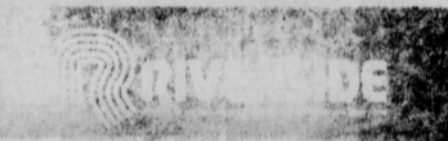

### Drivers May Designate Anatomical Gift

All drivers licenses issued after January 1, 1976, will contain a statement whereby the holder of the license may designate any part of his body as an anatomical gift at the time of his death.

Major C. W. Bell, commanding Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety which issues the drivers licenses, said the 64th Legislature enacted the measure that became effective the first of the year.

Accordingly, all drivers licenses issued after January 1, will contain the statement which specifies any or all of the donor's body that may be used as an anatomical gift.

If a person does not desire to participate in the anatomical gift program, Bell said, he need not do anything regarding completion of the statement. Drivers license will continue to be laminated on the front but the back will not be laminated in order that holders of the licenses may sign the statement.

The anatomical gift statement will be printed on the reverse side of the donor's operator's, commercial operator's or chauffeur's license. The gift is invalid on expiration, cancellation, revocation or suspension of the license or by lining out that portion of the statement.

Bell added that another method of voiding or canceling the statement would be to secure a duplicate drivers license in which case the reverse side of the permit would be left blank.

For the gift provision of the license to be valid, the statement must be executed each time the license is replaced, reissued or renewed. The document must be signed by the donor in the presence of witnesses who must sign the document in the donor's presence.

License which are currently valid in Texas will not be replaced with the newly-designed one, but as holders renew their licenses, they will receive the license which contains the gift statement.

If currently licensed drivers desire the newly-designed one, they may contact their nearest DPS drivers license office and apply for a duplicate license for which there is a minimal charge.

The law that was enacted by the Legislature only requires the DPS to provide a space on the license for the statement concerning the availability of the anatomical gift. "We do not maintain records regarding the anatomical gift," Bell added.

Recipients of gifts of bodies or vital organs may be any hospital, surgeon or physician, for medical or dental education, research, advancement of medical or dental school, college or university for education, research, advancement of medical or dental science or therapy.

Other recipients may include any vital organ storage facility established for medical or dental education, research, advancement or medical or dental science,

therapy or transplantation; or any individual specified by a licensed physician for therapy or transplantation needed by him.

# Federal Tax Bite Is \$7,385,000 Locally

NEW YORK, Mar. 27-How much will Hansford County residents be turning over to Uncle Sam next month in the form of income taxes?

With the deadline for filing, April 15th, just around the corner, local taxpayers are getting a painful inkling, as they prepare their reports, of just how much their payments will amount to.

According to the government's predictions, they will be more than last year, when approximately \$6,908,000 was collected from area residents in personal income and employment taxes.

That is the estimated amount they contributed then, as determined by an unofficial breakdown of the returns received from the State of Texas as a whole, which came to \$11,513,000,000. According to the Treasury Department, the local share, it is cal-

culated, represented some 0.06 percent of this total. Those who were fully employed throughout 1975 and were, in most instances, earning more than they had the year before, will probably have bigger tax bills next month than they had previously. Little or nothing is expected from those who worked only part of the year or not at all.

Nationally, according to the Administration's budget, submitted to Congress in January, it is anticipated that individual income and employment taxes will be about \$14.1 billion more than they were last April, an increase of 6.9 percent.

It counts on a total of a round \$217.0 billion from such taxes, as compared with last year's \$202.9 billion.

Residents of the local area will be bearing their proportionate share of the increase. It will bring their payments next month close to \$7,385,

000, it is estimated.

The President's budget for the following fiscal year, which will end September 30, 1977, instead of June 30, 1977, projects income and expenditures covering a 15-month period, rather than the usual 12 months.

For Hansford County residents to be able to carry their current portion of the tax load and maintain their present standard of living, their income this year will have to be considerably higher than in 1975, assuming the tax rate remains the same.

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

## Social Security

Students and other people who plan to get a summer job should apply immediately for a social security number if they don't have one, according to Howard L. Weatherly, social security branch manager in Pampa.

"You should apply for your number several weeks before you need it for a job covered by social security," Weatherly said. "Applications must be screened against central files in Baltimore to make sure that a second number isn't issued to that same person. Screening generally

takes several weeks. "Your social security number is yours alone and remains the same for life," he said. "A worker builds retirement, disability, survivors, and Medicare protection by work and earnings credited to his social security number. So when you get a job covered by social security, be sure your employer

copies your name and number correctly from your social security card to his records."

More than nine out of ten jobs are covered by social security.

People applying for a social security number for the first time may be asked to prove their age, identity, and citizenship.

"You can get information about applying for a social security number by calling, writing, or visiting any social security office," Weatherly said.

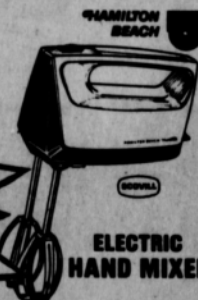

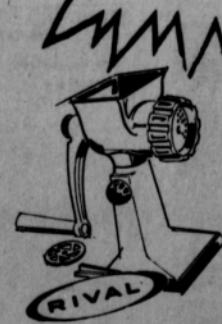
