If currently licensed drivers desire the newly-designated one, they may contact their nearest DPS driven license office and apply for a duplicate li-cense for which there is a minimal charge. The law that was enact-ed by the Legislature only requires the DPS to provide a space on the license for the statement concerning the availability of the an-atomical gift. "We do not maintain records re-garding the anatomical gifts." Beil added. Reciptems of gifts of bodies or vital organs may be any hospital, suggeon or physician, for medical or dental education, re-seatch, advancement of medical or dental school, college or university for education, research, ad-vancement of medical or dental science or therapy. Other recipients may in-clude any vital organ stor-age facility established for medical or dental education research, advancement or medical or dental science,
