

#### **Hens** Temperamental Husbandman Savs

 O. L. Willham, Animal Hus-landman of the Panhandle Agri-cultural Experiment Station, is in-clined to believe that they are. He has just completed a four year study of the reactions of laying hens to temperature fluctuations. In an interview Willham says, "Al-though hens show temperamental characteristics just like high-strung people it is a notable fact that those individuals which zre inclined to be good workers pay less attention to what goes on around them are not so sensitive to discuragements."
 His investigations, covering a period of four years, made use of about 100 pullets each of which had a record of 200 or more eggs per year. Taken the year around the daily fluctuations of tempera-ture did not affect the laying of high producing White Leghorns very much. It was found, however, that they were more sensitive to temperature changes after a per-iod of high production.
 During a period of steady rise or decline of temperature the hens seemed to adapt themselves to changes very well but they be-came sensitive to the daily fluctu-ations of temperature after a marked change either upward or downward in the general trend of the seaso.
 Willham concludes that very often the failing off of produc-tion which has been attributed to low temperatures is as likely to be caused by other factors, such as feed and care. A report of this study may be obtained by request-ing Panhandle Bulletin No. 28 from the Experiment Station at Goodwell, Oklahoma. #### TREATMENT OF FREEZE DAMAGED SHRUBBERY

DAMAGED SHRUBBERY Goodwell, Okla., June 4.—F. P. Eshbaugh, Horticulturist of the panhandle Experiment Station, makes the following statement. "Much damage was done to trees and schrubs over a large part of Oklahoma, Kanasa and northern Texas. Arbor vitae were killed outright im many places, and in other they were frozen to the main stems. Privet, roses, al-thea, barberry and honeysuckle were badly frozen. Some were killed to the ground this season while heretofore they had with-stodd our winters nicely. An un-amild March encouraged growth which was caught in zero weather the last week of March. The nor-mal temperature mean for No-vember to March at Goodwall is 39.9 degrees. The 1930-31 mean temperature for this period was done slightly warmer than nor-degrees above normal, with Arril 3.º degrees subnormal. 
