# City Council Slashes Budget

In a special meeting of the City Council Monday evening, a lengthy discussion was held on the budget and general operations with all departments coming under scrutiny.

The council, going through the budget, slashed some \$58, 143.00 from the budget during the period of January 1, 1976 to September 31, 1976. This cut will be reviewed periodically to see whether or not the items need to be reinstated.

The biggest cut was in the personnel. There will be a reduction in the gas, water and sewer systems of 6 people. One of these has resigned and will not be replaced, one was dismissed and four others will be laid off.

The Animal Control officer will be operating on a complaint basis only and will be maintaining the pound as well as working

in other departments.

One patrolman will be dismissed which will leave the Chief of Police and 2 patrolmen in the department. This will save approximately \$9,000.00

The councilmen voted not to take any salary for the period of adjustment which will amount to \$2, 340.00.

A cut of \$4,000.00 was made in the gas maintenance and repairs budget.

Comprehensive planning was cut \$2,000. 00, the planning will still go on but will be in the realm of state funds.

Acting City Manager Mark Neff said Tuesday that taxes were coming in slower than they had last year and of course our mild weather this winter has caused revenue from the gas system to be much lower than had been anticipated.

Under the quatantine, steems and spayed heifers (over six months old) can move without restriction. Stocker and feeder heifers from nonqualified herds can be shipped out of Texas only if branded with an "S" on the left jaw and shipped to a quarantined feedlot or to alaughter. Cattle for imm-ediate shupther mus be "S" branded or from a quali-fied herd and tested to move across state lines. Cattle reacting to the brucellosis test would be branded with a "B" and be moved for slaughter as under current regulations. "The net effect of the quar-antime will be to stop ship-ments of breeding cattle from Texas to other states until ownen can establish qualified herds, which will take a minimum of four months in most instances. 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

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Seminar Set **On World Food Supply** 

LUBBOCK -- Seven sponso are inviting West Texans to meet Jan. 30 for a dis-cussion of alternatives to the impending starvation forecast for the world as population numbers overfa

population numbers overax the earth's food supply. Two of the world's leading authorities on the population crists, Drs. George Borgsrom and Charles Westoff, will participate in the daylong seminar in Lubbock's South Park Inn. The meeting is planned in conjunction with the 13th annual West Texas Water Institute (WTWI). Other sponson are Texas Tech University's College of Agrie cultural Sciences, the Texas Department of Agriculture, the Planned Parenthood Associations of Lubbock and Northeast Texas, and the Lubbock and West Texas chambers of commerce. Texas Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White Will participate. The 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. meeting is open to the pub-lic. Registration is 12.50 or membership in WTWI. The 50 membership is open to any interested in West Texas vater problems. Dean Anson R. Bertrand of Texas Tech's College of Agricultural Sciences and WTWI chairman, said the meeting will highligh the importance of West Texas in the business of feeding the world. He emphaized the conference is important to many who are not involved directly in agriculture. The world's food and en-ergy crisis are related, he said, although the food crisis is less apparent than the energy crisis in the United States. The lubbock meeting will give a regional voice to the concem expressed at these world meetings." 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

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How To Care **For Poinsettias** 

COLLEGE STATION--The poinsettia is the favorite Christmas plant, with its attractive green leaves and bright red bases. And, with the proper care, it can provide attractive colors for your Christmas decor throughout the holiday

tor your Christmas decor throughout the holiday season. Everent Janne, Landscape horticultural Extension Ser-vice, outlines everal re-guirements which must be fulfilled to receive full benefits from poinsettias. "The poinsettia will do best when placed in a summy location and protected from sudden temperature changes due to drafts, heat vents or opening doors. Night temperature should not drop below 60 degrees F. A sudden drop in tem-perature can cause com-plete loss of leaves," notes Janne.

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10c OFF LABEL "Proper watering will do mach to prolong the life of the Poinseria. The plant's water requirements are re-latively high due to its large leaf surfaces and the low humidity in homes and offices. The soft hall around the plant should not be all-outed to become so dry that the leaves start to will." On the other hand, the horticulturits cautions against keeping the soft saturated with water as this cut off the doxygen supply to the roots, realising in loss of feeder noots and fol-iage. Frequently, poinsertias an attactive foll to en-hance their appearance. Be sure to check if the drainage hole in the bottom of the post is closed by the foll.
