Midget Twins Visit Here

Visiting in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Bowen this week were her aunts, Essie and Lessie Lackey of Cheyenne, Oklahoma. Essie and Lessie are 61 years old and are 4 ft. 2 in. and 4 ft. 1 in. in height. They are the only known midget twins in the world, according to them.

They were born and raised in Elk City and when they were born, they weighed six pounds and measured 6 inches each.

They came from a family of eleven children, ten of whom are still living. Their six brothers and three sisters ranged in height from around five foot five inches to around six foot tall.

They reported that carnivals tried to buy them for their side shows and that their parents had to keep a close watch on them so they wouldn't be kidnapped.

They live alone in a home furnished with regular furnishings. Neither one of the twins drive but they travel all over when someone comes to take them.

They belong to the National Twin Association and the L.P.A. (Little People's Association). At the last L.P.A. meeting held in Oklahoma City, there were approximately 700 little people in attendance.

Essie and Lessie's slacks are normal jamaica shorts. They said they have trouble finding shoes, sizes 2 1/2. They buy their clothes in



regular department stores and alter them to fit. There are six sets of identical twins in their family. They are the only midgets and the other five sets are normal sized third generation nieces and nephews.

Essie and Lessie and their niece, Mr. and Mrs. Donald Bowen and family attended the J. L. family reunion at Priest Gulch, Colorado last week. There were sixty-three people there camping out at the reunion and it rained on them everyday they were there.

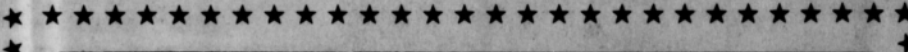
In other business, the school selected the First State Bank, Spearman, as their depository for the next 2 years.

Quarterly Sales Tax Reports Due

AUSTIN--Comptroller Bob Bullock reminded 225,000 retail businesses Monday that July 31 is the dead line for sending in quar-

terly sales tax reports. "Late reports are nothing but headaches for the taxpayer and for the Comptroller's Office," Bullock said. "I'd like to see every quarterly report filed on the deadline." Reports due July 31 cover the April-May-June quarter. Forms for the reports were sent to all sales tax permit holders by Bullock's office in June.

"Most of the delinquent or tardy reports are just oversights and simple mistakes but the consequences under the law are just the same," Bullock said.

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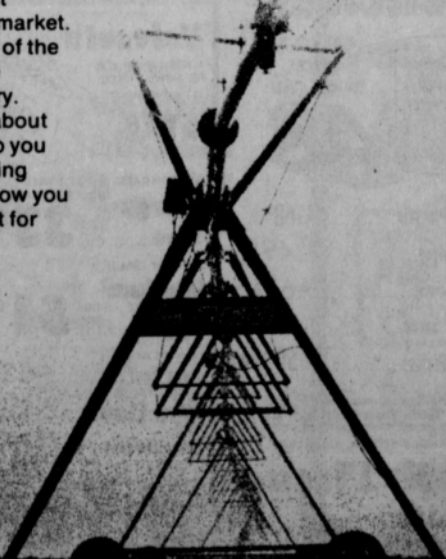

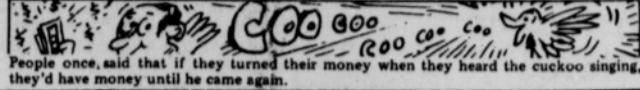

Folks in the agri-business including famers, cow-calf operators, and cattle feeders were polled at the May Texas Beef Conference on what they thought cattle feeding would be like in 1980.

They answered thusly: 72 percent of those polled think Texas will continue to be number one in cattle feeding in 1980; 57 percent think Iowa will provide Texas with the most competition for fed cattle, but then, 25% voted for California for that position. Sixty-one percent think the price of grain sorghum will drop below \$3.50 per cwt by October 1976; and finally, 62 percent think \$4.00 is the most that cattle feeders can pay for milo.

Consumer Food News

If you get a good harvest from your garden this summer, and might want to freeze some of it, so your favorite fruits and vegetables can be "in season" year round.

Freezing is quick and easy. It keeps the natural color, fresh flavor, and nutritive values of most fruits and vegetables. And the U. S. Department of Agriculture has a booklet with tips on choosing ingredients and equipment; preparing, packaging, freezing and suggestions for use. For a copy of HOME FREEZING OF FRUITS AND VEGETABLES send 65 cents to Consumer Information, Dept. 37,

Pueblo, Colorado 81009. The following information is included:

To keep your foods well frozen, use packaging that will prevent evaporation. Materials that are moisture-vapor-proof include glass, metal and rigid plastic. Most bags, wrapping material and waxed cartons made especially for freezing are moisture-vapor resistant.

All containers should be easy to seal. Also, be sure to choose packaging that won't crack from brittleness at low temperatures.

Freeze fruits and vegetables soon after they are packed. Be sure to put no more unfrozen food into a home freezer than it will freeze within 24 hours. Usually this will be about 2 or 3 pounds of food to

each cubic foot of its capacity. Overloading slows down the rate of freezing, and foods that freeze too slowly may lose quality or spoil.

Some fruits and vegetables don't freeze well--included are green onions, lettuce and other salad greens, radishes, and tomatoes (except as juice or cooked).
