## Twenty Girls Enter Beauty Contest

### Entries Needed In Various Roundup Events

Time is getting short for entries in the various events of the Hansford Roundup June 5, 6 and 7.

Mary Lou Wysong, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, said Tuesday that entries are needed for the businessmen's wild cow milking contest to be held Thursday evening, for the preacher's night ribbon roping Friday night, and for the horse flag race Saturday afternoon, and for the ladies calf scramble to be held on Saturday night. Entrants in the ladies calf scramble must be 18 years old, or a non-student or married. Trophies will be given in all three of these events.

Reservations for the flea market must be made at the Chamber of Commerce office by 5 p.m. Friday. This is a new event for the roundup and will start off the activities Thursday at 1 p.m. at the County Show Barn. All proceeds from the rental of spaces will go to the Stationmaster House Museum. Tables can be placed on the cement walk around the sides of the Show Barn. Spaces are \$5.00 each for three days.

The Strate Midwest Show from Kinsley, Kansas will be on hand to help make this year's Hansford Roundup a big success. They have safe and clean rides.

Rodeo performances will be held all three nights of

the Roundup beginning at 8 p.m. Triple M. Rodeo James Martin is the stock contractor. The announcer is Scott Stutzman of Ulysses, Kansas. Clowns are Kenny Becker and Steve Googlymyer of Garden City, Kansas.

Admission is \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for children. 25% of the rodeo profit will be donated to Girlstown, U.S.A. The rodeo will be held at the Oscar Archer Arena.

On the big day Saturday the Old Timers Reunion will be held at 10 a.m. at the Joe Trayler Ford building, sponsored by the Hansford Historical Committee.

The parade will leave the Jr. High at 1 p.m. The parade will assemble at the junior high and will proceed down Townsend Street and East on Kenneth St. and down Main Street and then on Hancock Street to the Rodeo arena where it will disburse. Trophies will be given to 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place in the commercial division. Cash prizes will be given to organizations, \$100.00, \$75.00 and \$50.00. The winners will have a sign on there float when they leave the junior high. The

decorated bicycles will be presented trophies this year.

The Old Time Fiddlers Contest will be immediately following the parade at the Show Barn with Wes Nivens in charge. Cash prizes will be given for 1st, 2nd, 3rd & 4th place this year.

Prizes will be \$75.00, \$50.00, \$25.00, and \$10.00. Trophies will also be presented.

At 2:30 or 3:00 the sack races will begin at the rodeo arena. Gregg Sherwood is in charge of this event. Ribbons will be given too. No entry fee will be requested for the sack races.

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The cow chip throwing contest will follow at the arena.

A horse flag race will also be held Saturday afternoon. This is a new event and will help provide something of interest for everyone.

The barbecue will be at 5 p.m. Tickets are on sale for \$3.00 each and are available at the Chamber of Commerce office, at the KBMF radio station or any Jaycee member.

The final performance of the rodeo will be at 8 p.m. Saturday night.

## Mrs. Gunn Retires From Teaching Cowboy-Indian Last Stand

The following article appeared in the Pampa Daily News Tuesday, May 20, 1975, concerning the retirement of Mrs. Ruby Gunn. Mrs. Gunn taught in Spearman schools for 15 years before going to Pampa where she has taught for the past 18 years.

It has been almost 40 years ago since Mrs. Ruby Gunn, music teacher at Stephen F. Austin School, began her teaching career in Spearman.

"It was just after the Easter Duster (dust storm) of 1935," she remembers.

Today, she is counting the hours until the school-bells of 1975 open a new world for her--retirement.

"I can hardly wait," she said explaining that her husband retired in January. She is retiring early.

"I know I'll miss the classroom, but am looking forward to fishing, golfing, traveling and staying home," she added.

She has spent the past 18 years at Stephen F. Austin School.

"I've loved it here," she said reminiscing over her many years of classroom work.

She recalled the blizzard of those early years along with dust storms, which left classrooms covered with dirt and occasionally topped with snow--especially on one occasion when the window was open.

The school lunch menus have changed since "we paid a nickel or dime for a glob of potatoes with a bread and butter sandwich."

But we were thankful for that," she said.

A graduate of East Texas State University in Commerce, the former Miss Ruby England came to the Texas Panhandle from Greenville, Texas.

Her salary for her first year in Spearman was \$90 monthly.

"I was supposed to make only \$75 per month, but I taught a shorthand class in addition to public school music and earned another \$15," she said.

Miss England married J.E. Gunn, Spearman High School principal, but in 1940 he was promoted to school superintendent.

"I had to quit teaching because they didn't allow the superintendent's wife to teach," she said remembering that times were hard and money was tight.

Three years later, her superintendent husband went into military service and his wife followed him from place to place.

Mrs. Gunn reentered the teaching profession in 1947 in Spearman.

The Gunns, who live at 1319 Williston, Pampa, have one daughter, Mrs. Lynda Shackelford of Canyon. They are expecting their first grandchild in December.

"We intend to stay here," said Mrs. Gunn.

"I'll miss the classroom--one can't teach for 33 years and not have mixed feelings about the work," she said.

The Gunns are active in the work of the First Methodist Church in Pampa.

They are planning a trip to Hawaii in September.

"I hope to keep in touch with the schools through the media," Mrs. Gunn said.

# Income Verification Mandatory

All income received by food stamp recipients must be verified if it is expected to be received during the certification period. This includes total salary and wages, gifts or awards for maintenance and bonuses paid as income (such as the crop bonus commonly given by farmers).

Charges are occasionally made that employers do not report total wages paid to employees, particularly the crop bonus. However, local welfare officials are somewhat skeptical of these reports. Both the employee and employer commit criminal offenses when income is intentionally reported incorrectly to obtain benefits or increase benefits from the food stamp program. Local officials feel it is not likely an employer would conspire with his employees to defraud the government. Employers simply have nothing to gain when their criminal responsibility is taken into consideration. The employer commits a criminal offense when he intentionally signs a false income verification statement. The provisions are contained in the Penal Code of Texas, Section 32.32, subsection b.

It is recognized that some abuse is possible in any program. Consequently, an investigation unit has been created by the State Department of Public Welfare. This unit is composed primarily of former police officers who are familiar with investigative responsibilities and the proper legal procedures. If you have knowledge of any attempts to defraud the government, you should report it immediately to the welfare office at Box 1109, Clarendon, Texas 79226 or telephone 874-3592.

Quoting State Health Department reports, Mrs. Brock said that in the week of April 26 through May 2, a total of sixty TB cases were reported, though the five-year median was fifty-one cases weekly.

"There is still far too much tuberculosis," she pointed out. "TB still kills, cripples, and spreads from the sick to the well. It is far from being whipped. If we had as much typhoid, diphtheria or polio reported, we might consider that we had an epidemic." She added that an area-wide program for parents of asthmatic children is scheduled for the fall in Amarillo's Villa Inn Motel. Details of which will be publicized at a later date.

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### Bids Sought For Gruver Post Office

MEMPHIS, Tenn.--The Postal Service is seeking bids for the construction and leasing of a new post office building at Gruver, Your County Agent

Says

I will be out of the office the first three weeks of June attending graduate school at Texas A&M, taking an entomology course.

If you have problems or the usual questions that you need answers for, call or come by the office. My very capable secretary, Mrs. Norma Jean MacIde, should be able to call on another Agent or Extension Specialist to give you an answer. Also, I will be calling into the office every few days. We'll try not to neglect anyone, just because I'll be out of pocket for three weeks. If you need help, call or come by the office.

Thursday, May 29, there will be a Wheat Field Day Tour at Bushland, Texas at the USDA Research Center. Many interesting research plots can be seen on the tour. Some of these include wheat breeding, weed control, soybean varieties, Trifolium research, barley and oat evaluation, alfalfa research, improved grasses, spring wheats, growth regulators, on wheat, wheat cropping systems, cool season grass research and sprinkler irrigation.

Tours for field day start at 1:00 PM at the Research Center 1 mile west of Bushland on the south side access road to the Research Center. It promises to be a very interesting field day.

This past Tuesday, Dr. Tommy Welch, Area Extension Range and Brush Control Specialist, put out some herbicide plots to see what chemical would best control the sawtooth brush which is beginning to infest some of our better range sites. The plots were put out on the Sanders Ranch and we will be watching and evaluating these plots over the next few years to see what results are obtained.

Although more vegetable varieties are becoming available that have resistance to common diseases, disease control is still a major part of home garden vegetable production.

Proper cultural practices play a major role in the prevention of disease problems. These practices will reduce the need for fungicides later in the season.

The following steps to a disease-free garden are given:

1. Choose a well-drained area.
2. Prepare the soil properly.
3. Plant disease-resistant varieties if they are available.
4. Use disease-free transplants where available.
5. Use fertilizer wisely to encourage maximum growth.
6. Plant crops when the soil temperature is correct to reduce losses from seedling disease.
7. Water properly to reduce foliage diseases, do not sprinkle late in the day.
8. Use mulches around plants to prevent fruit rots.
9. Control weeds as they often serve as hosts for vegetable diseases.
10. Use the proper row spacing to improve air circulation and reduce foliage disease.
11. Alternate plantings of the same crop to prevent buildup of a disease.
12. Rotate crops to prevent a buildup of soil diseases.
13. Control insects as they spread virus diseases.
14. Harvest vegetables at the proper stage of maturity to avoid storage decay.
15. Keep the garden clean of trash and debris where diseases can build up.
16. Use fungicides to control diseases that have become established.

Following these practices will go a long way in keeping disease problems to a minimum in the home vegetable garden. A new publication, "Disease Prevention in the Home Garden," is available at the county Extension office and provides additional information on diseases in vegetable garden.

### Texas Legislative Report

The past week in the House of Representatives was consumed and spent in debate over the financing of public education. In precipitous action, the Public Education Committee had reported favorably by last minute maneuvering a measure that would have required in excess of \$1 billion in new state money.

However, when Speaker Clayton opened debate before the full House on Monday, another less expensive substitute to finance the state's schools had appeared.

The vast differences in opinion and scope of options expressed throughout the state over the preceding two years characterized the House deliberations. In total, three complete approaches were advanced as substitutes. After innumerable amendments, motions and votes, a bill emerged on

Thursday that neither accommodated all nor placated all. Though not the consummate solution, the compromise that eventually addressed the problems within the very real confines of available revenue. It passed second reading by a vote of 74-71 and was finally passed on third reading Friday by a vote of 85-57.

Bearing the name of Public Education Committee Chairman Tom Massey, the "Massey Substitute" to House Bill 1226 was essentially the same bill as offered on Monday supported by Clayton and referred to as the "McAlister amendment."

The Massey substitute as amended calls for an expenditure of \$721 million over the biennium. This exceeds by over \$150 million the amount of state funds predicted to be available. However, the Appropriations Bill has yet to be passed and it is felt that this amount of money can

be found within the available revenue.

The Massey substitute includes provisions for driver education, reimbursement for private transportation to certain parents, compliance with Federal safety standards for school buses, and reduction of the scholastic year from 180 days to 174.

The bill subscribes to the program approach whereby funding is based on classroom teacher units rather than the "weighted pupil" concept as proposed in the Governor's Plan for education.

In the Massey substitute, the standard for allocation of equalization aid is gross ADA (average daily attendance). Beginning in September of this year each district is to receive an additional allotment of \$340.00 per classroom teacher unit for a total of \$1,000.00 per C.T.U. Under the compromise, the local share of the foundation program would remain at 20 per cent, the state retaining 80% of the responsibility.

Over the biennium the economic index will be determined by 1) full taxable value of property other than personal motor vehicles, weighted by fifty and 2) the average income for the county for the 3 preceding years, weighted by fifty. Beginning with the 1977-1978 school year, the economic index will be based upon the full taxable value of property in the county.

Compensatory education would be funded with \$75 million over the biennium and be made available to poor districts on a complicated formula basis. Over half of the \$721 million bill would go for salary increases (a total of \$448 million). The proposal provides an \$8,000 minimum salary for beginning teachers with bachelor's degrees, \$8200 for second year teachers, \$8400 for the third year, \$9000 for the fourth, and an additional 5 per cent of the fourth year base for each succeeding year.
