## City Meeting Held

The regular city council meeting was held Monday evening at city hall.

Outgoing councilmen Dan Desimons and J. K. Hicks were presented framed resolutions commending them for their service to residents of Spearman during their tenure in office. Desimons served 4 years on the council and Hicks has served more than 15 years.

The council voted to review city personnel once each year unless 3 or more council members call for an executive session for such a purpose.

The council tables the proposal to move the police dispatcher from the courthouse back to city hall. For several years, the dispatcher at the courthouse has handled both city and county police dispatching.

The franchise for Spearman Cable TV will be renewed on a month to month basis until a new contract can be worked out.

County Bond Chairman C. A. Gibson announced today that sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Hanford county during the month of March totaled \$4,917.00. Sales for the first quarter of 1975 were \$27,494.00 for 30% of the yearly goal of \$90,000.00.

Sales in Texas amounted to \$18,518,450 during the month while sales for the first three months totaled \$61,992,154 with 26% of the \$234.3 mil. goal achieved.

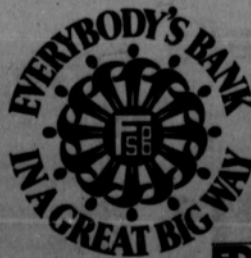

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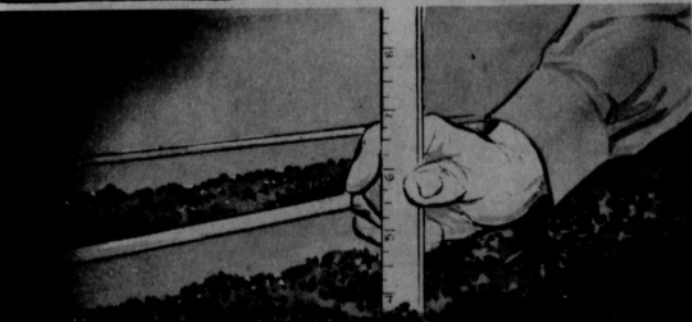



### Tractor School Dates Set

Some of these conditions that allow farmers to work youth under 16 years of age is as follows: the youth be at least 14 years of age, be familiar with the normal working hazards in agriculture, complete 10 hours training on the 4-H tractor program, pass a written examination on tractor safety and demonstrate the ability to operate a tractor with a two-wheeled trailed implement to include backing.

Any youth age 14 or 15 who plans to or wants a job driving a tractor must complete this course and receive a certificate of successful completion. The only exception is where a youth under 16 is employed by his parent on a farm owned or operated by such parent or person.

If any farmers or youth have any questions call the County Extension office, 659-2136 or 733-2901. Youth wanting to take this course must be present at 10:00 a.m. Saturday, May 17 at the Spearman County Agricultural Building. The hours of the course will be from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., May 17; and from 9:00 a.m. until approximately 2:00 p.m., May 24. There will be a lunch break for 1 hour each day. Youth must attend all

### County Agent Says

The Federal Power Commission will conduct hearings in Lubbock, Texas Thursday and Friday in the Federal Courtroom, Federal Building, 1205 Texas Avenue from 9:00 a.m. to about 4:00 p.m.

The purpose of these hearings will be to receive testimony relative to the reclassification of irrigation gas from priority II, Commercial, to priority III, Industrial. This reclassification can result in the curtailment of natural gas service at times of peak consumption, when sufficient gas is unavailable.

If this event should occur it would likely be during peak water use periods such as July or August. Think about how your farming operation would suffer if

your irrigation gas was cut-off in July for 1 or 2 months. There will be a place for interested people to register in the lobby of the Federal Building as I understand it. The testimony is being organized by two attorneys, John Aiken, Herford and Larry Lamb, A. Buquerque, New Mexico.

A meeting to plan and organize the testimony that will be presented is scheduled for Wednesday, at 2:00 p.m. in Plainview at the Farm Bureau office.

All farmers and concerned agri-business people should try to go to Lubbock either Thursday or Friday and at least sign the register in the lobby. As I understand, the only hope irrigation farmers have to reverse this decision is to show-up in force—the more numbers the better chance there is. I believe this geographic area needs to be represented.

You may think you need not be concerned because of your current gas contract. However, in the

future nobody knows what might happen to your contract if this ruling is allowed to remain. Do your part and go to Lubbock if at all possible.

According to a recent USDA release, the 1975 U. S. winter wheat production is forecast at a record 1,620 million bushels, 16 percent above last year's large crop. Acreage for harvest is estimated at 50.5 million compared with 47.1 million last year. Yield per harvested acre is expected to average 32.1 bushels compared with 29.5 bushels last year.

In Texas the wheat crop, based on May 1 conditions, is expected to total 137,500,000 bushels. If realized this will be the largest crop on record and compares with the 1974 crop of only 52,800,000 bushels. Yield per acre is expected to average 25 bushels this year compared to 16 bushels last year, but still short of the record 29 bushels per acre

in 1973. The rains last week-end and Monday night have done a lot for our local wheat crop. Dryland suffered a lot the last two weeks. However, the fields that are still alive when the rains came, have a chance now of making a little wheat.

If you're the type of person who likes to move and rearrange furniture every now and then, container gardening is for you. With container gardening every kind of plant from petunias to pine trees can be grown and moved whenever or wherever your fancies dictate.

Shrubs, trees, vines or plants of any kind can be moved from indoors to outdoors, from front yard to patio, or from living room to kitchen at any time. You can beautify a new garden instantly with pots of geraniums, begonias or petunias.

It's important to get suitable containers for plants, wooden boxes, tubs, bar-

rel halves or clay pots with good drainage are best. If you decide to use wooden containers, get those made of moisture resistant wood such as cedar or redwood. Of course, all containers should have drainage holes. Use a porous, yet moisture, retaining soil.

Because container grown plants dry out much faster than those grown in the ground, frequent watering is required. During hot weather, daily watering may be necessary. Frequent watering will cause plant nutrients to wash out of the soil more quickly, so use a complete plant food about once every three weeks after plants are established.

Plan the moving of plants in advance so they can be moved when the soil is somewhat dry. This reduces their weight considerably. Also, move containers on a dolly, wagon, or piece of canvas to make the trip faster.
