By Bob Close By DOD ClOSE we are now into the last month of the regular session of the 64th Legislature. The session will end in ac-condance with the State Constitution after the ex-piration of 140 days which this year, will be June 2, 1975. The daily sessions have been running longer and the committee hearings later. We have reached the point where it is becoming critical as to whether or not bills still in committee or waiting assignment to not bills still in committee or waiting asignment to the calendar by the Cal-endars Committee will have a chance to complete the legislative process. Soon we will begin delib-erations on the Appropria-tions bill, Public School Financing has been finally reported out by the sub-committee and was con-

committee on Public Edu-cation on the evening of May 1st. A subcommittee in the State Affairs Committee has not reported out a pro-posed state utility com-mission bill. There has been a tre-mendous amount of interest in school finance and the various issued involved. The subcommittee of the Public Education Commit-tee on School finance has made the following propo-sals: 1) That the salary of reachers and professionals be increased by \$140 per month across the board bringing the base teacher subcommittee to salaries for para-professionals by \$250 across the board. 2) It increases current operating costs by \$240 per classroom teacher unit, from \$660 per CT U \$1,000 per CTU. 3) It would increase funding for transportation by 75% under the current method of allocation. 4) It continues the 80% local financing and 20%





Texas cov-ers such a wide area that state totals alone do not provide adequate informa-tion on Texas' most basic industry--agric ulture. The Texas Legislature has provided a program of es-timates for each county. This is a cooperative ef-fort of the USDA's Statisti-cal Reporting Service and The Texas Department of







cultural Statistician In Charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Texas. This information will be the basis for determining the planted acreage for the state of Texas and for each courty. Texas cov-

cal Reporting Service and The Texas Department of Agriculture. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning pro-duction and marketings and in providing an un-biased picture of Texas agriculture. Farmers who receive questionnaires are urged to complete and return them by mail. All individual reports are com-
