### Safety Rules Listed For Kite Flying

Potentially dangerous toys have been very much in the news in recent months, and parents will do well to add to the list kites consaining metal, and kite strings with meta content or which have be-

come wet.

This is a combination which can pose a threat of death or serious injury to persons who fly kites in the vicinity of electric power times, according to C.D. Riggins, Spearman district manager for Community Public Service Company, who offered the following list of safety rules.

1. A brays use dry string, ho wire or metal in string or kite. 2. Don't fly your kite in the rain.

2. Avoid TV and radio aerfals, as well as busy streets and highways.

4. Fly your kite away from power lines, but IF your kite gets snagged in a power line, do not pull the string, or climb the pole. Call the power company:

3. Sustained abstinence after the drinking pattern has been interrupted using.


