License Plates Go On Sale

Spearman and Texas motorists began acquiring license plates Monday that might outlast the vehicles to which they will be attached.

The new license plates are designed to last for five years, beginning in 1975, and next year the same plates will be used with a detachable inset for the new year.

The new plates are of heavier steel and are reflectorized. The plates have black letters and numerals on a white field.

Hansford county has 3,610 passenger plates this year, with identification numbers being AOZ, ARA, ARB, ARC, and ARD.

Including license plates for passenger cars, the county has a total of 7835 tags including a wide variety of permits for trucks, motorcycles, tractors, etc.

Plates went on sale Monday, Feb. 3 and must be affixed to the motor vehicle by midnight April 1.

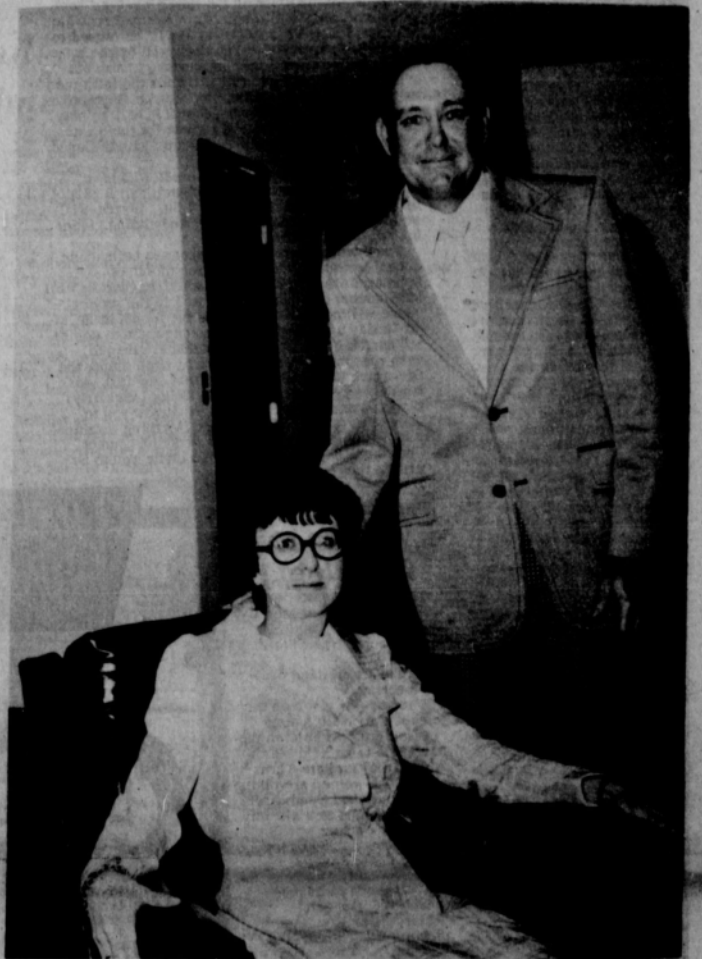
The state of Texas hopes to save \$5.5 million on the multi-year license plates. Each registered vehicle owner has received a notice through the mail and can purchase plates by mail by paying the \$1.00 fee.

There is no change in the fees collected for license plates in Texas, the amount depending upon the classification and weight of the vehicle. Multi-year plates were used in Texas during the war years of 1943 and 1944, with metal tabs renewing the 1942 plates. Windshield stickers were used in 1947.

One way you can save money on the household budget is to reduce appliance service calls. When you have a service man come you usually pay mileage, plus salary, driving time to and from your home, maintenance of trucks and tools, overhead, etc. The saddest thing is that nearly half of all service calls are the result of improper operation of the appliance or a minor repair you could do yourself.

If you have an appliance that is acting up read your owners manual. Often it will have the answer. We have in our office files for several appliances should you need them and no longer have your service manuals.

Another way to save some money is to really use your food freezer. Or you may consider purchasing one. Industry experts estimate that by 1976 there will be an increase of 33% in the number of frozen goods available. For the past two years the sale of food freezers has been up 33% each year from the year before.

Use your freezer by rotating the food supply - don't use it for a store house. Food items will get too old to be good if not used within a reasonable length of time. You can freeze such fresh items as milk, bread, butter, eggs and even whipped cream! We do have a copy of a time table for length of storage of various items. Call or come by for your free copy.

Left overs of vegetables, too little for another serving can be frozen for use in soup. Chopped onion, chopped green pepper, and chopped parsley can be wrapped in recipe size portions and frozen for use in casseroles, skillet meals, etc. Toss old bread and roll into crumbs to freeze for later use to bread fish, chops, etc. Sweetened whipped cream can be frozen in dollops on waxed paper in a freezer container for use within 6-8 weeks.

And by all means freeze your excess garden produce. Take advantage of sales on frozen items, meat, poultry, etc. But remember nothing is a bargain if you don't need it.

The monthly topic on Ash Wednesday was presented by Joann Farr. Mary Allen gave the program on "Cancer and Women."

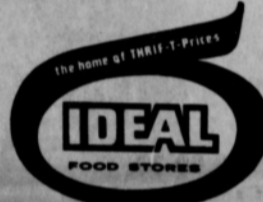

MARCH OF DIMES SCHEDULED

Last year with the help of volunteer workers and through the generosity of the people of Hansford County the amount of \$2315.77 was collected. \$1422.35 was sent to the National Office to be distributed for research grants; \$97.61 was spent on supplies; \$449.73 was spent on a Health Career Scholarship to Miss Barbara Farr. She is presently enrolled in Pre-Nursing Studies at Frank Phillips College. \$1625.08 is the balance of funds available for local use, this figure includes \$1470.04, a balance from previous years.

March of Dimes Day in Hansford County will be February 23, 1975, weather permitting, and volunteers are needed for the Mother's March and to assist in the mail campaign, the First State Bank furnishes the addressograph

machine and personnel. Volunteers are asked to call Ruth or Joe Dan Bryan at 659-2337.

Human genetics is one of the lasting mysteries of life. But some of its tragic aspects have become less unpredictable since the National Foundation, March of Dimes, turned its attention to birth defects in recent years after its marked success in the war against polio.

Primary aim of the campaign against birth defects is to prevent them as far as possible, or when that is not possible to reverse or mitigate the damaging effects.

Amniocentesis, or withdrawing samples of amniotic fluid through a hollow needle, has made possible the prediction of certain inherited conditions or biochemical defects, so

that remedial measures can be started immediately after birth.

Genetic counseling, a branch of science that has to do with heredity, is available in about three-fourths of the March of Dimes Birth Defects Centers across the country, to give counseling or referral service to couples who have had one child with a birth defect. For instance, maternal infection with rubella or German measles during pregnancy can cause severe birth defects, but these affect only the child in the womb at the time the mother had the infection.

NOT ALL BIRTH DEFECTS are apparent in the newborn child: cystic fibrosis or Tay-Sachs disease may appear up to six months after, and sickle cell anemia from six months on. Duchenne muscular dystro-

phy may appear when the child is 2 to 4 years old. Wilson's disease from 8 to 20 years after birth and glaucoma from the late 30s on.

The prediction of inborn metabolic errors by analysis of fetal cells is only one form of prenatal diagnosis of genetic defects. The National Foundation's research program supports the seeking of new knowledge in prevention or treatment of birth defects as well as new knowledge of genetic possibilities.

The Mothers March in January has become the largest single source of income for the March of Dimes research, education and medical services program. In the 25 years since the March of Dimes began, the crusade that helped make the victory over polio a reality, more than \$200

million has been raised for life-saving programs, and the fight against birth defects is the current focus of attention.

Birth Defects Centers in Texas provide diagnosis and treatment by teams of medical experts in Santa Rosa Medical Center of San Antonio, the University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston, Texas Children's Hospital of Houston and the Department of Pediatrics of the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School in Dallas.

Any child referred by a physician for evaluation and treatment for a birth defect is eligible for the centers.

Keynote for the Mothers March is leadership and organization. The March of Dimes, begun 25 years ago, helped build and continues to help support the Salk In-

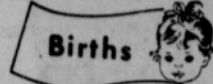
stitute Laboratory of Life in San Diego, Calif., founded in 1960 under the direction of Dr. Jonas Salk, who developed the first effective vaccine against polio.

Notice To Out-Of-State Vehicle Owners

Persons who have out-of-state titles and plan to register their vehicles in Texas for 1975 are requested to do so in the month of February.

The original out-of-state title must be surrendered at the time Application for Texas Title is made. Applications are to be filed with the County Tax Assessor in the courthouse.

Finance companies and banks are hesitant to release original titles to the owner when they have a lien on the vehicle. In these instances, the owner must call or write the lienholder and request that the title be mailed directly to the Tax Office. The correct mailing address of the Hansford County Tax Office is Box 1057, Spearman, Texas. It needs to be made clear

to the lienholder that they will be shown as lienholder on the new Texas title.

Before registering an out-of-state vehicle, the Serial Number must be inspected by a law enforcement officer, and an Identification Certificate must be signed. Any County Deputy, City Policeman, or Highway Patrolman may sign these certificates.

March, of course, is the heaviest vehicle registration month in Texas, with the deadline of April 1. Thus, if out-of-state titles could be processed in February, it would be less confusing to the owner of the vehicle and the Tax Office personnel.

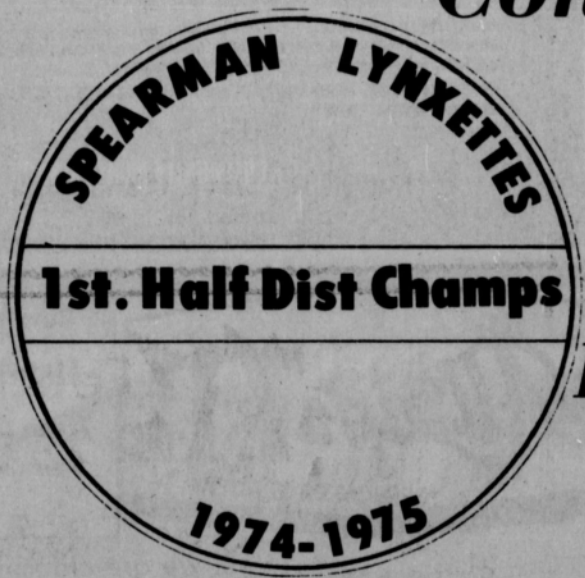

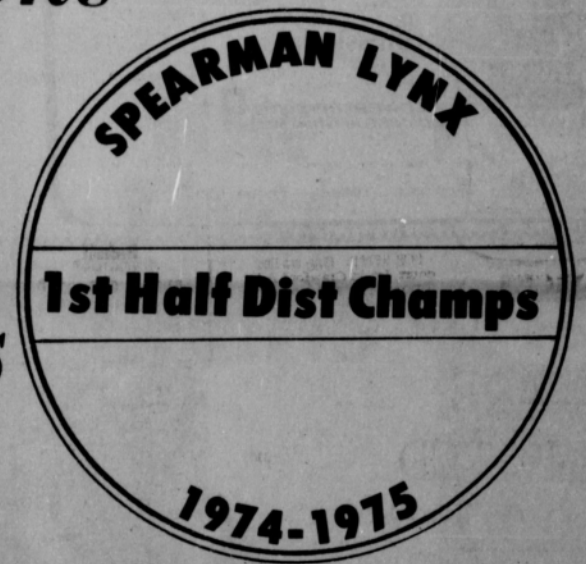

Your Social Security

Needy aged, blind, and disabled people in Texas received nearly 397.2 million more in government assistance payments under the new Supplemental Security Income (SSI) Program in 1974 than under the prior Federal - State Assistance Plan in 1973, and about 53.9 thousand more residents of Texas were eligible for such payments. The Dallas Regional Social Security Office reported today.

In a year-end summary of the impact in Texas of the first calendar year of SSI, it was noted that total federal-state spending for the aged, blind, and disabled in Texas increased by 67%, from \$144.3 million in 1973 to \$241.5 million in 1974 under SSI. While state expenditures dropped from \$35.9 million to none, Federal expenditures rose by \$133.1 million, to \$241.5 million. The number of beneficiaries rose from 206 thousand to 258.9 thousand.

There are still some transitional problems as might be expected in launching any program as vast and ambitious as SSI. But the figures indicate that SSI is achieving its goals, through the combined efforts of the federal and state governments--the state utilizing its greater proximity and flexibility to determine and meet local needs, and the federal government using its national organization and payment processing ability to provide basic payments for the needy in a program that combines respect for individual dignity with concern for the efficient dispensing of public funds.

The program was designed to provide a basic floor of income protection for the needy aged, blind, and disabled upon which each state could build according to its needs and financial resources. In Texas, eligibility for SSI also automatically qualifies the beneficiary to Medicaid.

The implementation of the SSI program was the largest undertaking by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare since Medicare. Although the Social Security Administration already had experienced with large-scale recordkeeping systems and had a nationwide network of offices, SSI required the development of what was essentially an entirely new system and new instructions and procedures to be responsive to the requirements of the new program. SSI payments--like social security benefits--are now geared to the consumer price index and will rise as the cost-of-living increases.

Rural Hero Search Underway

A search is underway for the Texas' Rural Hero of 1974 with the Rural Heroism Award, sponsored by the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council to be presented to some deserving person who has performed an act of exceptional bravery during a time of crisis. All entries must be submitted by February 15, 1975 to the Rural Heroism Award Committee, Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, Box 489, Waco, Texas, 76703, according to Ben Ballard, Assistant Safety Director for the Texas Farm Bureau. The heroic act must have occurred within the legal boundaries of Texas during the year 1974 and must be related to farming or ranching operations.

Nominations should include a written account of the incident and the names of those involved. Newspaper clippings and pictures should also be sent with the article if these are available.

Texas Legislative Report

The second week of this session of the Legislature has been a busy one. Over 300 bills have been introduced in the House of Representatives and over 100 bills in the Senate. Both the Governor and the Lieutenant Governor have made strong pleas for economical and efficient government and quality education. The Speaker, Bill Clayton, has completed his committee assignments. For the first time since reconstruction days, Republicans have been appointed as committee chairmen. Ray Hutchinson of Dallas is the new Chairman of the Constitutional Revision Committee. Tom Craddock of Midland is the chairman of the Natural Resources Committee. Both of these men are considered competent and qualified for the positions. I was appointed to serve on each of these committees and I will be reporting their activities from time to time.

The new rules of the House adopted last week provide for one preferred bill for each member. This bill would have preference over all other bills on the calendar. A drawing was held and guess who drew NUMBER 1. That is the first time I ever remember winning a drawing.

The Chaplain of the House, Dr. Ralph Smith, is the pastor of the Hyde Park Baptist Church in Austin. He is more than willing for visiting ministers to give the morning prayer. I have scheduled my minister, Rev. Bob Daniel, to give the opening prayer for the session on Monday, February 3rd. I would be more than glad to schedule other ministers from our area to do this at any time during the session. All I would need would be just a little advance notice.

Each House member is allotted 15 copies of the House Journal. The House Journal contains a complete report of all of the proceedings of the House while in session. I am having a copy of the House Journal sent to the following locations in the following counties so that they will be available to be read by any interested person: Perry Memorial Library, Perryton; Hansford County Library, Spearman; Kilgore Memorial Library, Dumas; Hemphill County Library, Canadian; Hutchinson County Library, Borger; Judge G. A. Green, Channing; Judge Newton Cox, Miami; Judge Warren Jenkins, Lipscomb; Judge Henson, Dalhart; Judge W. S. Prizzell, Jr., Stratford.

For several sessions the various House members have established a prayer coffee here at the Capitol on Tuesday mornings of each week. The Speaker is a member of this group. The first meeting of the group was held Tuesday morning on January 28th and was very inspirational.

The Governor has proposed emergency legislation to appropriate \$90 million effective February 1 for the state employees pay raise. This proposal calls for an across-the-board 10% pay raise together with emergency travel expense reimbursement and additional participation in group insurance plans. Senate Bill 1 which was passed by the Senate prescribes different percentage increases and will cost approximately \$110 million. The House Appropriations Committee has held hearings on the bill the last two days and this matter is to come up on the House Floor today. Like a lot of questions that come up, there will be a wide difference of opinion on this question. The word is that the Governor will veto any appropriations for this purpose in excess of \$90 million. The problem raises a question as to the purpose of this proposed legislation. Is it for a cost of living increase or is it for the purpose of providing increases based on need. The matter will be fully debated on the Floor today.

IRS NEWS

Amarillo, Texas---Married taxpayers filing either joint or separate tax returns this year should make sure that the social security numbers of both husband and wife appear on each return filed, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) said today.

Ronald Archer, Director of the Amarillo IRS office, said that the IRS computer system identifies returns according to social security numbers and an incorrect or missing number can cause a delay of weeks or months in getting a refund out to a taxpayer.

Additionally, he said, the number must be correct to ensure that the taxpayer will get full credit for his or her contributions under the social security and medicare programs. For this reason any name changes should be reported to the local Social Security Administration office.

One way for taxpayers to be sure their return is correctly numbered is to use the pre-addressed label on the tax package sent out by the IRS. Double check the

numbers, Archer said, and if there is a mistake it should be corrected on the label itself.

"The pre-addressed labels help us keep the numbers straight," Archer said, "and they speed the processing of the returns. At this point in the filing season a labeled return with the correct social security numbers can produce a refund for the taxpayer within five weeks. As April 15 approaches, the wait for the refund could be as long as twelve weeks. My advice is to file early and make sure the numbers are correct."

Many spouses operate in a tit-for-tat system whereby if the wife performs and behaves in a manner desired by her husband, then the husband behaves to please the wife. This system implies a revengeful motivation and is detrimental to good relations. Dorothy Taylor, family life education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, points out.

Perryton Seeks Designation As Growth Center Area

The mayor of Perryton, Harold Courson, has been selected as one of the two directors from the top six counties in the Panhandle. Courson reported on the recent meeting and said the most important business for this area conducted at the meeting was a move to designate Perryton as a growth center. He explained that such a designation would mean increased possibilities of federal loans at low interest rates and grants for both established and new businesses and industries in the area.

Five cities were recommended for such a designation, Amarillo, Tulla, Clarendon, Perryton and Berger. The PRPC director explained that while Amarillo is sure to be so designated, the second choice should be Perryton if there is more than one. Perryton meets the criteria for designation as a growth center. The requirements include: 1. a city within an hour's drive from an economically depressed area. 2. Increase in population for the past ten years. 3. Offer advanced college level education. Hansford and Lipscomb counties have been designated as economically depressed areas, and both are less than 30 minutes from Perryton. Perryton also offers college level courses

from Frank Phillips College and courses from both West Texas State University and Panhandle State University are planned through the Perryton School system. Courson said "in general, Perryton fulfills every criteria for such a designation while many other areas and cities in the Panhandle do not."

On the plus side for the possibility of having Perryton designated a growth center is the fact that Judge Warren Jenkins of Lipscomb County has been elected chairman of the PRPC. Also on the board of directors is Pat Waters of Canadian, a member of the Canadian city council. Cities or counties in the area with any type of problem they would like help with should contact Courson or Waters to get the problem taken to the PRPC.

"The PRPC will make their recommendations of the subject to the Economic Development Administration, a part of the Department of Commerce, where the final decision as to the designations will be made.

Benefits from the designation as growth center are numerous, such as more money for things like housing, one area of critical importance and short supply in this area now.

"Long term low interest financing that would become

available should Perryton receive the designation would make it much easier for new industries to come into the area

and would make it much easier to finance housing projects to go along with those industries," Courson said. "Also, already established businesses could take advantage of the loans at a much lower rate of interest than they could get elsewhere," he added.

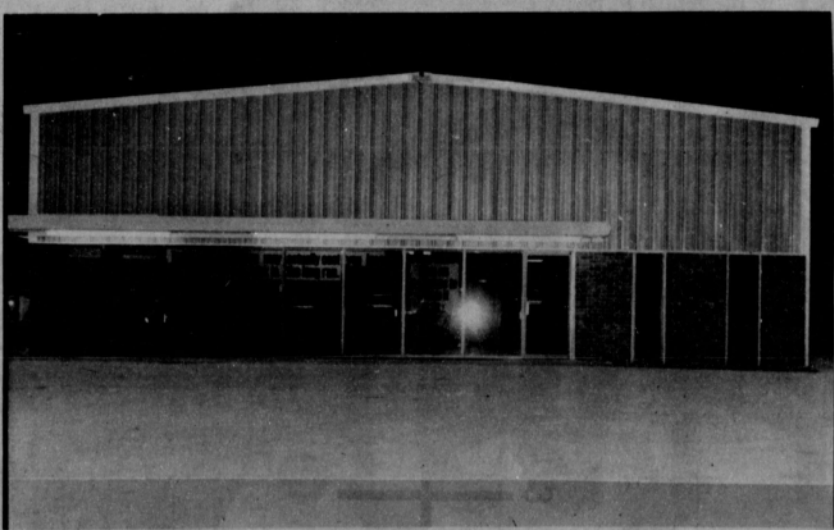

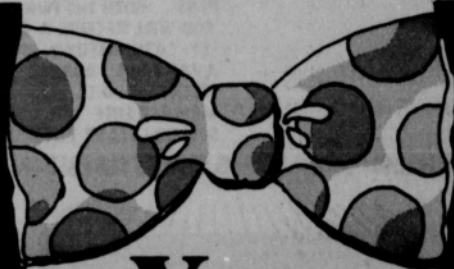

Spearman Girls Upset by Phillips

PHILLIPS — Phillips' girls, with the help of a productive third quarter, edged visiting Spearman, 70-65, for the first time in the history of the school Tuesday here at Blackhawk gym.

It was a crucial District 1-AA cage win for Phillips, giving the hosts control of the second-round of play with two wins and no losses while Spearman, the first-round winner with a perfect 3-0 mark, dropped to 2-1.

Spearman won the first round in district battle, 66-64, over Phillips at Spearman. If both teams win their final district game, a playoff would decide the title.

Spearman's boys kept a perfect district record with a 59-49 win over Phillips. Spearman's boys moved to 14-2 on the season and 5-0 in district play while Phillips dropped to 2-4 in loop play and 9-15 overall.

Phillips outscored the Lynxettes, 23-10, in the crucial third period with 6-2 post Jill Rankin scoring 17 of her final 43 points. The Blackhawkettes turned the ball over only once in the third quarter while forcing Spearman to give up the ball 10 times.

Spearman hit 28 field goals in the contest while holding

Phillips to 23, but from the deciding free-throw line, Phillips hit 24 of 43 (56 per cent) and Spearman hit seven of 20 (35 per cent).

Mary Ann Clemmons, who scored 23 points for Phillips, connected on 17 of 20 free throws.

Spearman fought back to within five points (65-60) with 2:32 left in the final period when Spearman's Carla Harper stole the ball and laid it in.

"They got cold and we got hot in the third quarter," said Phillips coach Bill Clemmons, "and that was the difference in the ball game. The hustle and determination of my guards helped as much as anything too."

Phillips opened up its biggest lead, 13 points, with 1:02 left in the third quarter as Miss Rankin hit one of her turn-around jumpers from eight feet out and Phillips took a 54-41 lead.

Spearman lost all-state guard Becky Wheeler with 12 seconds before the third quarter ended when she committed her fifth personal foul, and 5-9 post guard Kristi Gressett left the game four minutes into the fourth quarter. For the game, Phillips fouled 17 times while Spearman committed 24 fouls.

With 5:48 left in the first quarter, Spearman took the lead by one point on an eight-foot jumper by Janyth Lakey, who scored 14 of Spearman's 17 first-quarter points. The Lynxettes kept the lead until Miss Rankin hit a six-foot jump shot to give Phillips a 29-28 edge with 2:43 to play in the second quarter.

Miss Rankin, only a junior and averaging 40.1 points a game, led all scorers with her 43 counters followed by Miss Clemmons' 23 points.

For Spearman, will three forwards split the scoring with Michelle Schumann and Miss Lakey hitting 24 each and Miss Harper added 17 counters.

Pacing Spearman's boys were William Porter who hit 15 points while Roger Jones and Roger Brown scored 14 each. Denny Roark led Phillips' with 9 counters.

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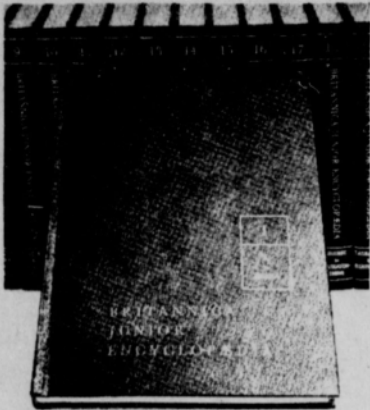
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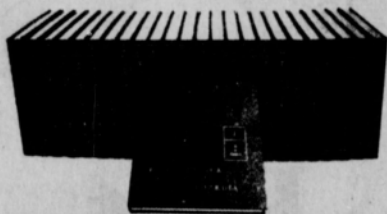
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
