The 1974 outgoing president, G. K. Rupprecht was honored by the entire community, for his work and dedication to the community. G. K. was awarded a complete set of Hansford county memorial coins for his work with the Chamber this year.

Nelle's News

Potatoes are a popular staple food of Americans. Here are some hints on the use of potatoes.

Insert an aluminum or stainless steel kitchen nail into each potato before placing in the oven. This will promote uniform baking. Don't ever attempt to bake a full-skin, mature potato without puncturing the skin—it might explode.

Peel only a narrow strip around Irish potatoes to be boiled. The skin will then come off easily when the potatoes are cooked.

If your soup is too salty, cut a raw potato in half and put it in a small kettle of soup. Boil for a short time until the over-saltiness disappears. Then remove the potato.

Hot milk is better than cold milk for adding to potatoes to be mashed. A teaspoon of baking powder added before mashing will make them light and creamy, especially if they're whipped briskly.

Sprinkle sliced potatoes to be fried with a pinch of flour to make them a golden brown.

Record supplies of onions are now coming to the market. Yellow globes and Spanish onions will be in heavy supply in February.

Onion rings are rising in popularity. It's less expensive to make them yourself while onion supplies are plentiful. You can prepare them and keep them frozen until they are to be used.

Place frozen rings on a baking sheet and heat in a 450 F. oven for about 5 minutes.

One of the newer recipes made with a buttermilk batter gives them a golden, puffed coating. Sweet Spanish onions are especially good for rings. Cut two of them in half-inch rings. Dip each ring in a batter of 2 eggs, 1 1/4 c. buttermilk, 1 1/2 T. salad oil, 1 1/4 c. flour, 1 t. salt, 1 1/4 t. baking powder. Dip and fry a few at a time in deep fat heated to 375 F. Drain on a paper towel then sprinkle with salt. Keep warm in the oven until ready to serve or freeze immediately.

FARMERS TO BE IN SURVEY

A comprehensive survey to determine costs of wheat, corn and other feed grains, cotton, soybeans, milk and selected commodities will include information from Hansford County farmers.

Charles E. Caudill, Statistician in Charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, said the national data collecting effort will get underway in late January. Hansford County producers and those in other parts of the country will be personally contacted for information about their 1974 costs of production. Costs of labor, power and equipment, fertilizer and chemicals, storage, drying, and other similar outlays will be determined. All responses will be confidential and only State, regional, and national summaries will be issued.

The survey will be conducted annually to identify production practices and establish current national average costs of producing farm commodities. The information will be of major usefulness in identifying and updating budgets for crop and livestock enterprises. The survey results will also provide production costs which may be used as determinants of target price or price support levels.

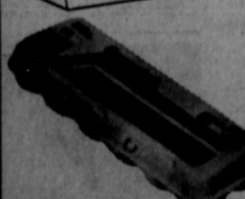

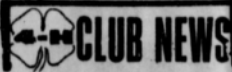
He was a farmer and a member of the First Baptist Church here.

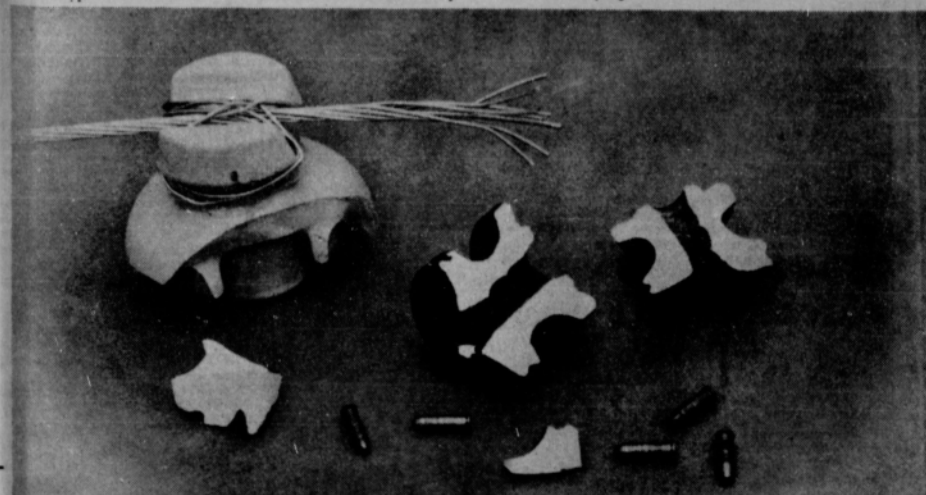

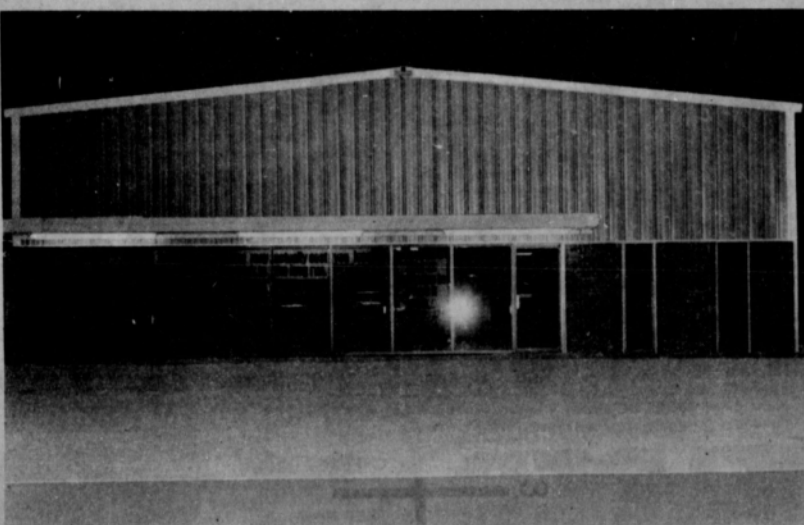

TEXAS PLACE NAMES:
HANSFORD COUNTY
BY Dr. Donald A. Gill

"What's in a name?" If Shakespeare had thought more deeply about that question, perhaps he would not have had Juliet ask it. To some people, a great deal lies in a name, es-

pecially in a place name. Each name that lies on this land of ours is indicative of the people who live here, and it reveals the history, the folklore, the every-day events that happen to these people.

Listed below are the name origins of all the place names which appear on the General Highway Map of Hansford County:

BARNES AIRFIELD. W. B. Barnes owns the private airstrip.

BERNSTEIN. John Bernstein was an early settler and land owner.

BERNSTEIN GAS FIELD. The gas field was named for the town of Bernstein.

COLDWATER CREEK. The name describes the water in the creek.

FARWELL. An early surveyor named Farwell plotted much of the land north of the Canadian River.

FRISCO CREEK. Origin unknown.

GRUVER. J. H. Gruver and his son, Lawrence, es-

tablished a ranch nine miles west of town in the early 1900's.

HACKBERRY CREEK. Hackberry trees grow along the stream.

HANNA'S DRAW. The creek flows through the Hanna Ranch, owned by the Hanna family.

HANSFORD. The present-day ghost town was named for the county.

HANSFORD COUNTY. Created in 1876 from Bexar and Young Territories and organized in 1889 with Hansford as its county seat.

HANSFORD MORROW OIL FIELD. The ghost town of Hansford gave its name to this oil field which is located in the Morrow geological zone.

HANSFORD NORTH OIL FIELD. The ghost town of Hansford gave its name to this oil field which is located north of the town.

HART AIRFIELD. Donald Hart owns the landing strip.

HITCHLAND. J. H. and

Charles H. Hitch were settlers and landowners in this vicinity.

HORIZON CLEVELAND OIL FIELD. The Horizon Oil Company began this oil field in the Cleveland zone.

HORSE CREEK. Wild horses ranged along the creek in early days.

KIMBALL. Mabel E. Kimball was an early settler in the county.

McKIBBEN. Mr. McKibben was a railroad official of the North Texas and Santa Fe Railroad.

MILLERS LAKE. S. P. Miller originally owned the property on which this lake is located.

MORSE. Charles A. Morse was chief engineer of the North Texas and Santa Fe Railroad.

OSLO. The name of this present-day ghost town was derived from the idea which Mr. Mordt, owner of A. L. Mordt Land Company, had for a little Oslo in Texas as in Norway. Mordt had married a Scandinavian girl, daughter of a man who own-

ed a Chicago newspaper. He advertised in the Chicago paper in 1909 that land was for sale and settlement on the Anderson-Thompson Ranch.

OSLO LUTHERAN CHURCH. The church was named for the town of Oslo and is all that remains of the town.

PALO DURO CREEK (NORTH AND SOUTH). The creek was named for Palo Duro Canyon in Randall and Armstrong Counties.

PHILLIPS CAMP. This oil camp was named for Phillips Petroleum Company.

RECORD. The Record was an early-day ranch foreman.

SOUTH BERNSTEIN. This railroad switch was named for the town of Bernstein.

SPEARMAN. Thomas C. Spearman was an employee of the North Texas and Santa Fe Railroad.

SPEARMAN AIRFIELD. The airfield was named for Spearman, the town which it serves.

TWIN MORROW OIL FIELD. The oil field was named in honor of dually completed wells in the

Morrow zone.

WILBANKS AIRFIELD. J. D. Wilbanks owns the farm on which the private landing strip is located.

the lowest for January since 1965.

Placements in the 23 states for the last quarter of 1974 were down 20 percent from 1973 and 32 percent below 1972. Marketings of fed cattle for slaughter during the last quarter was down 14 percent from a year earlier and 13 percent below 1972.

In Texas on January 1, there were 1,327,000 cattle on feed, which is 40 percent below the level of a year earlier and down 7 percent below the level of a year earlier and down 7 percent from a month earlier. This is the smallest number on feed in Texas since June 1, 1970.

Placements in Texas feedlots during the last 3 months are down 40 percent from a year earlier at a level of 595,000 head. Meanwhile marketings totaled 867,000 during this quarter, a 22 percent reduction from 1973 levels.

Texas feedlot operators reported intentions to market 850,000 cattle between January 1 and March 31. This would be 64 percent of the number on feed January 1 and would be 13 percent lower than marketed during the same period of 1974.

USDA has issued the following prospective acreage plans for 1975 crops: Corn - 76.1 million acres, down less than 1 percent from a year earlier; Sorghum - 19.4 million acres, a 10 percent increase; Soybeans - 57.1 million acres, up 8 percent from last year; Durum wheat - 4.5 million acres, a 10 percent increase and other spring wheats - 14 million acres, down 4 percent.

With the price drop during recent weeks on both cattle and grain, I sure believe our farmers had better play their cards pretty conservatively this year. Comments made by several farmers lately indicate they may reduce acres planted a little to enable them to better manage and care for the acres in production this year. We have all seen and experienced what has happened to the cattle situation over the past year and a half. The handwriting may be on the wall for the same to happen to grain prices this year. Let's hope grain prices strengthen, because with today's costs, who knows what it will cost to produce a bushel of corn or 100 lbs. of sorghum this year by harvest time.

A lot of interest has been shown during the last month in sending in soil samples to get fertilizer recommendations. The results from the samples submitted to our Extension Service Soil Testing Lab located at Lubbock, have shown quite a lot of variation from one field to another in residual or carry-over of prior fertilizers. Some fields are shown to need only relative small amounts - 40 to 80 pounds - of additional nitrogen. A few fields even indicate enough carryover to not require any fertilization this year.

I recommend you use the Extension Service Lab at Lubbock. James Valentini, who makes the recommendations and supervises the lab, correlates his recommendations with years of research results that were carried out over the Panhandle area by Experiment Station personnel. We have sample boxes and information sheets available in the office and the charge is \$2 per field sample.

City Representatives Attend Austin Hearing

The city council had a short meeting Monday evening.

They authorized city manager Ed Thompson to tie in the additional gas supply from Transwestern. Mr. Thompson said this would take about two weeks of work and would be done with no disruption of service and no outside help other than some welding. The additional gas is available from Transwestern from November to April through a trade-out with High Plains, whereby the gas utility replaces the gas to Transwestern.

The council made appointments to the airport and library board. These will be announced later after the appointees have been contacted.

The PWP program was discussed and Mark Neff, assistant city manager, went to Lubbock Wednesday to get further details on the program. These funds could be used in the area of the summer recreation program with perhaps the addition of crafts, etc., and youth training.

The decision on renaming 11th Ave. "Purple Pride Avenue" was tabled. Councilmen suggested that residents on the street be contacted about such a change. It was proposed that perhaps the street should remain 11th Ave. on either end and be renamed Purple Pride Avenue near the high school area.

The filing deadline for the city election scheduled for April 5 is March 6. As of press time no one had filed for the three councilmen terms up for election. Terms will expire for Dan Desimone, J. K. Hicks and A. Ron Ellsworth.

In other city news, Manager Thompson, stated that he is trying to get some work done through the Texas Highway Dept. concerning better drainage at 7th and 11th on Hwy 659, the ditch at Martin's Steak Garden, improve-

ments on Kenneth through the city and sign changes and construction.

City manager Thompson, city attorney J. E. Blackburn, Mayor Coy Palmer, and councilman A. Ron Ellsworth along with Wayne Brown, CPA of Pampa, and Bill McMorris of Amarillo attended the hearing before the Railroad Commission in Austin Friday concerning the rate increase being asked by High Plains Gas Co. The city was represented by a representative of the law firm of McGinnis, Lockridge and Kilgore of Austin. This lawyer was unable to cross examine Mr. Ballan who presented High Plains case to the commission but was able to question him to clarify statements. High Plains

is asking for a rate increase of 90¢ mcf effective immediately.

The city will present their case before the commission probably March 3. In the meantime they will examine the company's books and conduct a pipe survey.

In connection with the hiring of a professional fireman for the city, Thompson stated that as yet the city has received no authorization from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission for funds to hire such personnel and until these funds are forthcoming the city will not be able to hire anyone to fill this position. He stated that the city does have an application from a highly qualified man for the position should it become available.
