Lynx Demolish Amarillo Team 55-43 Monday Night!!

Terrific Terril Brummett lead the Lynx to a triumph over Alamo Catholic at Lynx gym Monday night, hitting 19 points. Porter hit 12, Roger Jones 10, McMullan 8, Harper 2, Hagerman 2, and Haner 2, to round out the scoring. However, the key to the Lynx victory was outstanding defense, as well as smooth ball handling.

The Lynx had only 5 turnovers for the night, compared to 9 by the Alamo team; this was the lowest number of turnovers for the Lynx this far; they are still getting into foul trouble, but they can't quite work all of the football out of their system. Roger Jones fouled out early in the 4th period, but his teammates carried the game right to the Alamo boys, and continued to pound them.

In other basketball action last week, the Lynx won 2nd place in the Canadian tournament, by defeating Wheeler in the semi-finals, and finally losing to Canadian 43-40 for the championship. In the championship game, Foster hit 15 points, and he and Roger Jones were named to the All-Tournament team for their fine efforts during the tourney. The Canadian tournament is one of the finest tournaments in the area, and we are proud of the Lynx for winning 2nd place. Most fans feel that the Lynx will avenge this loss when Canadian returns to Spearman in a couple of weeks.

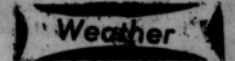
The church and Spearman will be welcoming back Bill Osborne, as minister of the church. He will fill the pulpit on February 2.

Beef Council Checks Success of TV Ads

Starting in February 1975 and running for 12 weeks, the Beef Industry Council of the Meat Board will conduct a \$117,000 television advertising test to determine the effectiveness of television advertising for beef. The results of the test will serve as a guide for the beef industry's future advertising plans.

The test will be conducted in six cities in three different geographical areas of the country. Three of the cities will be test markets where the television commercials will be aired. The other three will be "control markets" where no advertising will appear and they will act as comparisons for "before" and "after" research. The test cities are Binghamton, N. Y.; Des Moines, Iowa; and Tucson, Arizona. The control cities: Buffalo, New York, Kansas City; and Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Consumer purchase diaries and consumer attitude studies will be conducted in all six cities before, during, and after the 12-week test. John L. Huston, Secretary, Beef Industry Council, said "It's no secret that television advertising costs are high, but so are the potential benefits to the industry. That's why we're going to great lengths to design this test so results are accurately measured and projectable to a national program."

Tech Registration Set

Registration for the spring semester at Texas Tech University will begin Wednesday, Jan. 15, and continue through Saturday noon, Jan. 18. The first three days of registration will be conducted from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the Lubbock Coliseum, with the final half-day of enrollment to be conducted from 8 a.m. to 12 noon in the Office of the Registrar and in departmental offices, according to D. N. Peterson, registrar.

Residence halls will open at 10 a.m. Tuesday, Jan. 14. The first meal will be breakfast on the morning of Jan. 15. Classes begin at 7:30 a.m. Monday, Jan. 20. Enrollment for the 1974 fall semester totaled 21,927 students. The 1974 spring enrollment was 19,851. Both were records.

With total sales of \$8.4 billion, beef is number one in grocery sales for 1974. According to "Supermarketing" magazine, total fresh meat sales accounted for 11.7 percent of total store sales of \$11.5 billion. The magazine also reported that the average retail grocery shopper, when spending \$20, spends \$5.86 or 29% on non-nutritional food items (alcoholic beverages, soft drinks, tobacco, soaps, etc.). Meat took only \$3.98 of the \$20.00.

HD AGENT NEWS By Nelle Evans

This week let's discuss some areas of foods, storage, and care of utensils.

You may have wondered why the insides of cans of food are different colors. The insides of cans are treated with enamels to protect food from reacting with the metal of the can.

The different colors result from the 20 different types of enamel used in these treatments.

The type used is selected by the canner, depending on what food he intends to put in the cans. Some enamels are resistant to acid and others prevent changes in the flavor and color of food products.

The color on the inside of a can may change after it is exposed to air--if foods are left in the can. But those color changes won't affect the safety of the food.

Enamels are also put on the outside of cans. They protect the cans from wear and corrosion, from machines, and chemicals during the filling in canneries. Decoration is another reason for enamels on the outside of cans.

Grass-fed and grain-fed beef provide approximately the same nutrition, but there is some difference when it comes to cooking them.

Grass-fed beef is leaner and the reduced marbling may affect tenderness, juiciness and flavor.

Moist-heat cooking such as braising works well for the less tender cuts. Loaf, leg and shoulder cuts can be roasted in a 325 degree F. oven, but need to be brushed with fat during roasting to prevent drying.

Tender steaks from the rib and loin sections--rib, sirloin, T-bone and Porterhouse, can be broiled if they are to be done rare or medium. Well-done steaks should be braised.

Marinades such as a mixture of soy sauce and lemon juice or vinegar, enhance the mild flavor of grass-fed beef.

Bread always tastes best right out of the oven--yours or the baker's.

How fresh a loaf will remain depends on how the bread is handled and stored.

Bread and rolls should be stored in a clean, dry place at room temperature, away from any source of heat.

A well-ventilated bread box or drawer will meet these requirements.

Tests show refrigerator storage speeds the staling of bread products, but it also retards any tendency to mold. This is particularly true in hot, humid weather.

Freezing preserves the fresh ness of bread. Frozen breads thaw fairly quickly. Rolls and sliced bread take only a few minutes and an unsliced loaf takes from 30 minutes to an hour.

Breads should remain wrapped during thawing to prevent condensation of moisture on the surface.

Certain foods will mar the finish on stainless steel flatware if it's not washed promptly.

Salt, fruit and fruit juices, tomatoes, vinegar and dairy products are the worst offenders. They corrode the surface by breaking through the thin, transparent film of chromium and nickel oxides on the steel surface.

Oxygen in the air helps heal minor scratches in the protective film after the utensil has been cleaned and set aside. But if food is allowed to remain on the flatware, the air cannot reach the break to heal it.

Corrosion will take place each time the steel becomes wet. Dark marks sometimes respond to treatment with detergent.

National Wheat Growers To Convene In Amarillo

The Silver Anniversary Convention of Wheat Growers is scheduled in Texas January 12-16, 1975. Over five hundred wheat producers from throughout the nation and guests from at least three foreign countries are expected to attend the fact-finding and policy development sessions at the Hilton Inn in Amarillo according to Leo Witkowski, Hereford, President of the Texas Wheat Producers Association, hosts for the visiting organization.

Ray Davis, NAWG President, of Potter, Nebraska, said that wheat producer groups from France and Canada and grain trade representatives from Japan will be attending to observe wheat organization policy development which will range from grain reserves to farm programs and from marketing strategy to export policy during the five-day series of meetings and conferences.

Secretary of Agriculture, Earl L. Butz, will close the convention with a major address during the Annual Banquet Wednesday evening January 15. Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, John C. White, will open the general sessions which will be "open" to local wheat producers and others interested in attending with a welcome address on Tuesday January 14 at 9:00 a.m.

A wide range of farm-related subjects will be discussed by an array of prominent speakers, including: Glenn Lorang, Wheat Editor of the "Farm Journal"; Ambassador Edwin M. Martin, Coordinator of U. S. participation in the World Food Conference; Miss Mercedes Bates, Vice President, General Mills Consumer Center; as well as wheat producers—leaders from several states.

Policies developed by the wheat growers delegates in Amarillo will form the foundation for NAWG leadership in farm policy development and administration through the coming year. The 94th Congress, which opens January 14, will move quickly to review

changes in the farm program and reserve legislation according to Washington observers.

These January sessions mark the first time that the national wheat group has met in Texas, in a policy of rotating among member states, since 1964.
