The most important agriculture in the Virgin Islands is sugar, of which approximately ten thousand tons was exported in 1919. In 1919 the government succeeded in opening the Porto Rican market to cattle from the islands. About \$30,000 worth of cattle were exported, and it is thought that the cattle-raising industry will eventually become an important one. Exportation of cattle to Porto Rico formerly was prohibited on the ground that the Virgin Islands were in the tick-infested area.

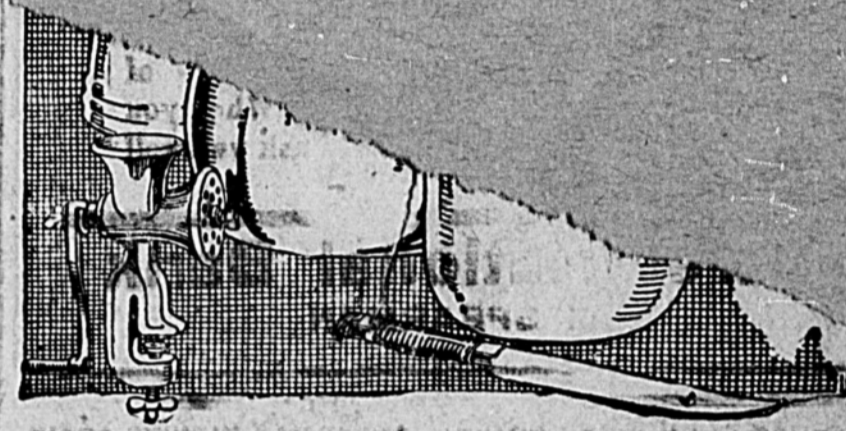
**One Good Point.**

**Assignment Follows Big Flash**

The Industrial Transportation Company has made an assignment. Unpleasant as this news may sound to the Quannah stockholders, it did not come wholly unexpectedly. The company had been breaking one promise after another, and shown itself utterly unworthy of confidence.

The \$15,000 more or less subscribed here by various people may safely be charged up to profit and loss; it being unlikely that much of it will be recovered.

Some six months ago two Dallas men, Prady and Durland, showed up here with a stock selling proposition. They claimed that company was operating in several states under a special charter, and was making money by selling groceries at ten per cent profit.

They were good talkers, and convinced the folk that showed interest in their proposition that by buying groceries in the open market, and shipping it in ear load lots to their 150 stores, more or less, the saving was so enormous that they could afford to sell very cheap. Stock was sold to well-to-do farmers, who took one thousand dollars worth, and poor working girls, who barely could scrape together one hundred dollars.

The money was to be left in the Quannah bank, to oral promises, but the St. Louis heads of the concern lost no time in checking the money out and some of the local men who did work for them had their drafts returned several weeks ago.

The store in Quannah was made ready for occupancy after long delay, but no groceries were ever shipped here. In some of the neighboring towns, where stores were opened by this concern, it is said the stocks were small, and gradually dwindled down to nothing.

The company was very lavish with its promises but a number of people here would like to see the head of the

concern prosecuted for winding—Quannah Tribune-Chief.

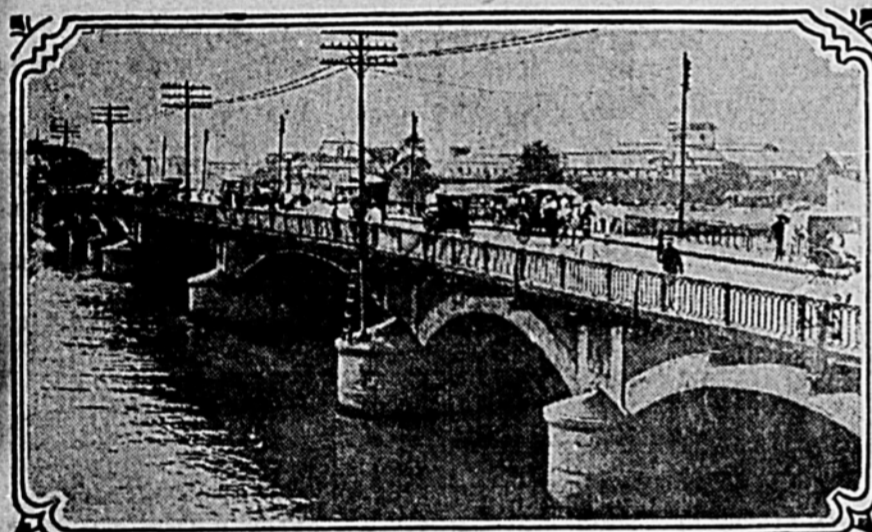

## A Passing Landmark of Old Manila



This is a photograph of the famous old Bridge of Spain, Manila. It is now a departed landmark of the Philippines, for its place has been taken by one of the finest bridges in the entire Orient, the new Jones bridge. The Jones Bridge is named in honor of the late Congressman W. A. Jones of Virginia, author of the Jones law of 1916 which promised the Filipinos independence upon the establishment of a stable government. The old Bridge of Spain is called "the mother of Manila's bridges." The original bridge was built of pontoons sometime between the years 1590 and 1600, being known as the Bridge of Boats. The stone bridge shown above was built about 1630. It was twice damaged by earthquakes, and was once partly demolished by a flood.

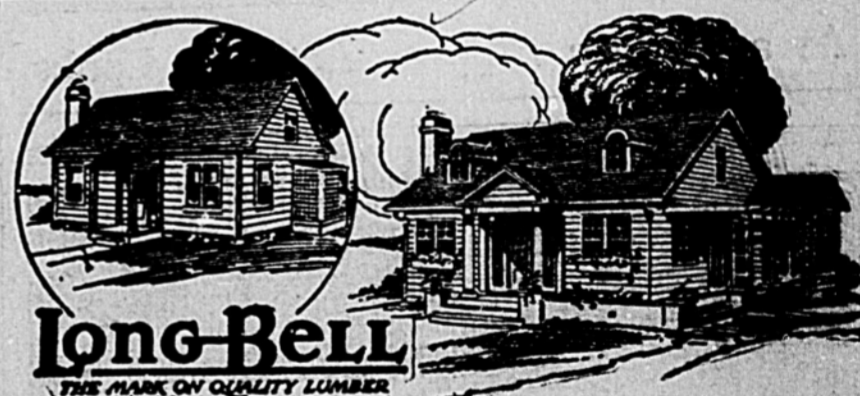

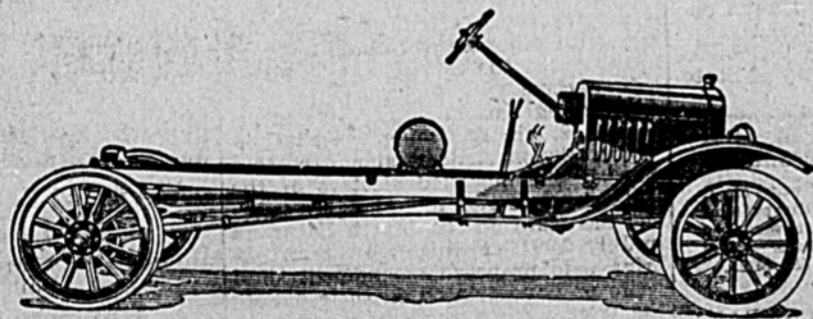

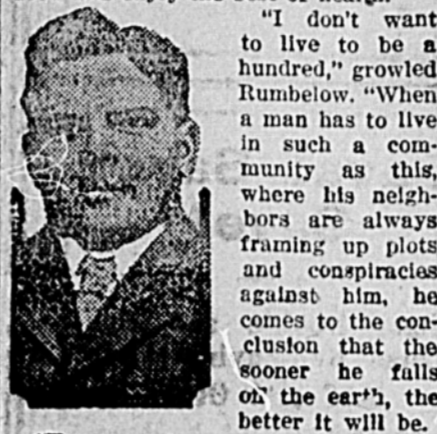

## Order for Election and Notice Thereof

State of Texas, County of Hansford, I, A. H. Storrs, Judge of the county court of Hansford County, Texas, do hereby certify that a petition has been presented to me on this 13th day of April, 1921, signed by Perron A. Lyon and other persons, praying for an election to be held within the boundaries of the Town of Spearman, in Hansford County, Texas, to determine whether or not said town shall be incorporated for municipal purposes, which said petition states the boundaries of said town as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at a mound, the N. E. corner of Section 88, same being the S. E. corner of Section 67, all in Block 4-T, N. O. Ry. Co. Grant, in Hansford County, Texas; thence along the east boundary line of said section 67, 950 varas to a point; thence west 1900 varas to a point in the west boundary line of said section 67, being the east boundary line of section 68, same block; thence south 950 varas along the said boundary line to a mound, the S. E. corner of said section 68, being the north east corner of section 89, same block; thence west 950 varas along the north boundary line of said section 89 to a point; thence south 950 varas to a point; thence east 2850 varas, crossing the east boundary line of section 89 at 950 varas to a point in the east boundary line of said section 88; thence north 850 varas to the place of beginning, containing within said boundary lines the south half of section 67, the north half of said section 88, and the northeast quarter of said section 89, and all in Block 4-T, N. O. Ry. Co. Grant, as more fully shown by a plat thereof accompanying and made a part of such petition.

And it appearing to me that the said petition is signed by at least twenty residents of the said Town of Spearman, who are qualified voters therein, under the purview of Chapter 14, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, and all amendments thereto, and satisfactory proof having been furnished to me that the said Town of Spearman contains more than Four Hundred and less than Ten Thousand inhabitants, and that said town is not incorporated for municipal purposes, and has never assumed control of municipal affairs.

Now, Therefore, I, A. H. Storrs, in my capacity as Judge of the County Court of Hansford County, Texas, do hereby order an election to be held in the said Town of Spearman, Texas, on the 15th day of May, 1921, to determine whether or not said town shall be incorporated for municipal purposes only within the above described boundaries, which said territory proposed to be incorporated is situated wholly within the county of Hansford, State of Texas.

Said election shall be held at the office of the Spearman Reporter, within the said Town of Spearman, and C. W. King is hereby appointed as Presiding Officer, who shall select two judges and two clerks to assist in holding said election.

Notice of such election shall be given by publication of a copy of this notice for at least ten days in the Spearman Reporter, a newspaper published in said town, and also by posting copies thereof in at least three public places in said town, said election to be held in the manner prescribed for holding elections in other cases.

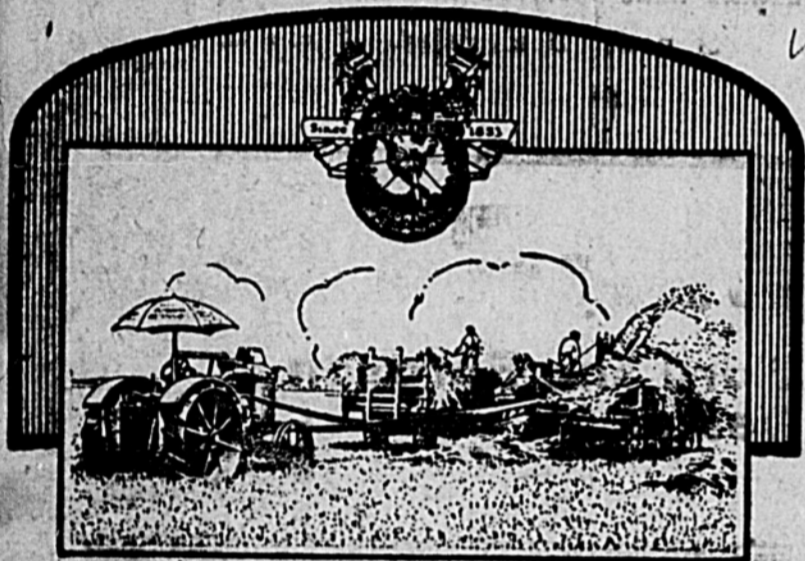
