WACO, Tex. — Military authorities described as remorseless today a private who said he shot his parents to death last Thursday at their Wisconsin home.

Pvt. Eugene D. Salzman, 24, surprised a provost marshal and chaplain yesterday with a statement that he killed the couple.

Emil Salzman, 42, and his 39-year-old wife were found cut down by rifle fire in the driveway of their Hayward, Wis., home.

Capt. A. M. Miny and Chaplain Earl C. Parker went to the youth's cell to break gently to him the "sad news of his parents' deaths."

Salzman answered he was "mad at the whole world, at the army, and I had been drinking." Later he told Dist. Atty. Tom Moore Jr. that his parents hadn't written to him for three weeks and had refused to send him money.

# Air-To-Air Missile Claimed To Have 'Brain Of Its Own'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force today described the Falcon, its newest guided missile, as "the only air-to-air missile with a brain of its own."

Removing some of the secrecy wrappings from the weapon designed to seek out and drop enemy bombers, the Air Force said it is the first line of defense against air attack.

This latest and smallest American missile is already in production and will soon be supplied as fighter-interceptor jet units stationed in the Arctic and at other posts around the approaches to the North American continent.

The Falcon was conceived by the Air Force in 1947 and developed and produced by the Hughes Aircraft Co. at Culver City, Calif., and Tucson, Ariz.

In words and pictures, the Air Force disclosed the Falcon to be a cigar-shaped missile looking like a rocket and about six feet long. At its warhead end, it is a little larger than a man's head.

In films taken of recent tests, a drone B17 bomber was the target. Although the bomber maneuvered in attempts to dodge, the missile shifted its course and scored a direct hit.

Another late bill introduced by Rep. Latimer would increase the maximum penalty for simple assault from \$75 to \$100.

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# Call Girl Pat Ward Returning To Stand

**NEW YORK**—Jurors in the Mickey Jelke trial, assembled in four days, today got on to the business of hearing testimony about cafe society playboys and their call girls.

Former call girl Pat Ward was scheduled to be the first witness. Asst. Dist. Atty. Anthony J. Liebler said yesterday he would call her right after the prosecution and defense complete their opening statements.

Pat, now 21, was the state's star witness in Jelke's first trial in 1953. She is expected to repeat her previous testimony about falling in love with Jelke and then sharing with the oleomargarine heir the fees she got from dates she said he arranged for her.

In his first trial, Jelke was convicted of inducing Pat to lead the life of a prostitute and of trying to do the same with Marguerite Cordova, now 25.

This conviction was thrown out on appeal because Judge Francis

L. Valente had closed the trial to the press and public during presentation of the prosecution's case. The appeals court ruled this deprived Jelke of a fair trial.

He was convicted again on two counts of compulsory prostitution. Jelke would face a possible maximum prison sentence of 40 years. Jelke, now 25, was sentenced to three to six years in prison at the reversed trial.

The new trial is expected to bring out the names of men who allegedly paid fees up to \$500 for the favors of Jelke's girl friends. The men, some of them reportedly prominent figures, were previously protected by the court ban against publicity.

# Because Of Government Delay, Provoov Is Cleared Of Treason

**BALTIMORE**—John David Provoov, 37, once convicted and sentenced to life for wartime treason, was ordered freed yesterday when a federal judge ruled "deliberate" government delays prejudiced his chances of a fair trial at this time.

Judge Roscel C. Thomsen dismissed the indictment charging seven overt acts of treason while Provoov was a prisoner of the Japanese after the fall of Corregidor in World War II.

He said he would sign an order for Provoov's release sometime today. The decision automatically ruled out a second trial on the

charges asked by the government. Judge Thomsen said Provoov would be released on his own recognizance pending the possibility of an appeal by the government to the Supreme Court.

Provoov, a tall, scholarly-looking onetime San Francisco bank clerk, broke down and wept when his four year court-appointed lawyers told him of the decision, handed down in chambers.

"I am very grateful," he said. Judge Thomsen, in a 33-page opinion climaxing more than a month of hearings and deliberations on Provoov's petition for release, said he found Provoov "could not have a fair trial at this late date."

He also found the former Army sergeant had been denied the right of speedy trial within the meaning of the 8th Amendment and that the government's "deliberate choice for a supposed advantage" in trying him originally in New York caused "oppressive delay and damage to the defendant."

The government charged Provoov shaved his head and donned the white robes of a Buddhist priest, greeted the conquering Japanese on Corregidor in the Philippines in May 1942 and offered his services.

A jury in New York Federal Court two years ago convicted him on four of the seven treason acts charged. Specifically, he was convicted of offering to aid his Japanese captors, informing on and causing the execution of a fellow

## Wetback Traffic Said To Be Under Better Control

**WASHINGTON**—Wetbacks, water and weather keep Rio Grande Valley Rep. Joe Kilgore on his toes.

When Immigration Commissioner Joseph Swing went before the government operations committee, Kilgore, a committee member, questioned him closely about border patrol operations.

The commissioner said wetback traffic is more nearly under control now than at any time since the war. With more border patrolmen recommended by the president's Budget Bureau, he said movement of illegal immigrants from Mexico is expected to be brought to a virtual standstill.

Wetbacks have been used, Swing added, by "chislers," who seek to evade the law.

Kilgore then commented: "Not all users of wetbacks are chislers, by any means, Mr. Commissioner."

"The farmers in my area would prefer citizen or legal Mexican contract labor. But there have been times when it was taken whatever help was available to get your cotton picked, or face certain economic ruin."

Water long has been of vital concern to the irrigation farms of the valley. The new Falcon Dam is a boon. Kilgore now is pushing for a series of check dams across the river below Falcon.

Kilgore told the committee Col. Leland Hewitt, international boundary commissioner, estimated \$100,000 would be required to make a detailed survey and study of idea.

The proposed channel dams, Kilgore said, would be operated by hydraulic lifts. During flood periods they would be lowered into pits below the river bed so as not to cause overflow on the adjacent lands on both sides of the border.

Elzie Geddie died after the car piled into a ditch and exploded. W. T. Williams, his brother-in-law, escaped from the wreckage with serious head injuries. Also injured was B. S. Crossley of Whitney, alone in the other car.

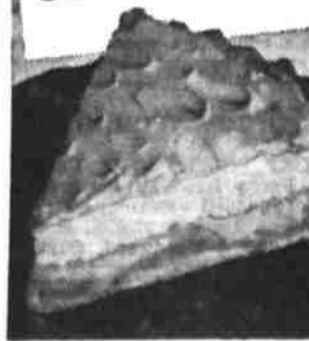

# Segregation In Parks Knocked Out By U. S. Circuit Court

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—The South's traditional doctrine of "separate but equal" facilities for whites and Negroes has received another body blow from the federal judiciary.

The U. S. 4th Circuit Court of Appeals, basing its decision squarely on the Supreme Court's historic May 17 opinion, labeling segregation in public schools unconstitutional, ruled here yesterday that segregation also is illegal in public parks and playgrounds.

The Supreme Court verdict of last spring, said the three-judge appellate court, has "swept away" the South's notion that separate facilities for the races are permissible provided the facilities are equal.

The ruling affecting parks and playgrounds, which reversed the

decision of the Federal District Court of Baltimore, produced no immediate outburst of critical comment from state and city officials in the South as did the precedent-setting Supreme Court decision on public schools.

Asst. Atty. Gen. Harrison Winter of Maryland said, "We have only received a telegram notifying us of the decision. We will want to make a thorough study of the opinion before making any comment."

# Telephone Lines Cut While Strike Negotiations Go On

ATLANTA (AP)—A widespread hunt was on today for persons who cut telephone lines in Alabama and Georgia shortly after Southern Bell Telephone operators and other workers in nine states struck in a union contract dispute.

Union officials denied any knowledge of the incidents.

The main toll cable between

Birmingham and New Orleans was cut in two places yesterday. Service to six Bessemer area communities was disrupted when telephone lines were cut in 15 places.

In Atlanta, a 1,200-pair (line) cable in the driveway entrance to police headquarters was cut about one third of the way through, partially paralyzing police communications for a short time. Two other cables in Atlanta also were damaged.

The vandalism occurred while negotiators were still meeting in an effort to settle differences. The meeting ended shortly before 10 p. m. and both sides agreed to return to the conference table today.

Informed of the cable cuts, G. F. Gill, of Atlanta, assistant Southern director of the CIO Communications Workers of America, said:

"The union neither initiates nor condones incidents of this nature. We have no knowledge of them. They are not of our doing."

A company spokesman described the cable cutting as "sabotage" and offered a \$5,000 reward for the arrest and conviction of those involved.

Orderly picketing was reported throughout the area.

CWA headquarters said the strike was almost 100 per cent among its members.

Southern Bell claimed that about one third of the estimated 50,000 union employes in the nine states were at work. In addition, about 10,000 supervisory personnel worked, the company said.

# S'western Life Reports Record Sales In 1954

AGAIN in 1954, Southwestern Life Insurance Company set new records in insurance sales and payment of policy benefits during a calendar year. It has been announced by President James Ralph Wood in his annual report on the company's business operations.

Southwestern Life policies issued to individuals in 1954 averaged \$6,037 in face amount, reflecting a continuation of the trend toward the purchase of more adequate amounts of insurance. Ten years ago, the average amount of protection provided by each such policy was only \$2,509, Wood reported.

# Orphan Children Treated To Real Gingerbread House

EL PASO (AP)—Remember the gingerbread house in the Hansel and Gretel fairy tale?

El Paso kids in the city's hospitals and orphanages remember it, thanks to the hobby of Sgt. Christian Schneider of Fort Bliss.

The veteran soldier bakes gingerbread houses by the hundreds, complete with candy roofs and chimneys and peppermint windows, and sends them through his wife's Brownie Troop to the children in institutions.

Schneider calls it a hobby, time-consuming but satisfying, since he loves children and he loves his bakery work. "I've worn out one electric mixer for my wife," he said, "and now I'm working on the second one."

The houses—each a 2 1/4-hour project—have been going to children since long before Schneider entered the service in 1942. As a civilian, Schneider ran a bakery in Chicago.

Since becoming a soldier, he's spread the fairy-land confections in such places as Camp McCoy, Wis.; Bikini Atoll in the South Pacific; and Army and Navy General Hospital in Hot Springs, Ark.

Funds for the goodies come from Schneider's pay as assistant chief baker at the Fort Bliss pastry shop and the allowances of his three children.

A small boy volunteered El Paso's appraisal of his work recently when he bit off a chimney, grinned and said, "Hansel and Gretel never had it so good."

WASHINGTON (AP)—Half of the young men nominated for the new Air Force Academy have been failing their physical examinations.

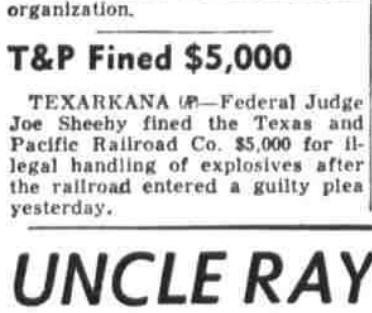

# Censure Move For Churchill Is Voted Down

LONDON (AP)—The House of Commons last night voted down an opposition Labor party motion to censure Prime Minister Churchill for failing to set up top-level Russian-British-U.S. talks on banning the hydrogen bomb. The vote, which followed party lines, was 298-268.

The legislators immediately after approved 299-268 a Conservative amendment saying any such big power meeting must await ratification of the Paris agreements on West German rearmament.

The vote climaxed a debate on the government's H-bomb policy, highlighted by Churchill's disclosure that he is still working for a big power meeting to ease world tensions. But he suggested such talks should include West Germany and France.

"We cannot agree," he said, "that France and Germany should at this time be disassociated from the task of resolving the fears and disputes which beset Europe and the world today."

Churchill previously had advocated a conference of the United States, Britain and Russia "at the summit." He explained earlier that an illness which left him paralyzed for a time forced him to drop attempts to set up such a meeting with the Russians in the summer of 1953.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Appropriations Committee called early today a "serious national problem."

It approved \$7,146,000 pending for emergency soil control work and urged the Agriculture Department to give "even closer attention" to long range plans for soil conservation.

# Calls For Curb On Crude Imports

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gov. Raymond Gary of Oklahoma urged today that increasing imports of oil and oil products into the United States be curbed.

He informed the Senate Finance Committee, studying extension of the reciprocal trade agreements, the welfare of the oil and gas industry is vitally important to every citizen in Oklahoma. In excess of 10 per cent of the tax revenues of the state comes from a gross oil production tax.

He said oil imports tend to increase unemployment in Oklahoma, lower the wage scale, cripple vital functions of state government and adversely affect the state economy.

Oklahoma producers, he continued, cannot stand the continued loss of markets resulting from declines in allowable oil production.

# Must Build Stronger GOP, Says Nixon

By BILL BECKER  
 LOS ANGELES (AP)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon has sounded a call to California's Republicans—perhaps the strongest segment of the GOP—to build a majority party by 1956.

The young vice president, at President Eisenhower's behest, urged 2,600 fellow southern California Republicans in one of three speeches yesterday to prepare "to do a big job this year and next."

Nixon said bluntly the GOP was in 1952 only because of its strong candidate and added: "The Republican party today is not strong enough to elect a president."

Nixon gave this insight into the President's views:

"The current situation is one the President feels we should remedy and that's why he's taking hold of the Republican leadership at this time. He believes it's his responsibility to build the party so its strength will be as strong as that of the President himself."

California, despite the Democratic trend nationally in the 1954 election, voted in 19 Republican

and only 11 Democratic representatives to the House. Its two senators and governors are key Republicans. Yet Democrats hold a substantial registration edge, as they do nationally.

Nixon did not disclose the President's intentions for 1956 but said significantly:

"I hope to work for the President again in 1956. The best way to see that he runs again is to build party power to the point where we can become the majority party."

Before returning to Washington by plane, Nixon addressed the Los Angeles World Affairs Council last night on the administration's plans for boosting Latin-American trade.

Nixon, who recently toured Central America and the Caribbean area, said those countries need more markets, capital, technical assistance and better communications. Private capital investment could handle most of the development, he said, but some government loans and lower tariff barriers would be needed.

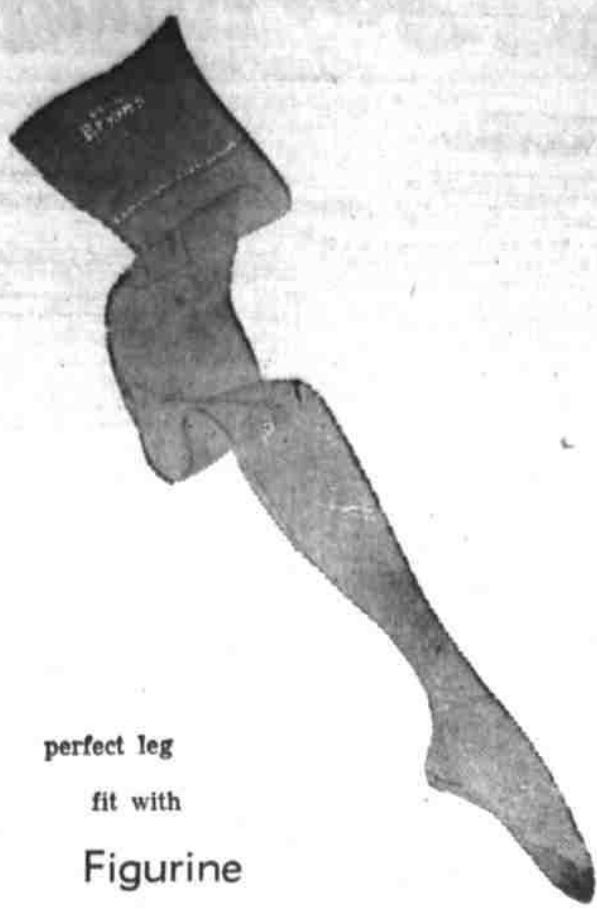

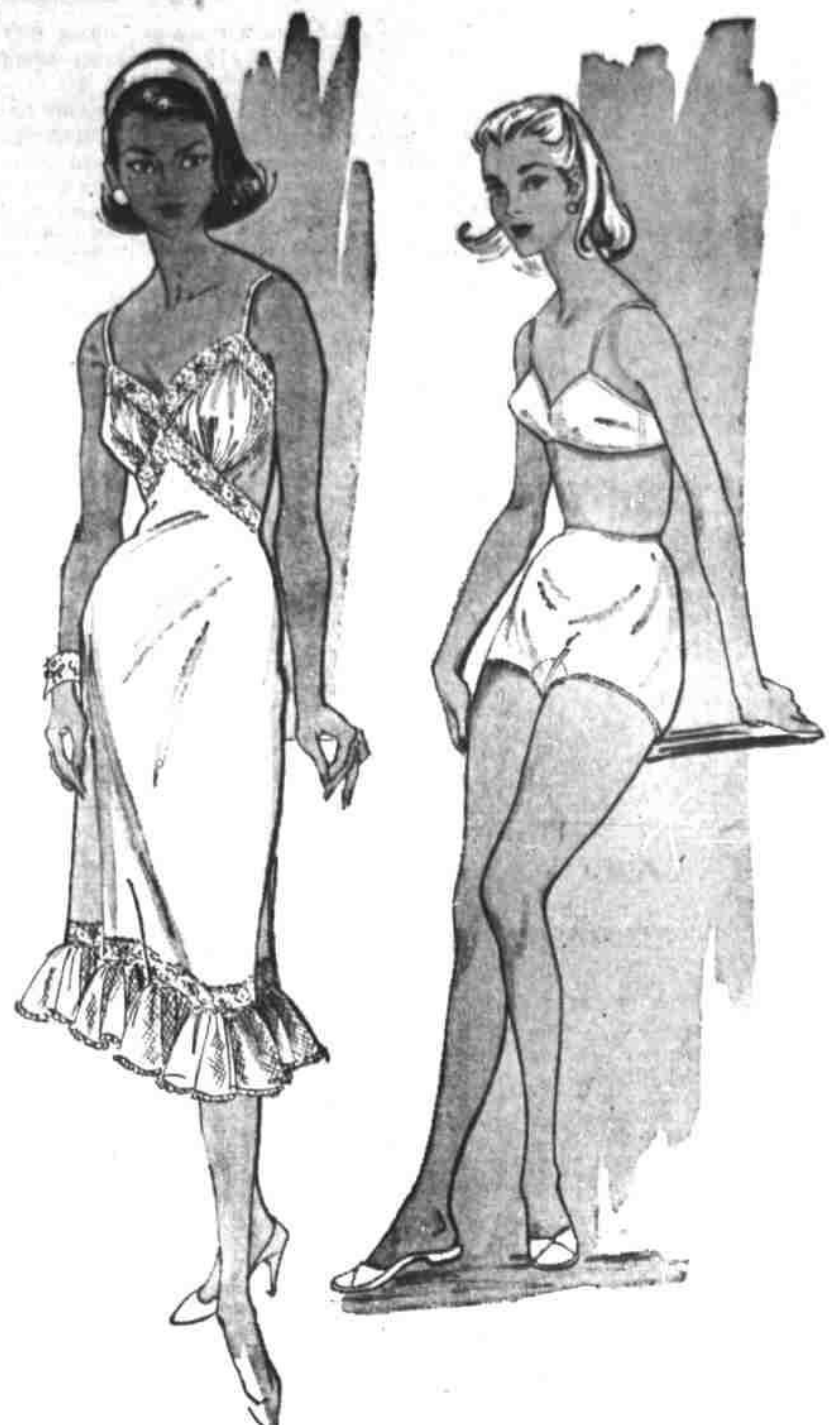

 HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Hollywood today discovered the world's greatest movie fan—a guy who has seen as many as seven different movies in one day.

He's a Texan, naturally.

George Raborn, a sports writer for the Waco News-Tribune, sees more movies than the head usher at Radio City Music Hall. Since 1932 he has seen 5,508 movies. He saw 500 before that but they don't count because he didn't keep individual records on them.

Raborn, who doesn't own a television set or a wife, has attended movies in 36 different states and five foreign countries. He has seen as many as 402 movies in one year. One month he saw 77.

Best comedian—Groucho Marx. Best comedienne—Judy Holliday. Best movie—"A Place in the Sun" (1951). Worst all-time movie—"White Pongo" (1945).

**Crude Production Hits All-Time High**  
 TULSA (AP)—Daily average domestic crude oil production reached another new all-time high of 6,830,500 barrels during the week ended March 12, a survey by the Oil and Gas Journal showed today.

The week's daily average increase was 25,725 barrels, the bulk of which was a 16,925-barrel raise in Texas to 2,972,950 barrels.

The journal's figures on cumulative 1955 production reached 477,112,775 barrels compared to only 450,082,770 a year ago.

Howard County 4-H Club's Home On Wheels

The motor van which local 4-H Clubbers use to haul their animals to various stock shows over the country also serves them as living quarters. Once the stock show is reached, the animals are unloaded and the van converted into a home. The part of the van used for bed space is the same part in which the animals ride. Of course, it is completely cleaned and divided by portable partitions. Front of the van—equipped with a stove, refrigerator, and sink—serves as

the kitchen. Approximately 14 steers can be transported in the van along with all the feeders if necessary. The van is commonplace to local residents, but it is rather unusual so far as 4-H Clubs are concerned. Recently the van and the club received nationwide publicity in Life Magazine. It has been used six years and has traveled some 60,000 miles.

## 4-H Club's 'Traveling Hotel' Is Nationally Known At Stock Shows

Members of the Howard County 4-H Club never have to worry about finding a place to stay or eat when they take animals to livestock shows over the country.

For they take their living quarters — and the quarters of the animals — with them. Their "traveling hotel" is the huge motor van which was purchased here in 1949 and which has become such a distinctive stock show feature that it recently received nationwide publicity in Life magazine.

The van, which doubles as a stock truck and as a bunk house, has been the home of many champions.

Local 4-H Club members and their animals have travelled some 60,000 miles in the van during the six years it has been in operation. Capacity load per trip is 14 steers and about 14 people.

When 4-H feeders here take off for a trip, they load their animals in the van. On arriving at the show, the animals are unloaded and the van is converted for the use of the feeders.

The animal section is cleaned completely, and partitions are pulled

to provide separate quarters for boys and girls. The front part of the van, in which people ride on trips, becomes the kitchen.

The kitchen is one of the most popular spots to be found on livestock show grounds. Not only do the local showmen congregate there, but others also gather, said County Agent Durward Lewter.

Howard County youngsters always go equipped with plenty of food and supplies. And the kitchen is equipped with a stove, refrigerator and sink — all the conveniences of home.

The bunk house arrangement in the van allows the boys and girls ample time with their animals, as time does not have to be consumed traveling back and forth from hotels and cafes.

The van also cuts expenses on trips. The cost of hotel rooms is saved, and quite a bit is cut on the cost of meals. Lewter pointed out that average cost per meal is about 60 cents.

"We try to feed the boys and girls right," Lewter stated. "They don't get any junk."

Adults who accompany the boys

and girls usually find their hands full. The women turn out to be the cooks, and men always find that a number of odd jobs have to be done.

Howard County's 4-H van has proven so successful that clubs in other sections of the state have also purchased similar vehicles. Martin County now has one, as

does Pecos, Rankin and Panola counties.

The local van was purchased from a Big Spring parts dealer, who had obtained it at an Army surplus sale at Camp Bowie in Brownwood.

It wasn't the van then that it is now, however, as it has been completely remodeled. Various firms here chipped in with parts and materials while the boys and girls furnished the labor for the repair project.

Original cost was \$2,500, the money coming from contributions and the 4-H Club treasury. Some of the 4-H money had been obtained from insurance when one of the organization's buildings burned.

The first show for which the van was used was at San Antonio, and a truck was borrowed to put under it. Since that time a 1948 model Dodge was purchased by the club to haul the van, and it has been to every major show in the nation except Baltimore and Ogden.

Between shows the van has been kept at Melvin Choate's house, at Floyd White's place, or on the fair grounds.

## Steer Feeding Calls For Good Equipment

Boys and girls planning to feed steers should first obtain proper facilities for housing and adequate equipment for care, said County Agent Durward Lewter.

The housing facilities do not have to be elaborate, Lewter explained, but they should be arranged for the utmost in cleanliness. Size depends on the number of steers to be fitted.

A shed about 12 feet square is ample for one animal, but Lewter said that it should be open on the south with windows on the other three sides. A pen, about 20 by 50, should be in front of the shed.

Lewter cautioned that the entire set up should be chicken proof. A feed trough which is easily accessible to the animal should be in the shed, along with a water tub and a hay manger.

The pen should be bedded with fresh sand or straw, and Lewter said he preferred sand as it is always available in West Texas at little cost.

It is also necessary to have nurse cows which are good milkers, yielding each day from three to four gallons of milk with butter fat content from 3.8 to 4.2.

Drugs will probably be necessary for treating colds, scours and other diseases. The dehorning equipment is not necessary, as Lewter dehorns all Howard 4-H Club calves himself.

The feeder needs a halter and stick to train the calves, and a rice root brush and scotch comb are also necessary for baths and

brushings. A curling comb is a must.

Hoof nippers and common wood rasps are equipment needed to trim the calf's feet. Oil for the hair, and proper soap for baths are also among the things needed by the feeder and exhibitor.

Many others continue to support the club by working as adult leaders and counselors, or by assisting with club undertakings such as the junior rodeo which is sponsored each year.

# FFA Goal Improvement Of Agricultural Leadership

The Future Farmers of America Association, which has four chapters in Howard County, is a national organization which has as its purpose the improvement of agricultural leadership.

The FFA program is conducted through vocational agriculture classes in schools, and it is operated by and for the boys in the classes.

Objective of FFA boys is to study vocational agriculture with the definite purpose of becoming good farmers, said Lester Buford, supervisor for this area. The FFA members put their classroom training into practice with farming programs at home.

In addition to improving agriculture leadership, other aims of the FFA are to develop character, scholarship, cooperation, thrift, cit-

izenship, community service and recreation.

Not all vocational agriculture students are members of the FFA, but those students wishing to become FFA members must express their desire and then must be voted into chapter membership.

Once in they have four degrees to achieve. Supervised farming projects play an important part in all these programs.

The first degree is "green hand," and these beginners familiarize themselves with the FFA program of work and map out a supervised project. After the "green hand" has satisfactorily participated in chapter activities for a year, he can become a "chapter farmer."

To be a chapter farmer the student must have operated an improved supervised farming pro-

gram from which he has realized a net profit of at least \$50. He must also make a study of the leading group discussion.

Next comes the "state farmer" degree, which takes another year of satisfactory FFA participation during which time the student nets \$500 from his supervised project. A state farmer also must have shown outstanding ability in chapter leadership.

The final degree is "American farmer," awarded on a national level after the students nets \$1,000 in a year of supervised farming. The American farmer must be outstanding, and he must be chosen as a state nominee and then selected at a national meeting.

Various projects undertaken by FFA members include poultry and animal husbandry, growing field crops, tractor operation and maintenance, grass demonstration, farm and home safety, entomology, farm electrification, and numerous others.

Classroom instruction even deals with such other things as citizenship, leadership training, self-expression, record keeping, soil conservation, proper use of machinery and hand tools, dairying, etc.

The FFA was organized 26 years ago in Kansas City by vocational agriculture students. The creed of the new organization began with the words, "I believe in the future of farming." Since that time the members have strived to be successful farmers of tomorrow.

Big Spring chapters are at the high school, where Truett Vines is teacher, and at junior high, where R. E. Baumhardt is the instructor. At Coahoma, where there is another chapter, Wayne White is vocational agriculture teacher. And at Knott, Cyrus Keith is the teacher.

Other FFA chapters are located in this area at Garden City, Stanton, Courtney, Colorado City (2), Ackerly, Gail, Flower Grove, Lamessa (2), and Westbrook.

## Six Things Looked For In Picking Calf For Feeding

Durward Lewter, Howard County Agent and one of the nation's top supervisors of young steer feeders, considers six things when selecting a calf with championship possibilities.

These six considerations are breeding, quality, type, balance and style, appearance, and age.

Before purchasing a calf to be fed by a local 4-H member, Lewter likes to see the animal's sire and dam and know of their breeding. Breeding can sometimes make the complete difference in a champion and an also-ran.

High quality calves are a must. These will have loose and pliable hide with soft silky hair, Lewter said.

Type of calf is also important. Lewter is partial to one with short legs, a short and deep body, smooth and straight legs, and a straight top and underline.

The balance and style cannot be overlooked before purchasing. Calves should always be viewed from a distance to see how well all parts blend together for balance from front to rear, and Lewter likes to see an animal carry himself with an alert walk.

Wide spring of ribs with a full deep round should be the appearance, according to Lewter.

"I like to get calves that have just turned the corner, without too much baby bloom," Lewter explained. "But I don't like to get those that have gone so far down hill as to 'doggie.'"

Another important point about a steer is the amount of beef it will dress out. A judge is interested in how much prime beef the calf will yield on the hooks, Lewter said.

A calf won't win a show if it is not prime.

Lambs follow about the same pattern as a steer, the county agent said. The points which are important to a steer are also important in sheep.

However, a lamb should have a firmer finish than a calf, he explained. General conformation is

## 'Feel' Important In Calf Judging

"Touch of the flesh" is all important in judging calves, according to County Agent Durward Lewter. The touch should be firm, but not hard, and the flesh should be smooth.

Feeding is all important in obtaining the desired feel, the agent pointed out.

Bran helps to keep quality in the touch of the flesh, oats help keep the flesh smooth, and corn tends to put on flesh, which barley firms.


Because of the various qualities of bran, corn, oats and barley, the ration for individual calves tends to change periodically with growth. Rations change with the touch.

## Don't Carry Calf Too Long, Lewter Instructs Feeders

Steers weighing between 900 and 1,050 pounds have a better chance of winning livestock shows, said Durward Lewter, Howard County Agent.

The exhibitor should keep in mind the show in which he is planning to enter his animal and know the show classes.


An exhibitor should not try to carry a steer too long, Lewter warned, as the flesh becomes dead and the animals loose their bloom. He stated that over-age calves never look too good in the show ring.

## THEY WIN TOO Breeders Back 4-H Exhibitors

West Texas and New Mexico Hereford breeders are given much of the credit for the success of the Howard County 4-H Club in the nation's livestock show rings.

Durward Lewter, Howard farm agent and supervisor of 4-H steer feeding operations, says the breeders have been "unusually good to us."

By that, Lewter means that breeders have supplied the 4-H Club exhibitors with "the cream" of their calf crops.

Many calves have been outright gifts from the breeders to the 4-H clubbers. In other instances, breeders have charged only nominal sums for the championship calves.

In practically every instance where steers were given, the gift meant the difference in whether a boy or girl was to have a calf to feed out and exhibit.

The breeders have never objected when the county agent and his proteges picked the very best calves from their herds either, Lewter said.

The ability to procure the top calves, either free of charge or at a relatively low cost, has been a vital factor in the long string of championships racked up by the 4-H clubbers.

Of course, it doesn't hurt the breeders any when one of their Herefords turn up as grand or reserve champion of a national or international livestock show. That's

something that has happened 60 times through the Howard County 4-H Club.

A dozen West Texas and New Mexico Hereford breeders have furnished Howard County 4-H Club members with steers free of charge.

Wilson Brothers, of Luther, probably head the list, having given about 10 steers to the club. They gave three steers in one year.

Dorothea Griffin of Lawn has given three steers, and Fred Lege of Weatherford has given two. Others who have contributed steers to Howard Club members have been Donald Lay, the late W. W. Lay, the TO Ranch of Raton, N. M., Norman Libby of Mesquero, N. M., W. J. and Ray Largent of Merkel, Winston Brothers of Snyder, Tom Roden of Big Spring, O. H. McAllister of Big Spring, and Read Brothers of Sterling City.

## Parasite Treatment Necessary For Calves

Calves should be treated for lice and other external parasites at regular intervals throughout the feeding period.

Usually the treatment should come every 14 to 21 days, and the calf should be watched for any digestive disorder and treated at the first sign.

This means that the same person should nurse and feed the calf at all times.

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# Howard 4-H Club's Record Unmatched By Any Group

You can't name a group that has won more blue ribbons in the last 10 years than the Howard County 4-H Club.

Members of the organization have won no less than 69 grand and reserve championships in livestock show rings in the last decade. And the titles they've won represent virtually every major show in the nation—all the way from Baltimore, Md., to San Francisco, Calif.

Earnings and winnings during the period have been nothing short of phenomenal.

Howard County Agricultural Agent Durward Lewter, supervisor of the club members' feeding and showing operations, says the organization has taken in from \$40,000 to \$115,000 per year since 1946.

The grand total, according to Lewter, is some \$750,000. This includes prizes and other cash awards and proceeds from sale of the prize cattle.

Under Lewter's supervision, the Howard 4-H Club has won the grandchampionship ribbons at the International Livestock Exposition in Chicago, the Eastern National Livestock Show at Baltimore, the American Royal at Kansas City, the Arizona National Livestock Show at Phoenix, the Houston Fat Stock Show, Southwestern Exposition at Fort Worth, State Fair of Texas, the San Antonio Fat Stock Show,

and the El Paso Livestock Show. Reserve champions have been exhibited at the Cow Palace Livestock Show in San Francisco, the Louisiana National Livestock Show in Baton Rouge, and Ogdon, Utah, Livestock Show.

An understanding and appreciation of nature has been one of the aims of local 4-H Club work, and observers have stated that 4-H Club work has helped through the years to increase incomes, standards of living and rural life satisfaction.

The 4-H's, of course, stand for head, heart, hands, and health. The head is to be used for thinking, planning and reason. The heart stands for kindness, sympathy, and truthfulness. The hands are to be helpful, skillful and useful. And the health is to enable club members to enjoy life, resist disease and make for efficiency.

# Good Grooming Essential To Show Animal's Success

FFA and 4-H Club members have had their faces washed, and they have.

The second step is brushing the tails. The object is to have the animals' tails looking like the tassels on the end of nylon ropes.

Then the steers must have their hair combed and brushed, which is no easy task. Cleanliness is all important. Closely connected with this operation is the "finerweave," which is done with brushes. The finerweaves leave little curls of hair all over the steer's body. Care of the calves goes on until the last moment before judging, and the owner is rarely satisfied. It is the same way with lambs. The first step in caring for a lamb is the trimming of his feet.

It would be futile to brush the top of the lamb and then let him in the dirt for his hair.

"Carding" the lamb comes next. This is done with a small wire comb to smooth out the wool. Wool looking a little coarse with dirt and oil takes on a satin-like sheen as it is combed.

The final step is "blocking" the lamb. This is the clipping off of long wool, giving the lamb the square look across the back and hips.

Capons are cleaned thoroughly and given manures. The fowls' legs and beaks are washed and brushed to the glistening point, and the feathers are smoothed and sometimes clipped or trimmed. Pains are also taken with the comb.

Winners, of course, are a product of constant care, but pre-show preparation is necessary for a good animal to look his best. In some instances it has meant the difference in a champion and a runner-up.

## Jaycees Post Prizes Exceeding \$500 For 4-H, FFA Stock Show

More than \$500 in cash prizes, plus \$32 worth of ribbons, is posted by Jaycees for the winners and best showmen in the 18th annual Howard County 4-H and FFA Fat Stock Show.

The largest single prize, of course, is the \$400 which will go to the exhibitor of the grand champion steer. The reserve champion steer will draw \$25 for his owner.

The exhibitor of the grand champion lamb receives \$10 and owner of the reserve champion will get \$5.

In the capon show, the boy or girl who shows the grand champion will receive a \$5 prize and the reserve champion exhibitor will receive a \$3 award.

In addition, there are prizes for exhibitors of birds and animals that win the first 10 places in all the various classes of the capon, lamb and calf divisions.

Showmanship awards also are posted in all three divisions.

Jaycee President Oliver Cofer estimated it will cost the Jaycees around \$1,500 to stage the stock show, by the time all expenses are paid. The Jaycees even employ the auctioneer and guards for the stock during the three nights of the show.

The Junior Chamber expects to recover part of this outlay through the sale of tickets. But the balance will be paid out of the organization's proceeds from such shows as the Harlem Globe Trotters, which it sponsored here, and other fund-raising enterprises.

Prizes are being posted in three steer classes. The awards amount

to \$12 for first place in each of the heavy, medium and light weight classes. Second place in each is worth \$10, third place prize is \$9, fourth is \$8, fifth is \$7, sixth is \$6, seventh is \$5, eighth is \$4, ninth is \$3 and 10th is \$2.

There also is a \$15 prize for the best-kept stall and aisle, \$40 for the grand champ, and \$25 for the reserve champion.

Steer showmanship awards are \$20 for first place, \$15 for second, and \$10 for third place.

Over in the capon division, cash awards are offered for the top 10 places in two classes—light and heavy.

In each class, the prizes are \$2 for first place, \$1.75 for second, \$1.50 for third, \$1.25 for fourth, \$1 for fifth, and 50 cents each for the next five places.

The grand champion capon draws another \$5, and the reserve champ gets \$3 extra. Showmanship awards, for three places, are \$5, \$3 and \$2.

There are two classes for fine

wool lambs, one for cross bred lambs, one for Southdown cross bred, and one for Southdown lambs. Prizes are posted for the first 10 places in each of the five classes. The awards are \$5 for first, \$4 for second, \$3 for third, \$2 for fourth, and \$1 for the next six places.

The champion fine wool lamb draws another \$5 and the reserve champion gets \$2.50 extra. The grand champion of the lamb show will be worth an extra \$10 to his owner, and the reserve champion will win an additional \$5 for his owner.

Lamb showmanship awards will be \$10 for first, \$7.50 for second and \$5 for third place.

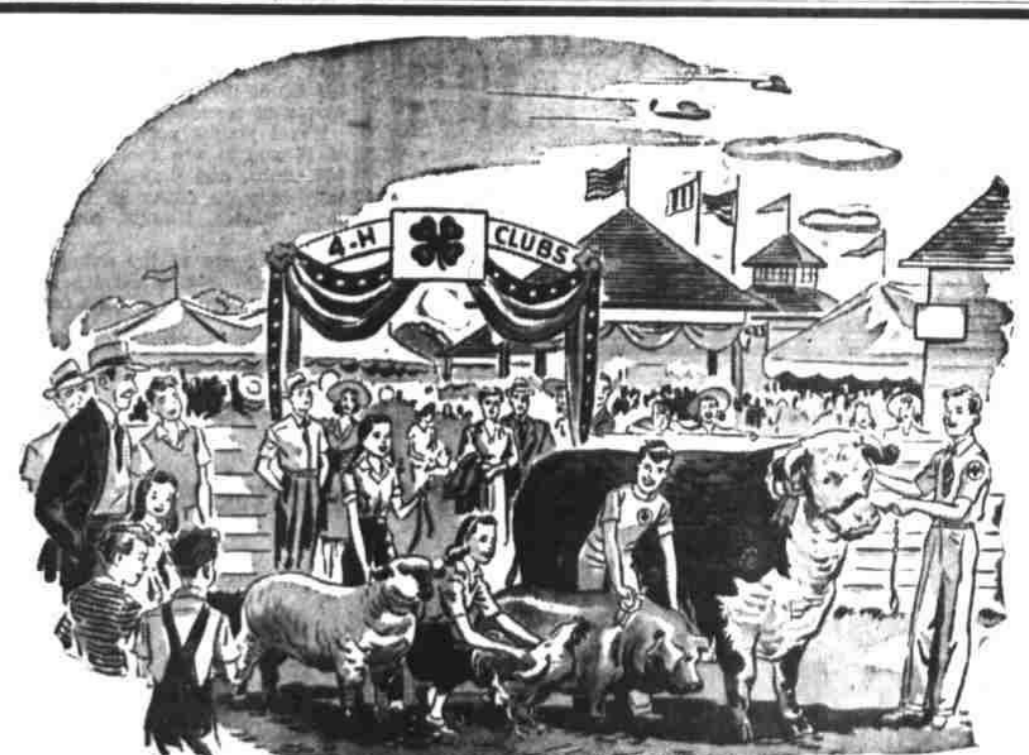

### Grass, Streams Not What They Used To Be

ALPINE 15—"I've seen thousands of acres of grass knee high and thick. It doesn't get that way any more. We used to have creeks that ran all the time and springs that never went dry. It's not that way anymore." Speaking was John Daugherty, who came here 52 years ago from San Antonio and "took up" a section of land (640 acres). Daugherty said people have changed too. Way back yonder, they built houses without locks. A man riding up to an unoccupied line cabin was welcome to make himself at home, use a bed and cook a couple of meals with the groceries that were all there. But when the country started settling up, some people would leave the camp in a mess, burn all the wood and cart off all groceries they didn't cook. Daugherty said it got so a cow-

boy on his regular rounds couldn't count on finding food at the company's line camps. So this open-handed hospitality stopped. At 76, Daugherty still does his own ranch work, getting help only when there's something out of the ordinary to be done. He retains about 40 acres in cultivation to raise feed for livestock but the rest of his section is pasture. Daugherty levels in Alpine and in the summer operates a produce business. He started cowboying for his uncles at 8. "The old-time cowmen here thought they had the best cow country in the world," Daugherty recalls of the time half a century ago. He still believes it's the best.

# Sale Proceeds Of Last 3 Years Estimated At Around \$50,000

Big Spring and Howard County businesses, institutions and individuals have rallied to support of the county club boy livestock show with brisk sales every year. Totals on the gross have not been kept, but some idea of tempo can be had from approximates of the last three years. By conservative estimates, these sales have aggregated more than \$50,000 for 65 steers, 118 capons and 271 lambs. Over the years the annual sales have not attained such levels, but since the war they have approximated or exceeded the \$10,000 mark in gross value. Biggest volume was in 1952 when steers averaged just under 61 cents a pound. However the great volume of sheep that year, 125 of them left for judging and sale after the selling, helped boost the total,

which would have been even larger had it not been a light year for capons. Estimates are that steers ran above \$13,000 that year, capons \$750 and sheep \$7,500. Here are some highlights from the last three sales: 1954 — There were 21 steers averaging 53 cents; 66 lambs averaging 44 cents; 83 capons averaging \$15. Delbert Davidson had the grand champion steer which went to Cosden for \$1.25 per pound, and James Cauble the reserve which went to Medical Arts Hospital for \$1; Tommy Birdhead had the champion lamb which went to Humble for \$2.50 a pound and Clarence Thompson the reserve which went to Swartz and McEwen for \$1.50 a pound; Robert Lomax had the champion capon bought by Everett Lomax for \$100, and Grady Barr

had the reserve which went to Mellingers for \$50. 1953 — There were 21 steers averaging 50 cents a pound; 60 lambs averaging \$5.7 cents a pound and 70 capons averaging \$16.55. Sonny Choate had the grand champion steer which went for \$1.25 to Pinkie's Liquor Stores, and James Cauble had the reserve which went to Cosden for \$1 a pound; Norman Spears had the champion lamb which was bought by Dr. J. V. and Neil Sanders for \$1.25 a pound, and Joe Spinks the reserve for \$1.50 by White's Auto Store; Robert Lomax had the grand champion capon which went to Lone Star Brewing Company for \$115; and Norman Spears had the reserve bought by Mellingers for \$50. 1952 — There were 24 steers averaging 60 cents a pound; 35 capons averaging \$35 each; and 125 lambs averaging 60 cents. James Cauble had the champion steer which brought \$1.25 from Cosden, and Ann White the reserve for 75 cents a pound from Big Spring Hospital; Edgar Allen Phillips had champion lamb which brought \$2.50 a pound from Taylor Implement Company and Mac Robinson the reserve which brought \$1.50 from Zales (Nat McMinn got \$1 from Reeder Insurance for his top fine wool lamb the same year); and Robert Lomax had the champion capon and got \$100 from Everett Lomax, while Elsie Lomax, exhibiting the reserve bird, got \$45 from the Howard County Farm Bureau.

## LAMBS, CAPONS CHEAPER \$325 Is Average Show Steer Cost

### Filipinos Go After Two Jap Stragglers

MANILA (AP)—The Philippine army is training a special unit to kill or capture two Japanese stragglers holding out on tiny Lubang Island near the entrance to Manila Bay. They are the survivors of a group which numbered 21 at the end of World War II. Government troops have killed the rest. Col. Salvador Abcede, said today.

Boys and girls who raised steers to show only in the Howard County 4-H Club and FFA Fat Stock Show have an approximate investment of \$325 in each animal, according to Durward Lewter, County Agent. He said the average cost of the steer, if showed several times in

other livestock shows throughout the country, would be about \$400. As there is no expense for the county show here, he explained, the cost would be between \$300 and \$350. The costs of buying the steer, feeding it, and caring for it vary, Lewter pointed out. About the highest cost of a steer is \$150. However, some breeders give boys and girls a steer and others have lower prices, Lewter said. Cost is sometimes as low as \$50, but average cost is about \$100. The cost for a nurse cow also varies but the average expense for 12 months is approximately \$100. It can be only \$60 in some instances, Lewter explained. Feed for the calf for 12 months will average about \$100 too, the County Agent said. This is the approximate cost for feed rations and hay. Veterinary supplies and vaccinations will cost from \$16 to \$18 for 12 months. This cost includes fly control measures in the summer, lice in the fall and winter months, and grubs in the fall. If the animal is insured, the cost will average about \$14.40 per year. Only a few of the boys and girls have this expense, Lewter said. Miscellaneous supplies, such as combs, brushes, halters and show stick will cost about \$20 a year. It costs between \$20 and \$50 per show for a boy or girl and calf. This includes the cost incidental to the van and other expenses. The steers weight from 800 to 1,000 pounds at the time of the show, Lewter said. Lambs are not so expensive as steers, Lewter said. The average

cost of a lamb is about \$15. To feed the animal from October to March will average about \$15. The veterinary bill will cost about one dollar for the period and other costs total about \$3. Thus a boy or girl can raise a lamb and show it for approximately \$35. These animals weigh about 100 to 125 pounds at the time of the show. Capons are even less expensive. Lewter said a caponized bird would cost about \$4 and feed for a year would cost about \$5. An additional dollar for miscellaneous expenses brings the cost up to about \$10 total. The bird is about a year old at the time of the show.

### Texas 'Redbud Trail'

HOWE, Tex. (AP)—Redbud trees are blooming in Texas this spring with unusual beauty. From Durant, Okla., down Highway 75 to Dallas, and up Highway 77 to Gainesville, they call it the redbud trail. The trees will be in full flower through March along this trail.



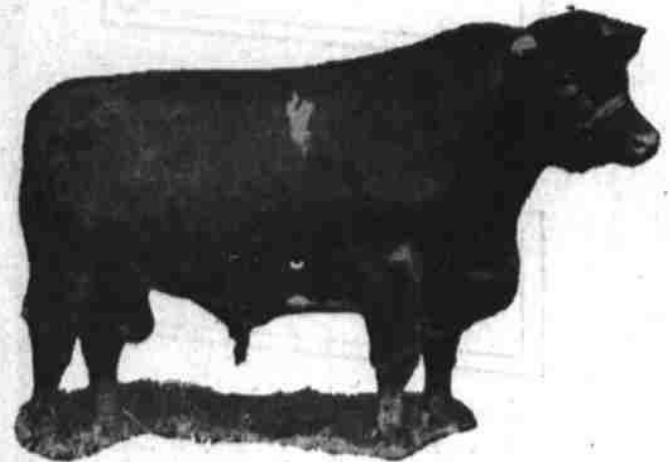

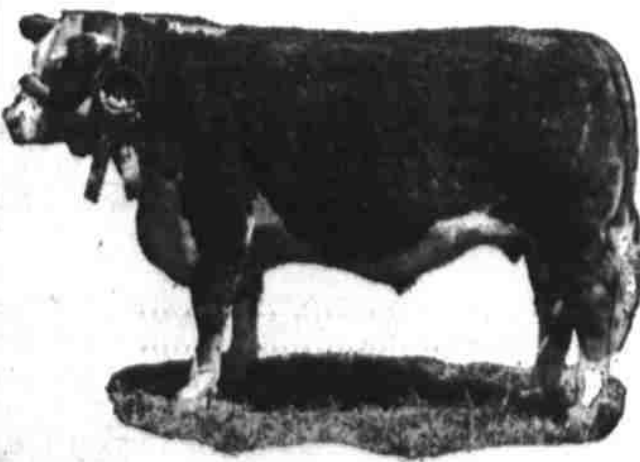

# Club Follows Show Circuit Across Nation

The livestock show circuit followed by the Howard County 4-H Club the past few years stretches from coast to coast and almost from Canada to Mexico. Local exhibitors have participated in practically every major show in the nation. They've won most of them, also. Ten years ago, the club started out with entries in such regional shows as those staged annually at Amarillo, Abilene, San Angelo, Odessa, and El Paso. The schedule for the past year included Phoenix, San Francisco, Ogden, Chicago, Kansas City, Baltimore, as well as the leading Texas shows.

## Holding Turnpike Bonds For Better Money Market

NEW YORK (AP)—Gov. Raymond Gary of Oklahoma indicated today the Oklahoma Turnpike Authority will delay the sale of two big new highway bond issues until the market is better. "I am very optimistic that the two issues will be sold after the bond market improves," said Gary. The governor and officials of the authority conferred today with bond specialists. Last fall the authority sold 68 million dollars worth of bonds for a proposed 85-mile Northeastern Turnpike which will link Tulsa with the Missouri-Kansas line. They are for a proposed Southwestern Turnpike from Oklahoma County to the Texas line near Wichita Falls, with a short spur to Lawton, Okla., near Fort Sill, and a Northern Turnpike which will link the Turner Turnpike with the recently financed Kansas Turnpike 97 miles away.

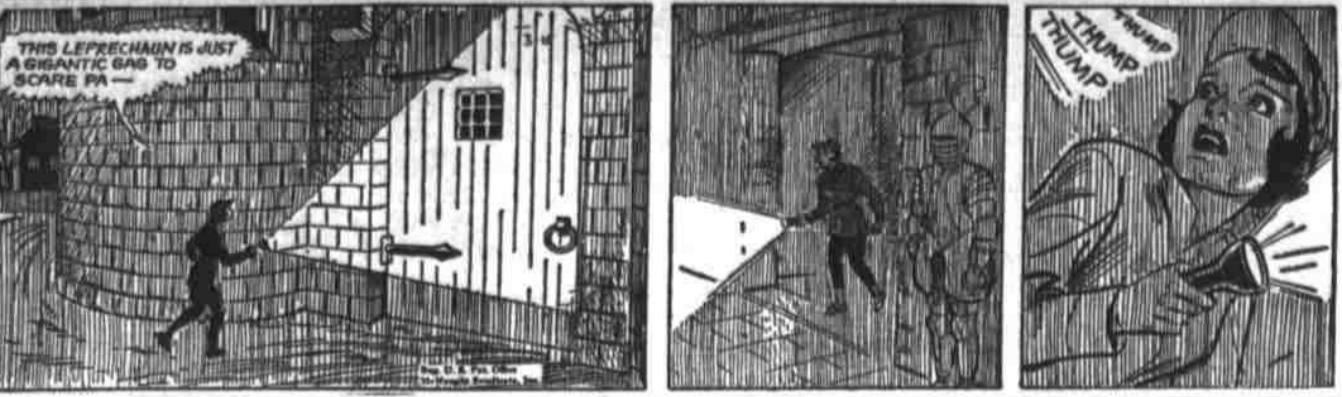
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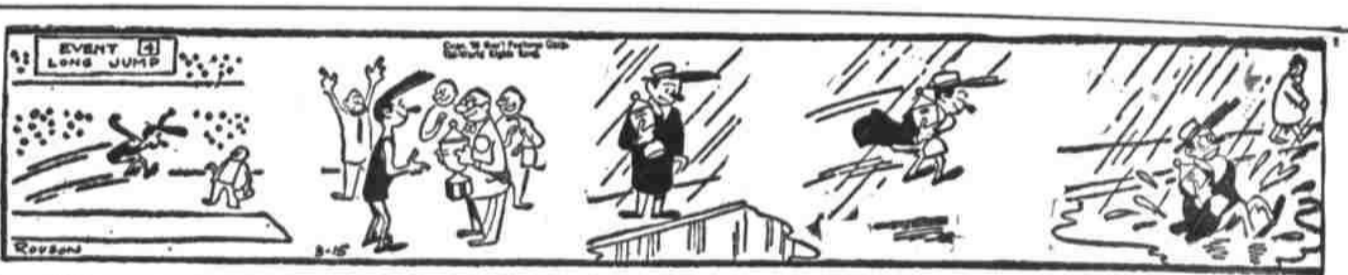

## Regular Attention To Detail Is Part Of Championship Formula

"It is not the big things that ordinarily make champions, but the regular attention to the small things."

So said Durward Lewter, who as Howard County agent has supervised the feeding of more champion steers than any other person in the United States.

The "small things" which Lewter stresses are cleanliness, regular feeding hours, grooming, proper exercise, parasite control, knowing the animal, and good showmanship.

Before a girl or boy obtains the calf, the facilities should be prepared for cleanliness. A shed and pen, chicken proof and with adequate troughs, should be available.

The feeder usually obtains the calves when the animals are a few weeks old, and Lewter said that the calves should never be more than 400 pounds when feeding starts.

The boy or girl should start all calves under 400 pounds on a nurse cow, Lewter said, and the cow should be a good milker yielding a good butter fat content.

The baby calves should be nursed at regular hours three times a day, Lewter pointed out, and when the calves are about four months old the nursing can be lightened to twice daily.

"The first month can determine the destiny of a calf," Lewter declared. "Both boys and calves must get adjusted."

Concentration on the ration to be given individual calves is highly important, the county agent explained, and the calves should be started on a "good, clean, coarse" ration.

The Lewter formula is to give calves weighing up to 400 pounds a ration consisting of five per cent cottonseed meal pellets, 10 per cent bran, 20 per cent cracked corn, and 65 per cent crimped oats. Calves also should have all the non-legume hay they will eat.

"Feeders should be careful to give their calves just what will be cleaned up three times a day," Lewter stated. "The animals should eat from 1 1/4 to 2 pounds of ration for each 100 pounds of body weight

Care should be taken that there is always an ample supply of clean fresh water available, Lewter pointed out.

Changing of rations starts when the calf passes 400 pounds and flesh touch becomes more important. An increase in the corn and bran and a decrease in the crimped oats results. Crimped barley is also added to the ration.

The finishing ration, which comes around 800 pounds, sees an even heavier increase of corn, bran and barley at the expense of the oats. Rations are subject to change according to touch.

Lewter pointed out that calves are weaned any time after 400 pounds.

Youths should begin teaching calves to lead with a halter as soon as possible, because the steer is too big for many boys and girls to handle if they wait until a month or so before the show.

Immediate grooming, three times daily, with a rice root brush and scotch comb is also necessary, according to Lewter. And dehorning, castrating, and vaccination come after the calves are well settled in their new environment.

Feeders must see that the animals are treated for lice and other external parasites at regular intervals. Droppings should be checked, Lewter explained, so that digestive disorders can be remedied.

Exercise is important, especially after the calf reaches 600 pounds, and Lewter believes each calf should be walked from one quarter to a half mile morning and evening.

Bathing after the 800 pound mark is reached should be once every two weeks, and Lewter cautions his 4-H Club members to rinse all the soap out of the hair. The hair should be curled right after washing, he asserts.

Trimming of the calf's feet comes

whenever needed, the job being done with hoof nippers and common wood rasps.

Lewter stresses the importance of tying up the steer 15 days before going to a show so that the animal can bed down on the same material that will be used at the show. The heads and tails are clipped about 10 days before show date.

Hauling to the show can be dangerous as the animal can get too hot or cold and off feed. Arrival should be three days prior to the show to give the calf time to fill up and get over soreness, Lewter said.

After arrival animals should rest between 12 and 24 hours and then be bathed. Exercise should be twice daily while at show and feeding should be thrice daily.

On show morning the animal's hair should be oiled with a light coat dressing. The oil should be rubbed well into the hair, then combed and brushed smooth, Lewter explained.

The person showing the animal, which is usually from 900 to 1,050 pounds, should be neatly dressed and should keep his eyes on the judge at all times, according to Lewter.

The Jaycees spend considerable time and energy in working out details for various shows and contests, Lewter explained, and they always try to give recognition to all steer winners.

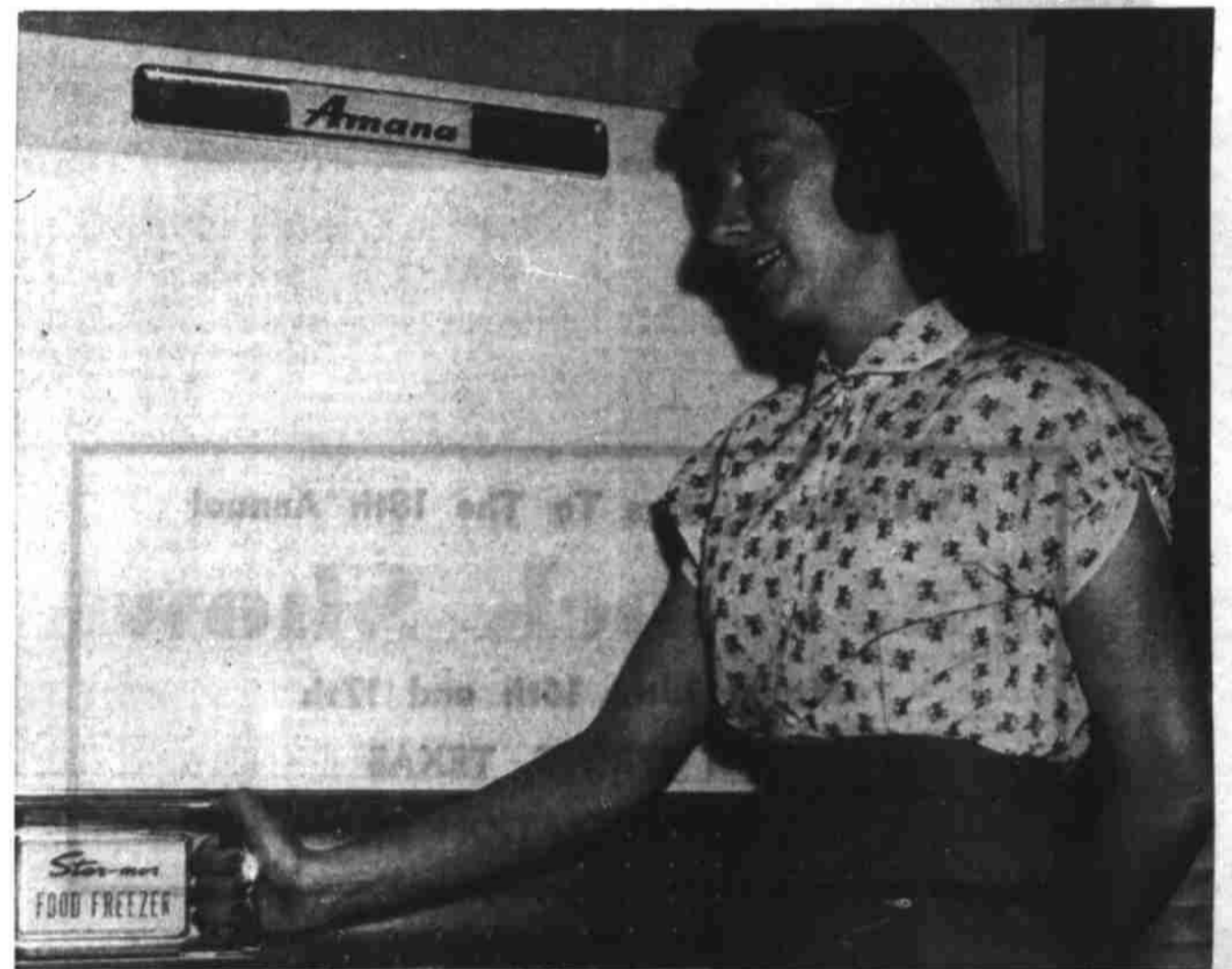
Not the least important of the Jaycees endeavors is the furnishing of prize and sale money for shows.
